## Anderson assigned to Persian Gulf

After I left Farwell on Sept. 13, I proceeded with my wife Julia to Norfolk, Va., for a series of briefings by Commander, Naval Surface Forces Atlantic (COMNAVSURFLANT).

The next week I reported in Naples, Italy, to Commander, Naval Service Force, 6th Fleet (COMNAVSEVFOR6THFLT) for several days of orientation on operations in the Arabian Gulf. Sadly, that was as far as Julia could go with me, and when she flew back to the states on Sept. 26, I flew the other direction to Bahrain.

Bahrain is a small island off the coast of Saudi Arabia,

### Kellie doing great; coming home looms closer

"Kellie is doing great. Her doctors hope that they have found the right formula on her medications. We have our hopes up that she will be coming home soon," says Kellie's mother, Mrs. Marvin Anderson.

The Andersons are cautious about getting their hopes up because Kellie has had setbacks in recent weeks.

Kellie has been in St. Joseph's Hospital in Phoenix since July 26 when she was taken to the hospital in a coma caused by viral encephalitis. After several weeks in a coma, Kellie began the long, slow process of regaining weight and strength. She has had some problems with the medications she has had to take to control the virus.

"Kellie is up to 91 pounds now," says her mother. Kellie's normal weight is about 104.

Kellie is also working to get her muscles back to normal. "Falling down is now a thing

of the past," adds her mother.

Kellie was sad about spending Halloween in the hospital, but the staff members did what they could to cheer her up. A recreation therapist named Pam brought a VCR and a scary movie and some popcorn and candy for Kellie. Later, candy and balloons arrived. Kellie makes friends everywhere she goes.

Kellie wanted to let everyone know how much she has appreciated the letters, cards, flowers, and visits. Among those who have visited are Johnnie and Diane and Lacy Actkinson, Robbi Fly, John Grigsby, Jason Schilling, Jerry Stover, and Larry Gulley, as well as Kellie's family members.

The Andersons are not sure what kind of outpatient therapy Kellie will need when she gets home. In addition to physical therapy, Kellie will have work on her studies. The Andersons were assured by Farwell School Supt. Grigsby, that a homebound instructor would be available if needed.

### Crackdown nears for animals running loose

The Texas Legislature has passed a vicious dog law that went into effect Aug. 31 - and Farwell will be enforcing it, said Municipal Judge Ysleta Kittrell.

The law makes it an offense for a person to own or keep a dog which he knows has engaged in vicious conduct when the person fails to restrain the dog at all times by a leash or pen.

The law further requires a vicious dog owner to main-

tain liability insurance to cover bodily injury the dog might cause.

The penalty for violating the vicious dog law is a fine up to \$1,000 and-or a jail term not to exceed 180 days.

Mrs. Kittrell said a crackdown is coming on dogs and cats running loose. She said that animals which are picked up for the second time will be turned over to the Humane Society for putting to sleep.

### Variance requests heard

The Farwell City Council Tuesday heard variance requests for placing two mobile homes in the city.

The council voted 5-0 to allow Kerry and Ronda Ford to place a 28x80 mobile home on the loop at Ave. E. There were no objections from adjacent property owners.

The council voted 4-1 (Liz Phillips) to deny a variance for Joe and Kara Castillo to place a 14x72 mobile home in the 500 block of Seventh Street. Two property owners objected to the variance, basically indicating the mobile home would not appreciate the value of their properties.

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North of Qatar. The British used it as a base for a number of years, but it is an independent state now. The U.S. leases the former British base at Manama, on the north end of Bahrain, for use as the administrative support unit (ASU) for ships assigned to my staff, Commander, Middle East Force (COMIDEASTFOR).

This staff is part of the U. S. Central Command, (CENTCOM) Commanded by Marine General George B. Crist. General Crist's report to the House of Representatives' Armed Services Committee this year briefly defined the situation in this part of the world.

