He is a past mayor of Farwell and served as Farmer County Attorney in 1946-54. He was a member of the Texas Public Safety Commission from 1952-56. He is a graduate of New Mexico Military Institute and the University of Texas School of Law. He was admitted to the bar in 1933. Aldridge moved to Farwell from Bovina when a small child. He attended the Farwell Schools and as a lad was associated with law enforcement while his

# Farmers Get Early Program Payments

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs will receive their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to Louis Welch, chairman of the Farmer County ASC Committee.

The first batch of payments were mailed out on July 1. Additional payments will be made as farmers certify compliance with program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

Due to inclement weather (rain), some farmers are finding it impossible to report their acres at an early date. Some of them are waiting for ASC employees to measure their program acres, Welch said. Of course, measurement activities have been slowed down because of the rain. This work (by ASCS) will be carried on as rapidly as possible.

"Because of the excellent cooperation between farmers and their local ASCS office,

30 per cent of the participating producers in Farmer County will receive their payments by the end of July," Welch said.

Practically all payments should be completed by about the end of the third week in August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all of the program provisions.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the chairman explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

"Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the past 20 years, but farmer's markets take only about a third of this increase," said Welch. This means new markets are needed. Farm programs help hold down farm production and maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

"Huge surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax collars and are wasteful of food and fiber," he continued. "Farm programs help farmers make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result

in more farm income from the marketplace and less from the public treasury.

"Since farmers are \$50-billion-a-year purchasers of goods and services produced in our cities and rural towns, the workers and business firms in cities and towns benefit from farm programs, too."

Farm programs also make important contributions to conservation of natural resources and help fight pollution, Welch said. Acres that are diverted out of crop production under farm programs are put to conserving uses such as the growing of grass and trees. Such practices conserve soil and water, provide habitat for wildlife and small game, help prevent pollution of streams from sediment and agricultural chemicals or waste products, and reduce air pollution caused by blowing dust, the chairman explained.

"When a farmer takes land out of production and puts it to a soil-and-water-conserving use, he gives up the value of the production he normally would have received as income. At the same time, the farmer pays taxes on land removed from production even though

that land produces no crops. Program payments are designed to compensate him for these voluntary contributions toward a more stable farm economy and a better environment."

In recent years, the U. S. Department of Agriculture advanced partial payments to farmers during the spring sign-up period for the feed grain program only. The balance of the feed grain payment, and cotton and wheat payments were generally made starting in late July and continuing through August and September, or later, the chairman explained.

"Because of budget restraints, partial payments could not be made this year. However, the department made a commitment to farmers that full payments would be made as early as possible. That commitment is now being fulfilled.

"Total farm program payments to producers in Farmer County in 1970 will be about 14 million dollars. Payments mailed out to now amount to about 1/2 million dollars; so, there is quite a number of payments yet to be made," said Welch.

The recent release of unofficial census figures showed that Farwell had a 16% gain in population in the past decade. The same figures indicated that Friona had a 50% gain and Bovina, a figure halfway in between. This puts the county seat as low man on the county totem pole. We wonder how long the rest of the county is going to put up with us as the county seat.

The census indicated that the towns have grown at the expense of the rural population. We had realized that many rural folks had moved their homes to town, but did not realize that apparently there has been a decline in the number of farm laborers in the county. This is probably a reflection of lower prices coupled with higher wage demands, forcing alternatives to human labor usage. While our area's overall growth was not as much as we would have liked, we are in much better shape than the large number of Texas towns that lost population in the soaring sixties.

We are convinced that our High Plains area is in for a much bigger and better boom in the coming seventies. Many things contribute to this feeling of optimism.

One thing that helps our thinking is the attitude of the Golden Spread people in general. Almost universally, business and community leadership is progress-minded. New plans, new ideas are always being formulated by concerned groups and businesses.

For example, the Southwestern Public Service Company is keeping well abreast of the area's power requirements and in fact are urging people to use more electricity. This is in direct contrast to many areas of the East. While pollution is not so much of a problem for us, we still are looking forward to mastering our problems in the most equitable manner possible for all concerned. From our information, we cannot say that for all parts of the country.

