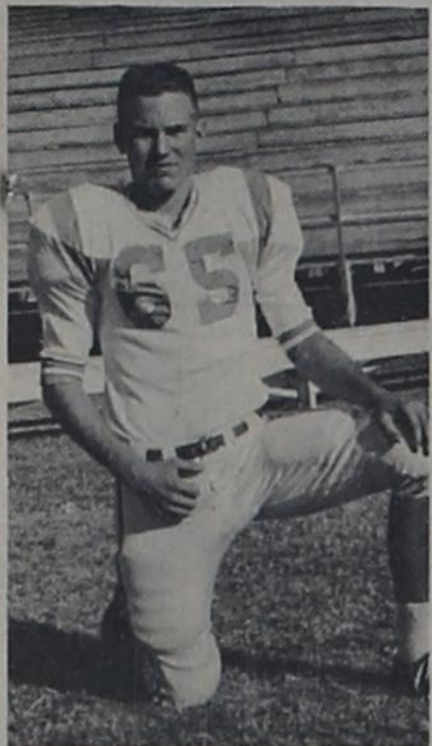
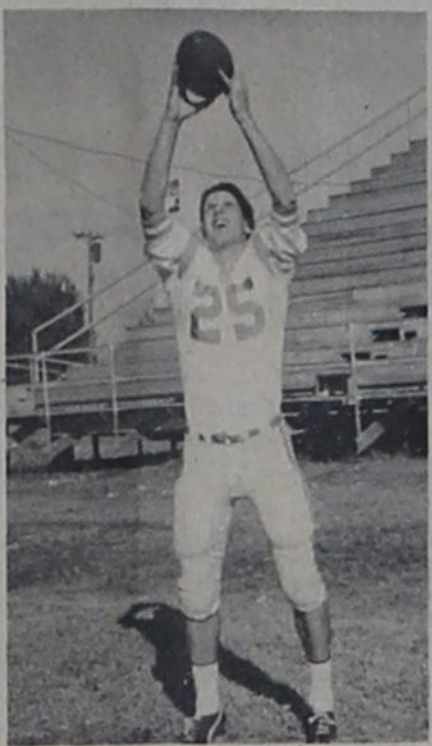


Ten Steers Named To District 3-A Teams

All schools in the district had boys named to the list; however Farwell with ten boys listed took top honors with 17 places copped by the locals.

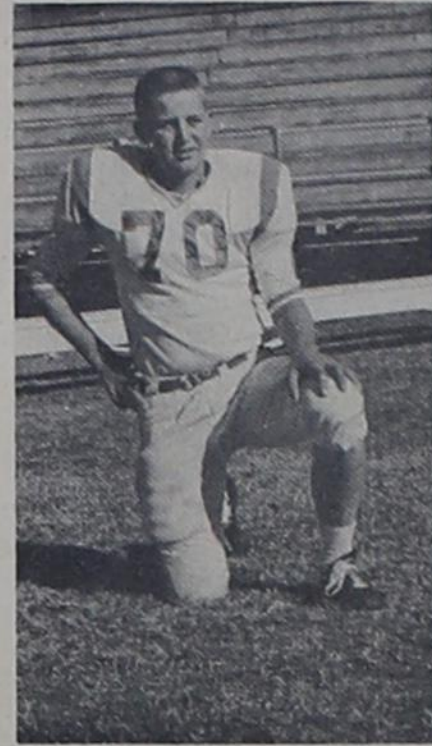
Unanimous choice as a first team quarterback was Leon Lovelace, senior, who also was named to the second team as a defensive linebacker.

Danny Lindop, senior, was a unanimous choice as a first string offensive halfback and also placed on the first team defensively in the same position.

