levels to stabilization of the aquifer In Parmer County, the 97 obser vation wells measured show an av erage annual change from 1987 to 1987 of 0.38 of a foot decline. The
10-year average annual change 10-year average annual chang
from 1977 to 1987 shows a decline of 2.00 feet. The five-year average annual change from 1982 to 1987
shows a decline of 129 feet shows a decline of 1.29 feet.
Throughout the District's Throughout the District's service
area, the five-year average annual change from 1982 to 1987 shows a total decline of one foot, which equals an average annual decline of 0.20 of a foot. The 10 -year average
change in water levels from 1977 to 1987 throughout the District's service area shows a total decline of 7.4
feet. This equals feet. This equals an average annual decline of 0.74 of a foot to the
