It's giveaway time

More than 50 Twin Cities businesses will be participating in the sixth annual Border Town Days Merchants Giveaway program held in conjunction with the annual BTD celebration's park activities July 25.

This year's giveaway will take place throughout the afternoon of the Saturday festivities at Farwell City Park.

Each participating business has a box in which customers may register for the prize to be given away by that merchant. A person may sign up as many times as he wishes from now through July 24, when the boxes will be picked up and taken to the park for the drawing.

Drawings will be held from each individual merchant's box, and the person whose name is drawn will be allowed ample time to claim the prize. Bill, Gertrude Foster honored

W.N. (Bill) and Gertrude Foster of Farwell will be honored as Pioneer Man and Pioneer Woman of the Year at Border Town Days July 25.

The BTD Committee voted Monday to name the Fosters to the honor. This is the second year that Pioneers have been named. Last year's recipients were Mitz Walling and Vashti Fowler.

The Fosters will ride in the BTD parade, then will be honored with certificates during the Day in the Park activities.

The Fosters were nominated by their daughter, Ernestine, of Mission, Kan. Her letter said:

"Bill arrived in Parmer County in 1919 and Gertrude came to this area in December 1920 after their marriage.

"Let's pay respect to the quiet ones in our community who serve (silently most of the time) at the times of birth and death, and joy and celebration. Who respond to the needs of people and church with no thought of personal glory.

"Bill rode his horse and carried the flag on many Border Town Day parades. He is always available with quiet words of advice - only if you ask for it - and never forcing you, always helping if possible.

"Through Depression, drought and all adversity, they 'stand tall' as examples to all."

In other business at the BTD meeting:

Kids can start registering bikes

All area youngsters are reminded that registration starts Monday for the Border Town Days Decorated Bike Contest at Texico City Hall.

"Everything is ready at the city hall in Texico for registration," said Ann Cooper, who is in charge of the bike contest.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. Texas time Friday, July 24.

She said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, if they are to be eligible for the cash prize to be awarded.

Prizes totalling \$50 will be awarded.

No motorized bikes will be allowed in the parade.

All riders must have their bikes at the empty lot west of the old Texaco station (or flea market) at 9:45 a.m. Texas time, and line up for judging on the southwest corner of the lot. "You must be on time or you will not be judged," added Mrs. Cooper.

Other rules are: All participants must continue to Farwell City Park, and then park their bikes. No riding will be allowed in the park area.

You must be present at the park to receive your cash prize.

There will be two divisions in the judging:

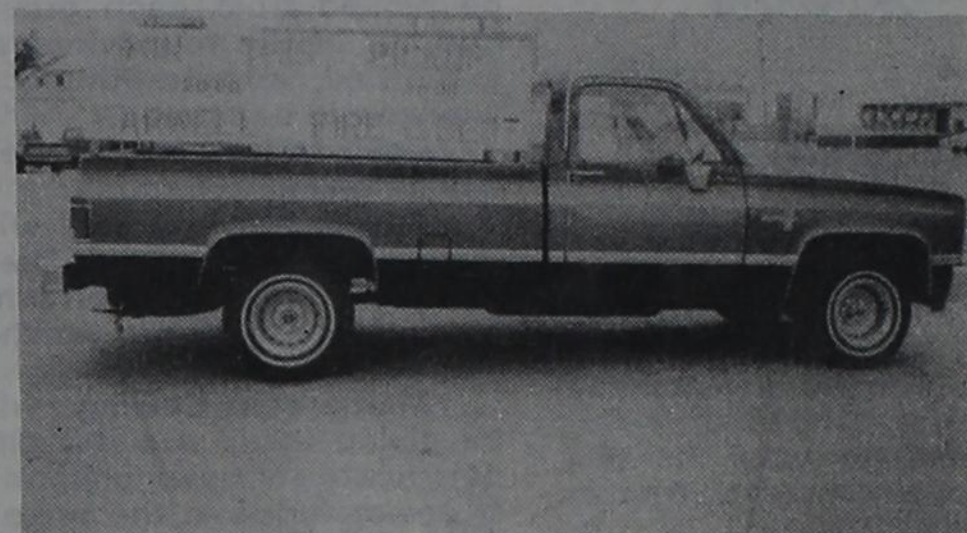
Division A: Best decorated bike, ages 7-12.