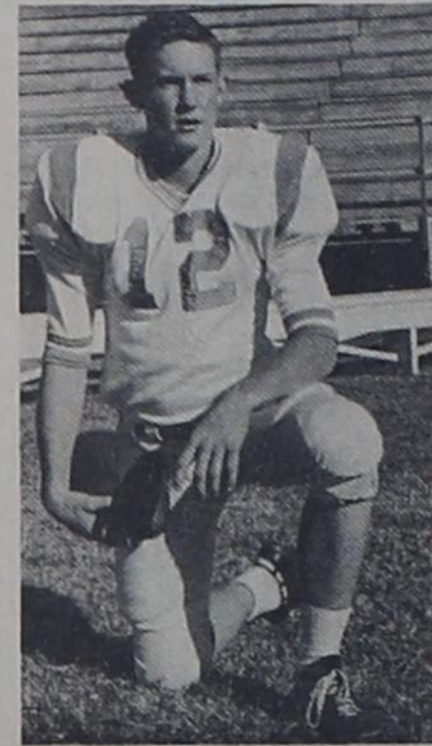
Jerry Childs, junior was unanimously chosen as an of-

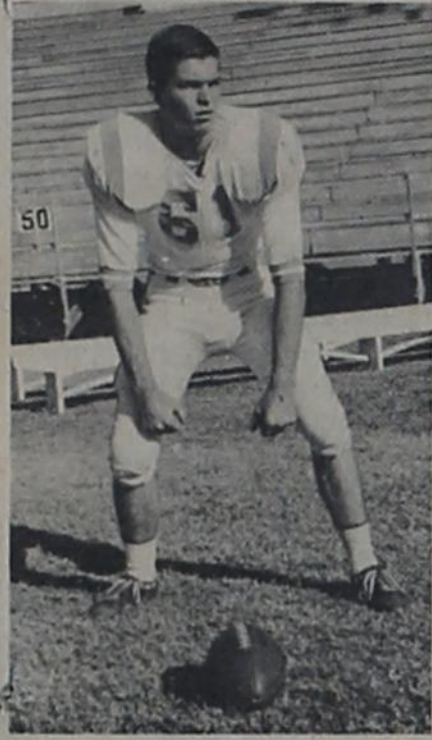

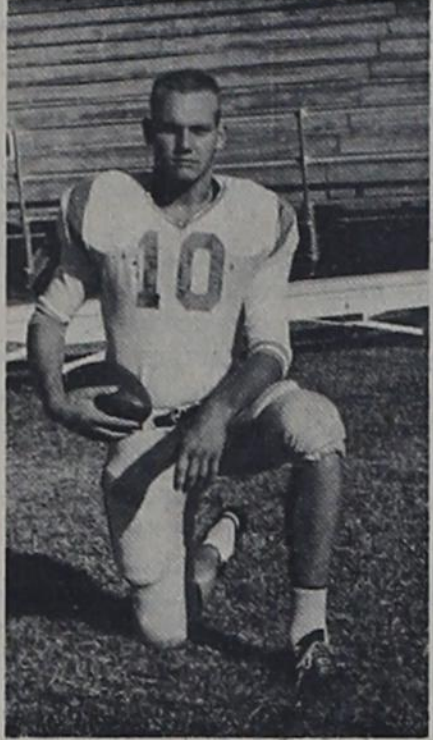

Texico To Purchase New Fire Truck

Texico town fathers meeting in regular session Friday approved the purchase of a new fire truck to be used by the town's volunteer fire department. The truck, a 1964 Ford, will be purchased from the lowest bidder, Thunderbird Sales, Albuquerque for \$13,911.

Also tentatively approved was the purchase of a 1964 Dodge police pursuit special for the use of town marshal Jim Light.

The council signed a street

and alley use agreement with Sides TV Cable Service, allowing them to use the town streets and alleys to install a TV Cable. A resolution was also adopted to amend the town ordinance covering town occupational licenses.

In other business the council approved the report of police magistrate Sam Lewis for the

month of November in the amount of \$600 and plans were made to install new light fixtures in the town hall soon. Two building permits were issued with one to Keith Scott and the other to Transport Trucking Co.

Next meeting will be held 4:30 p.m. Dec. 20, which is the regular meeting date.

TV Cable Installation Delayed In Twin Cities

Installation of a TV cable for Texico-Farwell is delayed until a permit is received from the FFA to erect a 500-foot tower that is needed for the cable system.

The permit must be granted for the tower on the planned site because the location is on an airway, say Frank Sides Jr. of

Sayre, Okla. and Ed Dart of Dallas, members of the firm holding the franchise for the TV cable.

