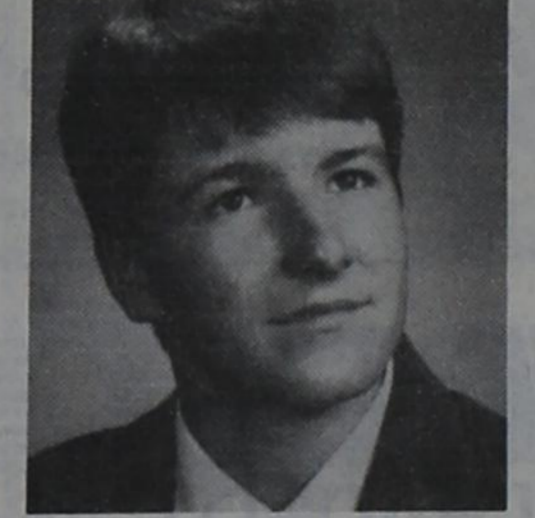

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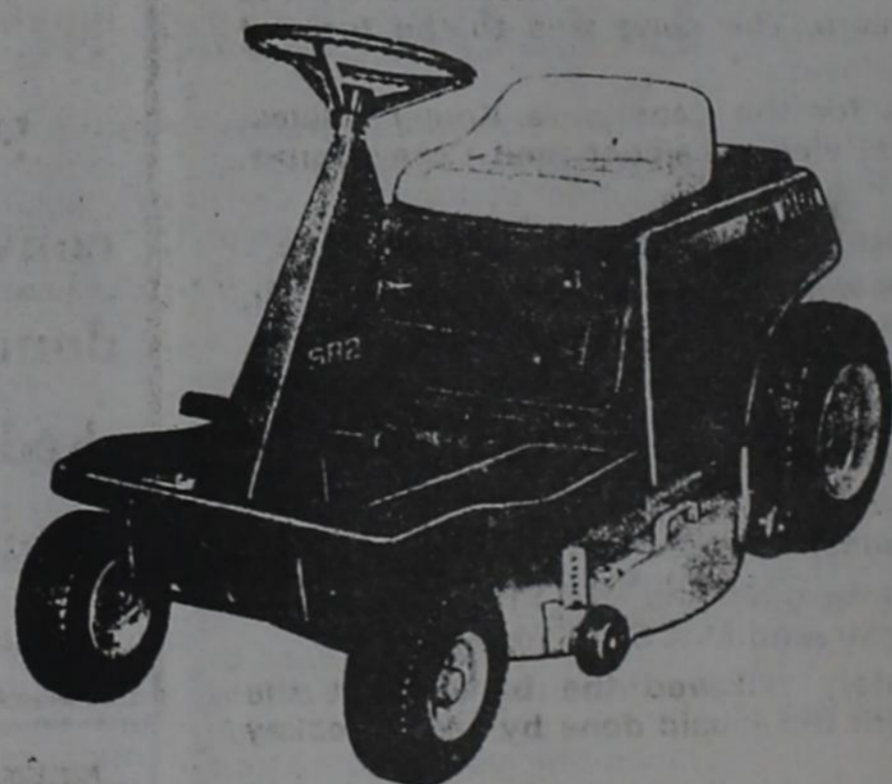
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Farwell Junior High cheerleaders announced

High school and junior high school athletes were honored for their participation in the school program.

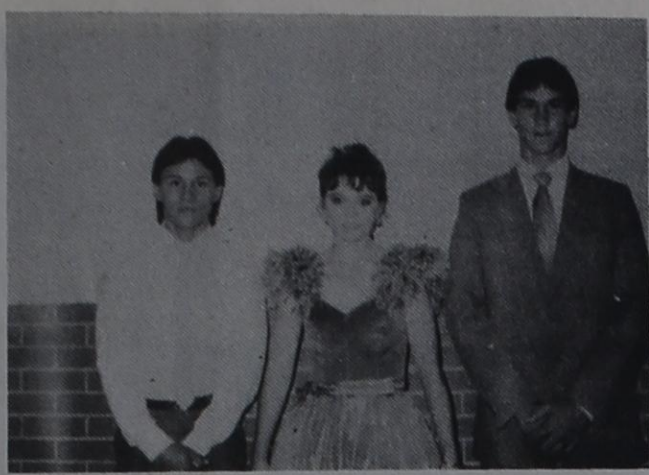

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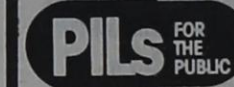

Recipe of Week

4 tablespoons minced parsley
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup (2 sticks) margarine melted
1 clove garlic, crushed
2 teaspoons salt
3 chicken breasts, halved and boned
1/2 cup lemon juice
Dash paprika

Combine bread crumbs, Parme-

san cheese, parsley, and pepper on a large sheet of wax paper. Combine the margarine, garlic, and salt in a mixing bowl. Dip chicken into margarine, then into crumb mixture, coating thoroughly. Roll each piece up tightly and skewer with a toothpick. Arrange chicken pieces in a casserole. Sprinkle with lemon juice and drizzle with remaining butter. Cover with waxed paper. Microwave on medium-high for 12 to 15 minutes or until tender. Let stand covered 5 minutes before serving. Sprinkle with paprika.

