Anyway, we've been fortunate with our printing business in that the extra revenue really helped out in a year where the local economy wasn't anything to shout about. We appreciate those local businesses that have used our printing service.

The other new project last year that took more than a few minutes to learn was our new computer. We bought two computers plus a laser printer. This eliminated the need for 4 obsolete machines that we had, plus cut down on one position (vacated by Jenine Foster when hubby Bobby took a job in Dallas).

Learning to use a computer, with all its intricacies, was fascinating. And if anyone was in the office when they heard bad words coming out of my mouth during that process, I apologize.

We bought our system from a Kansas salesman, on the recommendation of the Texas Press Association. It turned out to be a great decision because it was perfectly formatted for small newspapers like the Tribune. We're very happy with it.

So you can see, besides putting out our newspaper (me, wife Judy and Betty Jean Castleberry), it was a busy year learning new stuff.

Filing time nears for Texico posts

There are three offices up for election in Texico. There are two city council posts, and the municipal judge's position.

Councilman Bryan Kube has indicated that he would seek re-election. Councilman Steve Chancey indicated that he would not. Judge Howard Billingsley indicated that he would also seek re-election. The filing date for candidates who seek election in New Mexico is Jan. 5.

All candidates seeking election file on that one day. They must appear at the Texico City Hall on Jan. 5 to fill out a form to verify that they are

registered voters, and that they live within the city limits of Texico.

There is no filing fee for Texico municipal offices. Candidates for the municipal election do not need to declare political party affiliation.

City Clerk Marie Christian will have to check the registration and residency of each candidate, and send them a letter of acceptance or denial.

Candidates then draw for position on the ballots. Voting will take place at the Texico community building on March 1.

We would also like to invite any family members who would like to join to come. We encourage all to participate so we can make our center a home instead of a place we must stay.