Sides and Dart stress the fact that installation crews will arrive in town immediately after the permit is issued and will begin construction on the cable installation at once. The men were here Monday.

When the cable is completed with the solid state amplifier distribution time system, citizens in Texico-Farwell will be able to have better TV viewing with less trouble, say Dart.

Postmaster's Annual 'Present' For Christmas

Postmaster Jim Bob Smart had his annual Christmas 'present' ready today for his patrons and, to nobody's surprise, it was his perennial suggestion: "Mail early."

"Christmas shopping and mailing is, for most people, one of the heaviest chores at Christmas," Smart said, "and if I can persuade some people to get it done right now I think they will agree later - when they are taking it easy while

others rush around - that I have given them a very good present."

"Virtually all Christmas mailings can be disposed of now by observing the following five suggestions," Smart explained:

1. Do your shopping for your Christmas gifts now.
 2. Check and revise mailing lists for cards and presents.
 3. Package and mail Christmas parcels promptly. Don't worry about being too early - just mark them "Do Not Open Until Christmas."
 4. Buy Christmas cards now and address them right away, separating them into out-of-town and local bundles. Mail them immediately with ZIP Codes on them and you've got it made, except perhaps for that last-minute card you forgot to send to Aunt Minnie.
 5. Buy plenty of stamps now while post office windows are uncrowded.
- For Christmas cards, the postmaster recommends the attractive new 5 cent Christmas stamps showing the National Christmas tree in Washington, D.C. Use of this stamp insures first-class mail treatment - meaning the card may contain personal messages and may be forwarded or returned free of extra charge.

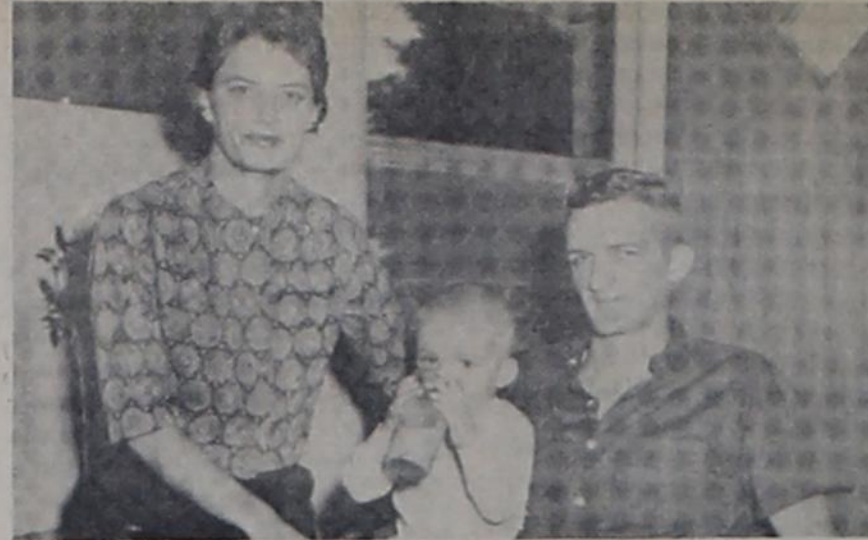
Former Residents Represent Dairy Industry At Meeting

