





Bolings visit Europe

This story was written by Frances and Bill Boling of their recent trip to Europe.

After flying nonstop for ten hours on a DC10, we arrived at Frankfurt, Germany at 7:25 a.m., March 28, along with 300 other passengers. As Frankfurt is seven hours ahead of Texas time, we lost seven hours of night. (and sleep)

That afternoon Terri took us on a bus tour to Mainz. Here we visited the Gutenberg museum which contained the old Gutenberg bible and printing presses. There were so many beautiful hand-copied Bibles. I was amazed to see the hieroglyphics carved in huge pieces of

One can catch a bus within 10-15 minutes to go anywhere in the city of Wiesbaden. These public buses are also used by the school children.

The trees lining the streets in Wiesbaden are meticulously trimmed. Each tree is numbered and residents are assigned specific trees to care for. It is a beautiful city built on hills. The houses are three-story with different families living on each floor. Terri's home was formerly a carriage house (where horses were kept), then a cigarette factory, and now a beautiful dwelling.

A German congregation of about 500 attended the Baptist Church. Afterwards an English-speaking service was held in the same church. We attended the latter one.

I had pictured the Autobahn as bumper to bumper traffic. Not so. There are no speed limits except in a few areas. Cars travelled 80-120 mph. A Porsche would speed up on us, doing 120, flash his lights, and we would move over fast.

Our daughter drove us to Paris, France on Sunday afternoon. We saw farm houses clustered in little villages. One does not see a house on each farm. The soil that we saw in France was thin and rocky, farmed with small tractors. No cattle were seen anywhere. They are kept penned in barns until later in the

Paris is a city of huge buildings, subways, and people always rushing to catch trains. The magnificent structures -- Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame Cathedral and Arc de Triomphe are beyond description.

We found only two toilettes in the city. One was a small circular building on a street corner in the heart of the city. You open the door with two francs. The door closes automatically and opens automatically in about three minutes.

I could understand the French

revolt after seeing the palace of Versailles. Louis XIV decked his palace throughout with gold (from taxes) while the people were starv-


We saw armed guards patroling the streets, and stationed around Notre Dame.


