## Two-way street

When I have written about the need to shop locally, I realize it's a two-way street.

Yes, we hope that consumers shop at local independently-owned businesses. But we also recognize the need for those businesses to reach out to their community.

An excellent example of this two-way street is occurring right now at Capitol Foods. I'm speaking of their "Mitey Mizer" campaign.

This campaign is designed to help offer low prices, excellent savings to the customer and high quality. It's being made possible by Affiliated Foods in conjunction with Capitol Foods.

What Capitol Foods is saying is this: "We're doing our best to give you top-line merchandise and also save you money."

Now, you tell me, what more can a local business do to attract your patronage?

No, I'm no dummy. I fully realize that some foreign-owned corporations can undersell local American independent businesses because they can sell at a loss while making their profits elsewhere. But I ask you: Do we have to help those foreign-owned businesses toss our own nation's businesses into bankruptcy? I say no.

In a case with the Mitey Mizer campaign, we can see better savings for the customer than if they go to those non-local owned, foreign-corporation owned chain stores. This is yet another example of our local businesses reaching out to you and doing their best to counter competitors from abroad.

Personally speaking, I do what I can to avoid shopping in non-local, foreign-owned chain stores. I know that my few bucks won't make a dent in their huge profits but it's just something I have to do.

A real problem is that few folks take the time to understand how a local economy works, how dollars are recycled into a community in order to maintain its strength.

For example, when you shop at Capitol Foods, your dollars don't go to a foreign country - as they do when you shop at non-local, foreign-owned chain stores. Instead, you dollars go into the salaries of folks living in Texico-Farwell, into tax money that maintains our streets and services, into donations to our schools and churches.

If every person reading this article (and who tell others who don't get our paper) work at shopping locally, whether it be Texico-Farwell, Clovis or Muleshoe, then our local business climate would improve dramatically.

This is a case where every person does make a difference. I can't say that when talking about world trade policies, or what the federal government is doing. But I can say that with certainty when discussing our local economy.

Our local businesses do not make huge profits - as the non-local, foreign-owned corporations do. Our local businesses need full community support in order to maintain services here. When we shop elsewhere, it's like sticking a knife into our own neighbors.

It's nice to report, also, that I've gotten some feedback from local businessmen who have said some folks have switched back from the kinds of places I've mentioned. They've told me how good it feels and how much they appreciate it. It makes them want to do a better job for their community. Like I said, it's a two-way street.

Sometimes, it's difficult for someone to switch from a foreign-owned chain to a local American-owned business. How do you tell the local fella that you've been by passing him all this time.

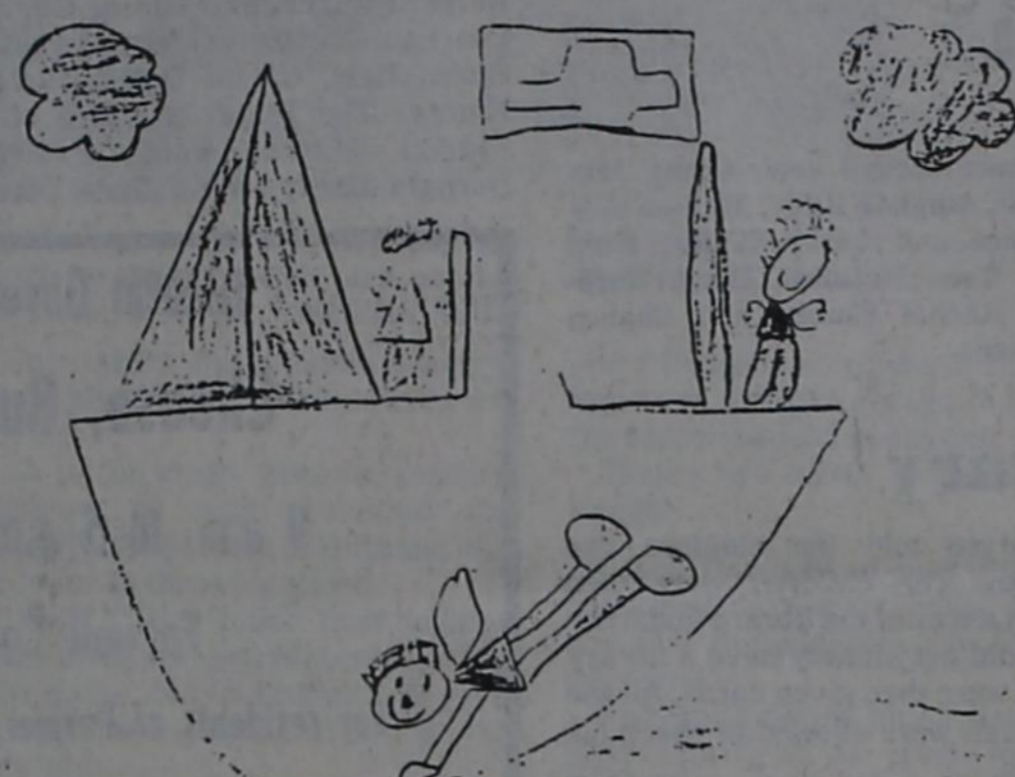
Well, here's what you do: you simply make the switch. There's no need to say anything. Just switching is a silent message that the local businessman will understand - and appreciate. He'll know that you and he are working together - on keeping our community strong. He needs you to make that switch.