We, as an isolated community are not all alone in our efforts to attract additional trade. We have many fine groups working in each town's behalf. Again, an example of a regional group doing excellent work in the field of attracting industry is the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

We recently enjoyed a talk by Larry Milner who is employed by SWPS Co. to assist in this type of promotion. Milner said that our biggest asset in Texico-Farwell was Clovis. By golly, we think he is absolutely correct.

So with many things going for the High Plains, we are expecting the decade of the seventies to do wonderful things for this area. We do not believe that we will be disappointed.

We have not as yet received a preliminary report of the census count in Texico but would be shocked if it differed significantly from the trend shown in Farwell. We were hoping that both census figures would come in together and we could discuss population all at one time, but such is not the case, and we will comment on Texico's figures at a later date.

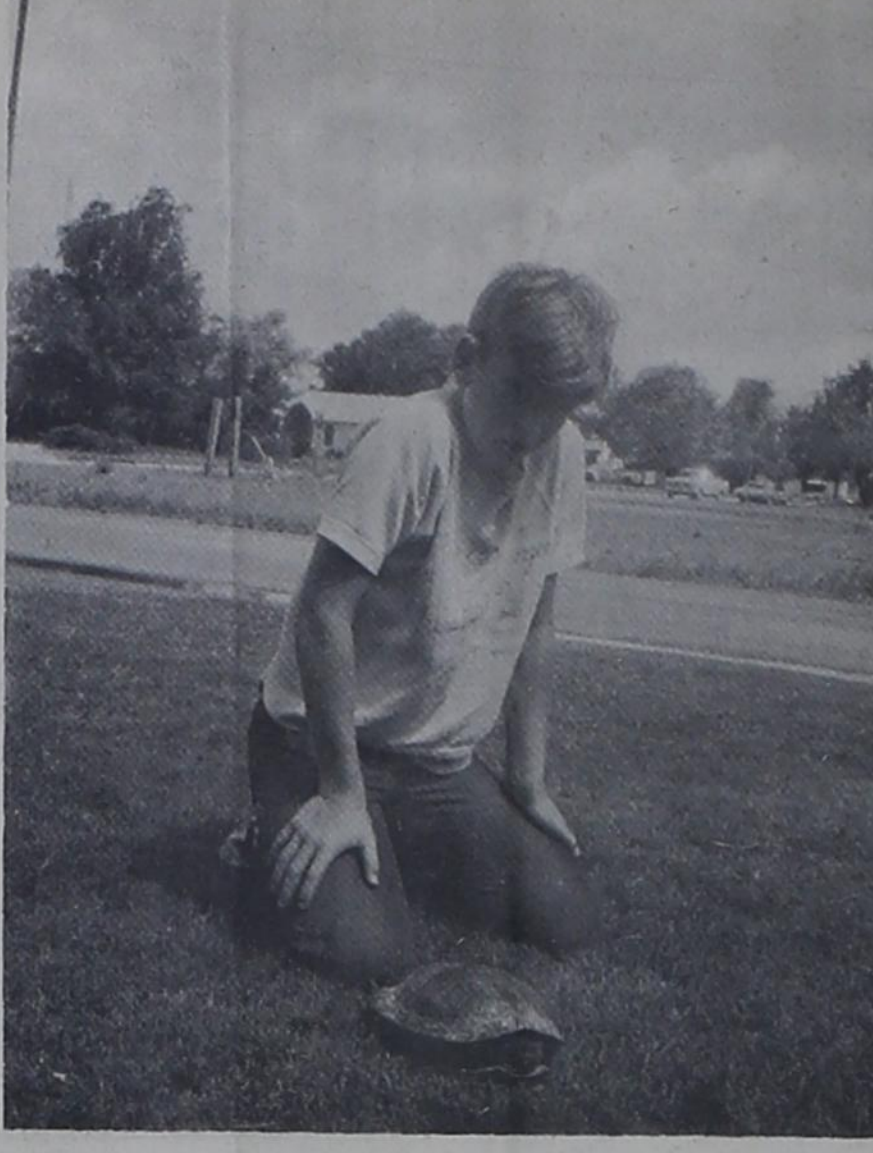

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# My Impression Of Boys State

I returned home with a desire to become a better citizen and a greatly enlarged knowledge of a democratic form of government.

