BTD Committee Begins Plans For Celebration

The first planning session for 1980 Border Town Days celebration in the Twin Cities was conducted Monday evening when the BTD Committee met at the Jaycee Community Building. Nineteen persons representing 10 local organizations were present for the initial meeting.

John Getz, Committee president, called the meeting to order and members present offered ideas and selected a theme for this year's Texico-Farwell celebration.

Theme of the 1980 Border Town Days will be "We've Come A Long Way" and businesses and organizations are urged to begin thinking about this theme when planning their floats or entries in the annual parade.

Several definite plans were made Monday night. The celebration will be held in conjunction with the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association rodeo which will be the nights of July 25 and 26, and sponsored by the Farwell Jaycees as it has been for the past several years. The main activities of the annual Border Town Days will take place on Saturday, July 26.

The BTD parade will begin

at 11 a.m. CDT on Saturday and will follow the same route as last year, pending completion of the highway construction in Farwell. The projected completion date is June 30, barring wet weather, which should allow plenty of time for the final work. Texico-Farwell Lions Club will have charge of the parade.

The parade will form south of Highway 60-70-84 at the former Texaco station in Texico, proceed through the "main streets" of both Texico and Farwell, turn south on Fifth Street in Farwell and disband one block south of the Convalescent Center.

A barbecue is scheduled on Saturday following the parade and will again be sponsored jointly by the Farwell Jaycees and the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club. The Jaycees will obtain the meat and the Rotarians will be responsible for the cooking and preparations. Serving of the barbecue meal will begin at 12 noon CDT in the Farwell City Park. The co-sponsors plan to have several serving lines this year to expedite the serving of the meal.

A BTD Queen's Contest will again be held this year with

Joann Getz serving as coordinator assisted by the Farwell Study Club. The queen's contest will take place in the park gazebo following the parade and barbecue. All girls who will attend either Farwell or Texico high schools during the 1980-81 school year are eligible. Each contestant must have a sponsor. The entry fee is \$10, and entrants will be judged on the basis of personality and talent.

Two local sororities, Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha and Alpha Rho Lambda chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, will coordinate the park activities and entertainment. The

sororities will have charge of setting up the park area for booth space for concessions, games, displays, etc. Any group, organization or individual desiring a space should contact a member of this park committee and reserve an area. Space fee will be \$5.00, the same as last year.

The BTD Committee hopes to have a new speaker system installed in time for the celebration so that attendants in all areas of the park will be able to hear the entertainment, contestants and announcements. A total of \$250.67 is reported in the speaker system

Steerette Golfers Are State Champs

Farwell Steerettes golf team won its fourth Class A State Girls' golf tournament title last week in Austin. The Farwell team has won this title four of the six years in which the University Interscholastic League has separated girls' golf into five classes. Ganado, last year's Class A champion, finished second with 754.

Finishing first with a 36-hole total of 729, the Farwell team was coached by Mike Martin and led by Lisa Hughes with a 176 total.

Lisa, a senior who was also a member of the 1977 championship team as a freshman, finished fourth in the medalist play after losing a sudden-death playoff.

Lisa, who was the defending Class A medalist, was beaten in the play-off in the second

extra hole by Sheri Hahn of Ganado.

"I hit two good shots on the second hole, but I ended up in a sand trap," said Lisa. "I'm disappointed about not winning medalist but the team is the important thing."

Janene Berry, Farwell sophomore, shot a total of 179, second on the Farwell team and fifth best overall.

Farwell scores were as follows: Lisa Hughes, 89, 87 - 176; Janene Berry, 91, 88 - 179; Robin Vinton, 93, 92 - 185; Dondra Geries, 96, 91 - 189; Kim Marsh, 103, 94 - 197.

"We all played really well for that day," said Janene Berry. "We could all probably have done better, but we're really proud of the team."

After the girls returned home they were informed that

they had broken the state tournament record. The record was previously held by the 1977 Farwell team.

"It feels fantastic!" the girls said. "We would like to thank the school for their support, and also our parents. We also thank the late Tay Nittler for his help. And thanks to Sharron Hughes and Alice Vinton for their support and for being there when we needed them."

Their plans for the future? "To win next year and keep up the Farwell tradition." At least some of the three seniors hope to be able to continue golf in college.

In his second year as girls golf coach at Farwell, Martin is understandably very proud of his team.

"Under the conditions the

girls played excellent games. There is no way to play that course without losing strokes. But they did an excellent job of staying out of trouble and when they did get in trouble they got out of it well," said Coach Martin.

"They kept their composure well under pressure, especially the second day," he said.

"They won this tournament because of a lot of hard work. The days they practiced in spite of the wind and the cold weather paid off. They put in a lot of hours on the golf course, no matter what the weather was."

"We have five good solid golfers and we could have won the tournament with any four of our scores."

"These are all good kids,"

The Texico girls team, defending state champions and number one in the district this season, will take seven qualifiers to the state meet.