And if you feel there's something to be said, here's one way to put it: "I'm switching back to our community. We must work together in these difficult economic times."

Texico-Farwell is one community. It's a small community. It's a community that will survive only if folks work together.

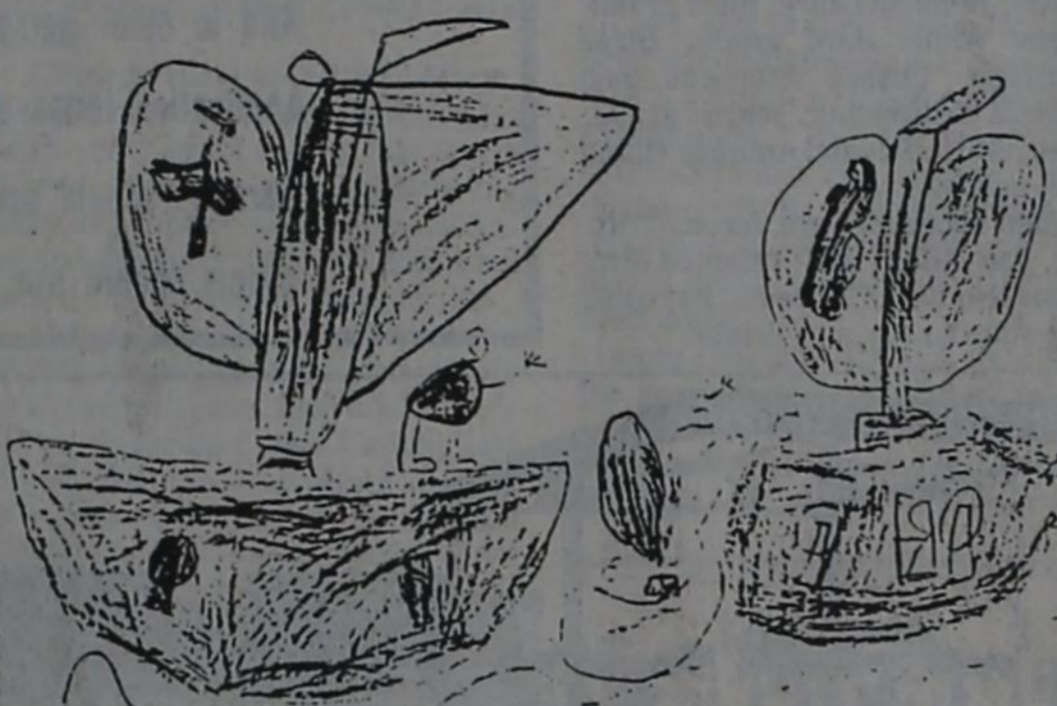

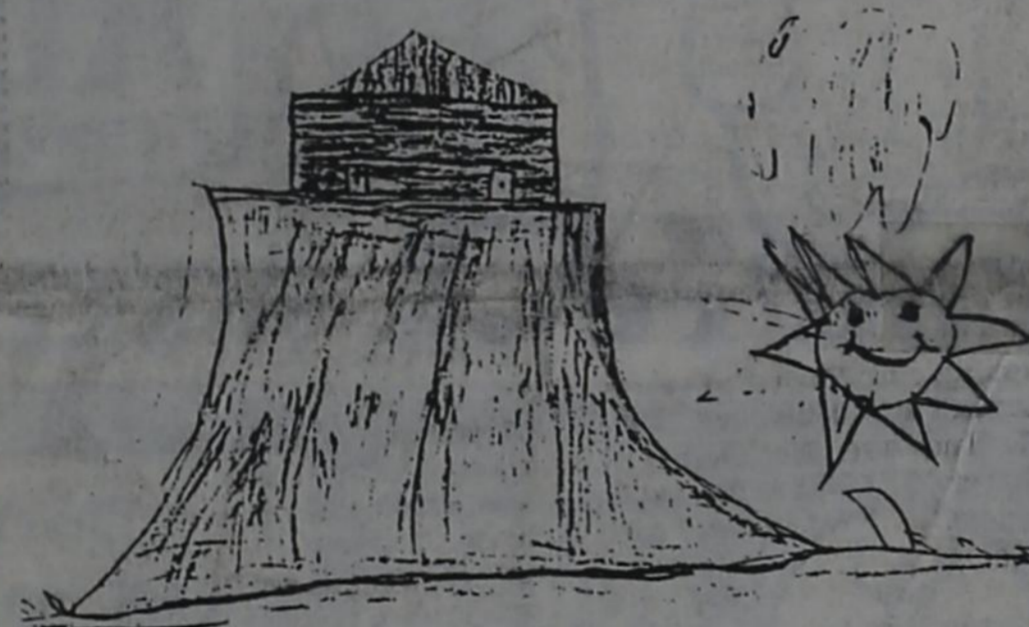
Columbus sailed on a ship which was 14.