The Arabian Gulf is an immensely important region of the world, particularly to western countries who rely on imported oil to sustain their economy. Approximately 55 percent of the world's proven oil reserves are in this gulf (compared to approximately 17 percent in the whole western hemisphere and 12 percent in the communist bloc).

Currently, the USA imports only about 7 percent of its oil requirements from this area, but our allies are much more dependent (Western Europe 30 percent, Japan 65 percent). The instability in this area has the potential to send severe shock waves throughout the economy of the western alliance.

Coupled with this problem are the historic efforts of the Russians to expand their sphere of influence into this region of the world beginning as early as Peter The Great in 1689, the Russians have pushed to control this area so vital to commerce, strategic positions, and mineral wealth.

Thus, after World War II, the Central Treaty Organization (CENTO) was formed in an attempt to provide stability and to check Soviet thrusts toward Southwest Asia. During President Jimmy Carter's administration in 1979, CENTO was allowed to slip into dissolution.

General Crist says, "It is more than simple coincidence that the dissolution of CENTO, the demise of U.S. influence in Iran and the resulting hostage crisis, and the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan all occurred in the same year." CENTCOM is the U.S. command charged specifically with this area of responsibility now.

General Crist's command consists of elements of all the armed services and the commanding officer of COMIDEASTFOR (navy) in the Gulf is Rear Admiral Harold J. Bernsen. It serves a variety of missions, which includes demonstrating national resolve to freedom of the seas in this vital area. The flagship, USS LaSalle, is over 500 feet long, more than 13,000 tons displacement, and carries almost 500 men. From there the admiral controls the movements and employment of all the very many naval forces in the gulf.

It seems ironic that I should be assigned to COMIDEASTFOR. When I joined the navy, I thought I was free from Farwell's sand storms forever, but this is one of the few places in the world where sand storms at sea occur. I will be on-board for at least a year, and when we get the chance to pull a port call in one of the countries that will accept us as guests, I will write a few words and send a few pictures.

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# Heavy Parmer election turnout

More than twice the expected number of voters showed up at the polls in Parmer County Tuesday.

"Normally, only about 15% of the registered voters turn out in an election that features amendments," said County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

37% of Parmer County's 3895 registered voters came out and voted. 32.3% of Farwell's 829 registered voters showed up.

"Just about everybody voted on everything; they didn't skip around and pick just a few issues to vote on," said Mrs. Warren.

The issue that drew the most interest in the election - the referendum to legalize pari-mutuel betting - failed in Parmer County, but passed for the state as a whole. Many people consider this to be the issue that brought most people to the polls.

The city of Farwell voted the same way that the county as a whole did on all issues except amendment 18.

On amendment 1, concerning insurance for grain housed in grain warehouses, 173 favored it and 76 voted against it in Farwell; 995 favored it and 371 voted against it in Parmer County.

On amendment 2, which allows a raise in the allowable tax rate for certain rural fire districts with the residents' permission, 111 Farwell residents voted for it, 131 voted against. In Parmer County as a whole, 554 voted for the amendment, 766 voted against it.

On amendment 3, which would limit school tax on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person, 207 Farwell residences voted for it, 48 voted against. In Parmer County as a whole, 1117 voted for it, and 273 voted against.

On amendment 4, the proposed assistance to encourage economic development in the state, 132 Farwell voters voted against, and 99 voted for; in Parmer County 760 voted against, and 538 voted in favor.

On amendment 5, which proposed guaranteed bonds for turnpikes and toll roads, 143 Farwell residents voted against, and 83 in favor; 865 voted against in the county, and 376 voted in favor.

On amendment 6, which proposed state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses, 131 Farwell voters voted against it, and 106 voted for it. In Parmer County, 791 voted against it, 519 voted for it.

On amendment 7, the amendment providing for the issuance of bonds to finance certain public facilities, 161 voted against, and 70 voted for it in Farwell. In Parmer County, 936 voted against it, 345 voted for it.

On amendment 8, the amendment providing for the issuance of bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions, mental health and mental retardation facilities, 134 voted against it in Farwell; 103 voted for it. In Parmer County, the issue passed, 697-609.