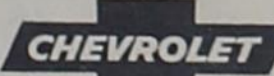

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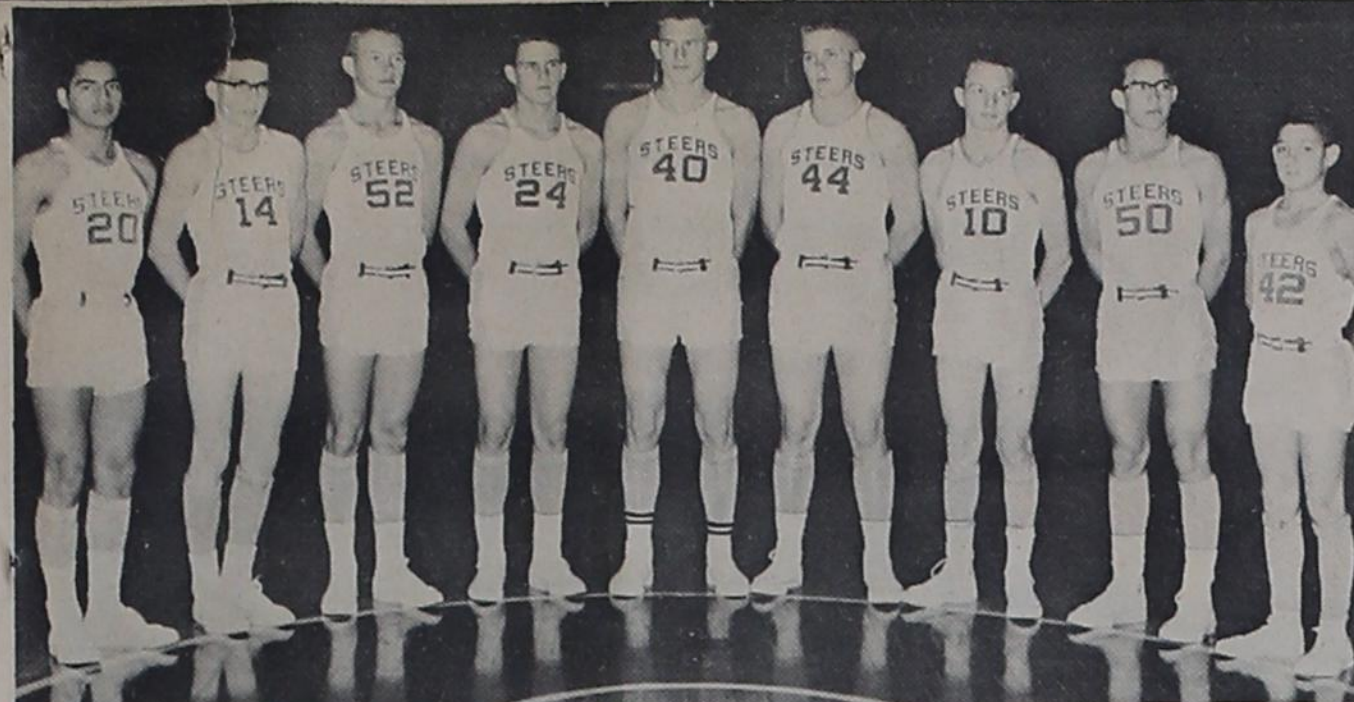

ing, that all do their share and work as a team to win games. Scoring is always evenly divided with top scoring honors changing with each game.

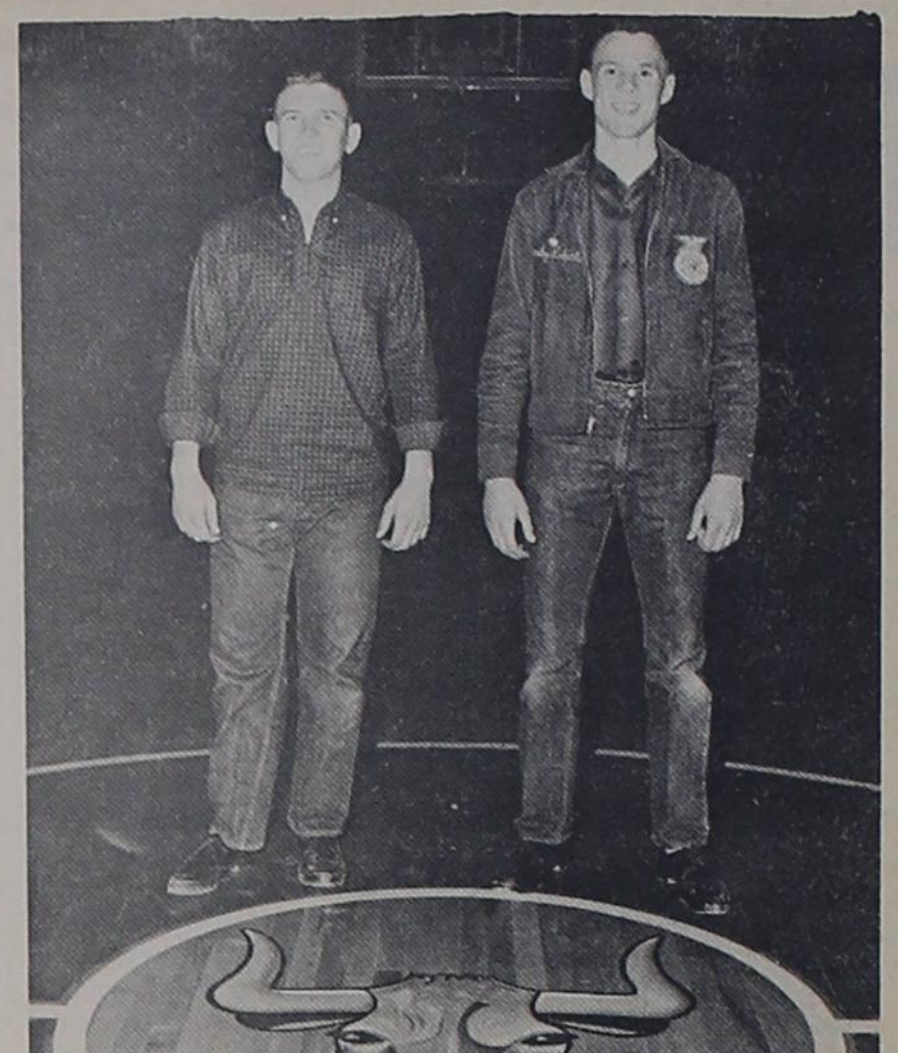
The junior teams will be playing in the Grady tournament this week and are scheduled to meet Ft. Sumner on the Texico court, Saturday morning 11 a.m.