Ruth Scott qualified in the 880 dash, discus, shot put and mile run; Tammy Landis qualified in the 880 dash, discus, and mile relay; Jill Jesko qualified in the 440 relay, 880 relay, 880 medley and mile run; Lisa Coffey qualified in the 440 relay, 880 relay, 880 medley and 440 dash; Corinna Hungerford qualified in the 440 relay, 100 yard dash, mile relay and 880 relay; Becky McDonald qualified in the 440 relay, 220 dash, 880 relay and 880 medley; and Lisa Crooks qualified in the 440 dash, 880 medley and mile relay.

The Texico boys team, second in the district, are taking eight qualifiers to the state meet.

Ron Kirby qualified in the 110 high hurdles, 165 low hurdles, 400M relay and long

jump; James Hadley qualified in the high jump, long jump and 400M relay; Joe Martinez qualified in the shot put and discus; Ronnie Landis qualified in the 200M dash; Ricky Foreman qualified in the shot put; Herbert Bibbs qualified in the 100M dash and the 400M relay; Willie Bibbs qualified in

the 400M relay; and Clyde Bibbs is going as an alternate. According to Coach Roy King, girls track coach, the girls have a pretty good

chance of winning the state meet again this year. "It will be between us and Tatum, but I don't know in what order. I hope we win," said King.

"We have beaten Tatum twice in a row and the kids have been running pretty hard. Three straight track meets have helped because we have

run every weekend and we always know when we will run. Last year it seemed like most of the track meets got rained

GPI Fuel Alcohol Meet Is Successful

The High Plains GPI sponsored a free barbecue on Thursday, May 1, at the Muleshoe Civic Center. Purpose of the meeting was to get farmers and agri-business people to come and hear plans for the proposed fuel alcohol plant being planned for the area.

This was also to have been the final deadline for membership in the fuel alcohol cooperative, as announced by the GPI.

According to Bert Williams, local spokesman for the GPI, the meeting was a huge success, with almost 400 people attending and enjoying the food.

Speaker for the event was Alvin Mavis of Illinois whose speech on the production of alcohol was entitled "Alcohol Fuels the Future."

"We got about 50 new members to join the cooperative plus a lot of persons put

in their additional \$500. In all, we collected about \$90,000.00 that night," said Williams.

It was announced at the meeting that the consultant was working on a lease-purchase for the proposed plant. "It will take about two weeks to get approval on the lease so we have extended the deadline on membership in the cooperative until that time," said Williams.

"Everyone is really enthusiastic about the lease-purchase prospects. If anyone wants to know more about it they can contact one of the members," commented Williams.

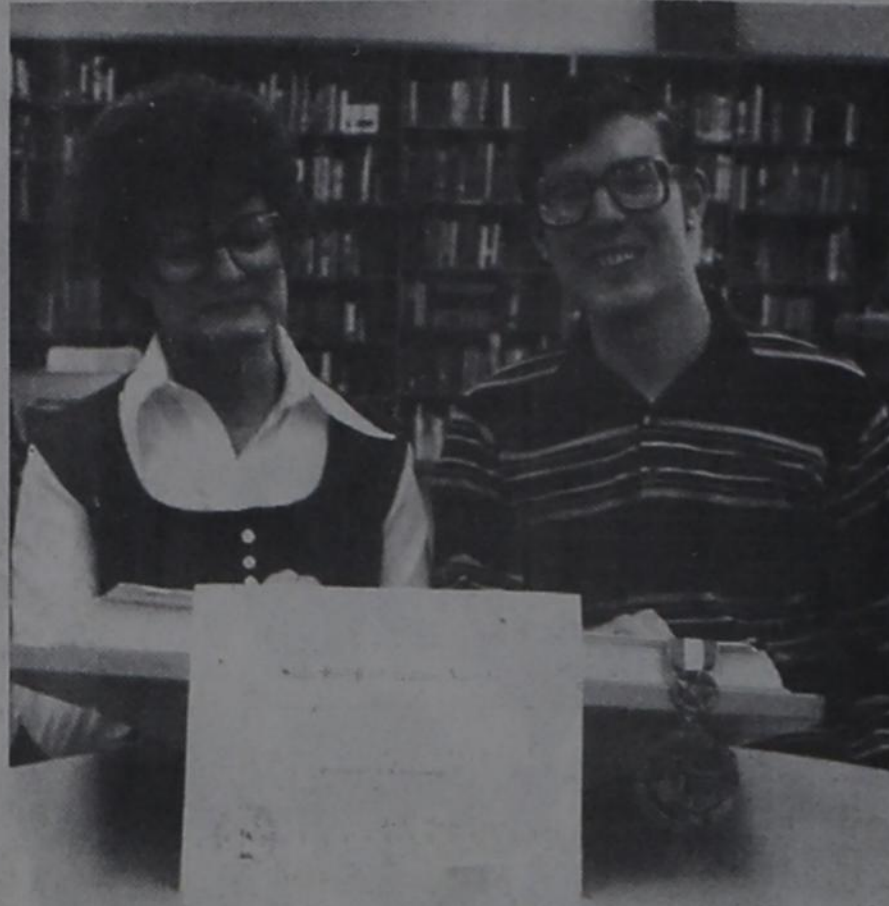
entries.

Sheriff's Report

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that his department is investigating the theft and vandalism of a pickup and a tractor at Bovina early this week.