Division B: Best decorated bike, ages 6 and under.

Judging will be based 50 percent on originality and theme; 30 percent on neatness, and 20 percent on use of color.

Judges will be from Clovis: Tim Martin, Carl Thompson and Frank Murray.

folks who were considering having a 5 kilometer fun run before the parade were not able to get organized in time, but may do it next year.

- Heard Mrs. Cooper report that the pennants to hang over the Texico streets have been ordered by the Texico Chamber of Commerce. The Farwell pennants, bought by the Farwell Chamber, have arrived.

- Robyn Palady was asked to find a local resident to sign the New Mexico state song (the theme of this year's BTD is New Mexico's Golden Anniversary) and the National Anthem at the start of the Day in the Park activities.

- Noted that the Texico - Farwell Rotary Club's barbecue tickets will cost the same as last year - \$4 for adults and \$2 for youths (drinks included).

- Vicki Milloy reported that the High Plains Rodeo will start at 7:30 p.m. July 24 and 25.

- Entries for the arts and crafts show on the courthouse lawn July 25 should register with Janie Bowery at 481-3620.

BTD marshals named

She moved to Friona in 1983 from Clovis, where she had lived since 1928. She was born in Leonard, where she married Herbert Sikes July 1, 1921. He died in 1975.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church in Bovina. She had been a member of the First United Methodist in Clovis for more than 50 years, where she was a charter member of the Clyde Campbell Circle of the Methodist church, the Women's Society of Christian Service and was past president, district officer and a member of the official board of the United Methodist Women. She was a volunteer and officer of Clovis Hospital Auxiliary for 12 years.

She was preceded in death by two sons, James Herbert Sikes, in 1930, and Rodney Sikes, in 1965.

Survivors include a daughter, Gwen Clements of Bovina; three sisters, Winnie Condron of Elgin, Mary Ruth Redden of Clovis, and Frances Hodges of Tulia; five brothers, Billy Sudderth of Bovina, Rev. Melvin Sudderth of Bovina, Rev. Melvin Sudderth of San Francisco, J. B. Sudderth of Farwell, Sam Sudderth of Shawnee, Okla., and Don Sudderth of Alamogordo, N.M.; six grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

Kaltwasser named

The Farwell School Board Monday appointed Steve Kaltwasser to fill the term of Maxine Williams, who recently died.

Kaltwasser's term will expire in May 1988.

Kaltwasser, who was unanimously picked, was next in line of the top vote-getters in the last school board election. He received five less votes than Roberta Johnson, who won election last year.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Ron McWilliams, high school band director. He is going to Seminole, Texas. Several candidates for the post here are being interviewed.

The board also approved applying for a loan from the Texas School Services Foundation to buy about \$100,000 worth of equipment. The board also hopes that this will mean a higher bond rating, resulting in less interest.

Loans are sought for the following equipment: 53-passenger school bus, \$30,000.

Science lab equipment: microscopes, vent hoods and carts, \$14,500; and laser disc systems, \$6,050.

Computers, \$11,500.

Printers, \$3,700.

Cafeteria: Dishwasher, \$9,000; 25 tables, \$12,000; 225 chairs, \$2,500; food warmer, \$4,000, and microwave, \$1,000.

School Supt. John Grigsby explained that seeking the loan is designed to keep local taxes down, yet get the equipment needed for school operations.