## Lifeline available

The Emergency Response System, which will be offered by volunteers from St. John Lutheran Church, Lariat, is an invaluable lifeline for the older adult living alone.

It secures vital help in emergencies with the push of a button. It provides a safe home environment for the older adult who, without round-the-clock security would need closer supervision or even institutional care. You can live with peace of mind knowing assistance can be summoned easily and immediately in case of heart attacks, strokes, falls, robbery, assault, etc.

Constant security through a 24-hour center means someone is always there to help through ERS. If a client signals for help, someone calls within seconds to assess the situation. Depending on what kind of help is needed the center dispatches a volunteer, ambulance service, the fire department or police with no delay. An automatic timer provides extra security by sending a help call if the client is

unconscious or can't use the call button. If a timer is not reset daily by the client, the center is automatically notified of an emergency.

These units, valued at \$500 each, are provided through Lutheran Social Service of Texas at no cost to the client. They are installed by volunteers in the community through the local Lutheran Church.

A monthly fee of \$21.75 is the only cost to the client. Lutheran Social Service of Texas has a contract with the Texas Department of Human Services to provide ERS to those persons meeting their eligibility criteria. The service is now available to anyone needing it in Lamb, Parmer and Bailey counties.

**W.A.R.M. proposes legislation**

The War Against Rape and Murder (WARM) officers attended the Legislature's Criminal Justice Committee meeting Sept. 25 and 26 in the State Capitol, Santa Fe. The officers present were Mrs. Albert Matlock, President, and Mrs. Loren Wilson, Secretary-Treasurer.

Mrs. Matlock addressed the committee stating that WARM's by-laws have been incorporated by the State Corporation Commission and now hope to expand statewide. Geraldine Wilson addressed the Criminal Justice Committee on Fri-

day morning proposing legislation to make officials who release convicted persons on appeal, probation, or parole, to be held responsible for that person. She made this plea in response to W.A.R.M.'s by-laws and the public outcry for a halt to releasing violent criminals to again prey upon law abiding citizens.

Mrs. Wilson proposed legislation to require elementary schools to provide trained counselors for, 1. child abuse, 2. child neglect, 3. substantive (drugs, alcohol) abuse.

"Our elementary children must be offered protection from abuse and counseling when abused. If these elementary children are not reached and helped, they are already hardened criminals when they reach high school age. Statistics prove each criminal costs the N.M. taxpayer the following: minimum security, \$16,700; medium security, over \$20,000; and maximum security, \$33,000. Taxpayers should realize a "savings" with reduced criminal population within 12 years, and we should have safer, happier and more productive children almost immediately," she said.

# Texico shocks Springer

Friday night's game against Springer started off too familiar for Texoc, finding themselves down 6-0 after Springer's Gillespie tossed a short touchdown pass to Doug Wingo.

Springer carried the ball in earlier for a touchdown, but it was called back because of a holding penalty against them.

The Wolverines were more aggressive this game and showed maturity. They were able to shut down Springer's running game as they played good defense. Texico has been known to give up big plays, but they overcame that this game. Instead of giving up the big play, Texico made them.

