11 years as a 'black shoe'

(Editor's note: Awhile back, the Tribune asked Navy Lt. Commander Will Anderson of Farwell, to periodically write about his experiences aboard ship.

Following the operation with the Royal Thai Navy in the Sea of Siam, our task group of USS Elliot and USS Ramsey returned top Subic Bay, Philippines, for a week of repairs and rest. We were underway again on March 16, for a big operation with the South Koreans named TEAM SPIRIT. That is the operation we are in the midst of now and I will cover that when it is completed.

However, the first phase of the operation was just getting to South Korea. The combined amphibious task group we had worked with in the Bering Sea and in Thailand proceeded from Subic Bay on March 16 enroute Okinawa, Japan, and ultimately, Pohang, South Korea.

The transit was conducted in association with USS Ranger and her battlegroup of escorts. (USS Ranger is one of the six aircraft carriers in the Pacific Fleet.) The improved detection capabilities and extended ranges of modern weapon systems have expanded the area of naval combat to ranges well beyond the horizon, so the ships were steaming hundreds of miles apart - we never saw USS Ranger or her escorts until we got to Okinawa although we coordinated with them throughout the transit. U.S. submarines and attack aircraft flying out of Okinawa simulated Orange Forces (the bad guys). Our task groups were Blue Forces (the good guys) and our mission was to get to the amphibious assault area in South Korea without being "sunk". Long transits like these make the differences between different types of ships and different types of naval officers very clear.

The naval officer corps is divided up into different "communities". One community goes to sea in a specific type of ship and the ultimate goal is to take command one day of a ship of your own. This is called the Unrestricted Line. The Unrestricted Line is divided into Air, Submarine, and Surface.

Air Warfare Officers are called Wing-nuts, Airdales, or Brown Shoes (in reference to their distinctive uniforms.) They fly anything from large multi-engine patrol planes to helicopters to jet attack aircraft. The recent movie "Top Gun" is an accurate portrayal of the airdale community.

Submarine Warfare Officers are called Bubbleheads and very little is known of them outside of their own dark world. They don't talk much about their work and they don't normally associate with Target Sailors (as they refer to us).

I have spent almost 11 years now as a Surface Warfare Officer, also known as a Skimmer or a Black Shoe. The U.S. Navy will have 600 ships by 1989 (up from fewer than 450 in 1979) and the majority of them are surface ships commanded by Surface Warfare Officers. The smaller craft are patrol missile craft and minesweepers (which always struck me as a bad way to make a living). Larger than that are the frigates and destroyers which specialize in anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, and shore bombardment. Cruisers and guided missile versions of frigates and destroyers specialize in anti-air warfare. And the four battleships that have been recommissioned are overwhelming. They have helicopters for over the horizon targeting or anti-submarine attacks. Their batteries of 16-inch guns (the diameter of the bore of the bar-

rell) can put a ton of explosive on target over 20 miles away. And with the retrofit of the newest missile systems, their striking range goes out hundreds of miles.

Other surface ships include the repair ships, hospital ships, logistic supply and replenishment ships, and the amphibious assault ships that we have escorted for three months now. Each class is designed for a specific mission and the crews are trained for that purpose. The largest warships in the world are, of course, the super-carriers like USS Ranger. They are commanded by naval aviators and any one of them can carry more warplanes than most countries in the world own. They are the key to our ability to maintain a presence in the seas of the world.

A destroyer size warship is normally divided up into four departments - Operations, Combat Systems, Engineering, and Supply. Simply put, Operations plans a ship's activities and provides the personnel for the associated communications and coordination. Supply is responsible for ensuring the ship has all she needs for her mission, from guns to butter. Engineering is responsible for getting the ship there by providing propulsion and power for every system onboard from galley equipment to weapons systems. An engineer is also responsible for the damage control equipments and training onboard (fire, flooding, nuclear or chemical attack). And Combat Systems maintains and mans the sensors and weapons that the ship must have to perform her mission and protect herself.

Once underway, an officer will man one of three primary watches onboard. The Officer of the Deck is the officer on the bridge of the ship who is responsible for safe navigation and maneuvering. It is a significant moment in a young officer's life to "assume the deck" and to be responsible for several thousand tons of warship and every soul onboard. The first time I assumed the deck was as an Ensign in 1978, and my first helmsman was my Dad (the helmsman steers the ship at the Officer of the Deck's orders). Dad had come to sea for a week's cruise from Pearl Harbor to San Diego, and my Chief Bos'n Mate arranged for Dad to be my very first helmsman. After that first watch together, Dad and I pretty well decided that between the two of us we could handle any warship in the world.

The Combat Information Center is another watchstation. It is here that the ship's radars, sonars, communications, and weapons centers are located. It is manned by a variety of officers whose duties vary depending on their warfare training, and they are under the direction of the Tactical Action Officer (my watchstation on my last ship). A TAO is also authorized in writing to release weapons in an emergency if time does not allow contacting the commanding officer.