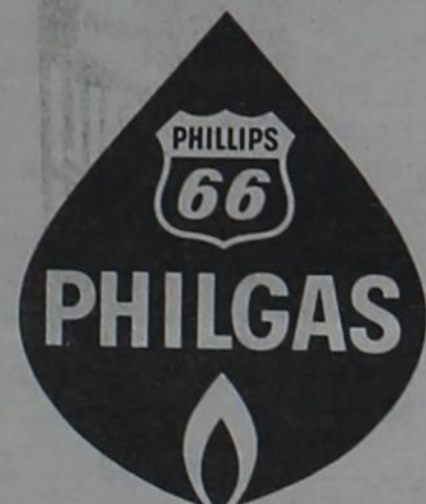

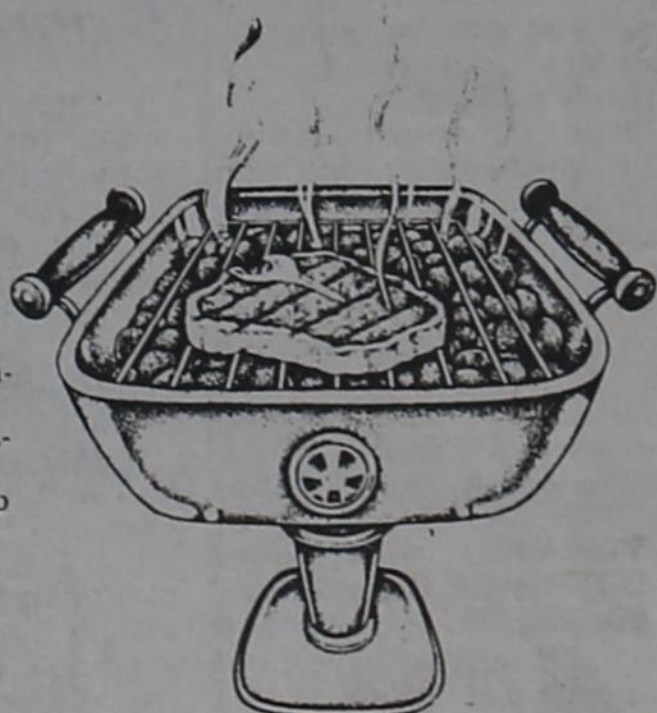

Singleterry family settled this area around 1860

The Singleterry family reunion was held June 26-28. Family members and friends came from several states to participate in the reunion. Many of the participants met relatives they did not even know existed.

Most of the people who attended descended from Joseph Wilson Singleterry who settled in the Pleasant Hill area.

His great-granddaughter, Myrtle Rathbun, told relatives at the reunion that in the late 1850's or early 1860's J. W. Singleterry was "at loggerheads with his neighbors about slavery." He was an abolitionist who moved his family to Kansas before the Civil War.

He thought he could be more effective there as an abolitionist than anywhere else. On the trip to Kansas, the family had to stop their wagon for a few days so that their daughter, Kansada, could be born. He later came to New Mexico.

In April 1906 about 80 Singleterry family members and other relatives came on a railroad train with farming tools and household goods to Texico. They moved a few miles north of Texico to land that had been selected by Drury Singleterry. Then J. W. Singleterry and his 4 sons and their families settled on the land.

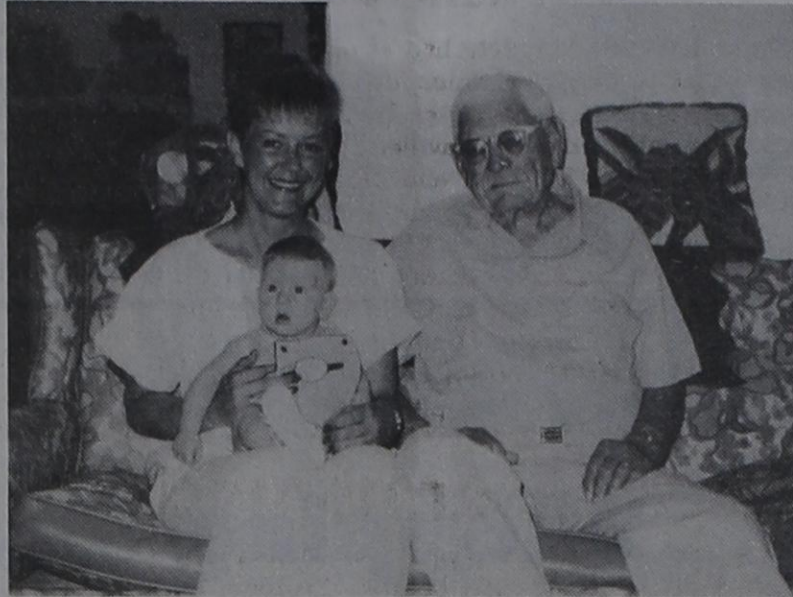
They first lived in tents, then dugouts. One son - James Moses and two of his sons (James Moses and George) settled on adjoining pieces of a section. J.W. Singleterry's son James Moses and his wife claimed the NW quarter of a section that is across the road from Aero Farm Chemical today. His brother, George, claimed the SW quarter. Another brother, Ben, claimed the section now farmed by Howard and Gerald Whitener.

