
The highway repaving project has made significant. changes in our local driving habits. In fact, sometimes wefeel that a body just can't get there from here.

Upright and spreading branches of Forsythia make it a popular plant for a hedge or screen. It is also popular as an accent plant for use among evergreens, says Herrera.