A 1976 Ford pickup belonging to Bovina Pump Company and a John Deere tractor belonging to Tom Beauchamp were reported taken Sunday night and were discovered near Bovina Monday morning. Sheriff Lovelace said that both vehicles received damages amounting to thousands of dollars. The tractor had been left with its motor running and

it was missing one rear wheel. Much damage had been done to the vehicles and to the road where the tractor had plowed through it.

One person has been arrested in the case and is being held in jail at Canyon, and two other persons are expected to be arrested in the case, Sheriff Lovelace said.

In other activities sheriff's officials are investigating the theft of some \$150 from the agriculture department at Bovina Schools. Entry was made by breaking a window and the money was taken from an unlocked filing cabinet. Sheriff Lovelace said that the filing cabinet can be reached by a person at the window and said that this was the second time in only a few months that a theft of this nature had occurred at this ag room.

The Co-op Gin south of Friona reported that some \$200 worth of batteries had been taken from tractors on the gin yard.

Ned Gutierrez of Friona has been picked up in Phoenix, Ariz., and will be returned here as soon as he signs extradition waivers. He is wanted here for violation of probation the sheriff said.

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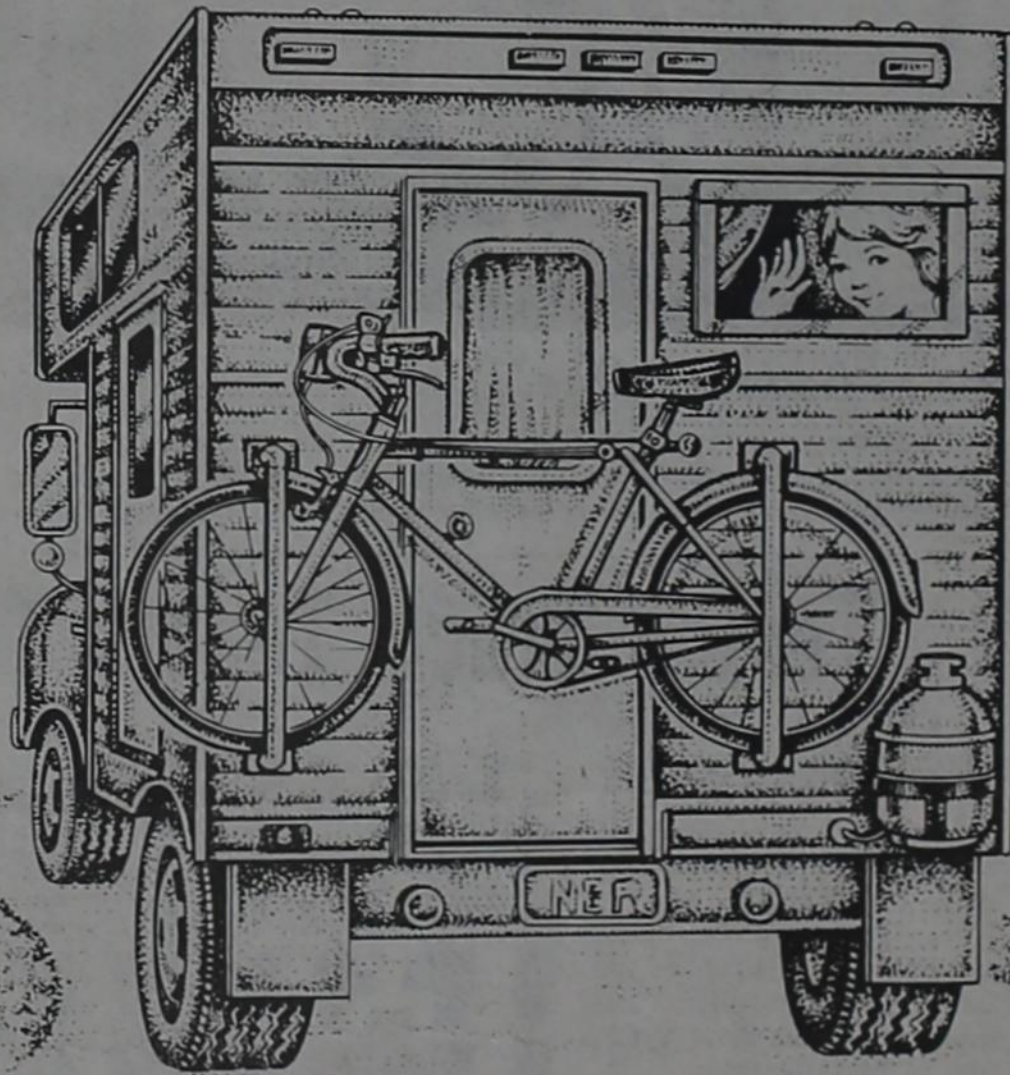

Letters were sent to Farwell seniors in April urging applications for the chapter's scholarship award.