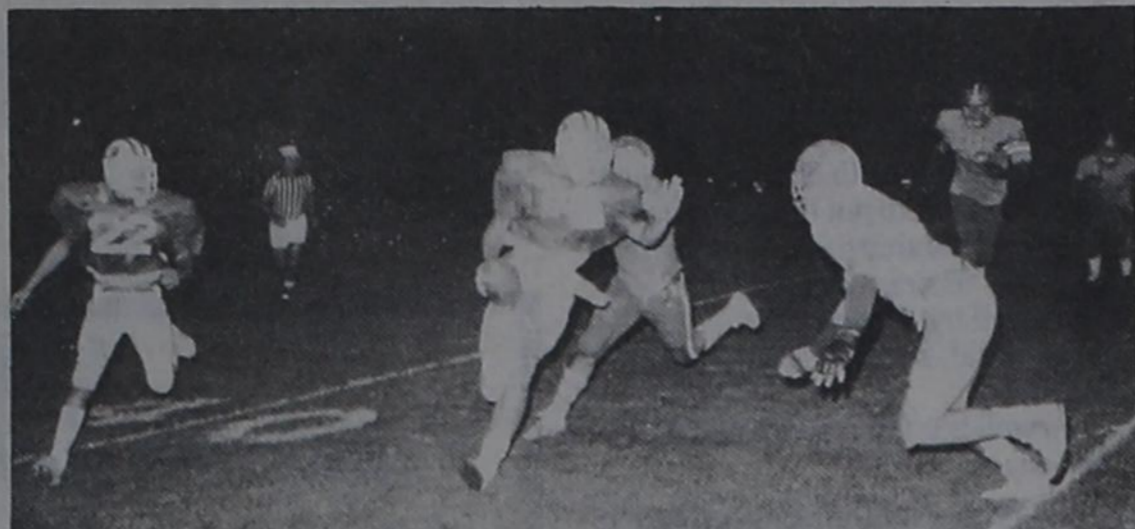
With 37 seconds left in the second quarter, Texico's Rod Smith worked his way around the outside on a 3 yard TD run. He had set up the 65-yard drive with a 40 yard run. The third quarter showed strong defense from both teams. Texico wanted to put a lot of pressure on Gillespie and did so by forcing him to throw before he wanted to.

This pressure made him move out of pocket letting Texico stop a lot of the big plays. Putting the pressure on were Spicer Lewis, linebacker, Lance Akers, noseguard, and Jesse Martinez, defensive tackle.

Both teams were held scoreless in the third quarter. Then Springer took the lead again on a 12-yard Gillespie sweep. The lead was short-lived as 14 seconds later Smith took the kickoff and ran it back 75 yards for a Texico touchdown.

The conversion failed as it had earlier for Springer. After exchanging punts, Texico got the ball again on its own 25 yard line and drove down field.

Keeping the drive alive were

Lance Akers and Kenneth Murphy. Both hung onto crucial catches for Texico.

A lot of credit goes to Texico's defense as they pressured the usually fine passing of Gillespie into a 10-for-24 throwing game.

Then Texico made their biggest play of all with just 16 seconds left in the game. Smith kicked a 27 yard game-winning field goal through the uprights.

After kicking off, the Wolverines' defense loaded their secondary to prevent a long pass. Springer was still alive too as they moved the ball up field on a long quarter-back sneak.

Gillespie flung up a "Hail-Mary" pass to one side of the field flooded with receivers, but Texico's David Loera came up with another big play as he intercepted the pass that ended Springer's threat. The final score was Texico 15, Springer 12.

Springer may have been overconfident and not pumped up to really play ball. Capitan had beat Texico 44-0 and Springer beat Capitan last week. But the Wolverines showed them how to play ball as they moved Springer to an overall record of 4-2

and a District record of 0-2. The win improves Texico's record to 2-4 on the season and 1-0 in district.

Texico will travel to Hagerman tonight.

Coach David Lynn said that the boys played an outstanding game and that the offensive line played very well.

Rod Smith played an outstanding game scoring all the points for the Wolverines, said Lynn. Other offensive players he mentioned were Urban Orozco, Brett Southard, Jesse Martinez, Mike Williams, Justin Barnes and Robert Amick.

Lynn says that he thinks that the boys have matured a lot, and that they did things well out on the field Friday night. "They took advantage of the situations and did well," said Coach Lynn. He further mentioned that they didn't give up the big plays, which previously they had been doing.

Lynn said that the boys went into the game thinking that they would have a hard time beating Springer, since two other teams that they had played had been defeated by

Springer.

Lynn says that he thinks the Texico-Hagerman game will be a good game. "Hagerman is not listed high in District, but they always have a real physical game against Texico," said Lynn.

Texico will play Hagerman at Hagerman tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. MDT.