One of the daughters of James Moses - Sarah Katherine and her family settled on Running Water Draw and dug the first windmill in the Pleasant Hill area. This land is now owned by Roy Richardson. There were Singleterrys settled all along the country from Texico to Hollene. Many of the Singleterrys didn't stay long enough to prove their homestead claims, but returned to Illinois.

J.W. Singleterry's son, Drury, was already in New Mexico when the rest of the Singleterrys arrived. Drury Singleterry was marshal of Texico at one time.

A son of James Moses, Joseph Thomas Singleterry, brought his wife and six children with him to Pleasant Hill. Later three more children were born to the family. They all attended school at the Pleasant Hill school. Four of his children graduated from Pleasant Hill School, and two graduated from Clovis. During the flu epidemic of 1918 Joseph Thomas walked to several homes in the community helping to care for the sick. The epidemic killed thousands of people across the country.

I agree that enough is enough. Americans have been warned to stay out, to get out, of Lebanon. I believe we've paid enough.

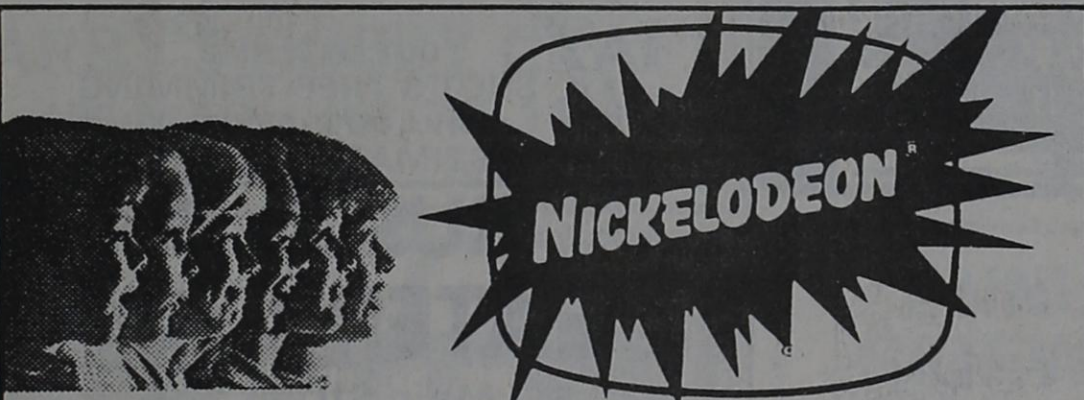

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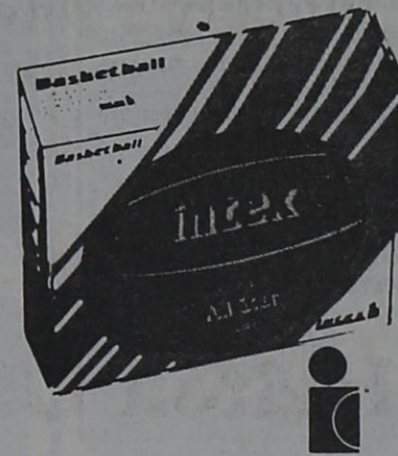

