Congressman Bob Price Announces New REA Loan

Congressman Bob Price announced from his office in Washington, D. C. on Friday morning that an REA loan had been approved for the Bailey County Cooperative in Muleshoe.

The loan in the amount of \$757,000 has a four-fold purpose. It will be used for construction of 1.78 miles of distribution lines to serve 410 new consumers; for reconstruction of 15 miles of 69

kilovolt transmission lines; to finance system improvements, including nine miles of new tie-lines and conversion of 16 miles of extension lines and related facilities; and also to reimburse the borrower for cost of construction completed with prior REA approval.

Clarence R. Mason is president of the Bailey County Electric Co-op and J. W. Coppedge is manager of the Muleshoe office.

Our cup runneth over--with water, that is. Our cup, our bar ditches, our tallwater pits, our playa lakes, and our lister ridges are brimming full of the nourishment of life on the High Plains. Running Water Draw looks more like the "Father of Waters" than its usual dry bed.

We haven't heard but we suspect down stream communities will be yelling for flood control again. We wish that we could give it to them. It is a shame that uncounted acre-feet of water is running off our fields and will be lost to the agricultural industry forever. We could have more than filled a good size retaining dam and several others on this week's rainfall. Some day, reality will take precedent over county and state lines and we will have a system of impounding and distributing our uneven annual rainfall.

We think this conservation of natural waters is necessary to implement the grand plans of water importation. It would appear rather silly to spend vast sums to import Mississippi River water at the same time we let the already delivered water slip away to be so laboriously returned via canal and pump.

There is nothing like a tornado alert to set a community all agog with excitement. The undulating crescendos of the local fire sirens ripped through the quiet of last Monday's drap evening and created a traffic jam of concerned citizens. The southwest sector of town was the focus of many an anxious eyeball as reports of a funnel cloud sighting came from that direction.

Had the cloud continued in our direction, we wonder to where many of the local citizens would have fled. We know of several "hide holes" that would have been blimpful of friendly people. Isn't it amazing what a spontaneous camaraderie exists in time of danger. It almost seems as if a spot of common peril is good for the spirit of a community.

One of the hot items of discussion in our busy state capitol is the issue of an annual session of the state legislature. In today's fast changing world, it does seem improbable that the policies and the revenues of a state as vast and as populous as Texas can be handled on an every other year basis.

This problem was on the agenda of the Panhandle Press Association meeting last week in Amarillo. A resolution was presented to the assembled publishers urging an annual legislative meeting and a favorable vote was urged for its adoption. One of our weekly publishers, Russell Grimes of Petersburg, made the observation that the lawmakers had passed more laws just meeting every two years than he could cope with and he hated to think what annual sessions might produce.

This astute thought ended the debate and the convention by voice vote turned down the resolution. Take note legislators---the Panhandle editors feel that we have enough laws to last for awhile. We suspect the majority of citizens may feel the same way.

Several Tornadoes Sighted --

Heavy Rains Fall In Area

Heavy rains on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday in the Eastern New Mexico and West Texas areas have brought the ordinarily dry draws in the vicinity to the overflowing stage as a promise of more rain is forecast. For several hours Tuesday the Running Water Draw which crosses the highway between Farwell and Bovina was running across the highway and was also creating a hazard to cattle in the pens at Parmer County Cattle Co. which is situated on the side of a hill.

Turbulent weather with funnel clouds dipping to the earth has also been prevalent in the past several days. On Monday evening a total of 13 funnel clouds were sighted in the immediate area and on Tuesday afternoon a funnel cloud dipped to the ground in the Lariat area. The funnel is reported to have swept along the ground for some two minutes before lifting; however, no report of damage has been received. On Tuesday evening a tornado ripped through Earth in

Lamb County, causing damage to some 10-12 buildings in the small town. No reports of injuries have been received since citizens had been forewarned of a tornado in the area.

Wednesday morning, just prior to press time, threatening rain clouds were still in the area and weather forecasters were predicting more rain before the day was over. Predictions called for lessening of the rain before the end of the week.

