Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan. On Sept. 3, Cecil Rundell of Farwell reported that the door glass of his gas station and the window of a pickup parked at the station were shot out on the night of Sept. 2.

On Sept. 5, Billy Marshall of Bovina reported that his barn southeast of Bovina had been entered and that two cutting torches, a regulator and hose and a two-ton chain hoist had been taken.

On Sept. 5, Farwell Public School reported that the cafeteria had been entered and food items had been taken.

On Sept. 5, Lorenzo Claudio reported the theft of hub caps from his vehicle while parked on the Excel parking lot.

On Sept. 5, Robert Boone of Farwell reported the theft of two sets of barbells from his back yard.

On Sept. 7, Jimmie Dale Seaton of Friona reported that the gas line had been cut and the gas turned on. Oil barrels at his irrigation well had also been shot.

On Sept. 8, Mike Martin, manager of Farwell Country Club reported that the Country Club had been

entered and some money taken on the night of Sept. 7.

On Sept. 6, Jesus Silva, 40 of Friona, was arrested by the Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of driving while intoxicated. On Sept. 9, he was arraigned before Justice of Peace Judge Albert Smith and his bond was set at \$1000. His case is pending before the Grand Jury.

On Sept. 8, Luis Guerrero, 18 of Hereford was arrested by the Sheriff's department on a charge of burglary of a building. He was arraigned before Smith on Sept. 9 and his bond was set at \$5,000. His case is pending before the Grand Jury.

--Heard Wheeler ask where he should have the police car serviced. He was told to have it serviced in Texico but to have it washed anywhere.

--Heard resident Ed Autrey offer to mow weeds for the city in case they needed more help. It was suggested to him that he check with property owners who needed mowing done.

--Praised Dee Hammitt, of Farwell, for helping with the water department during the illness of his brother, Billy, who handles Texico's department. It was agreed to pay Dee \$200 as compensation at this time and probably will give him more money later.

The Mexican army approached San Antonio through the hilly country from the northwest, and was not detected by Texian scouts, even though Mayor John W. Smith was warned last Friday, September 9, by Antonio Perez, a leader of the loyal Mexicans, that an invasion army was en route. The rumor was discounted as being caused by a party of raiding bandits, not uncommon in the area. Nevertheless, the citizens arranged to assemble at the Maverick house in case of alarm, to make a stand if necessary.

Woll's army surrounded the city before dawn yesterday morning. The Mexicans started the attack when they heard the Texian reveille, thinking it was their own. Heavy fog made fighting all but impossible. When it cleared, the Texian saw the overwhelming odds they were facing, and accepted a truce, explaining that they thought they were fighting a marauding band of thieves. They wished to surrender as prisoners of war, but Woll insisted that they surrender "at discretion," that is, unconditionally. Nevertheless, he has guaranteed them their lives, saying that he was "moved by a spirit of humanity and in order that they might recognize Mexican generosity." They are also permitted to retain personal belongings.

The Mexicans took 62 prisoners, but are releasing 10, consisting of five Mexicans who have promised future loyalty, two merchants who did not bear arms, two youths, and a man who is too sick and lame to march. Of the remaining 52, many were participants in the court session of the Fourth Judicial District which has been in session in San Antonio. These include Judge Anderson Hutchinson; District Attorney C.W. Peterson and his assistant French S. Gray; lawyers Samuel A. Maverick and William E. Jones, who are both members of Congress; and Judge James W. Robinson, who was Lieutenant Governor of the Provisional Government of the winter of 1835-36. The prisoners are being kept in close guard in the Maverick house.

Anglo-American women and children remaining in the city have not been molested, nor have the native Mexican families, most of whom seem to support General Woll and his troops. Some eight Anglo-Americans made their escape, including Mayor Smith, who has reached the town of Seguin, 37 miles northwest of San Antonio. He has sent an express messenger of Colonel Mathew "Old Paint" Caldwell at Gonzales, urging him to assemble forces at Seguin as soon as possible.

Captain John "Jack" Hays, with a small force of rangers, was reconnoitering outside San Antonio on

Saturday. When he returned before dawn yesterday, he found the city surrounded and fell back. He is now

outside the city observing Woll's movements, and is sending back reports.