On amendment 9, the amendment to allow members of the legislature to be elected or appointed to a different state office during his legislative term at no increase in pay, voters in Farwell voted against 125-117. It also failed in Parmer County, 714-602.

On amendment 10, the amendment to remove certain personal property from ad valorem taxation, 121 Farwell residents voted no, 108 voted yes. In Parmer County, 684 voted no, 606 voted yes.

On amendment 11, the amendment to remove certain items from ad valorem taxation or a temporary period, 125 Farwell residents voted against, 99 voted in favor. In Parmer County 721 voted against, and 541 voted in favor.

On amendment 12, the amendment permitting spouses to

hold community property with the right of survivorship, 206 Farwell residents were for, and 37 against. In the county, 1131 were for it, 215 were against.

On amendment 13, to create emergency service districts, 147 Farwell residents favored, 86 opposed. 717 Parmer voters favored, and 569 were against.

On amendment 14, the amendment giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases, 154 Farwell residents were for it, and 77 opposed. 792 were for it in Parmer County, 487 were opposed.

On amendment 15, which would abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette and Nueces counties, 124 Farwell residents favored it, and 67 opposed. In Parmer County, 616 voted for, and 438 were against.

On amendment 16, the constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace, 150 Farwell residents voted for it, 81 against. In the county, 746 voted for it, 523 voted against.

On amendment 17, which defines the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality, 81 Farwell residents favored, and 136 opposed. In Parmer County, 755 opposed, and 471 were for it.

On amendment 18, concerning the creation, operation and financing of jail districts, 120 Farwell residents voted in favor, and 97 opposed. In Parmer County, 542 voted for it, and 694 voted against. This is the only issue upon which Farwell and Parmer County differed.

On amendment 19, which authorizes bonds to fund the super collider, 167 Farwell residents favored it, and 84 opposed. County residents favored it 963-397.

On amendment 20, to authorize the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for offshore drilling equipment not in use, 84 favored it, and 142 opposed it in Farwell. It failed 833-430 in Parmer County.

On amendment 21, allowing the speaker of the house or his appointee membership on executive agencies and committees, 156 opposed it in Farwell, and 66 favored it. It also failed in the county, 884-348.

On amendment 22, which limited the governor's power of appointment for lame duck governors, 144 were in favor, and 93 opposed in Farwell. It passed in the county 795-508.

On amendment 23, which would authorize water development bonds, 155 Farwell residents were for it and 84 opposed. In the county, 749 were for it, and 554 were opposed.

## Depot group seeks donations

The Bordertown Heritage Foundation met at Luce's Spur Restaurant on Nov. 2 to discuss its plans to save the old Santa Fe Railroad Station. They are a seeking stories

from residents about the history of the station, and they are seeking donations. Anyone interested in donating to the project should contact Ann Cooper or David Kube.

On amendment 24, which would allow a county to perform work without compensation for another governmental agency, Farwell residents voted no 132-100. Parmer County residents as a whole voted against it 760-516.

On amendment 25, which would authorize Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain Randall County residents, 146 Farwell residents voted in favor, 61 opposed. In the county, 794 voted for, and 349 opposed.

The two referendum propositions failed in Parmer County. The first would allow appointed school boards; Farwell voted it down 186-72. Parmer County voted it down 1157-243.

The second referendum, legalizing pari-mutuel betting was defeated in Farwell 174-93, and in Parmer County 952-465, even though it passed in the state of Texas.

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Lynn Cox of Dimmitt, Texas, machine harvested and ginned the first bale of cotton in Parmer County. The bale was gathered from 4,100 pounds of lint cotton on 3.23 acres for a yield of 1,263 pounds per acre.

The variety of cotton was **ALL TEX QUICKIE**. All-Tex Quickie is the newest release from All-Tex Seed and joins All-Tex E-2 and All-Tex WM 571.

