Well, this may be true. At least it appears to be in the modern-day version of the American melodrama, the TV western. You can spot the villain when he delivers his first line.

But I'm not convinced this is an accurate slice of life. At least not for me it isn't. I have decided, after some attempts at it myself, that it takes a good bit of courage to tell a good, respectable falsehood.

The spineless, slinking bum that is our mental prototype couldn't deliver a bang-up lie worth taking note of. He just wouldn't have what it takes.

I found out at a very early age that there is more to this lying stuff than just making it up and spitting it out to suit the occasion. It takes some real plotting to tell a lie that will do you any good, and this is where the hard work comes in.

I think the hardest thing to get over when you are trying to get to be a respectable liar is getting caught up with. This is really tough on the beginner. Every youngster can testify to

Mama always told me that if I told stories I would get bumps on my tongue. I got bumps on my tongue from eating too many tomatoes, too, and decided this wasn't an unbearable thorn in the flesh, but the bumps that bothered me were the ones Hop placed on my bottom with a few well-aimed licks with a brass line gauge. This sort of thing nips young liars in the bud pretty

Today it's fashionable to lie about a lot of things, of course. The income tax is probably the most common meeting ground for liars in this country.

Now you can sort of see some point to lying about your income tax. Saving money and all that. But the thing I can't figure out is why everybody wants to lie about things that don't seem important anyway.

The first thing you'll think of along this line is the well-known tendency of anglers to fabricate fabulous tales of their catches; or their almost-caughts.

But do you know anybody who ever told you the truth about their car's gas mileage? This used to be a pretty good game, but since the compacts have hit the road, it's the national habit. The compacts all make 30 miles to the gallon (or better), and you can't find a full-size car that comes below 20 to save your

I believe white lies are okay. At least some of them ought to be. Life would be pretty thorny if we never told any white lies. For example:

"How do I look in my new hat, Dear?" "Wonderful, Just Wonderful." (You look like a

"Do you mind if I bring a friend?" "Of course not. Was about to suggest it myself." (Ye gods, not old Yattity-Yattity all evening again.)

"Congratulations. You played a really swell game." (Blast you, I'll get even the next time you're opposite me.)

"Don't bother to cook, Honey. Let's go out tonight." (If we have leftovers one more time so help me l'11 leave her.) And things like that.

I guess I haven't the stuff that really successful liars are made of. I don't get any credit for this, because I HAVE tried. When I am all wound up to tell good one I feel as if my cranium were made of clear plastic and the object of my intended prevarication can look right inside and see what's fixing to come out.

This makes me clammyhanded, full of stutters, and liable to commit revealing errors outside the chosen plan. That's the tough part, like I said. The plan. If you don't stick to it you'll trip yourself up. And my memory has never been good enough for me to remember the details from one story to another. Invariably I

spill the beans. I believe it's a better policy to take the coward's way out. heart.




Funeral services for Mrs. Francis A. Hardage, a resident of this area for 30 years, were conducted Sunday at 3 p.m. in
