Everybody who hasn't already seen the fine Christmas decorations that can be found in Farwell should take a drive through town some night and look them over.

There aren't too many window and yard displays this year, but those people who have taken it upon themselves to bedeck the exteriors of their homes with holiday decorations, have done an outstanding job.

In an effort to capture on film some of the beautiful Christmas displays, I went out the other night and shot pictures of about a half dozen that I thought to be outstanding.

One thing I discovered after coming back from my tour around town, was that photography just can't do justice to these colorful night-time scenes. A couple of the pictures,

taken of the choir boy scene at Farwell Clinic and the Santa Claus and his reindeer display at the Joe Crume home, turned out real well, but most of the other scenes, even though they were outstanding, just didn't look like I thought they would. This could be due partly to my inability as a cameraman, but mainly I think its due to the inadequacy of photography to catch the full lustre of the multi-colored decorations.

Many remarkable accomplishments have been made in the field of photography, and cameramen with some of the latest technological advancements can do wonderous things. One area where photography has been able to improve upon its subject has been in portraits. As one photographer friend of mine once pointed out, "It's a poor photographer who can't flatter a person." However, this certainly doesn't hold true in taking pictures of luminous Christmas decorations. There's just no substitute for the naked eye when it comes to getting the full benefit of these lighting displays.

Jury Never Gets Chance

A 35-member jury panel was summoned twice last week for a couple of Parmer County District Court cases but never got a chance to hear either of them.

The jury was dismissed by Judge E. A. Bills Thursday after the counsel for the defendant, in a case styled the State of Texas vs. Bill Rollins, failed to make an appearance. Rollins, of Tyler, was present to face charges of theft with false pretext but his attorney from Dallas did not appear. The attorney will be charged with contempt of court, the

It was the second time in the same week that the jury panel had been summoned but never got a chance to hear a case. On Monday of last week, a 12-man jury had already been selected to hear a case against Everett Deaton of Friona but the judge ruled a mistrial.

In the center of the street, where the modern highway now runs, was a big water tank for people to water their horses. Mrs. Faville feels that the major change in mode of living

is the high-powered automobile and she sometimes wonders if the auto is as beneficial as it should be. She feels that people are living at too fast a pace in glass and passing car windows. the age of modern conveniences and wonders if they take the time to enjoy life as they once did. 



The demand has required that the industry become more mechanized, especially in the Northwest where millions of trees are harvested each year.

Big Business


Trees are stacked by the thousands in collection yards. Conveyor belts carry them directly into railroad freight cars for shipment to all sections of the nation. A spokesman for the Christmas tree industry reports there is a trend toward nursery-raised trees. Big picture windows are partly responsible. Home owners want neighbors and friends to see trees that are symmetrical or unusual. Also, there is a great demand for very small trees. They are for trailer dwellers.


Popular Size

The most popular size of tree is from five to seven feet. This is due, in most part, to the passing of high ceiling rooms and modern home construction. Commercially grown Christmas trees have been shipped from the United States to many distant lands. There seems to be a growing demand for them in Hawaii, Mexico and Cuba.


Holiday Cards Now

AT CHRISTMAS **Thousands Visit Holy Land**

Jerusalem and the Holy Land at this time of the year attracts thousands of Christians from throughout the world. They come by every means of transportation to visit the shrines and Holy places so important to the Christian world.

In Bethlehem they find the Church of the Nativity, traditional scene of the birth of Christ, which is cared for by monks of many sects.

From the Mount of Olives, where Jesus prayed and wept over Jerusalem, visitors can see the great beauty of the Holy City and the great wall that Herod built. Beyond it is the Dome of the Rock which tradition says marks the place were Solomon built his temple and Jeremiah hid the Ark of the Covenant.

The Garden

It was completed in the twelfth century by the Crusaders and many different Christian orders have shrines here.

One of the many traditions of the church is that the keys are kept by a Moslem of the family of Nusaibeh. This custom has been in practice since the time of Saladin, who was Sultan of Egypt and Syria from 1174 to 1193

Supposedly by letting the family of Nusaibeh keep the keys to the church it will keep peace among the many Christian factions.

These are but a few of the many shrines and Holy places that have attracted millions of pilgrims throughout the centuries and will continue to do so for centuries to come.




YIELD PER ACRE OF ALL CROPS


Counting Time Man's Problem For Centuries Time is, as no one can deny,

very valu; ble, so it is not surprising man learned how to count it accurately, down to the minute, even to the second. But, man is not yet, the complete master of time.

The Gregorian Calendar, presented to the world in 1582, brought about the first achievement of any unity on the world time front. But, it took a long time to catch on. England didn't adopt the Gregorian system until 1752, after most other European countries had done so.

Egyptians The ancient Egyptians devised a fairly accurate calendar, similar to the Gregorian in that it was divided into 12 periods and consisted of 365 days. The difference between the Egyptian method and our present time counting system, however, was that the 12 periods used in Egypt consisted of 30 days each, with the remaining 5 days of the year "tacked on" to the last period, or month, with-

out any provision for leap years. The purpose of our Leap Years, then, is not to give every girl the chance to catch herself a man. Instead, Lean Years help us keep the calendar and the solar equinoxes congruent. An adjustment is necessary because of the fact