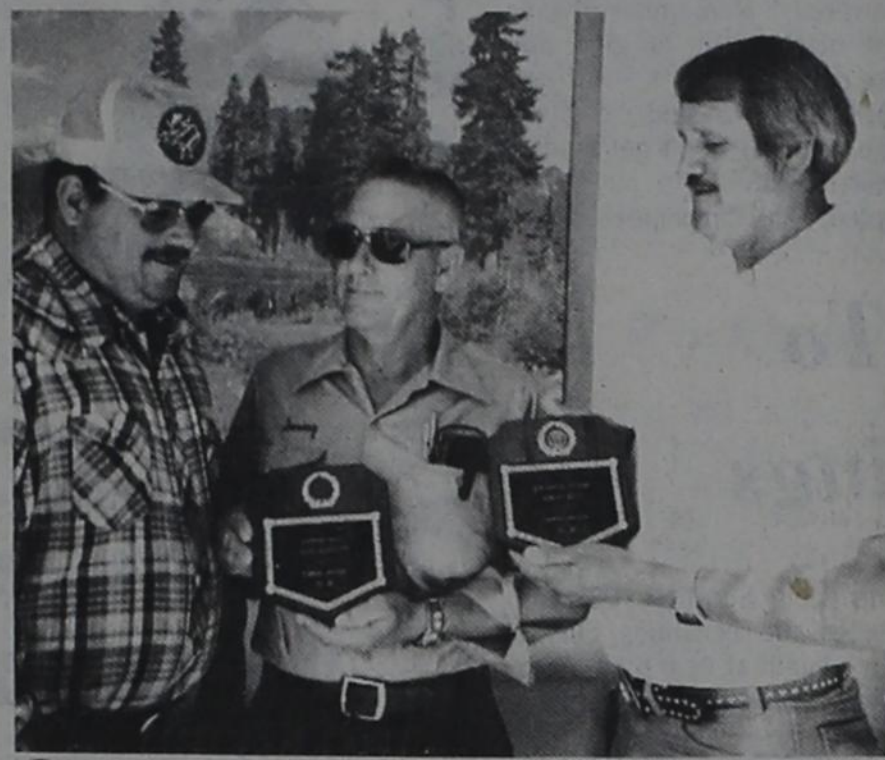
Following the evening's ceremonies and yearly report, members and wives stayed for music and dancing.

Tax Appraisal Board Withholds Decision

In a meeting Monday night, the newly-organized Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board withheld a decision on accepting the anonymous donation of a building to house the board. The board will meet again Monday, May 12, to make the decision.

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in a special called meeting Wednesday, April 23, to consider the donation of the building. The decision of the Commissioners Court was to consider the acceptance of the building contingent upon the approval of the Tax Appraisal Board.

According to Judge Porter Roberts, the vote to consider the acceptance of the building is not legally binding.

"After the Tax Appraisal Board makes its decision on the building, the Commissioners Court will meet in a legally advertised meeting to make the final decision. We will take the decision and desires of the Tax Appraisal Board into consideration when making our decision," said Roberts.

The question concerns the anonymous offering of a building to house the Tax Appraisal Board. The building

will cost the county nothing except for the expense of the pavement around the building.

The construction of the 30'x40' all-brick building will cost approximately \$50,000 and take about 75-90 days to complete.

There is only one stipulation attached to the building; that it be constructed on the north-west corner of the Parmer County jail.

The new Tax Appraisal Board consists of E.A. Parham, Lawrence Jamerson, David Grimsley, D.C. Herring and Gilbert Kaltwasser.

Welcome Showers Fall In Area

The beginning of the spring rains and thunderstorms of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico made itself known Monday and Tuesday nights as area residents were bombarded with much-needed water and a fire-work display of lightning.

The Sherley-Anderson elevator at Lariat recorded a total of .7 inch for the two-night total.

Sam and Duane White recorded "about one inch" on their farm in the Oklahoma

Lane-Lariat area.

According to a spokesman for Southwestern Public Service Company in Farwell, the lightninging also did slight damage to their equipment when lightning struck some lines in the Oklahoma Lane Community Tuesday night. The downed lines caused the

power to be off a total of about four hours, but not in any one area. A local Farwell resident stated that the power was off in her home for about 15 minutes.

Though the rain was a little late for some crops, the moisture was certainly appreciated by area farmers.

Mr. Edwards said, "Just be sure that both don't get mad at the same time." Signed, Avis Carpenter

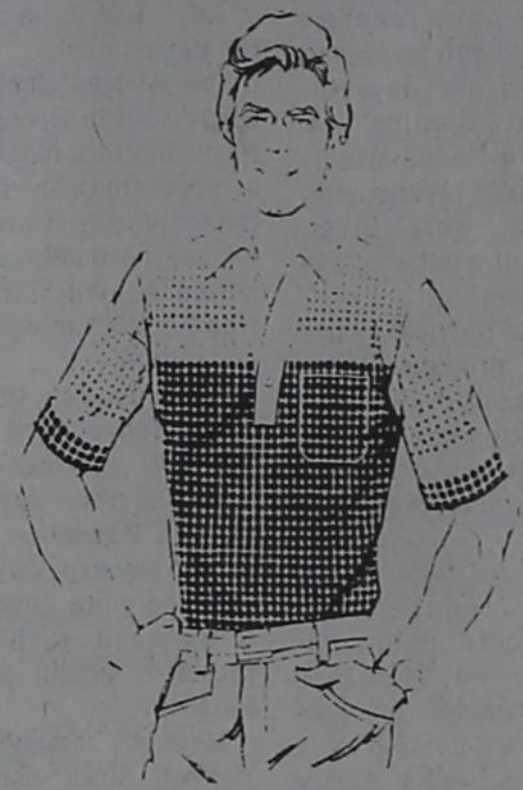

All youth applying will need to complete an Income Eligibility Worksheet for each income recipient in the family. These sheets may be obtained from James Craig at the Farwell School Administration office.