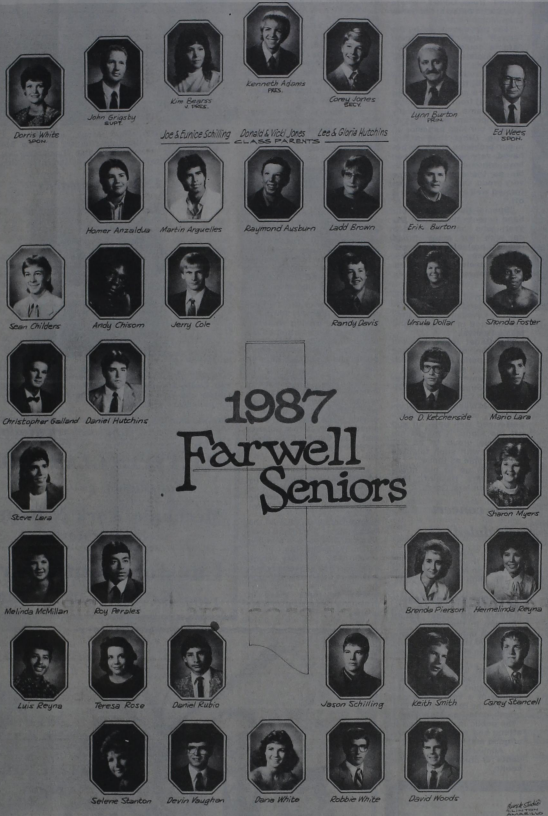

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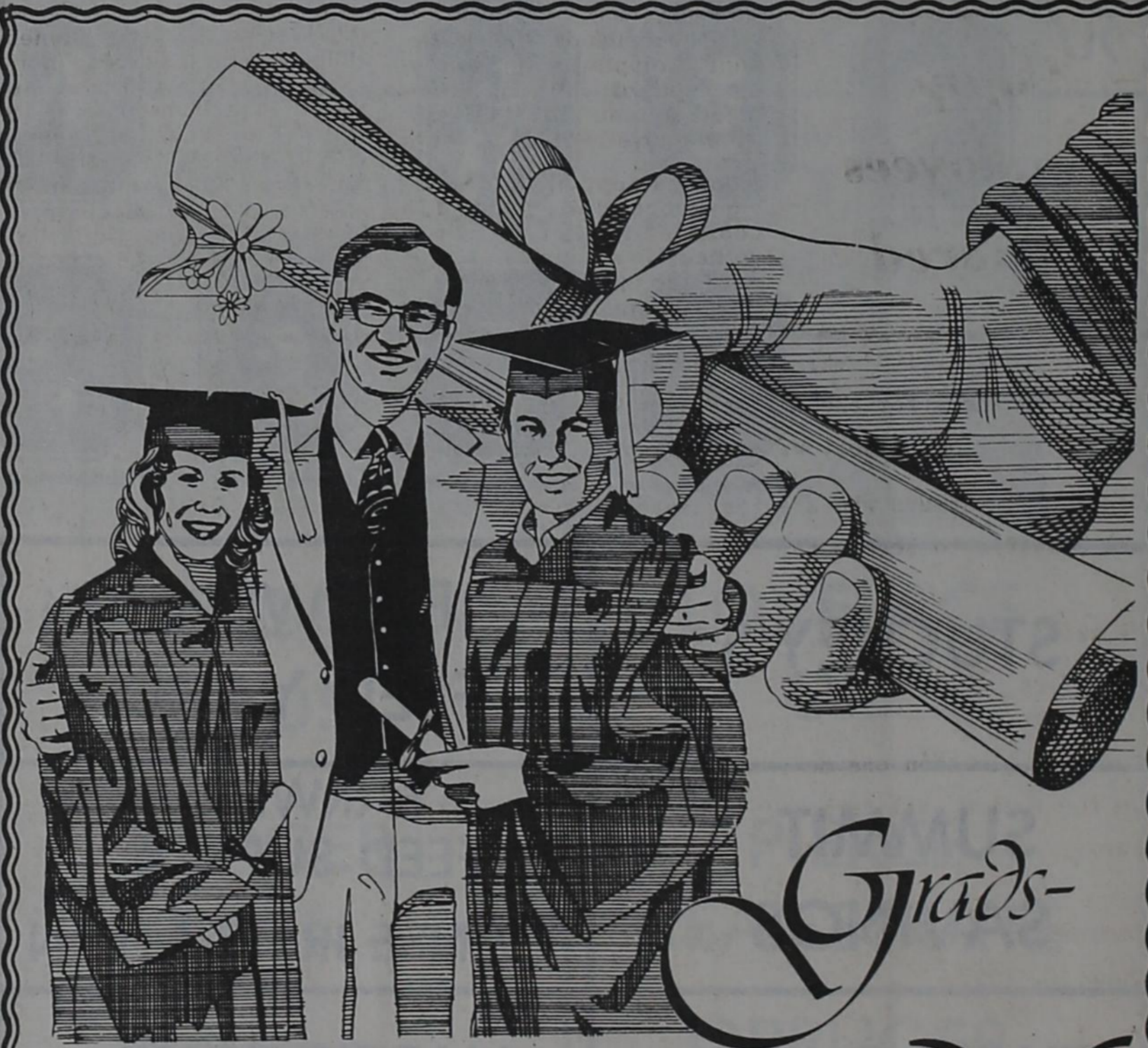