The other primary watchstation is "the Pitt", or more properly, the Engineering Control Station deep in the depths of the ship. I have been designated a steam engineer for 7 years (and despite all my efforts, have yet to develop a convincing Scottish accent like the engineer on Star Trek - "She's coming apart, Cap'n - I canna say how much longer she'll take this!). Propulsion systems are changing rapidly. I am trained as a conventional steam engineer. We burn fuel to make steam to turn turbines to drive the ship. They don't build the standard

main topic was of future water rights. Gikas again stressed the need to look ahead and plan accordingly so that the city will always have a good water supply.

Toward that end, he received council approval to schedule a joint meeting with the Texico City Council and officials of the Eastern Plains Council of Government to discuss how Farwell can participate in the Ute Lake Water Project.

Texico's City Council Tuesday signed an agreement to be a Ute Lake member but Farwell is not eligible since it is not in New Mexico.

But Gikas said he believes Farwell can become an ex officio member and be allowed, down the road, to purchase water from the project, through Texico, if need be.

Gikas went to Tuesday night's Texico City Council meeting and discussed this.

Texico landfill reopened

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted to re-open the city landfill weekdays for a 60-day trial basis.

Councilman Steve Chancy urged that the council offer its free usage to Texico residents only.

Users must go to City Hall, get a key, and sign a form. There is a stiff financial penalty for wrongly using the landfill.

The landfill has been closed since Waste Control received a contract to haul residents' trash. The landfill had been a problem with the state unhappy about its standards, thus leading to the Waste Control contract.

In other business, the council:

- Agreed to a request by Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas to have a joint meeting of the two city councils and officials of Eastern Plains Council of Governments to discuss future water usage.

Texico Tuesday signed a contract with the Ute Lake Water Project for future water needs. Farwell cannot sign up because it is not in New Mexico. But Farwell wants to be an ex officio member and be in a position to buy water, through Texico, from the project if the need arises.

The water project contract will cost Texico \$670 the first year and \$250 the second, at which time the contract likely will be redrawn.

- Tabled a discussion of the water rates, which haven't been raised in 10 years. Chancy, Butch Tharp and Billy Hammit will check on how much money is generated from water fees and where the budget stands.

- Heard a presentation on cancer insurance from American Family Life Insurance personnel.

- Appointed councilman

Doyal LaRue as its representative to the Ute Lake Water Project.

- Discussed the problem with out-of-state persons receiving traffic citations who fail to appear in court. City Attorney Duane Hamar will check into possible ways of solving this.

- Discussed the possibility of the county ending funding for the Senior Citizens. Lewis Cooper will check with the county manager on where this stands and will report back.

- After an executive session on the personnel policy, announced that councilman Bryan Kube will be the public information officer and the mayor is personnel manager.

- Opened applications for the city marshal's post. Texico is currently without a marshal. A marshal may be chosen at the next council meeting, June 23.

Little interest shown in saving depot

A meeting was called by several Texico and Farwell residents Monday at Luce's Restaurant to seek ways to save the Texico depot from destruction, but virtually no one attended.

The meeting was decided upon last Thursday night, too late to be reported in last week's Tribune. But the Clovis newspaper carried an article on the upcoming meeting last Sunday.

Attending were John Hadley, Ann and Lewis Cooper, Maurine Caywood and Jess Richardson.

Mrs. Cooper said she had met the previous Thursday with David Kube, James and Charlotte Pierce and Doyal LaRue, and they agreed to call for a public meeting.

Kube had been in contact with Santa Fe officials who want to tear the depot down

because they need to re-route the tracks, due to several derailments.

Kube was told that he could virtually have the depot for almost nothing but he would have to move it. That price is estimated at more than \$200,000. Mrs. Cooper

was hoping that retired Santa Fe employees would rally to help save the historic depot. She also hopes that local residents will contribute to a fund to help move it.

The employee at the Texico depot has been moved to Farwell.

The Texico Council agreed to his request for a joint meeting. Texico Mayor John R. Hadley and City Councilman Bryan Kube both indicated the need for the two cities to work together.

Farwell had paid dues to the Ute Lake project years ago when it was formed.

Gikas also discussed the possibility of filing a city suit against New Mexico regarding the El Paso water case. He described such a suit as "friendly" because it is really aimed at El Paso.

The suit would seek for Farwell, and other Texas communities, to receive their fair share of New Mexico water in light of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision that New

Mexico owes Texas water.

Gikas said he will explain this to the New Mexico governor and also seek support from other Texas Panhandle mayors. If such a suit was pressed, and won, it would mean that New Mexico could spread the water it owes to other Texas cities besides El Paso.

The council also:
- Noted that a worker on the new sanitation plant was injured in an accident and hospitalized with broken ribs.

- Agreed to spend \$2,376 on new blue and white aluminum street signs.

- Noted that the city crews will soon start patching and seal coating the streets where needed.

- Received a letter from Floydada officials noting their intention to seek a minimum security prison there. The mayor and council endorsed their project.