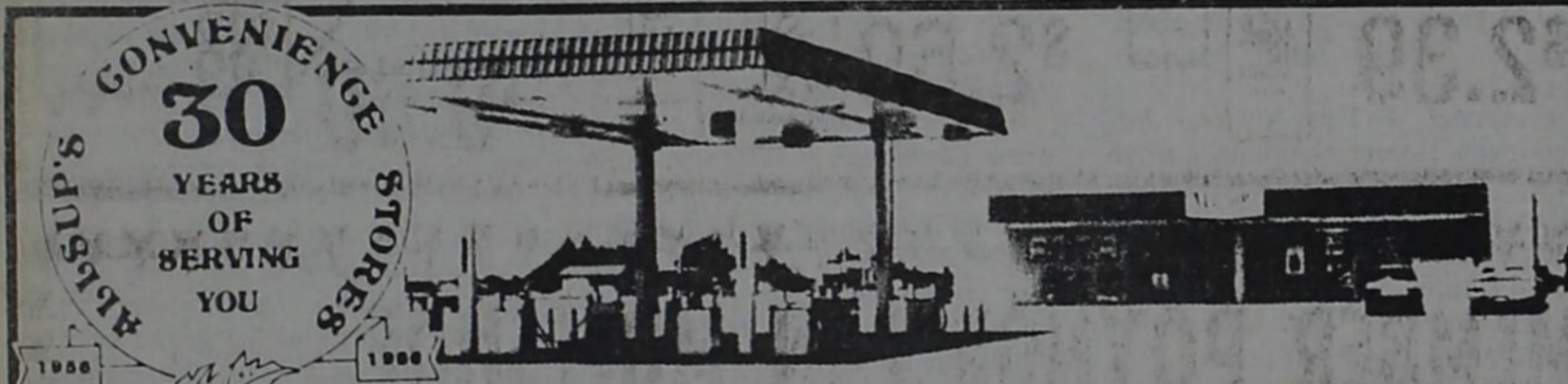

Recipe of Week

PILAF

This delicious dish is appropriate as either a side dish or main course.

- 2 cups long-grain rice
- 1/4 cup uncooked vermicelli, broken into 1 to 2-inch pieces
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 5 cups chicken broth
- cinnamon if desired

Brown the broken vermicelli in margarine until it takes on a golden brown color. Add 2 cups of rice to the browned vermicelli and stir lightly until rice is crisp. Pour in the hot chicken broth; cover and steam over low heat for about 30 minutes.

If desired, sprinkle cinnamon over the top before serving. This gives the pilaf a Middle Eastern flavor.

Yield: 12 1/2-cup servings, about 185 calories each.

Texico is a young team this year, starting five sophomores. The inexperience showed Friday night, as the Wolverines gave up a couple of big plays to Cloudercroft.

Texico's mistakes came at the most crucial moments leading to a 26-0 loss to Cloudercroft. Texico is 0-2 on the season.

Texico looked good through most of the first half. Wet conditions caused both offensive attacks to suffer. At the end of the second quarter, Cloudercroft scored as Ace Wimsalt ran 47 yards on a counter play for a touchdown. The first half ended with Cloudercroft ahead 6-0.

Texico began moving the ball behind the running of Larry Dudley, but couldn't get it across. Texico had the ball inside the Cloudercroft 10 yard line three times, but were held scoreless.

Late in the third quarter, Texico was backed up to their own end zone and was forced to punt. The punt was blocked and recovered by Cloudercroft's Dan Foley in the end zone for a touchdown.

Late in the fourth quarter Cloudercroft scored two more times. With less than two minutes to play, Michael Gaffney of Cloudercroft scored on a 27 yard touchdown.

Less than a minute later, Gaffney picked off a Texico pass and ran 57 yards for the final touchdown.

Coach David Lynn says that they didn't play well at all and they have to play better this week. A lot of the mistakes were made in the middle of the ballgame. "We were inside

Telephone work goes on in Farwell

ENMR Telephone Company should be just about finished with its work in Farwell by the time this paper is published. They have been replacing the wiring that serves Farwell.

In the past, the wiring would get wet when it rained. This sometimes interrupted service. The new wires will be buried in a cable, so they should not be bothered by weather.

The new wiring will eliminate any party lines in Farwell. All service will now be private.

The quality of toll service should also be upgraded.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas had stipulated that rate

changes could not be made until this service was completed. The rates were set at the same rates which were charged at the time ENMR purchased the equipment to serve Farwell in 1980.

There will be some adjustments in the billing in November. Private lines will now be charged \$13 per month. This will be an increase for some households which were previously on party lines. Businesses will now pay a base rate of \$17.50 which will be a reduction for some of them.