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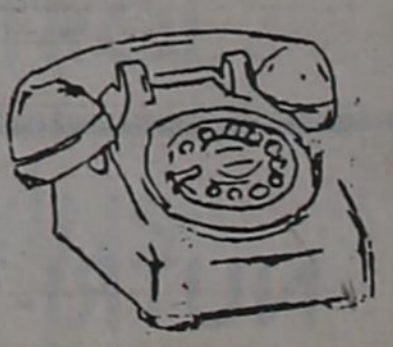

Dudley was appointed a public defender. A hearing date has not yet been set.

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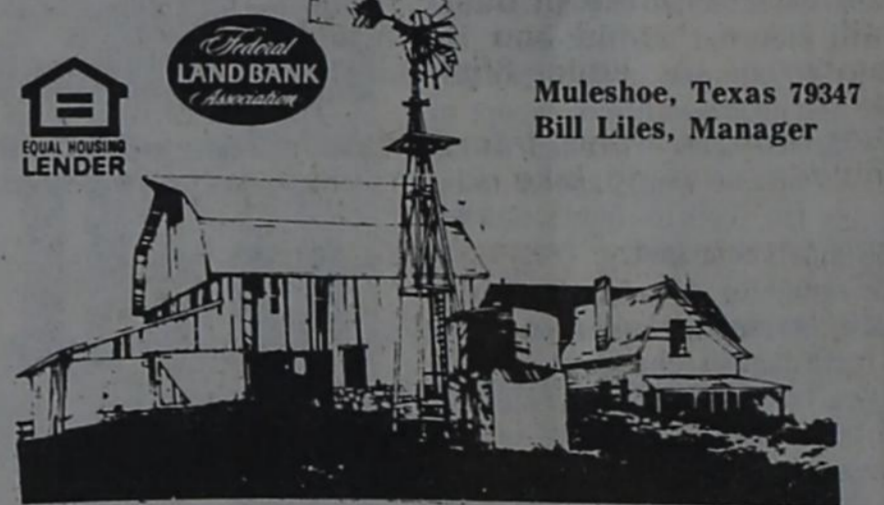

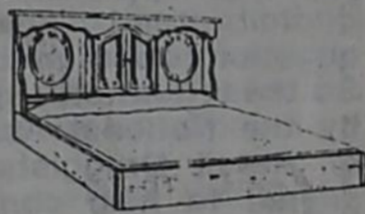

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Texico votes to support Ute Lake water project

Once again, the future of water in this area was a main topic at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

The council voted to support the Ute Water Join Powers Agreement. After checking into the pact further, the council likely will spend \$250 at its next meeting to help reserve water from the proposed plan at a future date.

It was asked if Farwell would be eligible to be involved in this pact, but councilman Doyal LaRue indicated that New Mexico laws at the present time won't allow that (see Farwell City Council story for more on this subject).

In other business, the council:

- Approved \$287 for its annual Eastern Plains Council of Government dues.

- Discussed three variance requests: Johnny Howard's, for a painting business office in his home; Don Lovelady's, for a workshop and vehicle washing facility at his Garwood home; Red Pierce's, for a small engine repair shop, and Betty

Pierce's, for a beauty salon.

