Claims One Life --

Tornado Rips Area

A series of savage tornadoes moved across the Panhandle of Texas Friday evening leaving a path of death and destruction in its wake. Most serious damage in Parmer County was in the Lazbuddie area where the storm moved in a southwest to northeast direction. At the Alton Morris farm the storm ripped buildings from their moorings, twisted machinery and killed livestock before mov-

ing in a 15-mile line across the county.

Mrs. Alton Morris, sister of Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter, was pronounced dead on arrival at West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe from apparent heart failure, following the storm. Her husband and a daughter, Jeannie, were treated for minor injuries. Morris' mother, who lived in a small

house behind the Alton Morris home, was also treated for injuries at the hospital.

The tornado also hit the Wayne Clark home, slightly injuring members of that family and hit another house in the vicinity before lifting back into the clouds.

The storm also hit several other places in the Panhandle, including Whitharral, Whiteface, Plainview, Green Belt Lake at Clarendon, Silvertown, Kress, Cotton Center and Hale Center, leaving an estimated five million dollars of property damage and 26 persons dead.

PURELY PERSONAL

Friday evening was another vivid reminder of the destructive fury of old Mother Nature. But again nature's catastrophes show the innate kindness and helpfulness of the people of the High Plains. Saturday morning after the reports of the tornadic devastation was widespread, Mrs. Jim Hughes called us to discuss storm shelters for the residents of the Twin Cities. Mrs. Hughes reported that they have a large basement and in the past had sheltered over 20 people during a weather alert. She is willing to share the Hughes' facilities and wondered how many other places in town had room for people during bad storms.

We will inquire about the use of public buildings for storm shelters and if anyone wishes to share their safety with others, we will be glad to mention their name and location next week. A tornado hide hole is like an insurance policy -- when you really need it, it is already too late to run out and buy one. Forewarned is forewarned.

We see that the Farwell track team captured last place in the District track meet. The Blue and White scored only one first place as Gene Sheets took the mile run honors. That a school should take the District Championships in football and basketball and last in track is at first glance an anomaly. On deeper thought it isn't so strange a situation. Track, generally speaking, is a competition among individuals and the fastest boy, or the strongest boy, or the boys with singular physical virtues win the points. Football and basketball on the other hand are team sports. In team sports, heart, desire, cooperation and team effort, plus first rate coaching, play a much greater part in gaining victory. Farwell had the attributes of a team, team cooperation, top notch coaching to a superlative degree and therefore were able to sweep both "team" sports without a district loss. A most phenomenal feat in view of the lack of great individual athletes. Again, guts, blood, sharing and brains proved superior to the vain glories of the solo performer. Ole!

On Wednesday of this week Communists all over the world celebrated the 100th anniversary of Vladimir Ilyich Ulyanov, otherwise known to the world as Nikolai Lenin. Lenin's central claim to fame is as the father of the Bolshevik Party that took over the Russian government after the collapse of the Tsarist regime in World War I. As the political father of the present Red Rulers of Russia he should be anathema to persons living under the free principles of Democracy. Yet, we find a portion of our hard earned tax dollars going to support a worldwide celebration in his honor.

How did this travesty of justice come about? It came about by our membership in that great worldwide organ of human betterment sometimes called "Sodom on the Hudson" but otherwise known as the United Nations. Uncle Sucker has for years picked up the lion's share of the tab for running this "neutral toward communism" organization and a well publicized arm of the UN has been suckered into donating the tidy sum of \$5,000,000 toward a Lenin symposium recently held in Tampere, Finland. The donating arm is the dogooder UNESCO.

You remember UNESCO--on Halloween they have hordes of moppets going around begging alms in behalf of the world's hungry children. They were reminded that UNESCO donated toward a celebration of Mahatma Gandhi and it would only be fitting if they took 5,000 skins earmarked for hungry children and celebrated the birthday of history's greatest butcher of mankind. In the six years of Lenin's personal reign of power, over 12,000,000 people perished in Russia and the surrounding states. This does not take into account the multiplied millions that have died as a result of his political philosophies, including U. S. boys dying in Vietnam today.

That the United Nations through UNESCO should allocate this sum for this purpose compels us to make one remark -- equine ordure!