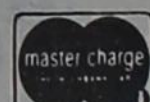
The program is scheduled to start on June 9 and will run approximately 8 weeks. Activities will include pre-job orientation, labor market information and job training.

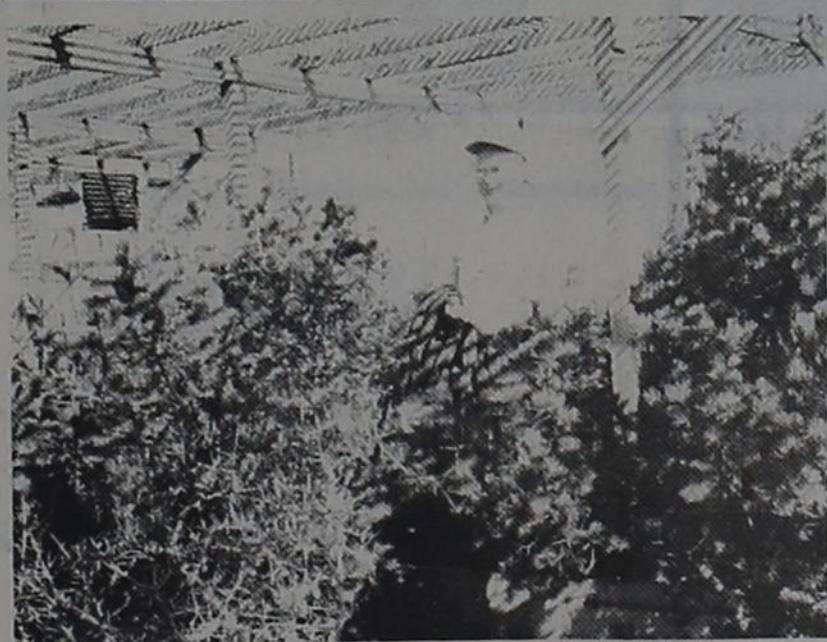

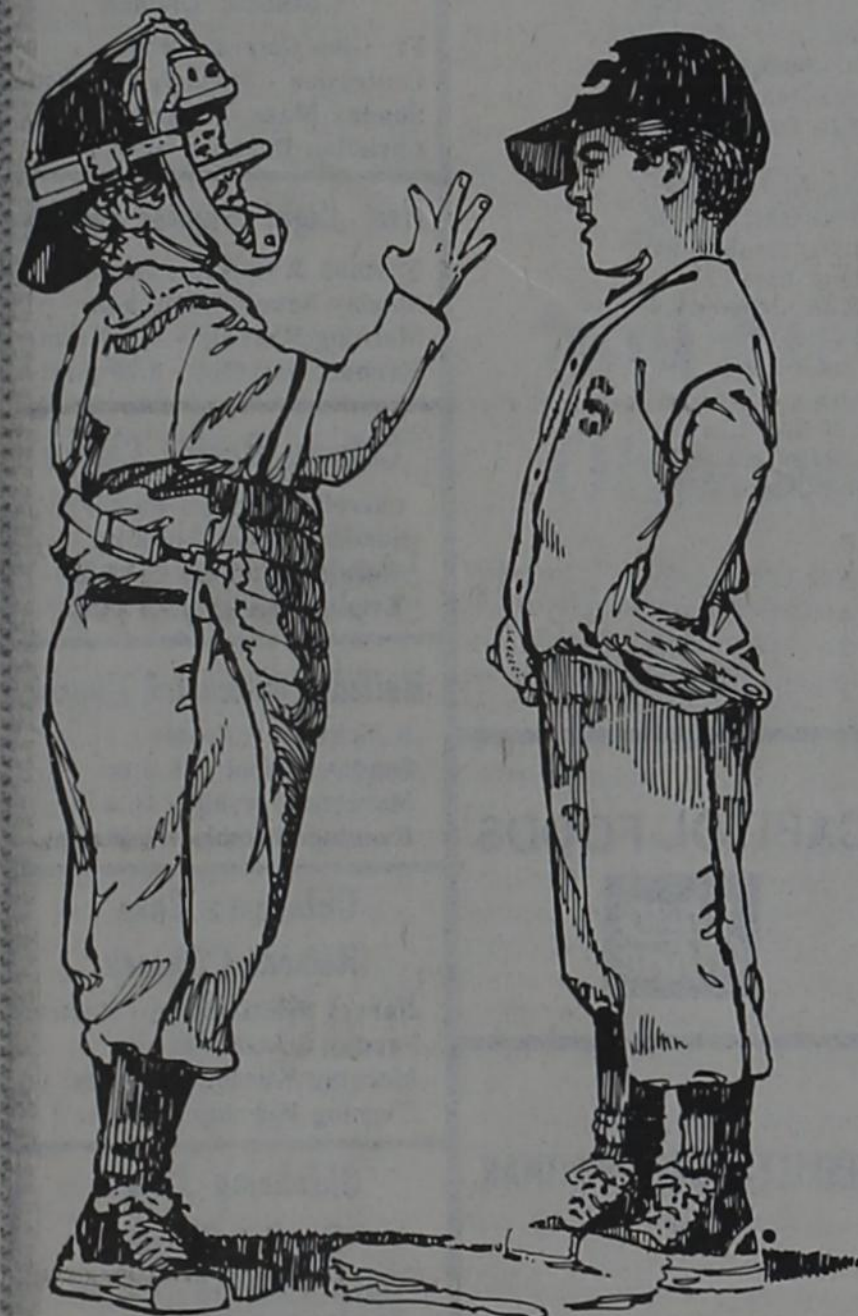

questions and answers

Q. When I became eligible for Medicare, I decided not to take the medical insurance part. Now, I've changed my mind. Isn't there a special time of year when people can enroll in medical insurance?

A. People who turn down Medicare medical insurance and later decide they want it can sign up during a general enrollment period, the first 3 months of each year. That means you only have until the end of March if you want to sign up this year. If you enroll during a general enrollment period, your protection won't start until the following July and your premium will be 10 percent higher for each 12-month period you could have been enrolled but weren't.

Q. Two years ago, I was severely injured in an auto ac-

cident and haven't worked since. Even though my condition hasn't improved, I've been thinking of trying to get some kind of job because I need the money. If I do go to work, will my disability benefits stop right away?

A. No. But if you take a job, you should notify social security immediately. People who return to work before their medical condition has improved may be eligible for a trial work period. During this period, they may work and still get disability checks. Even if you are not eligible for a trial work period, you will be paid benefits for an adjustment period of 3 months should you recover or return to substantial gainful work. If you do start working, be sure to notify social security.

THE TIME ELEMENT IN SCRIPTURE

How many problems would be solved, how many seeming contradictions in Scripture explained, if we were more careful to note the time element, emphasized so strongly in the Word of God.