When we arrived at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell we were organized into cities and counties. Each city had 64 citizens and two cities made up a county. City, county and state government was explained to us, and we then began to elect and operate these three levels of government. We adopted our own ordinances and prosecuted offenders in our own courts.

It is a great experience to see over 500 boys interested and working within their own government.

I came away from New Mexico Boy's State with two main conclusions. One, that the only way to strengthen our nation and improve its government is for each citizen to become involved in its operation. Two, to borrow a famous quote from an American patriot, "Democracy is a very poor form of government, but all the others are so much worse."

I would like to thank the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, and the Texico Fire Department for providing me with the opportunity to attend Boy's State.

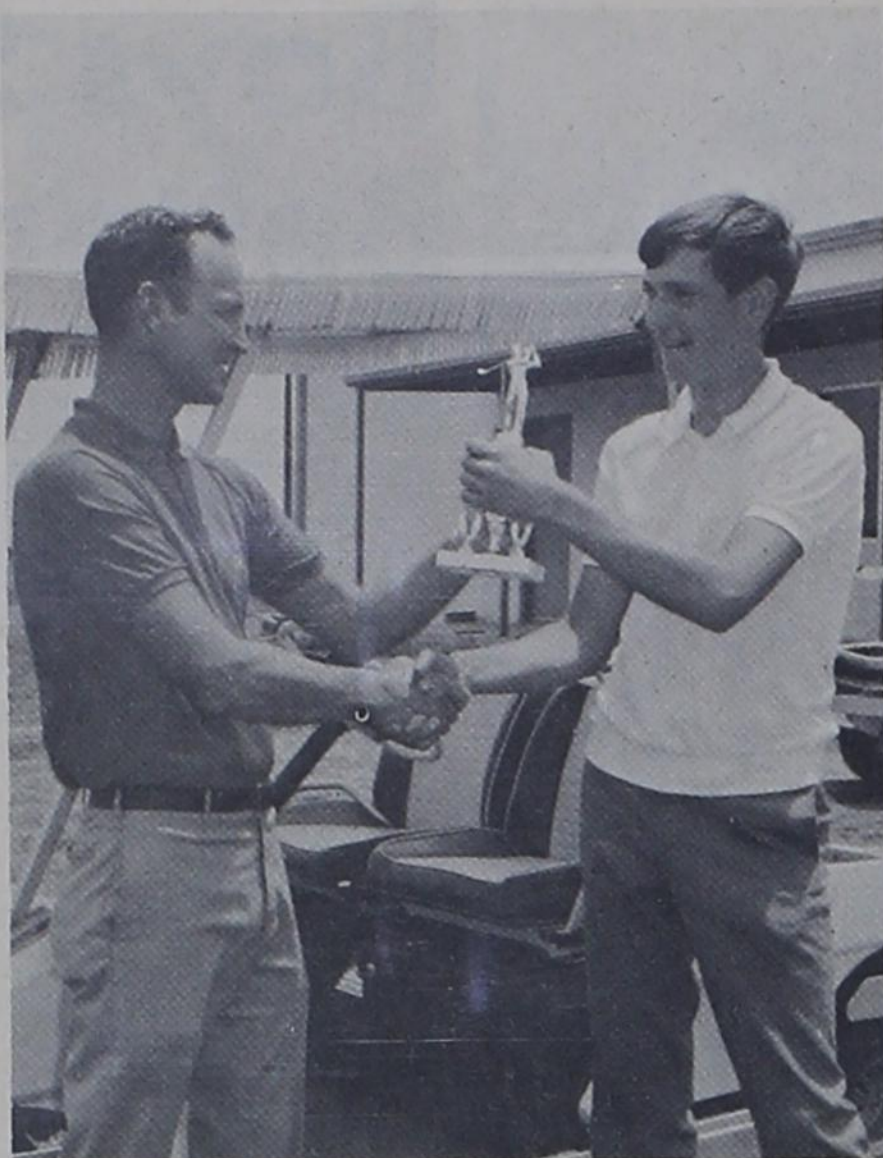