Claude Gregory of North Lazbuddie Gln announced the 490 pound bale was ginned from 2,350 pounds of seed cotton on Thursday, Oct. 29, 1987.

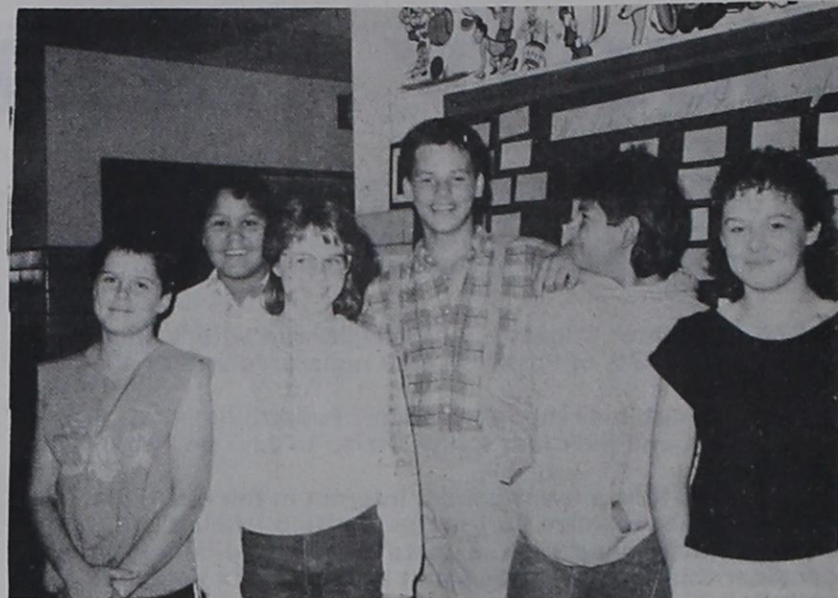

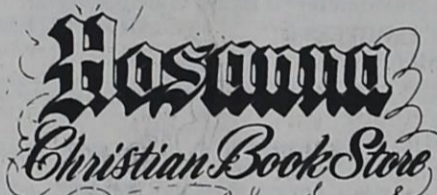
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## Why \$\$ needed

## Bargers visit

Virgil Barger and his wife, Beverly, stopped by the State Line Tribune office on Oct. 23 to find out some information about his roots. The Tribune files held a story that was written in 1976 about the Bargers.

Mr. Barger's grandparents were early settlers of the Oklahoma Lane Community. One grandparent arrived in Parmer County in 1909, another in 1910, and another in 1913. They bought their land sight unseen from land speculators. One of Mr. Barger's ancestors lived in West Camp. They had one of the first wells in the area; it was dug by hand in 1910.

The names Barger, Burns and Kloepper appear in Mr. Barger's family tree.

Virgil Barger was born in Texico; Dr. V. Scott Johnson delivered him. Barger lived in the Oklahoma Lane Community until 1938. He was five years old when his family moved to Albuquerque where his father opened a tire recapping business - "OK Recapping."

Today the Bargers live in Bosque Farms, south of Albuquerque. He works for the Gas Company of New Mexico.

The Bargers have been tracing their ancestors while they were on vacation. They spent quite a bit of time in Illinois finding information on Mrs. Barger's ancestors.

The Bargers have traced the Barger line back to the James River area of Virginia in the 1700's. "We have gone through cemeteries in Texas, Nebraska, Missouri, and Illinois looking for our ancestors," said Mr. Barger. "We plan to visit the Oklahoma Lane Cemetery tomorrow."

## Road work completed

Work to rebuild a 2.14 mile section of Texas 86 from southwest of Bovina to the Castro County line was completed last week, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The highway was widened from 22 feet to 40 feet during the construction which cost \$4.7 million.

It was the first major reconstruction of the highway since it was built in 1947.

"The project improved safety for motorists in Parmer,

and revitalized a highway that was deteriorated with age," said Mel Pope, highway district engineer in Lubbock.

Construction was a direct result of improved highway funding, said Pope.

