up. "Just about everybody voted on everything; they didn't skip around and pick just a few issues to vote on," said Mrs. Warren.
The issue that drew the most interest in the election - the referendum to legalize pari-mutuel betting - failed in Parmer County, but passed for the state as a whole. Many people polls.