Absentee Voting In Progress

Absentee voting began in Parmer County last Monday, April 13. Those wishing to vote an absentee ballot on either the Republican or Democratic tickets may do so by visiting the office of County Clerk Bonnie Warren any time until four days prior to the primary elections which are slated for May 2. In the Farwell precinct no races are contested; however, at Lazbuddie, Raymond Treider, Jr., seeking re-election as commissioner of Precinct 4 is opposed by J. D. Carpenter, Jr. On the county level Archie Tarter, incumbent county judge, is opposed for re-election by W. L. "Preach" Edelman. Judge J. Roy Thornton is running unopposed for Justice of Peace-precinct 1, Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer, Bonnie Warren, county clerk, and Dorothy Quickel, district clerk, are all running unopposed on the Democratic ticket for re-election.

Set New Record --

Farwell Girls Fourth In District Track Meet

The Farwell girls track and field team came away from the district meet Thursday with a total of 75 points and fourth place, following behind Happy, Bovina and Amherst. In addition, a Farwell girl set a new district record and ten girls qualified to compete in events at the regional track and field meet in Panhandle on May 1.

Debra Foster set a new district record in the discus throw by hurling the discus 108 feet 10 inches. The old record had been set in 1968 by Riley of Bovina. The old record was 96 feet 8 inches. In addition to the first place record in the discus throw, Miss Foster hurled the shot 31.3 1/2 for a second place and tied for third in the high jump with a leap of 4-6. She will compete in all three events at Regional.

Other girls qualifying for the regional meet are Cindy Phillips, broad jump - 15 feet, for a third place; 100 yard dash-time 12.4, second place; mile relay team second 4:4.25. Team members are Barbara Goettsch, Sandra Ensor, Jenlene Taylor and Arnetta Bryant. Kristy Taylor, 80 meter hurdles-third with a time of 14.4.

Arnetta Bryant-second in the 440 dash, time, 1:06.6.

Other events in which the team placed were the 440 relay team, fourth with a time of 5:3.5. Team members are Connie Jones, Terri Edwards, Kristy Taylor, Cindy Phillips, Cindy Phillips, 6th in the 60 yard dash; the 880 relay team, 5th. Team members are Jenlene Taylor, LaShawn Sheets, Barbara Goettsch, and Connie Jones; LaShawn Sheets placed fourth in the 880 dash and Cheryl Boling was sixth in the same event.

Schools participating in the regional meet include Hart, Hale Center, Happy, Kress, Farwell, Bovina, Vega, Clarendon, Claude and Panhandle.

Commenting on the showing of the girls in the district meet Miss Gayle Nicholas, coach, said, "I am quite proud of them as they have had little chance to practice this year due to the weather conditions and had participated in no meets before the district one." She also stated that this is the first year in some time that the Farwell School has fielded a track and field team for girls. Miss Judy Taylor is assisting with coaching duties for the team.

Election for three directors will be held and over \$140,000.00 in Capital Credits for 1968 will be distributed to members of the cooperative.

