Coker stated. "Heavy midge populations have been found south of Farwell, and in the Friona-Black area in some fields. Also, midge have been found in the Oklahoma

Lane community," he said. Coker pointed out that previous work has shown that the heaviest egg-laying by midge usually begins about the third day following sorghum head emergence from the boot. Chemical control depends upon the destruction of the adult female before egg-laying begins. Thus, each sorghum head must be covered with insecticide within three days after emergence from the boot to prevent

egg-laying within its spikelets. Under ideal conditions of uniform heading, a single welltimed insecticide application should give good midge control. However, it is realized that many fields will not head uniformly and two to three applications at three to four day intervals may be necessary for

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

One of the most dreaded jobs. believe, of the average homemaker is that of cleaning the oven. Here are a few tips that may help: Simplify the task. Make use of the "keep-clean" tricks de-

scribed below and tackle spills and spatters as they occur. Keep the Job to a Minimum: Using low roasting temperatures (not over 325 degrees F.) and taking care not to overfill casseroles, so they won't bubble over, are both helpful. So will leaving the oven door open to cool after use, to prevent further baking-on of "splatters." A small cookie sheet covered with aluminum foil kept in the oven at all times on the bottom rack, can serve as a drip catcher. When it gets dirty, replace the foil. (Never line oven with aluminum foil-it may be fused to the bottom and it does cut the even distribution of heat in oven.)