Farwell went on to win their own tournament after defeating Texico, by taking a win from Springlake in an overtime.

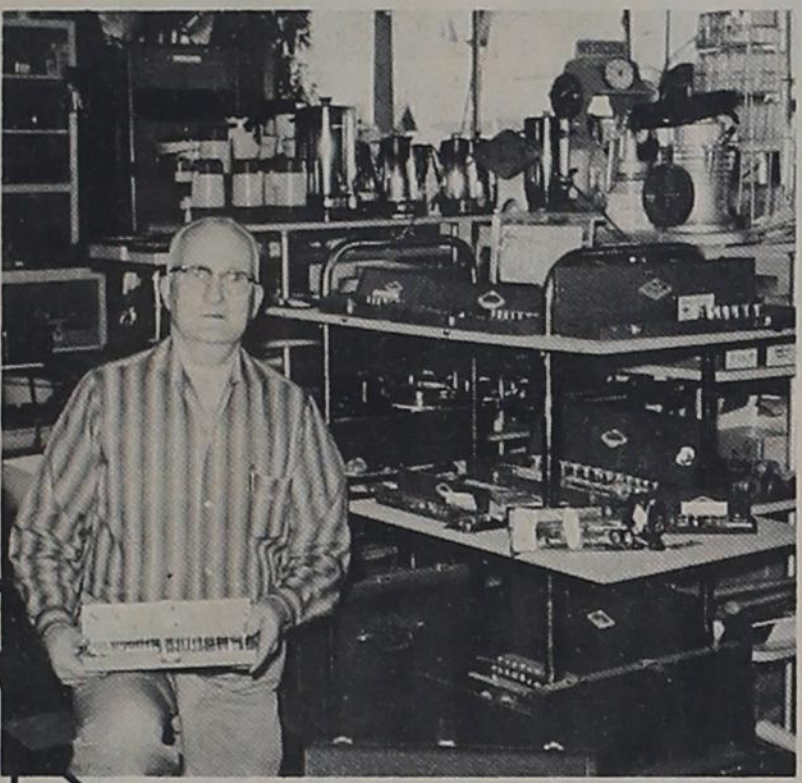

Tragedy Interrupts Texas Farmers Union Convention

The 60th Annual Convention of the Texas Farmers Union in Lubbock, November 22 and 23 was cut short by the tragic death of President Kennedy on Friday.

