ican troops into San Antonio's Plaza de las Armas, meeting no resistance. Another is Colonel Vincente Cordova, former alcalde of Nacog-
doches before independence, and doches before independence, and
leader of Cordova's Rebellion there in August, 1838. He is much wanted by the Texians, and has had several narrow escapes.

The action occurs just as Texian
fears of a major enemy invasion fears of a major enemy invasion
have subsided, after the departure have subsided, after the departure
of General Rafael Vasquez, who took San Antonio last March, 5 and held it for two days. Colonel Sequin
left with General Vasquez at that time, fearing to remain because insistent rumors that he had supported the invasion. "I have been
the object of hatred and passionate the object of hatred and passionate,
attacks of some few disorganizers," attacks of some few said, "a foreigner in my native
land."
He hid out in South Texas for several weeks, and on April 18
resigned as mayor, giving as his resigned as mayor, giving as his
reason "the disorderly state in eason the disorderiy state in
which this unhappy country finds
tself at the present time." He itself at the present time." He
finally decided to seek asylum in finally decided to seek asylum in Mexico. He went to Laredo, where
he was imprisoned by the Mexican commander. On orders of General Mariano Arista, commander of the Army of the North, he was transferred to a Monterrey prison while
Arista checked with Mexican PresiArista checked with Mexican Presiregarding his disposal. It was agreed to permit Sepuin to prove his
loyalty to Mexico by fighting loyalty to Mexico by fighting
against the Texians, and he was against the Texians, and he was
sent to join General Woll's invasion force, then preparing to cross the
Rio Grande at Presidio del Rio Rio Grande at Presidio del Rio
Grande, about 75 miles up-river Grande, about 75 miles up-river
from Laredo on the Mexican side.

army was en route. The rumor was discounted as being caused by a party of raiding bandits, not uncommon in the area. Nevertheless the citizens arranged to assemble a the Maverick house in case o
alarm, to make a stand if neces sary. Woll's army surrounded the city
before dawn yesterday morning Defore dawn yesterday morning.
The Mexicans started the attack when they heard the texian rev-
eille, thinking it was their own. eille, thinking it was their own
Heavy fog made fighting all but
impossible. When it cleared the Heavy fog made fighting all but
impossible. When it cleared, the
Texian saw the overwhelming odds Texian saw the overwhelming odds they were facing, and accepted a
truce, explaining that they thought they were fighting a marauding band of thieves. They wished to
surrender as surrender as prisoners of war, but
Woll insisted that they "al discristetion," that they surrender ally. Nevertheless, he has guaranteed them their lives, saying that he
was " was "moved by a spirit of humanity
and in order that they mi and in order that they might recog-
nize Mexican generosity." They are also permitted to retain personal