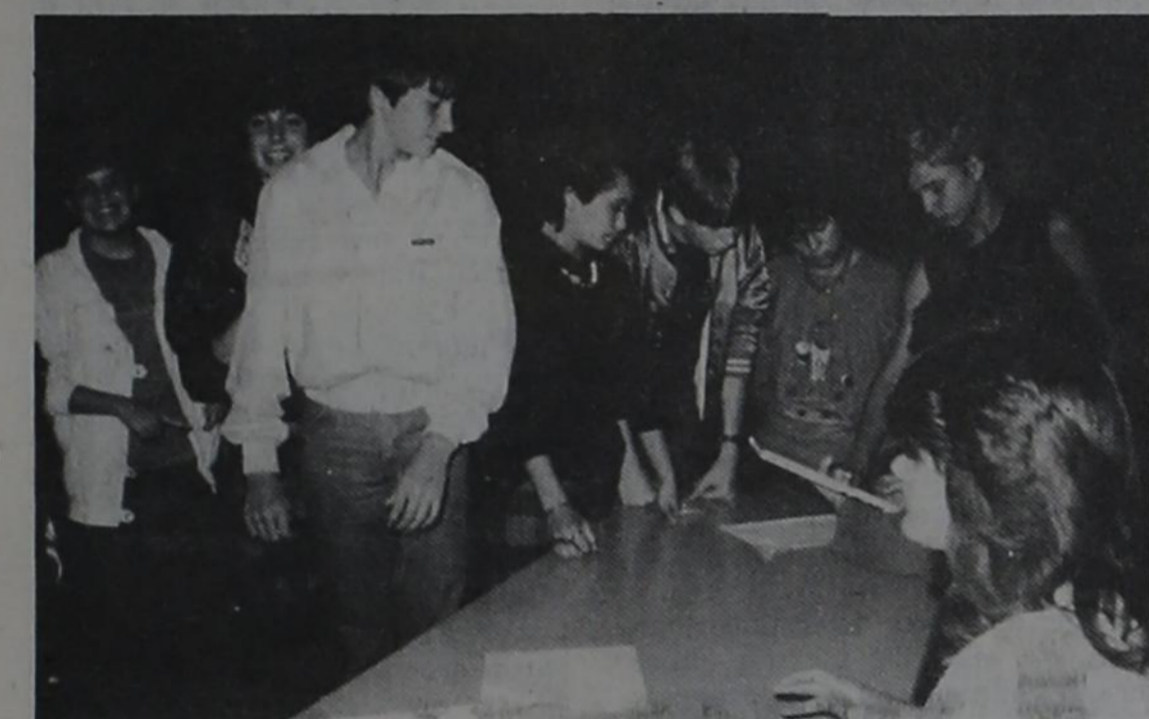

The second quarter began with a first-down run by Jeff Actkinson followed by a series of plays and another first down run by Actkinson which had the Steers out to their 29 yard line. There was then two major penalties moving them back to the 5, then a fumble was recovered by Petersburg. They scored and kicked the extra point.

On the ensuing kickoff, the kick was returned by Woods to the 24 yard line. A first down was made by a penalty and then Petersburg intercepted a pass at the 45 yard line and returned back down to the 35 yard line. However, the Steer defense tightened and Farwell took over on downs.

In the second half, Farwell kicked to Petersburg and they returned to the 33 yard line; however, they were held on three downs and were forced to punt. The punt was returned to our 36 for good field position for the first time.

Farwell was able to pick up one first down on a run by Woods and on a reverse to the split end, Roy Perales threw a 25 yard pass to Daniel Rubio for a first down. This was followed again by a first down pass from Woods to Roy Perales which had Farwell at the Petersburg 19 and their best opportunity to score. However, a series of incomplete passes killed the Farwell drive and the ball went over on downs.

With Petersburg held in their own end of the field and their poorest field position, the Steer defense played well and had a jarring tackle by Homer Anzaldua for a loss followed by another excellent defensive play and a loss caused by Jerry Cole. # Texas seeks recognition from European nations

1838: FRIDAY, OCTOBER 12. In Washington, D.C., Texas Minister to the United States, Dr. Anson Jones, formally withdrew the application of the Texas Republic for annexation to the United States. The action was taken on direct orders of President Sam Houston, despite the fact that Texians had voted almost unanimously for annexation in September, 1836.

Dr. Jones is known to be in agreement with the President's position. The withdrawal is expected to facilitate recognition of Texas by European nations. The republic is actively seeking treaties of trade and recognition with England, France, Belgium, Holland, Norway, Sweden and other European nations, and currently has an agent in Europe for that purpose.

In a letter addressed to U.S. Secretary of State John Forsyth today, Dr. Jones stated that even though the subject of annexation has presumably been disposed of, "Texas, nevertheless, continued to be generally regarded by the people of both countries as in the attitude of an applicant for admission into this Union." In order to prevent future misunderstanding on this subject, he wrote, "The undersigned, Minister Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Texas, therefore, in accordance with his instructions, has the honor to announce to the Secretary of State of the United States the formal and absolute withdrawal of the proposition for the annexation of Texas to the United States."