Convention delegates, in a business meeting on Saturday, approved a 1964 program for the farm organization which:
1. Expressed its grief at the death of the President, saying in part: His abiding faith in securing ultimate peace for all mankind, his selfless devotion . . . have secured the highest place for him in the hearts of all men of goodwill forever."

2. Saluted Orville L. Freeman, saying that the Secretary of Agriculture "has amply demonstrated that he is cognizant of the problems of the family farmer . . . and is dedicating his . . . talents to their solution; and decrying "smear tactics . . . misleading and meaningless slogans used by various opposition elements in a vain effort to discredit (the secretary)."

3. Pointed out that the 1964 wheat carryover of more than one billion bushels will require the Secretary of Agriculture to call another wheat referendum, and promising support for a "yes" vote for the wheat certificate plan if no new wheat program is passed next year.

4. Cotton resolutions expressed objections to two features in the cotton bill presently before the House, (H.R. 6196). One provision in the bill would inject a "choice" provision, which is a departure from existing law under which a national minimum acreage allotment is established on the basis of historic plantings.

Delegates supported a program which would permit cotton to be priced in the market place with direct payments to producers, and recognized the need for making U. S. cotton and U. S. textile mills competitive with foreign cotton and mills.

* Supported rural electric cooperatives and urged a congressional investigation of the "activities of power monopolies to destroy REA's; and opposed any increase in interest rates for REA loans.

* Called for expansion of domestic family farm allotments of sugar beets.

* Supported the sale of surplus wheat for cash to the Soviet Union.

* Reaffirmed the organization's "strong belief in the true free-enterprise system" and pledged efforts to secure bargaining power for family farmers "that will permit them to receive a parity of income equal to all segments of the economy."

Despite this defeat, Naman said, the Texas Farmers Union will urge higher farm prices and the kind of supply management programs that will make these prices tenable.