In Romans 5:12 we learn that sin entered the human race by Adam. Then later "the law entered" (Ver. 20). But still later the Apostle Paul arose to say, "But now, the righteousness of God without the law is manifested" (Rom. 3:21).

Early in man's history blood sacrifices were required for acceptance with God (See Gen. 4, Heb. 11:4); later circumcision and the law (Gen. 17:14, Ex. 19:5), and still later, repentance and water baptism (Mk. 1:4, Acts 2:38). But not until Paul we learn of salvation by grace through faith alone, on the basis of Christ's finished, all-sufficient work of redemption.

This is why the apostle refers in Gal. 3:23 to "the faith which should afterward be revealed." This is why he declares that our Lord "gave Himself a ransom for all, to be manifested in due time, and adds: "whereunto I am ordained a preacher and an apostle" (1 Tim. 2:6, 7).

It is only as we recognize the time element in Scripture that we see the difference between "the kingdom of heaven" and "the Body of Christ," between "the gospel of the kingdom" and "the gospel of the grace of God," between the "dispensation of law" and "the dispensation of the grace of God."

A comparison of Romans 3:21 and 26 shows how this time element is emphasized in Scripture.

After discussing the function of the law in Verses 19 and 20, the Apostle Paul declares:

"BUT NOW the righteousness of God without the law is manifested.... Then, in Ver. 26 he states that it is God's purpose:

"To declare, I say, AT THIS TIME, His (Christ's) righteousness; that He (God) might be just and the Justifier of him that believeth in Jesus."

There you have God's terms of salvation for today. The sinner who places his trust in Jesus Christ, who paid the penalty for our sins, is justified before the bar of God. Glorious message! Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved.