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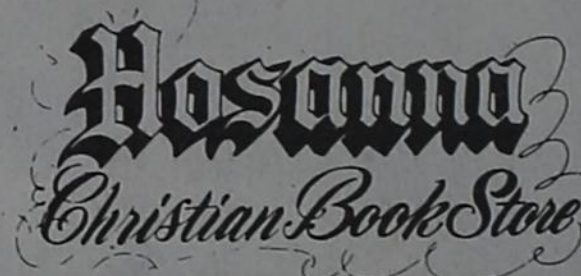

Where VA funds went

Most of the money expended by the Veterans Administration in Texas went directly to veterans during Fiscal Year 1986, according to Waco VA Regional Office Director Stephen L. Lemons.

"Of the \$1,757,553,147 expended in Texas during Fiscal Year 1986, more than 54 percent, or \$951,756,049, went directly to veterans as compensation for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, or as pensions for wartime veterans with limited incomes," Lemons said.

He added that the VA spent \$88,826,144 for readjustment and vocational

rehabilitation benefits, \$88,738,148 for insurance and indemnity payments, \$32,471,840 for facility construction, and \$595,760,966 for medical services and administrative costs in Texas.

Estimated VA expenditures for Parmer County veterans totaled \$369,575.00 This figure includes \$329,073.00 for compensation and pension, \$2,700.00 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation.

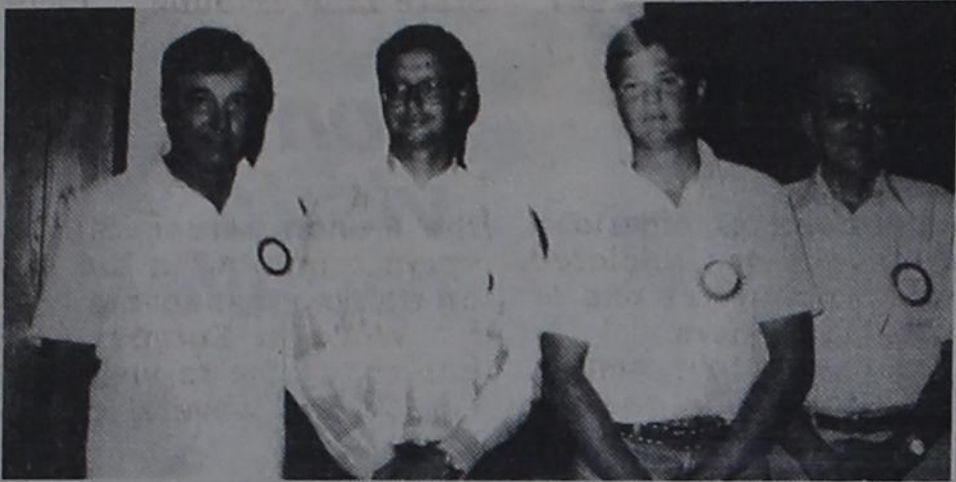
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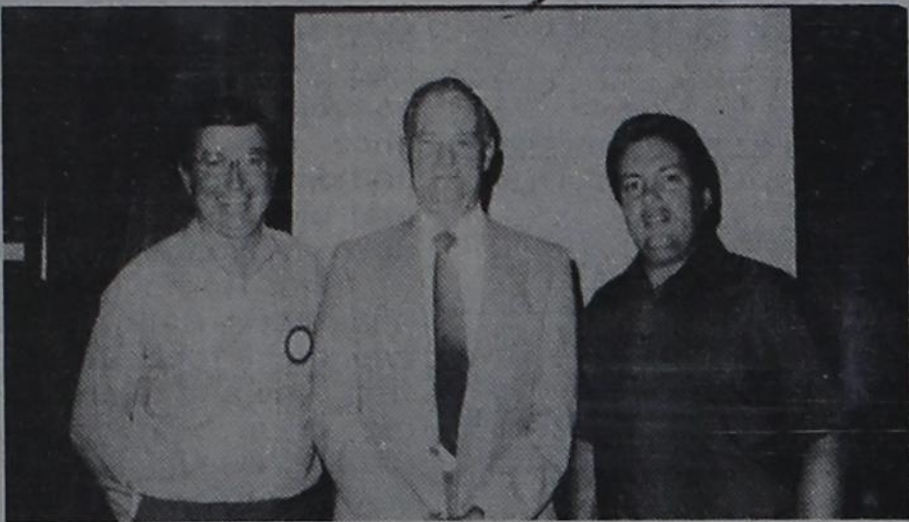