"Projects like this cost money. Until the last couple of years, we didn't have the funds to make these types of improvements, no matter how great the need," said Pope.

Laney, from Hale Center, is in his 8th term.

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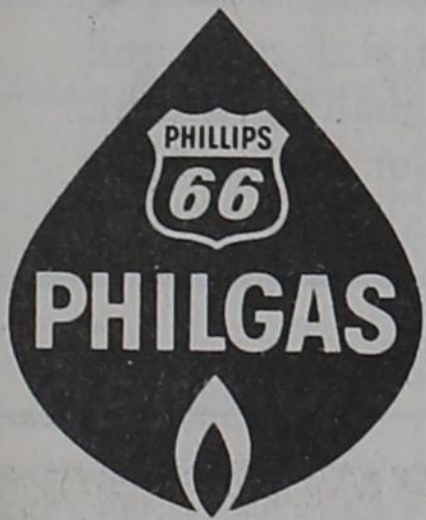
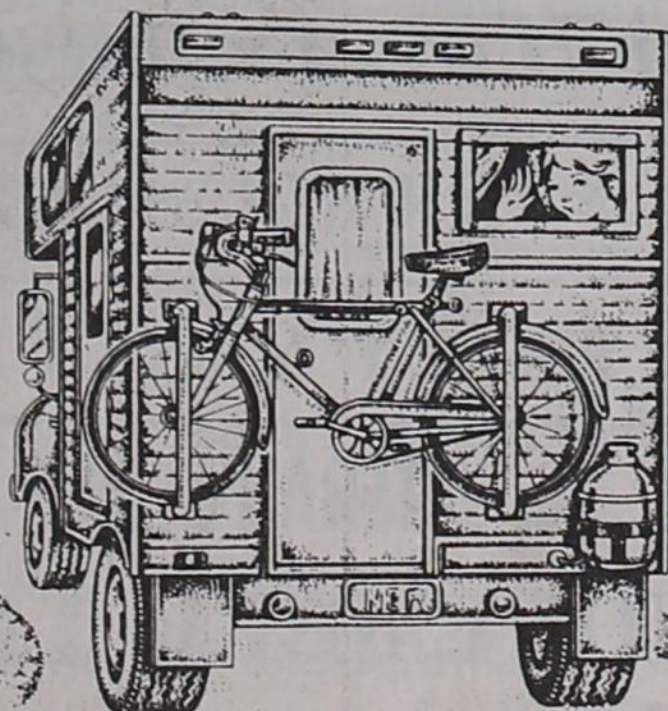

### Amber Bruce 3rd overall

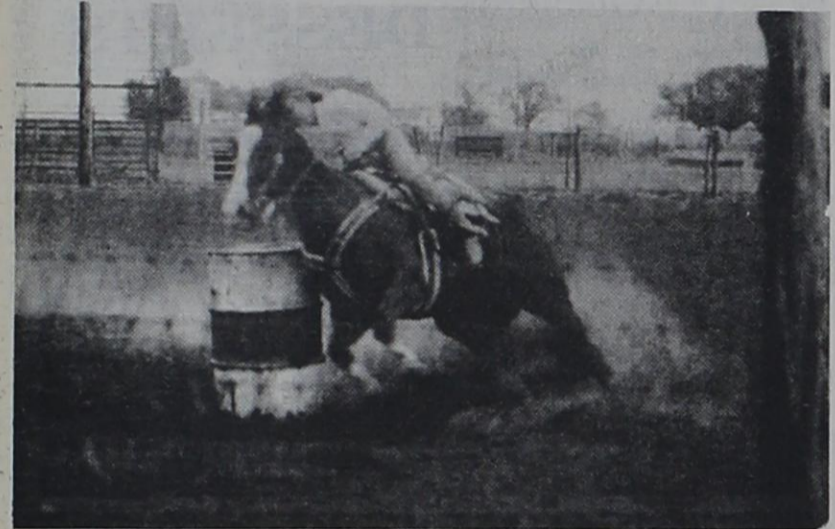
Robin Pettigrew of Clovis came in first in the Saddle Series Barrel Races held in Farwell this summer.