Rain reports vary in the area with largest amount reported at Bovina where seven inches has been received along with light hail. Eight miles north of Texico-Farwell, approximately five inches of rain has fallen while in

the area south of town reports indicate that some six inches of rain has fallen. A report from Lariat indicates that that vicinity has had from five to six inches and also some scattered hail. In Farwell four inches of rain with light hail has been reported for the three day period. Don Gerles, who lives in the Pleasant Hill area, reports five inches of rain and sleet sized hail.

Many farmers in the area indicate that crops will have to be replanted while others state that although the rains have created a problem for farmers who had crops in the ground, the rains have been most beneficial as a whole.



PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRS)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Sections 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and distribution of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

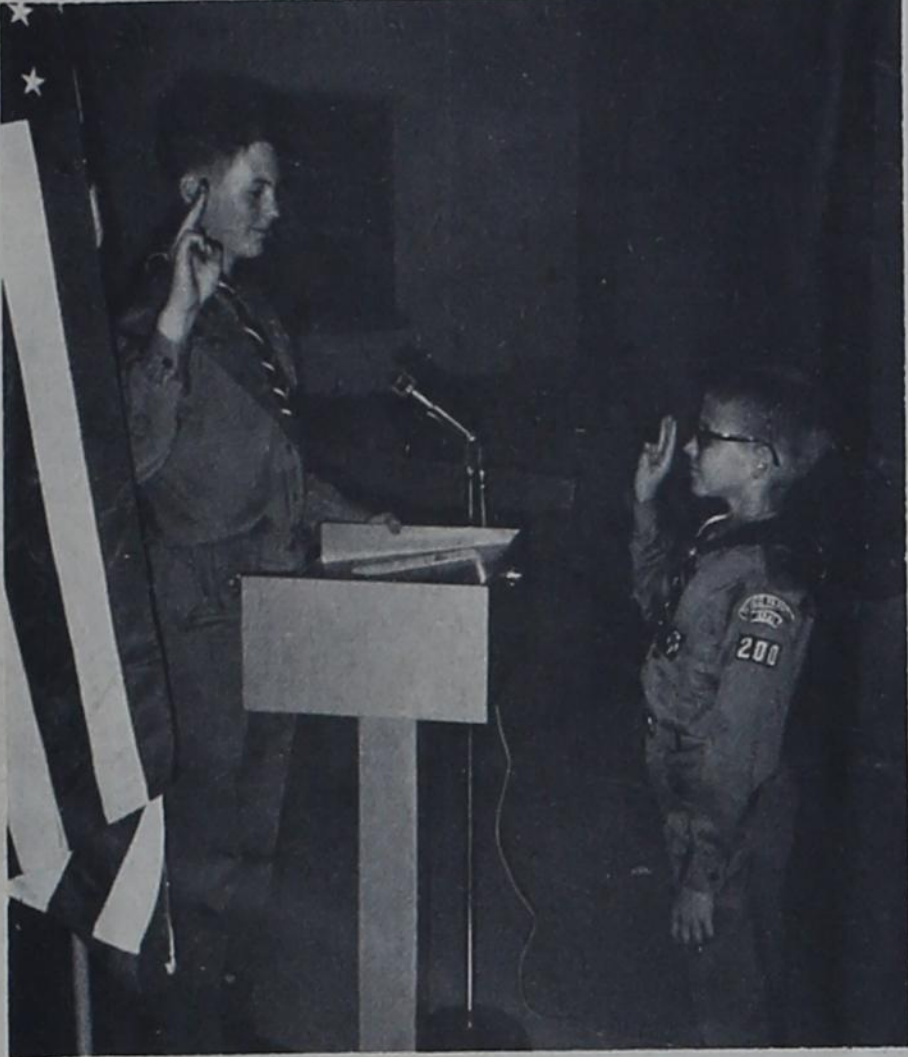

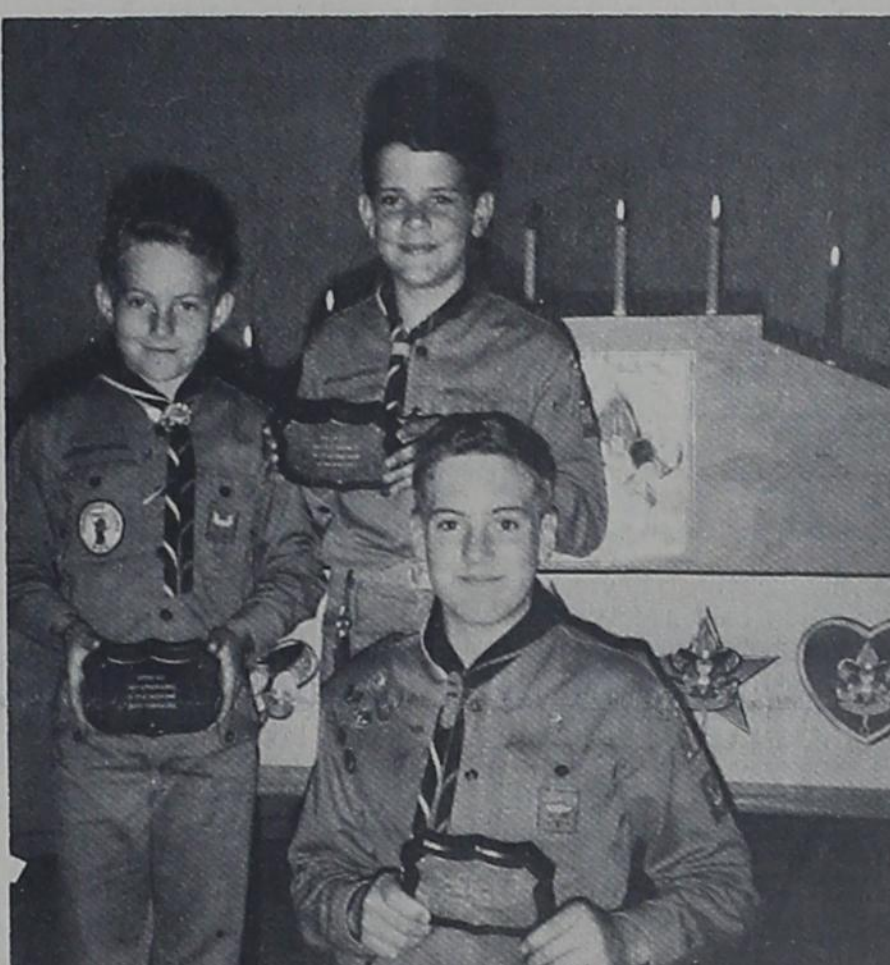