- Agreed to pay the registration fees for Gikas and councilman Curtis Smith for a conference of state mayors and councilmen in El Paso later this month.

- Heard Gikas criticize a Portales group for placing a sign in Muleshoe suggesting motorists take a shortcut on the road south of Farwell to save time to get to Portales. This means bypassing Texico, Farwell and Clovis.

Gikas said he would complain to TRIAD and EPCOG about the sign, which hurts businesses in the cities being bypassed.

steam plants anymore for U.S. warships and haven't for years (it's sobering to realize that I'm approaching obsolescence). But my steam plants will be around until the next century anyway. The newer propulsion plants are gas turbines, which are simply jet engines that drive the propellers directly through reduction gears - no steam. They are much faster, much more responsible and rapidly available. Advanced diesels are used on the newer amphibious ships. The carriers, submarines, and some cruisers are powered by nuclear plants.

That is a summary of the Unrestricted Line in general, and Surface Warfare in particular.

Each community has its own distinctive device worn above the left pocket of the uniform shirt. A pilot wears wings, as always, and a submariner wears dolphins. The surface warrior wears a golden badge that represents a destroyer slicing through heavy seas and crossed swords.

The rest of the Officer Corps is either Restricted Line or Staff Corps. They each have an area of specialty that the Navy needs - from lawyers and doctors to engineering duty (as in shipyards) to intelligence to any of a number of other special skills. They do not go to sea very much, if at all, and tend to pretty much keep "civilian

hours" in their work ashore. They are collectively called "Sand Crabs".

The backbone of the Navy - our greatest asset and strength - is of course our enlisted ranks. Each man at sea is a specialist in a specific area, which determines which department he is assigned to. These specialties may be traditional rates like Bos'n Mate (linehandling, boat coxswains, shiphandling) or Quartermaster (celestial or electronic navigation) or Mess Specialist (cooks and frozen stores). Each type of different propulsion plant will have its own breeds of specialists and repairmen. The complexities of processing intelligence and surveillance information is a whole world of several specializations. Every warfare area has its own specialists, and the list of

The men who operate and repair these devices are the best trained sailors anywhere in the world. One of them on-board USS Elliott is a Petty Officer Second Class named J.D. Briscoe. He is an Electronics Technician and he is from Muleshoe. The citizens of the Twin Cities and Muleshoe can rest well each night knowing that J.D. and I are pretty much running the Seventh Fleet out here.

Our schedule keeps changing so it is difficult to predict where we will be after the completion of Exercise Team Spirit. I will write about it when it is over, and from wherever we go after that.

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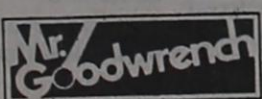

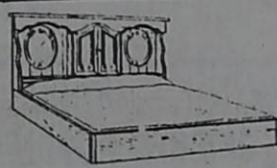
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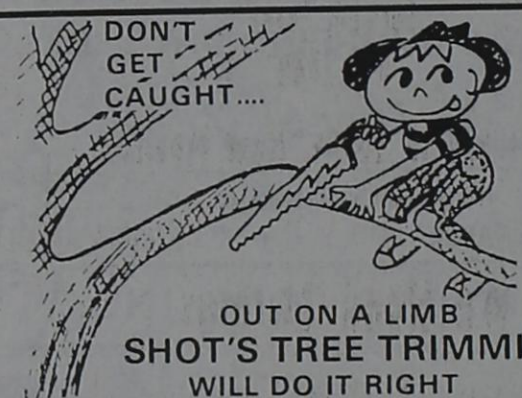
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Jeff and Karen Taylor

Fransé attends seminar

Lucille Fransé of Farwell High School attended a Institute sponsored by Region XVI Education Service Center June 1-5. The Institute featured Dr. George Gonzales of the Pan American University of Edinburg, Texas, who showed teachers ways to improve the teaching of reading. Gonzales writes for Riverside Press. Gonzales' method has been highly successful. In one pilot project, 99% of the students reached grade level as measured by the California Achievement Tests. Gonzales taught that students learn by first listening, then speaking, then reading, and then writing. He stressed that teachers need to go over the material orally before the students see it. It helps, for instance, for the second grade teachers to use the vocabulary orally that the students will need to learn to read in third grade. Gonzales also felt that

teachers must keep learning fun for the students. Gonzales gave the students several examples of lesson plans which use the Madeline Hunter method of teaching which is used in Texas. They also learned practical ways to write lesson plans which would enable them to teach reading effectively. Mrs. Fransé will also attend two other Institutes this summer. One by Dr. Tanya Tullos on materials to remediate problems and instruct students on the most frequently missed items on the TEAMS test. The other institute is by Ruth Holland of Dumas on effective teaching practices. **Smith trains** Army National Guard Private Joseph C. Smith, son of Joe C. and Lydia Smith of 615 State St., Texico, has completed basic training at Fort Dix, N.J.