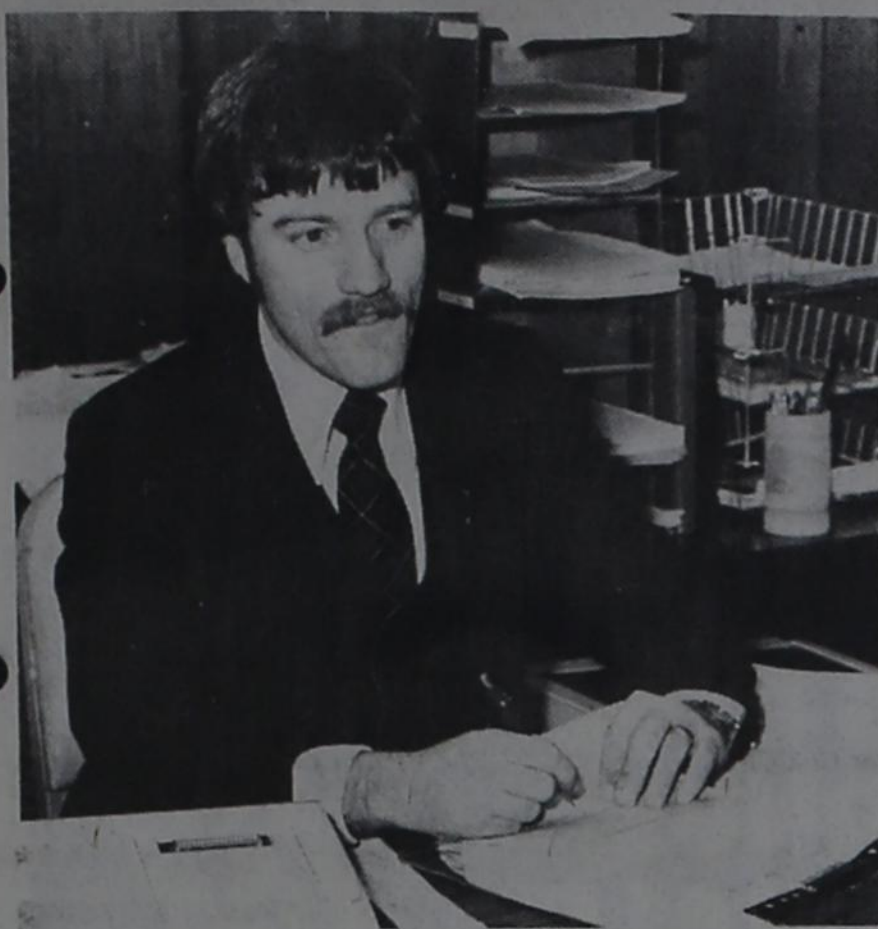

Receives Promotion

Roddy Pearce, former staff accountant with Allsup's Convenience Stores, was promoted to Director of Internal Audit, according to a company spokesman. A graduate of Wayland Baptist College, Pearce received a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration at Eastern New Mexico University. Originally from Texico, Pearce, his wife Ann and their daughter Jaime presently reside in Clovis.

Parmer County voters turned out in moderately heavy numbers for the Democratic and Republican Texas primaries last Saturday. According to County Clerk Bonnie Warren, of the 4091 registered voters, 1761 cast their ballots for a 40 percent voter participation in the two primaries. "The average turnout for Parmer County is about 33 percent so this was a good turnout," said Mrs. Warren.

In Parmer County, there was a very close race in the Democratic primary for County Commissioner, Precinct three. County-wide, Cecil Atchley received 65 votes, Max C. Crim received 194 votes and Archie L. Tarter, incumbent, received 140 votes.

In the individual precincts in this race the count was as follows: Farwell precinct, Atchley, 41; Crim, 113; and Tarter, 121; Oklahoma Lane precinct, Atchley, 21; Crim, 79; and Tarter, 12.

This is the only county race in which a runoff election will be necessary because neither of the three candidates received a majority vote. The

run-off election will be Saturday, June 7.

Also in the Democratic primary, running for County Judge to fill the unexpired term of Paul Fortenberry, Porter Roberts won the race with 857 votes over Joe Buchanan with 515 votes.

The precinct break-down for the County Judge race is as follows: Black precinct, Buchanan 19 and Roberts 21; Friona precinct, Buchanan 162 and Roberts 383; Bovina precinct, Buchanan 96 and Roberts 110; Farwell precinct, Buchanan 101 and Roberts 149; Lazbuddie precinct, Buchanan 45 and Roberts 64; Oklahoma Lane precinct, Buchanan 41 and Roberts 61; Rhea precinct, Buchanan 14 and Roberts 31; Lakeview precinct, Buchanan 26 and Roberts 8; absentee, Buchanan 11 and Roberts 30.

All other local Democratic races were uncontested in the primary. For District Attorney, 154th District, Jack Young received 1080 votes. For County Attorney, Johnny W. Atkinson received 1110 votes. For Sheriff, M.C. (Bill) Morgan, Jr. received 1156 votes. For County Tax Assessor-Collector, Hugh Moseley

received 1239 votes. For County Commissioner, Precinct One, Ernest Anthony received 560 votes. For Justice of the Peace, Precinct One, Albert H. Smith received 366 votes.

For County Chairman, Richard Collard received 943 votes. The uncontested positions of Precinct Chairmen were as follows: Precinct One, Martha Hamilton, 36 votes; Precinct Two, Jay E. Beene, 444 votes; Precinct Three, Ken Horn, 145 votes; Precinct Four, Wilfred Quickel, 215 votes; Precinct Five, Mrs. Max Steinbock, 102 votes; Precinct Six, Wendol Christian, 86 votes; Precinct Seven, Raymond K. Schueler, 37 votes; and Precinct Eight, Mike Buchanan, 32 votes.

The Democrats indicated their Presidential preference in the following numbers county-wide: Jimmy Carter, 554 votes; Ted Kennedy, 131 votes; Jerry Brown, 49 votes; and uncommitted, 581 votes.

On the local scene in the Republican primary Nick R. Hand, the candidate for sheriff, received 223 votes; and Raymond Euler, candidate for County Commissioner, Precinct one, received 116 votes.

The Republicans elected as their County Chairman Ellen Estes with 31 votes. Precinct Chairmen were elected as follows: Friona Precinct, Ron Awtrey received 11 votes; Bovina Precinct, Houston Hoover received 23 votes; Farwell Precinct, Delbert Lingnau received seven votes; and Lazbuddie Precinct, Glenn Lust received five votes.

State-wide in the Democratic primary, there were eight contested races.

For State Senator, 31st District, Parmer County voted 867 for Bill Sarpaluis and 477 for Gerald McCathern. In the race for Railroad Commissioner the Parmer County vote was 742 for John Poerner and 481 for Buddy Temple.