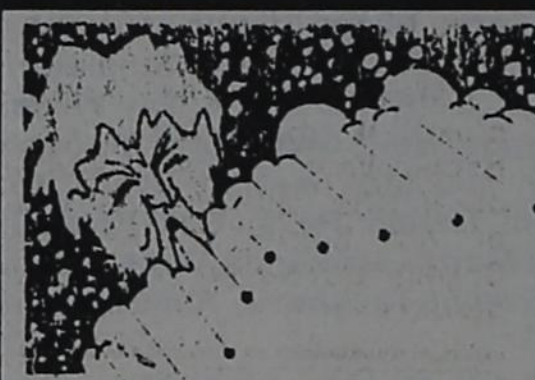

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Cynthia Ancira: military policewoman

Cynthia Ancira didn't plan to be a military policewoman when she graduated from Farwell High School two years ago, but after 1 1/2 years in the Army, she has come to enjoy her work.

Ancira is currently stationed in Giessen, West Germany.

"It is a really active job, and I like to be active," said Ancira. "We have a hectic work schedule, and we work 12 hour shifts. Five days a week we have to have physical training - exercise classes, too."

In her spare time, Ancira is also enrolled in courses through the University of Maryland to help with her criminal law career.

Military police work requires a lot of thinking.

"The paper work is unbelievable. The Army has a form for everything. A simple traffic accident takes 8 forms. There are 15 forms if a death is involved in the accident. If they are not filled out right, they throw it back to you," Ancira said.

Cases which involve military personnel and German nationals require tact and care. German laws are not the same as American laws, and as guests in their nation

Spending vital

In addition to just trying to attract new industries to boost the local economy, community leaders may need to give more emphasis to strengthening existing retail trade and service sectors.

"Strong retail trade and service sectors are vital to the economic development of small Texas communities," points out Dr. Don Stebbins, community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Communities that do not have adequate trade and service sectors face two major problems, according to Stebbins: First, local employment opportunities will be lacking, so some people may be forced to move. Others, especially farmers, who need employment for some family member, may be in additional jeopardy of suffering financial loss.

A second problem in communities lacking adequate trade and service sectors is that the community income multiplier will be unusually small because a large proportion of consumer spending goes to other communities.

"I believe many small Texas towns have income multipliers of 1.5 or less because consumers find it necessary or desirable to travel to some other community to spend a large portion of their income," says Stebbins. "This means that every dollar received from outside is worth only \$1.50 or less to the community after the multiplier effect."

we must abide by their laws.

Driving while intoxicated is a felony in Germany. The polezi - German police - do not have to treat arrested suspects with the same respect that American police do.

"They don't mess with a balloon test or a coordination test - they just take a blood sample to prove intoxication," said Ancira.

Another difference between German and American criminal law is that buses have the right of way in Germany. They pull right out in front of cars.

Speed on the autobahns is another difference. Outside of towns, there is no speed limit. Some Germans drive 120 miles per hour - drivers can go as fast as they like. Americans often have trouble adjusting to the changes in driving conditions.

Under German law, if an accident occurs involving a car and a chicken, the farmer is paid for the the chicken and all the eggs that chicken would have produced. Or, if a driver hits a tree, he has to pay for the value of that tree and the whole surrounding area that might be affected if the tree is removed.

There are even laws which make it mandatory for a homeowner or shopkeeper clean the sidewalk in front of his home or business. Snow must be shoveled away quickly.