All will be needed to be advertised legally for public hearings and certified letters will be sent adjoining property owners before the council takes action.

- Discussed next fiscal year's budget. \$33,000 is planned for street repairs. Water rates will be reviewed next year and may need to be hiked at that time. A work study session is set for Thursday.

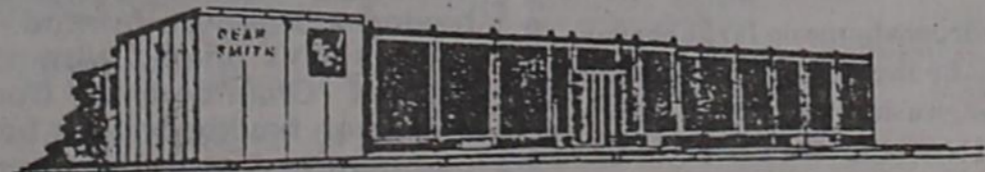
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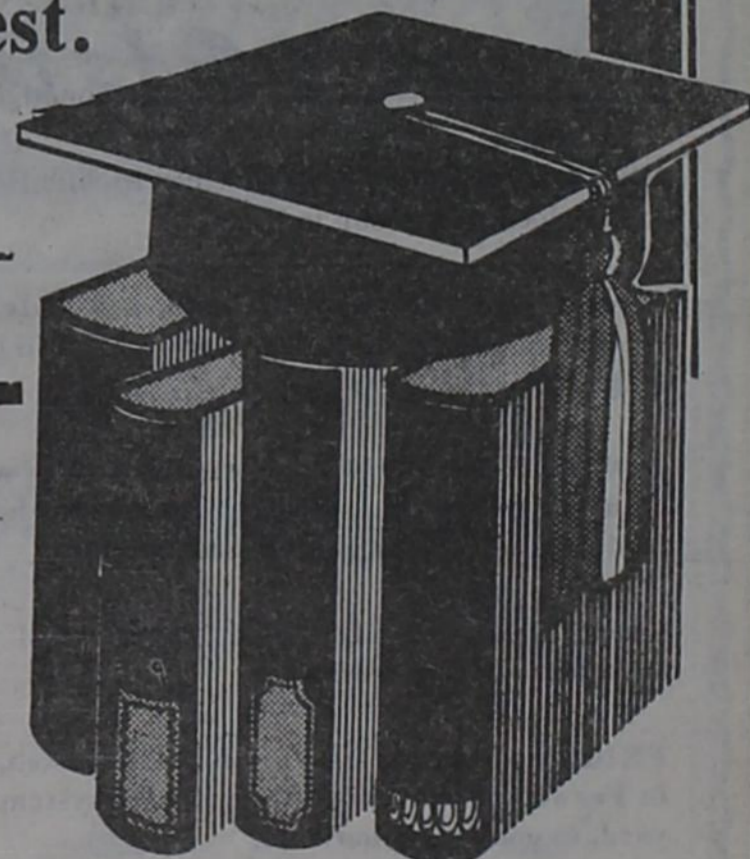

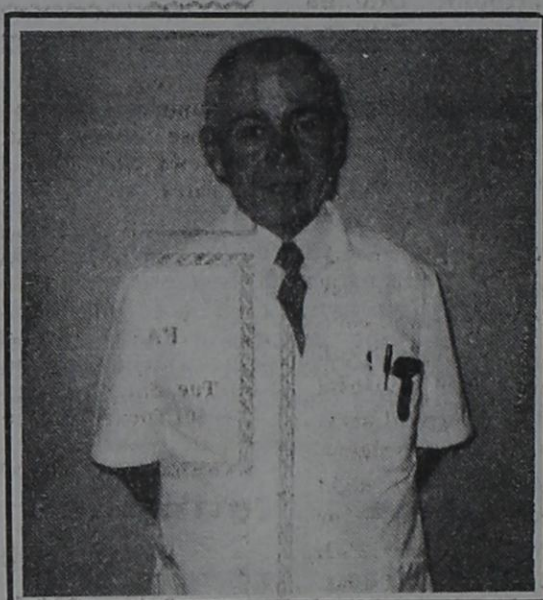

of the post office. It will be advertised and letters sent adjoining property owners, with a hearing tentatively set for May 26.

- Saw a demonstration of the new fire department's WEPS unit. Fire fighters Mike Kamp and Lee Hutchins showed how it worked.

- Turned in suggestions of which streets need to be repaired.

- Talked of buying new street signs. Prices will be checked on.