ENMR will soon offer operator service from Clovis. Hopefully, this will result in a rate reduction in the

future. Also, Clovis area operators should be more familiar with the area. Currently, evening operator service comes from Tempe, Ariz., which is why the operators are sometimes confused by requests from an 806 area code coming through a 505 area code.

The emergency alarm system that tells ENMR that they are having trouble with one of their lines is located in Provo, Utah.

"When they call us at 3 or 4 in the morning, they really have no idea how far away the area with a problem is from our headquarters," said an ENMR official.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

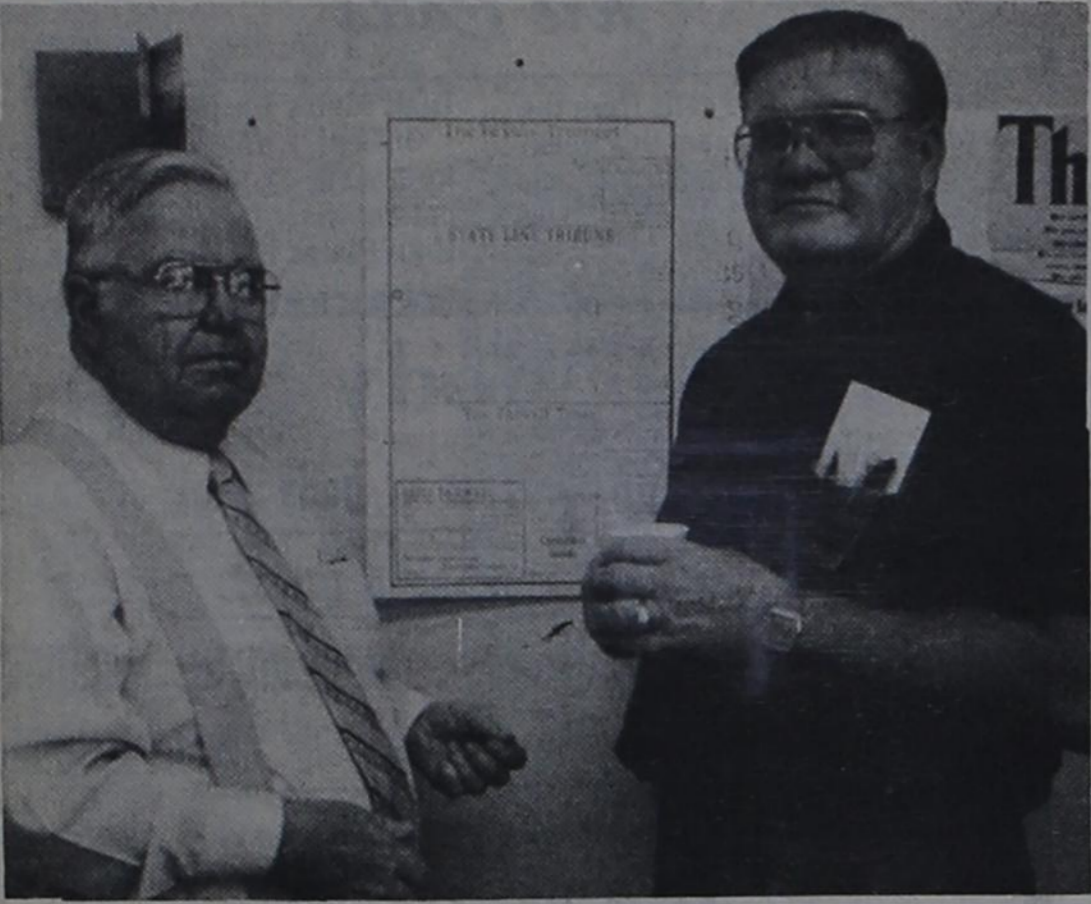

While working on the 75th Anniversary issue, Tribune staff members asked local people: "How have things changed over the years?" We got a variety of answers from members of the community. Here are some below:
Bill Christian - "Computers have revolutionized our business. When I first started here, everything was done manually. We could never keep up with the volume of business we do today if it had to be done manually."
Guy "Sonny" Cohee - "Farwell is a lot cleaner than it was when I moved to this area in 1954. The dust storms were so bad you couldn't see a fence post between here and Clovis."
John Lovelace - "When I was born (in 1919) people in this area used horses and wagons. I feel as if I've gone from the horse and buggy days to the space age. The things we used to read about in the funny papers are realities today."
Prentice Mills - "When I first came to this area I stayed in the Texico Hotel. The waiters wore suits and ties and everything was real fancy. The floors were made of very pretty tile."
Dorothy Lovelace - "Women weren't allowed on juries when I was a girl." Mrs. Lovelace was one of the first women on a jury in Parmer County.
Bob Anderson - "I remember Farwell as a 'Saturday night' town. People would drive their wagons or cars into town to shop and visit. There were still hitching posts and watering troughs here after they had disappeared in some other places."
Abie Crume noticed that the Tribune now has plumbing - "When I was at the Tribune we had an old double outhouse out back."