The withdrawal now goes to the Texas Congress for ratification, which is expected to be forthcoming in due time.

There have been numerous representatives of the Republic of Texas in Washington since the Declaration of Independence of March 2, 1836. At that time, three commissioners from Texas had been in the United States for two months: Stephen F. Austin, William H. Wharton, and Dr. Branch T. Archer. They were joined shortly afterwards by George C. Childress, author of the Declaration, and by ad interim Secretary of State Samuel P. Carson, but none had authority to negotiate formally with the United States. "If we had those powers," General Austin reported on April 6, more than two weeks before the Battle of San Jacinto, "Texas would have been by this time recognized, if not admitted into this Union."

However, General Austin was unduly optimistic. Five weeks after San Jacinto, ad interim President David G. Burnet appointed his then Secretary of State James Collinsworth, who had succeeded Carson, and his Attorney General Peter W. Grayson, as commissioners to Washington to negotiate for annexation or recognition. Secretary of State Forsyth refused to recognize their authority because their documents bore no official seal of the Republic of Texas.

Upon becoming President, Sam Houston appointed William H. Wharton to return to Washington as the official Minister of Texas, with General Memucan Hunt to aid him, and Fairfax Catlett as Secretary of the Legation, "to take charge of,

and safely keep, in a neat and regular manner, all documents, papers and records."

The U.S. State Department still quibbled over the Texas Legation's credentials, even though Congress passed a resolution recognizing Texas, signed by President Andrew Jackson on March 3, 1837, as one of his last official acts. He also nominated Alcee La Branche of Louisiana as U.S. charge d'affaires to Texas. A few weeks later, Wharton and Hunt departed in disgust, leaving Catlett in charge. Forsyth remained obdurate. Catlett reported that when he presented his credentials to the Secretary of State, "He told me that he could not formally receive me inasmuch as Messrs Wharton and Hunt had not been regularly accredited, and my commission as Secretary of Legation rested upon a Texian Minister first being formally received and accredited by this Government."

This quibbling finally ceased when General Hunt returned to Washington in July, 1837, as the official Texian Minister, and was received by President Martin Van Buren on July 26. President Houston then sent General John T. Mason and Attorney General Peter Grayson to Washington to aid General Hunt in placing the cause of Texas annexation before Congress. On August 4 Hunt presented Secretary of State Forsyth with a lengthy 20-page document setting forth reasons for annexation. Forsyth rejected it on August 25, stating that "the United States are bound to Mexico by a treaty of amity and commerce" which prevents even any "future consideration" of this matter.

The U.S. charge d'affaires Alcee La Branche did not take up his duties in Texas until October, 1837. On October 26, he was presented to the Texas House of Representatives. On the same day, Dr. Jones, then serving as Representative from Brazoria, introduced a resolution disclaiming Texas interest in annexation. It was tabled. Shortly afterward he introduced a motion to reduce the status of the Texas representative in Washington from

"Minister Plenipotentiary" to "charge d'affaires." It was not carried. On April 23 he again introduced a resolution requiring the President to withdraw the proposition for annexation. It lost by only one vote. At this time, Jones was chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations.

Texas representatives are elected annually, and Jones did not plan to run in 1838. He was getting married in June. After Congress adjourned, however, he was requested by President Houston to become the new Minister Plenipotentiary to Washington, to replace General Hunt, who had resigned. Peter Grayson was also leaving Washington. Dr. Jones' fiancée agreed to postpone the wedding, and he somewhat reluctantly accepted the appointment, with the proviso that he would be permitted to withdraw the annexation proposal.

He arrived in Washington last August 23, after a lengthy trip of four or five weeks. At that time he commented: "Today I have to make my debut in Washington City. I feel like a schoolboy just before examination, and wish the 'ceremonial' was well over." However, President Van Buren was out of town, and the "ceremonial" did not take place until last Tuesday, October 9. The President received him shortly after 2 o'clock. He presented his credentials, and chatted briefly for about ten minutes. Today, three days later, Dr. Jones lost no time in presenting to Secretary of State Forsyth the withdrawal of annexation proposals. ...

1843: THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12. William Bollaert, an Englishman currently visiting Texas, has embarked on a hunting expedition. It is today approaching the valley of the Guadalupe River. For those unfamiliar with hunting in Texas, he provides the following information: "The hunter should be habited in the tanned hunting shirt and leggings or trousers, armed with a spear, holster, pistols, and rifle, Bowie or huntint knife and a smaller pocket knife." He says that for each five men, there should be "a camp kettle and iron pot, frying pan, coffee pot - each his tin cup - or half a gourd will do better, for then one can drink without burning oneself, and thus be a match for the backwoodsmen, whose mouths and throats are insensible to the feeling of heat."