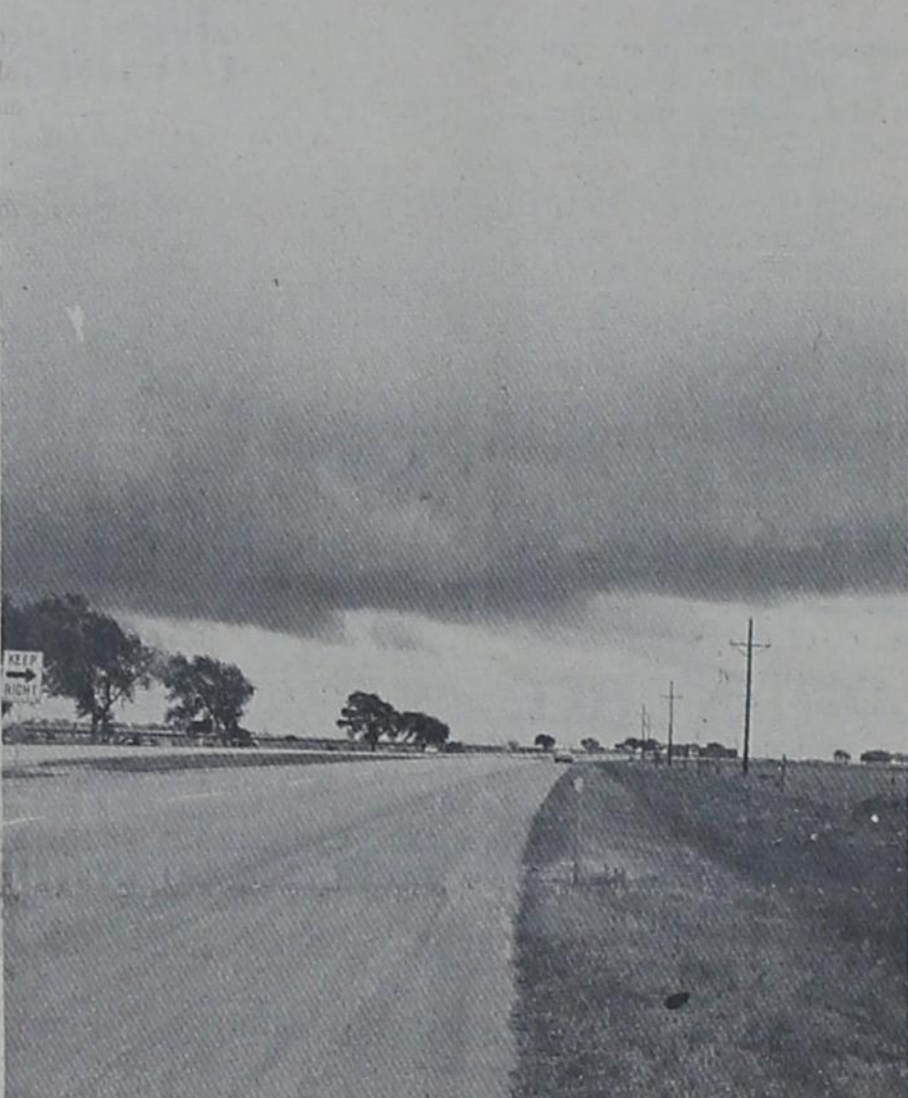

BAKED ENCHILADAS
Brown two pounds of hamburger meat and one medium sized onion (diced); add 1 can chicken and 1 can mushroom soup (creamed) to the meat and onion and stir; now add 1 can condensed milk, 1 can taco sauce, 1 can green chille enchilada sauce and salt, pepper and garlic sauce to taste. Mix well.

In bottom of oblong casserole place a layer of quartered raw tortillas and pour one half of mixture over tortillas, cover with grated cheese; repeat procedure using all of remaining mixture. Place in oven and bake one hour at 325 degrees.