Coach Rex Cumpton stated that the Steers did a super job.

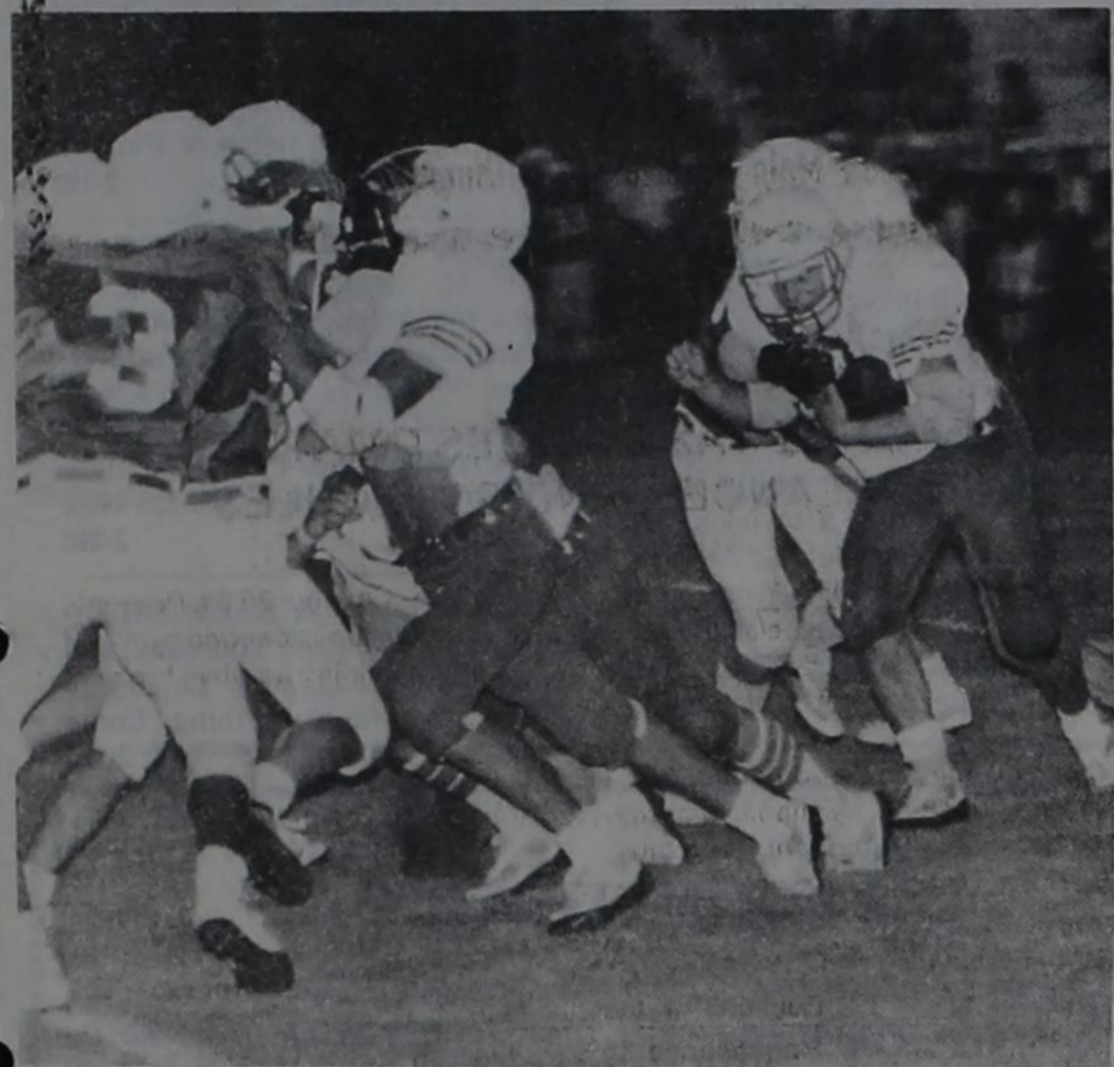
"Our defense totally dominated the game. We physically whipped them on the line of scrimmage,