He says that Indian cornmeal is best for breadmaking. "A little venison fat put in the frying pan and when melted, put in the meal and water. It soon cakes; turn it and the breads i made. Mush is good also.

Even when a pack mule is not taken along, bread, dried beef, coffee, sugar, salt, pepper, tea, may be carried in the saddle bags.

"In the pouch, which may have two compartments for bullets, punt for kindling fire, or a piece of rag rolled up and the end rubbed with powder - then with flint and steel, fire can be soon got by putting the punk or rag into some dry grass - whisk it about, the grass takes fire, then a few dry sticks, and voila fuego."

He says that in Indian country, dark horses are preferable, since they are not so easily seen at night by the Indians. During the day the horses may be allowed a pretty wide range, but at night brought into camp for safety. "Saddle and saddle bags should form the pillow - the bridle at one's head. Blankets placed so that they may be laid hold of in the dark and if necessary, horse saddled quickly. The arms, if fine weather, may recline on the tree one lines under - if wet, rifle and pistols laid alongside you under

the blanket. There should be one guard during the night for one or two hours, and if there is apprehensions of Indians, make but a small fire to cook by and that ere Sundown. No firing or hunting - and put fire out after cooking."

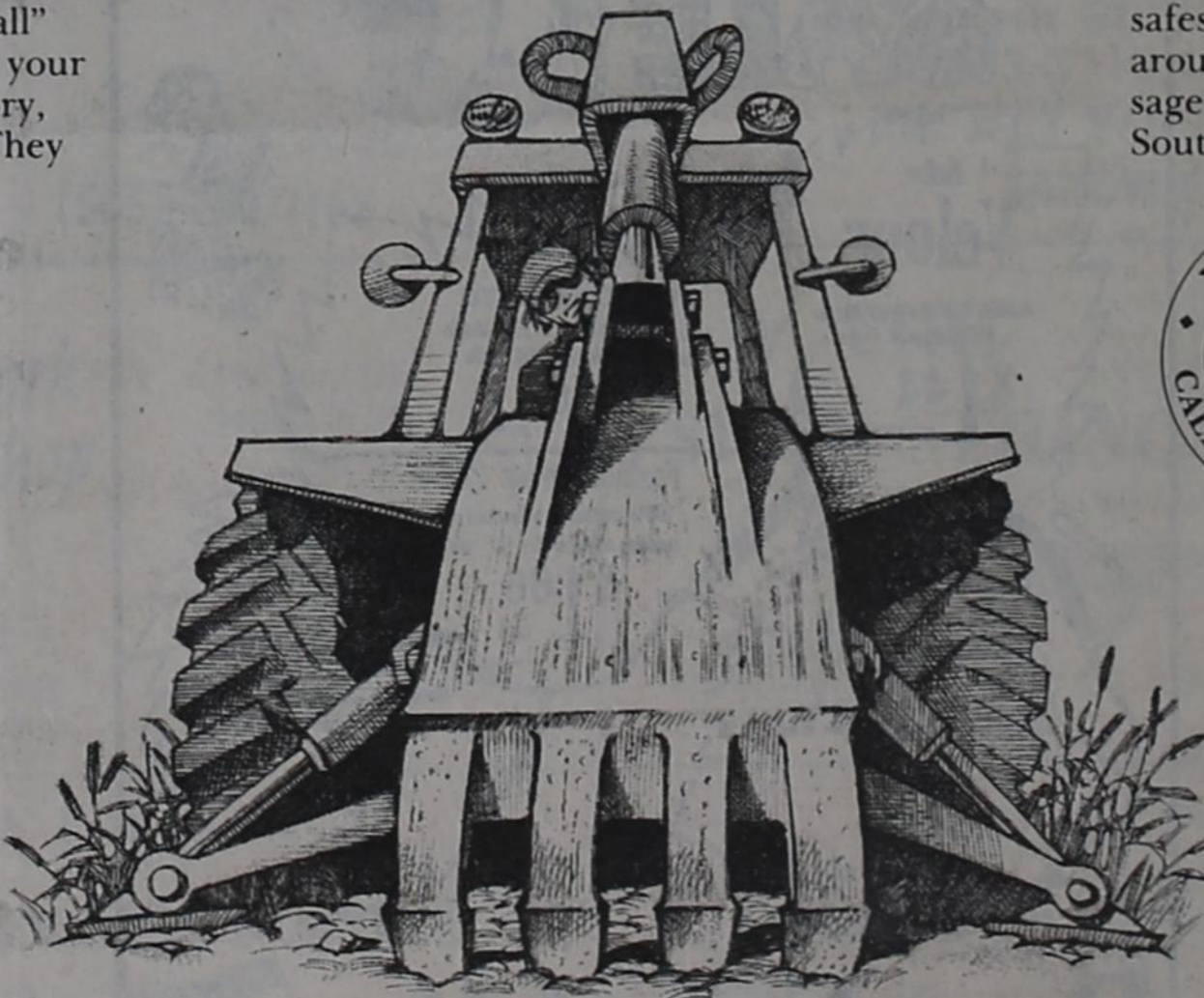

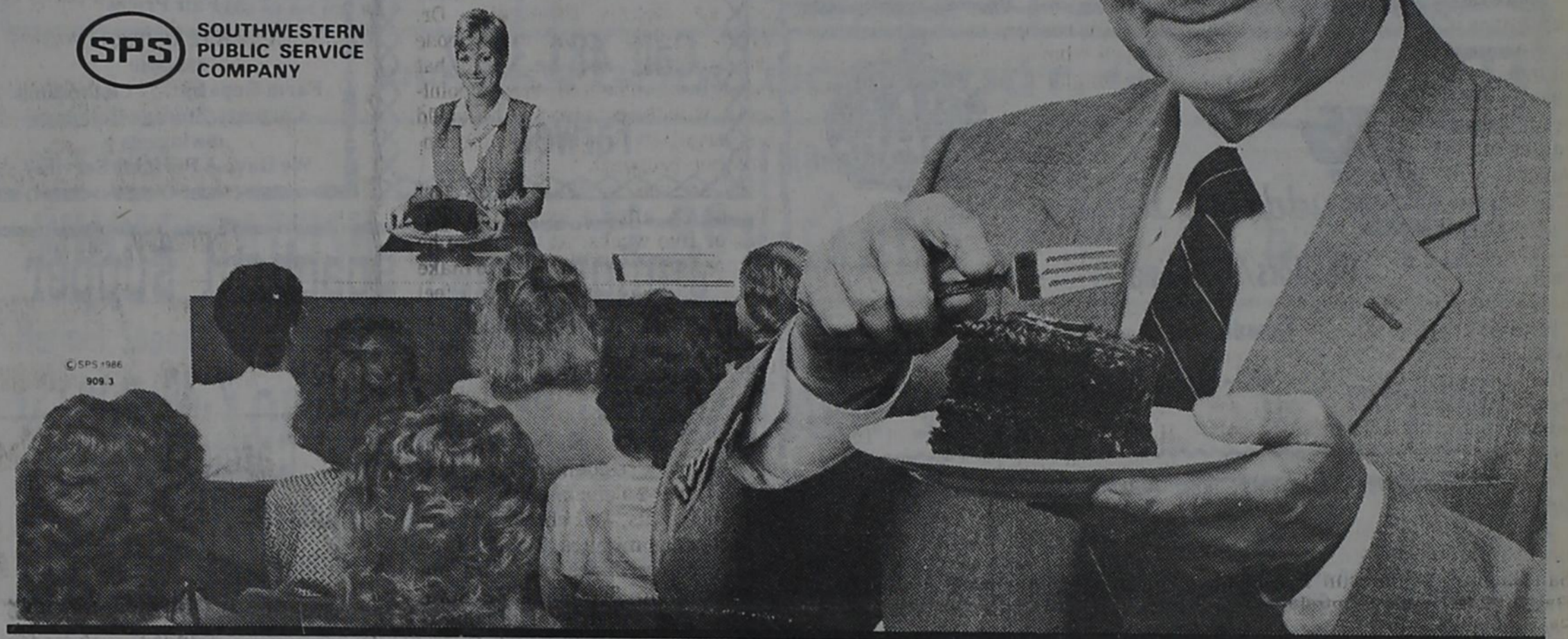

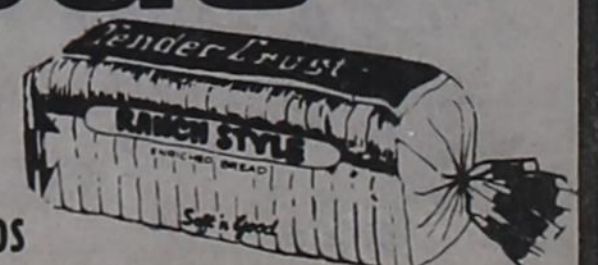