The county vote for the other Railroad Commissioner's place was 679 for James Nugent and 592 for Jim Hightower.

In the race for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place one, Parmer County voted 473 for James P. Wallace, 330 for John C. Phillips and 185 for Wayne Scott.

In the race for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place two, the county voted 502 for Sears McGee and 466 for

Lawrence E. Bergman. For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place one, the Parmer County vote was 508 for Leon Douglas and 477 for Marvin O. Teague.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place two, the county vote was 393 for Mike McCormick, 258 for W.T. Phillips and 281 for John Humphreys.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place three, the county vote was 333 for Edith Roberts, 328 for Tom Davis and 256 for Walter Boyd.

The uncontested Democratic primary races state-wide were as follows: (the votes are total Parmer County votes)

United States Representative, 19th District, Kent Hance, 1213 votes; Associate Justice, Supreme court, Place three, Robert M. Campbell 882 votes; Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4, C. L. Ray, 855 votes; State Representative 74th District, Bill Clayton, 1106 votes; Member, State Board of Education, 19th District, James H. Whiteside, 930 votes; Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District, Charles L. Reynolds, 902 votes; Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District, Carlton B. Dodson, 886 votes and Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District, Richard N. Countiss, 846 votes.

The Republican primary had

only one contested state race. For Railroad Commissioner, Parmer County voted as follows: E.W. (Billy) Kidd, 77 votes; Henry C. (Hank) Grover, 107 votes; and John Thomas Henderson, 57 votes.

On the national scene, the Republicans cast their ballots in the Presidential primary. The county vote was as follows: Ronald Reagan, 303, and George Bush, 16. There were no uncommitted votes in the county primary.

Uncontested Republican primary races were as follows: Railroad Commissioner, H.J. (Doc) Blanchard, 227 votes; Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place one, Jim Brady, 222 votes; Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place four, Will Garwood, 217 votes; and State Senator, 31st District, Bob Price, 253 votes.

In the proposition concerning wiretapping Parmer County voted 228 "for" and 66 "against." In the Initiative and Referendum proposition, Parmer voted 238 "for" and 58 "against."

The Democratic Parmer County convention will be Saturday, May 10, at 2 p.m. at the First State Bank in Bovina.

The Republican Parmer County convention will be Saturday, May 10, at 8 p.m. in the Jaycee Building in Farwell.

Gardening News

Forsythia Is Beautiful And Easy To Grow

It happens very early every spring. Frustrated gardeners view with envy those large, yellow bloom-covered plants in a yard along the street, wishing every inch of the way that they had something like that around their yards. You can, and very easily, says Esteban Herrera, Extension horticulturist for New Mexico State University.

The plant that you see in all of its showy early spring glory is Forsythia or Goldenbell. It is an old deciduous garden shrub often found around New Mexico homes.

Upright and spreading branches of Forsythia make it a popular plant for a hedge or screen. It is also popular as an accent plant for use among evergreens, says Herrera.

The flowers of Forsythia are bright yellow and bell-shaped. They bloom in the spring before the leaves appear, making the plant a solid mass of yellow color. It's an easy shrub to grow. Forsythia thrives in most garden soils, but it may be a good idea to add a little organic matter in the hole when you're planting it. Herrera also suggests that mulch be used around newly set plants.

Forsythia often tends to grow too large for its space

and has to be pruned. This should be done in the spring immediately after bloom. Next year's flower buds develop during the summer. Space the plants at least five to seven feet apart and three to four feet from a building to minimize the need for pruning as the plant grows.

Soil Stewardship Week Observance Set May 11-18

Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will join in the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 11-18, according to an announcement by Leroy Johnson.

Theme of this year's celebration is "The Judgement of Nature." Its focus is especially appropriate as the United States considers the current condition of its soil, water and related resources," said Johnson.

"Through nature, we are linked with the past and committed to the future," it is said in the 16-page "Judgement of Nature" reference booklet, which presents thoughts for consideration not only during Soil Stewardship Week, but throughout the year.

When planning your trips, a little thought for family protection can help keep these excursions happy rather than tragic, urges the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Weekends, especially holiday

weekends, are statistically the most dangerous driving periods for Texans, according to Department of Public Safety records. But a little planning can help the motoring family avoid the most dangerous period during those weekends: the deadly hours between 11 p.m. and 3 a.m.

Seat belts, effective any time, are critical items of equipment during family trips. In addition to halting back-seat distractions and helping keep the driver's attention on

the road, buckling up can greatly reduce the chances for a severe injury or fatality for all the loved ones in the vehicle.

A vehicle crash victim has 57 percent less chance of being injured or killed when wearing a lap-shoulder type seat belt, and 31 percent less chance when wearing a lap belt alone.

One other simple but effective preventive measure is for the driver to keep his attention on the road all the way into the driveway. Many people are

lulled by the familiarity of roads and streets near home when returning from a trip. Many tend to eagerly speed up for a kind of "finishing kick" on the last leg of a trip. These drivers contribute to the fact that 75 percent of all traffic accidents involving death or injury occur within 25 miles of the victim's home.

Giving just a little thought to family protection before and during a trip can help keep any family excursion a happy and memorable one.
