

New hospitals must have complete sprinkler systems and other costly capital improvements; existing hospi-tals can be licensed under less stringent regulations.

Studies were done with the assistance of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock which showed that Muleshoe could probably support a hospital if

it was managed properly.

The Board of Directors sought out donations from the community to get West Plains Medical Center into shape for its re-licensing. The Board accepted donations of time and money. Strong community support was shown last weekend by the people who showed up to volunteer their time and energy for repairs and cleanup of the hospital.

"Over 120 years ago, in the 1860's, an instrument called the spectroscope was invented which enables us to tell what temperature and chemical composition a star has," answered Rollinson.

"How can we tell the same things about a planet?" asked another student.

"The spectroscope can be used to measure reflected light on the surface of a planet just as it can measure the light of a star. Every substance gives off a different color," he replied.

"What is your theory of the formation of the universe?" Rollison answered: The most widely held theory among astrophysicists is that a big gas cloud collapsed. This early solar nebula imploded in on itself with great force, and then started scattering debris outward to form the universe.

I have doubts about it. For instance, how do you get rid of the magnetic field? How could the angle of momentum work? How does the mathematics of their theory of the formation of the universe agree with the what we observe happening today in many parts of the universe? This is a problem we still need to work on.

"How long does it take for light from other galaxies to get to earth?" asked a student.

Light travels at about 186,000 miles per second. It takes 1,600,000 years for the light to get here from the closest galaxy, and about 18 billion years for it to arrive from the farthest one we can observe.

'Vote no on Prop. 1'

Dear Editor:

The upcoming election on Nov. 3 presents a large number of propositions that are very important to the people of Texas.

Proposition No. 1 is a very important proposition for the taxpayers and children of this state. It will determine if the State Board of Education will remain a board appointed by the Governor or elected by the people it represents. Be-fore H.B. 72, the State Board of Education was elected. H.B. 72 changed it to a TEM-PORARY appointed board. In January of 1989, the state board, by law, must revert BACK to an elected board.

If Proposition No. 1 passes, the State Board of Education will become a permanent appointed body. The sitting governor will select who determines the Educational policies for the <u>entire state</u>. Once appointed to a fouryear term, the member is not accountable to anyone, much like our federal judges. On Oct. 13, 1987, the Far-

well Board of Trustees voted

to support the return to an elected body. It is the feeling of the Board that all representatives that determine policy should be accountable to the people of the state. They should be elected.

We ask nothing but that you vote your personal con-victions. But I feel that it is our democratic right to determine who should make public policy and that policy makers should be accountable to the people they represent. We should not allow any further intrusion into our form of representative government. If you feel that we should

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

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

SPS files for rate structure changes

Southwestern Public Service Co. has filed for two rate changes.

SPS officials said that due to savings resulting from federal tax reform, they plan to file with the New Mexico Public Service Commission to decrease electric rates for New Mexico customers by \$2.65 million, of 2.1%.

If approved, the lower rates would be effective by December.

On Sept. 1, SPS had its federal income tax rate dropped from 44% to 34%. The net effect is a smaller tax burden; taxes are included in the cost of providing electric service.

The four rural electric cooperatives served by SPS in New Mexico are expected to receive a \$3.3 million, or 7%, rate deduction. Also, SPS is proposing a credit to its New Mexico cooperatives of \$1.7 million, resulting in part from pending Federal Energy Regulatory Commission rate cases. SPS is discussing the proposed wholesale rates with its wholesale customers prior to filing a rate request with FERC.

Also due to the federal tax inform, SPS will file for an annual rate decrease of about \$13 million, or 2.8%, for its Texas customers. If approved, the lower rates and a one-time credit to its Texas retail customers of \$11 million in fuel-cost savings and interest, would be effective in December.

In Texas, cities have jurisdiction over base rates within their city limits.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas sets base rates in rural areas and regulates the fuel-cost portion of electric rates.


SPS officials said the fuel-cost savings resulted from several factors, including lower rates for coal and natural gas; the relatively mild summer weather, and improved efficiency of SPS plants.

SPS recently was cited as seventh best among the 100 largest investor-owned electric utilities in the United States in terms of generating efficiency.

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