One of the cases Ancira was involved in concerned a suicide who was found near military property. The MP's had to keep everyone from touching anything near the scene of the suicide until the polezi arrived.

The most interesting case she worked on involved the

arrest of a sergeant first class who shoplifted cartons of cigarettes from the PX.

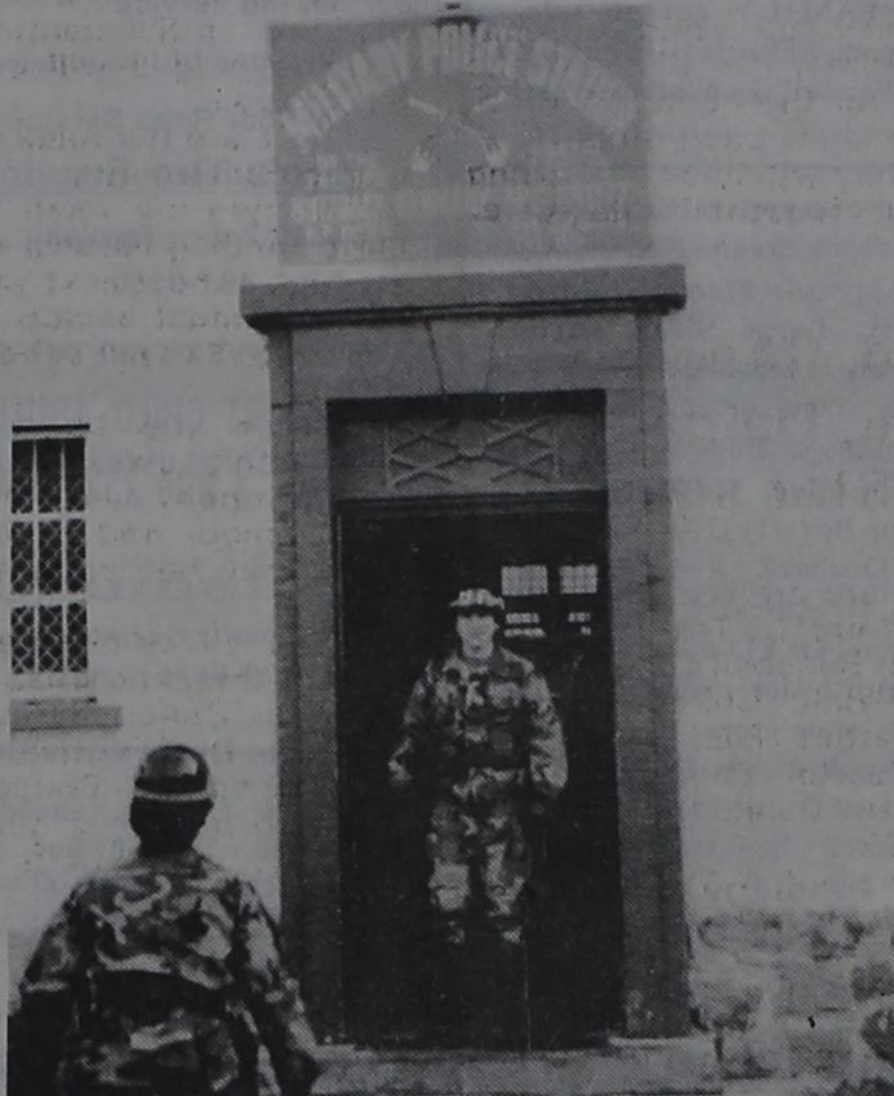
He was apprehended outside the PX with 7 cartons of cigarettes under his coat. It was later established that he had stolen 67 cartons that week. He sold them to German nationals who

pay high prices for American cigarettes. He was addicted to heroin. Ancira was one of the arresting officers.

Ancira spent four months working jointly with the Air Force on an operation near

the French border. She also spent a month "in the field" on training maneuvers.

While in Europe, Ancira has been able to visit Spain, France, and several cities in Germany.