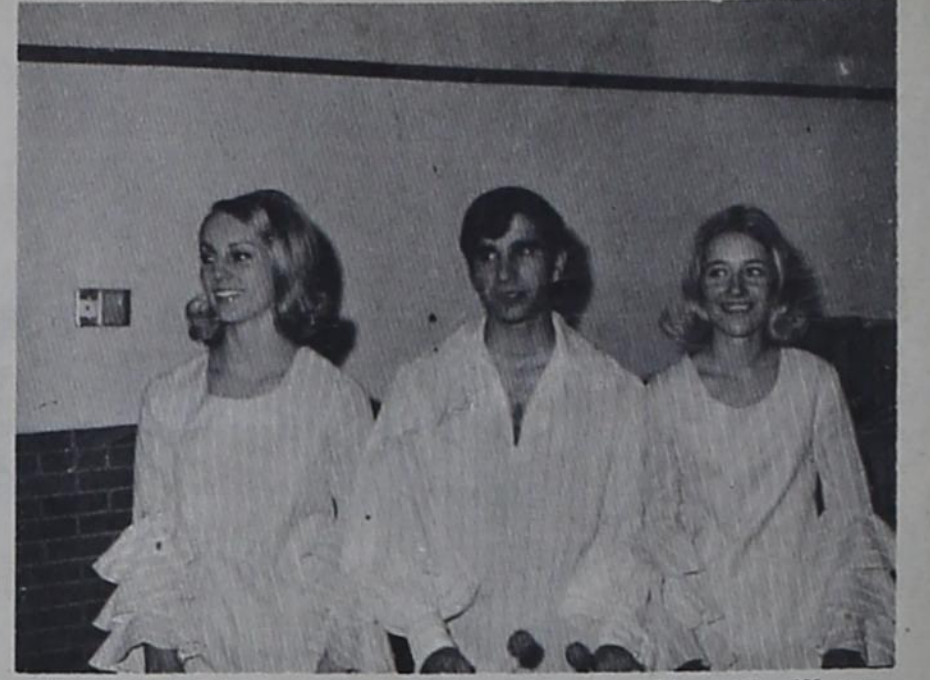

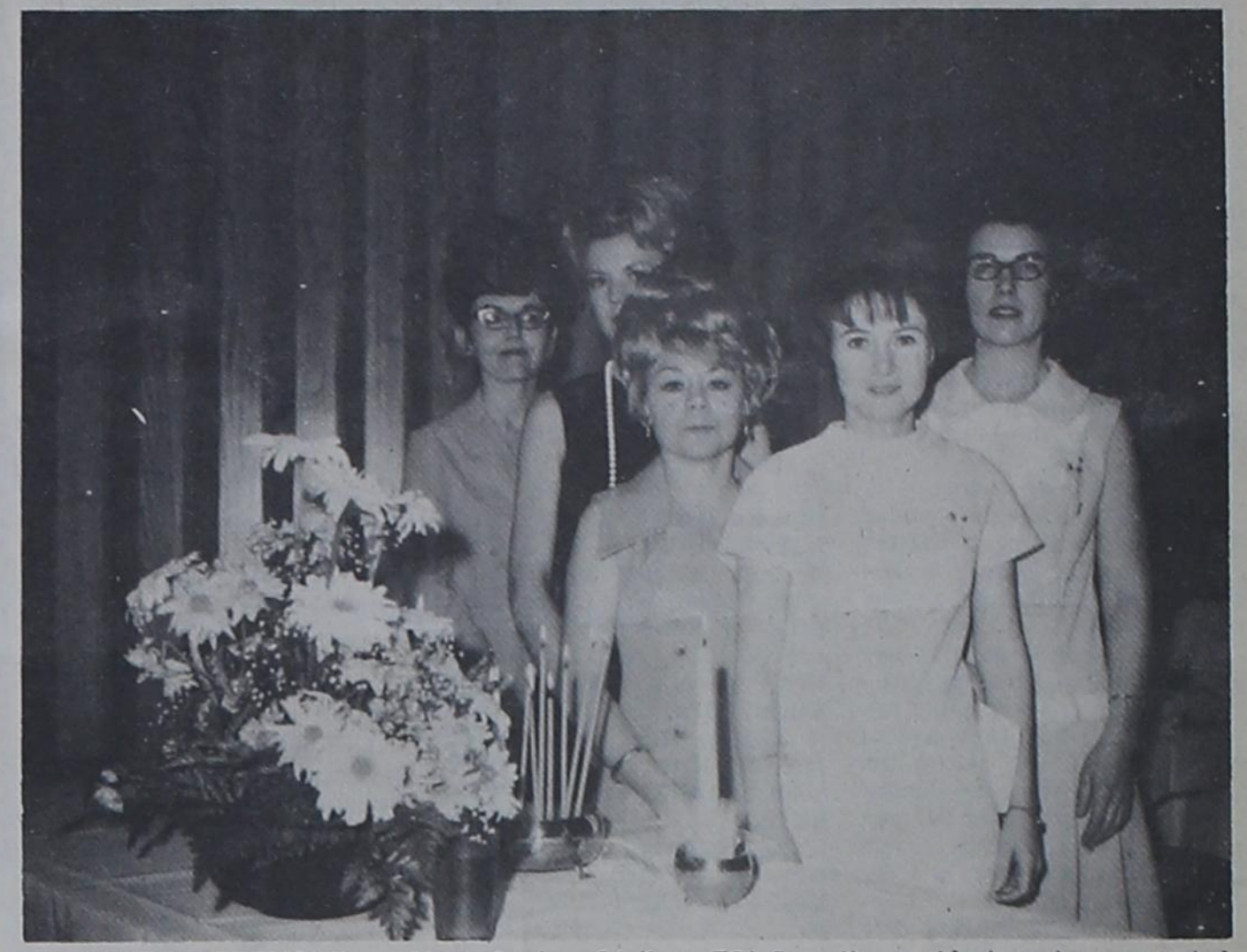