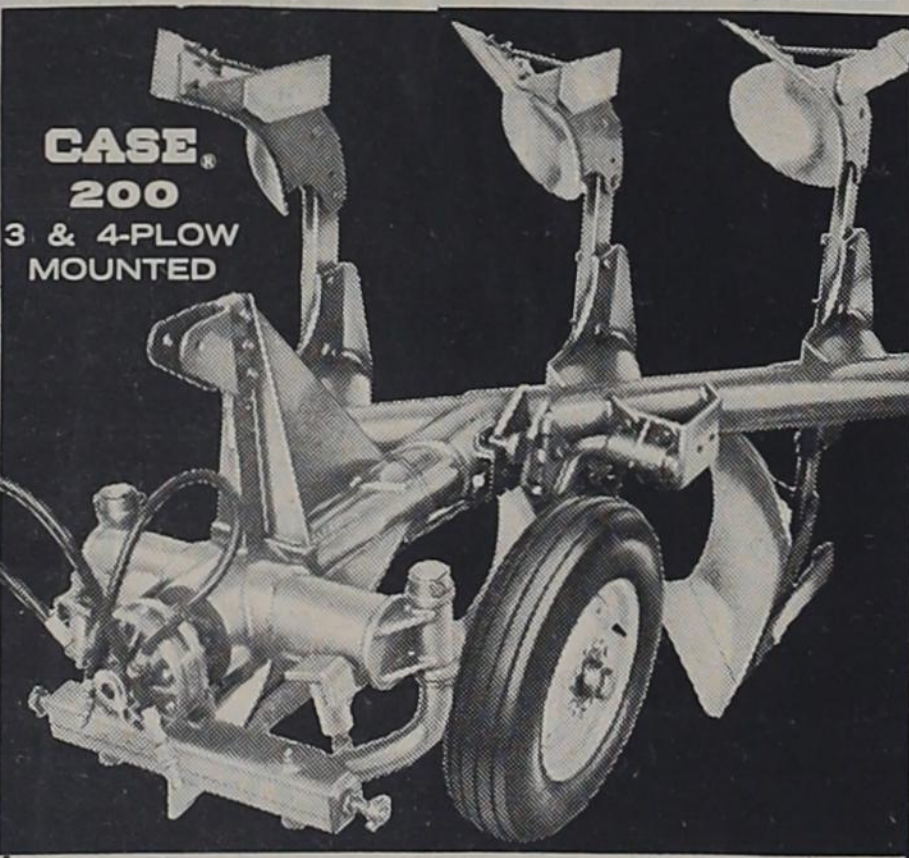

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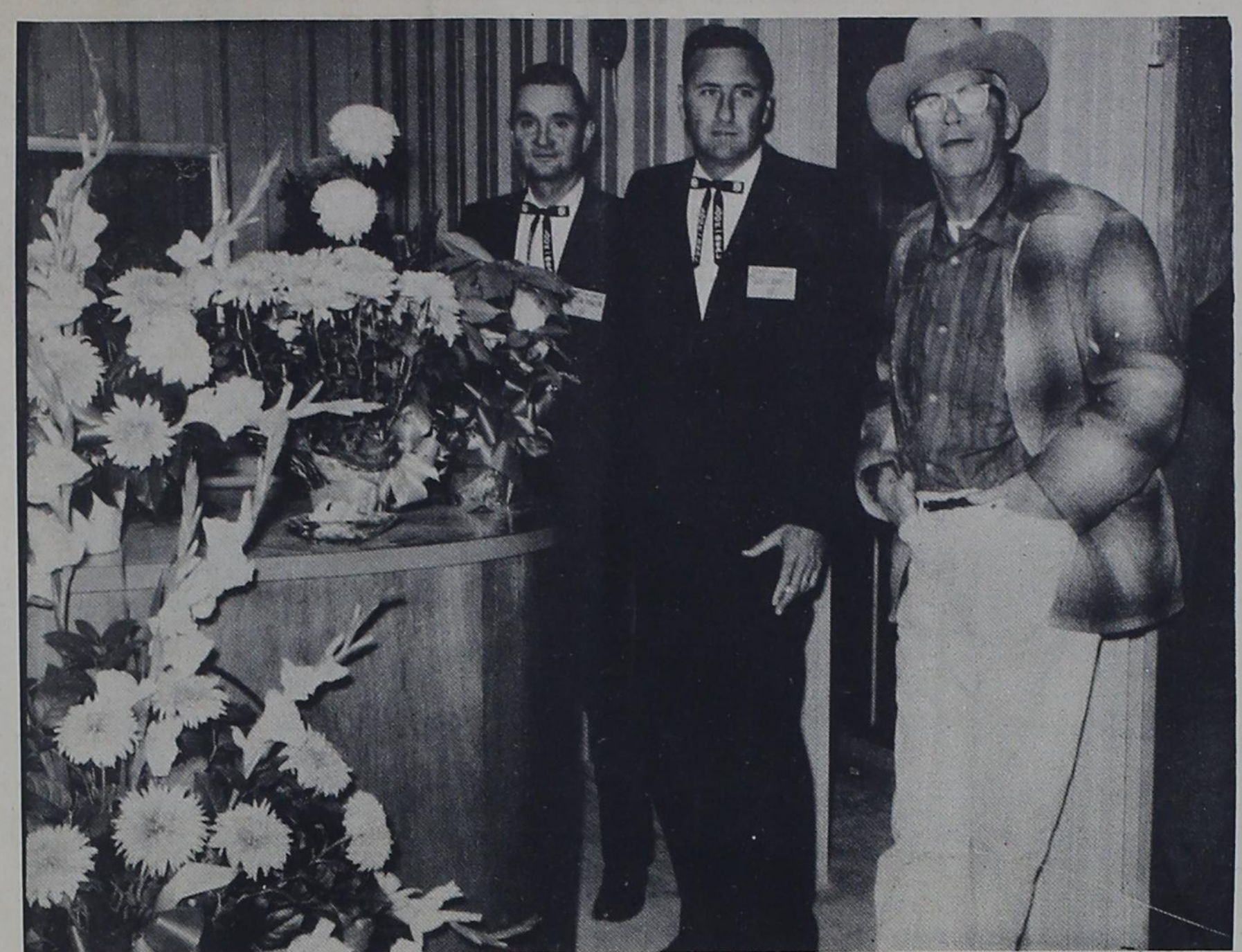

During World War 2 there was a terrible shortage of children's shoes. The situation was so bad that the federal government required shoe manufacturers to produce more shoes for children.