This casserole may be pre-

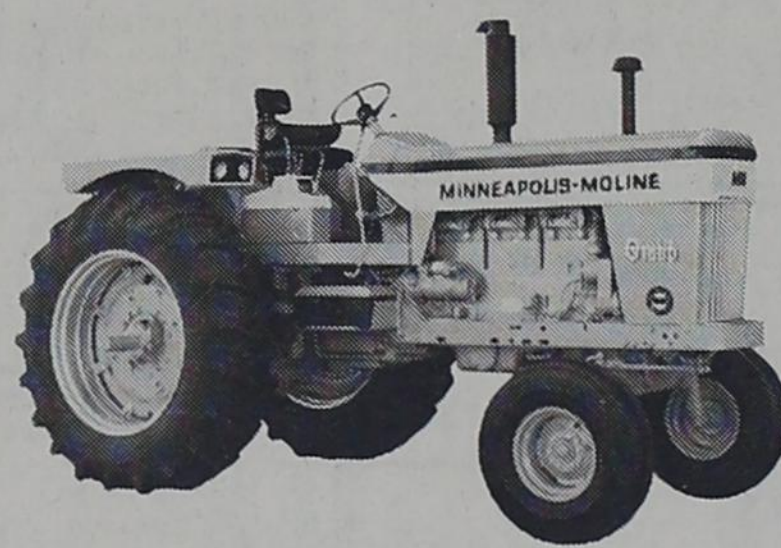

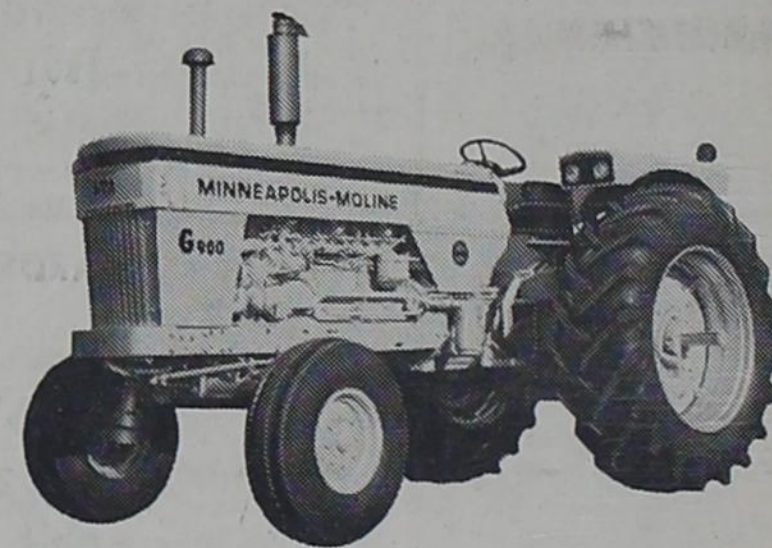

The cane is presented annually to a graduating medical student whom the class feels best exemplifies the ultimate in patient care. Students vote by secret ballot for the award, which is considered to be one of the highest honors a graduating senior can receive.

The Gold-Headed Cane by MacMichael is an historical account of a cane which was carried from 1689 to 1825 successively by five distinguished British physicians - Radcliffe, Mead, Askew, Pitcairn and Baillie. The cane carried by

these outstanding clinicians has been placed in the museum of the Royal College of Physicians in London.

In 1939 the first Gold-Headed Cane in the United States was presented at the University of California School of Medicine. The award at UTMB was established in 1960 by Dr. Charles T. Stone, Sr., professor emeritus of internal medicine.

Stewart Wolf, MD, Regents Professor of Medicine, Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, and Professor of Physiology, University of Oklahoma School of Medicine, and head of the neurosciences section, Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, will be the guest speaker at the ceremony.

Announcement of the five finalists was made by Gene Powell, director of student per-

sonnel services at the Medical Branch. Other finalists include Ronald W. Deskin of Corsicana, Arthur Tijerina of San Antonio, Thomas D. Cherry of College Station and Don W. King of Texarkana.

While a student in medical school, Williams has held membership in Phi Beta Pi national medical fraternity and Alpha Omega Alpha honorary medical fraternity. He received his undergraduate training at Texas

Technological College, Lubbock.

Williams, who is married to the former Janice Prince of Farwell, will serve his internship at UTMB Hospitals, Galveston.

FHA Announces Loan Plan

The Farmers Home Administration can now make loans to farm and ranch owners or tenants for outdoor income-producing recreational enterprises according to Billy R. Boling, County Supervisor.

Loans to individuals can be made to convert all or a portion of their farms to recreational facilities. The recreational enterprise may supplement regular farm income or, in

some cases, replace farm income by converting the entire farm to recreation.

Public recreational areas are increasing in number each year; however, the demand for such facilities still exceeds what is available. The purpose of this loan program is two-fold in that it will provide more recreational areas and help farmers and ranchers to increase

their income, stated Boling. Loans may be made for camping, picnicking, and hiking facilities, swimming, boating, skiing and fishing facilities, golf courses, riding stables or many other forms of outdoor recreation.

Funds can be used to purchase necessary materials, supplies and animals, acquire and develop land and water resources, construct or improve modest essential buildings, and to purchase and install needed equipment and fixtures.

Each loan will be scheduled for repayment over a period not to exceed 40 years at 5% interest. Interested individuals should contact Billy R. Boling at 708 Avenue A, Farwell, for further information.

Breathalyzer Test Successful

The Breathalyzer, a portable instrument used for determining the alcohol content of the blood by a simple "breath test," which was put into operation November, 1968, over the state of Texas is proving to be quite useful in the Northwest Texas area, announced Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this Region.

During the months of November and December of 1968, there were 1164 suspected drinking drivers who took various types of tests to determine the amount of alcohol in their blood. Of this

number 957 or 82 per cent took the Breathalyzer test as compared to 207 or 18 per cent who took other types of tests.

Major Bell stated that the Breathalyzer not only will help in convicting a drunken driver, but assists in absolving a person who appears intoxicated, but may actually be suffering from epilepsy, a heart attack, an overdose of insulin, or many other pathological conditions.

Bell stated, "It is hoped that the use of the Breathalyzer will hit hard at the problem and help reduce the traffic deaths in Texas."