"I always liked trading farms and upgrading them. I always felt good when I could take an old run down place and fix it up by cutting the weeds and painting it" said Sudderth.

Today Sudderth Realty consists of J. B. and Peggy, both of whom hold brokers licenses; salesman Jimmie Mace; broker and appraiser, Daren Sudderth; and computer specialist, Ja'Dan Sudderth. J.B. Sudderth, Daren Sudderth, and Jimmie Mace are also qualified auctioneers.

Things have changed dramatically in the business of selling and financing homes recently, so the Sudderths have gone to schools and seminars to keep on top of

the changes. "We go to school all the time. We try to keep up with all the new laws and regulations and changes. We are licensed in both Texas and New Mexico as both realtors and brokers. One of the most enjoyable experiences Sudderth recently had was the opportunity to teach a group of Farwell students about purchasing a home. The students were given computer printouts of the costs involved in buying a home using various types of mortgages and

various lengths of mortgages. The students were amazed by the thousands of dollars difference there was between the types of mortgages.

"It really made me feel good to teach that group of youngsters," said Sudderth. "Their homes are probably going to be the largest investments they ever make, and probably the investments that make the most money for most of them. I feel that I have taught them something they will really use."

The Sudderths still do some farming in addition to their real estate work. And, Peggy often volunteers as pianist and organist at the Farwell First Baptist Church. When J.B. and Peggy Sudderth aren't doing those things or going to school or selling real estate or running an auction, they enjoy fishing at Ute Lake and playing with their grandsons.

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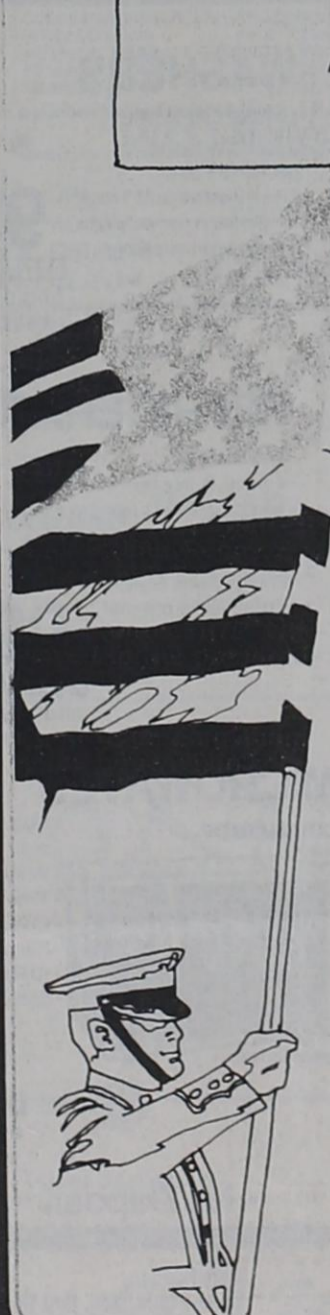

Meanwhile, Farwell Coach Rex Cumpston had been using all his players liberally throughout both halves. "We played every kid on our sidelines in both halves, including a JV quarterback and a JV tight end," he said.

The scoring continued. Freshman JV quarterback Michael Arce hit Darren Haseloff with a 25-yard pass for a TD. With 2 1/2 minutes left in the final period, Lorenzo scored.

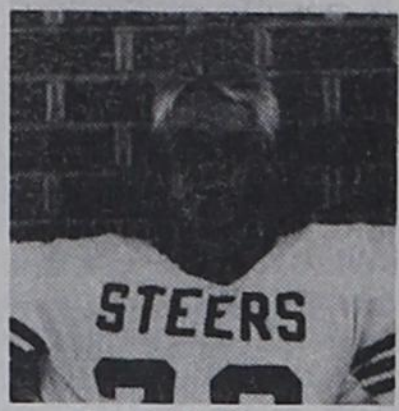
The scoring ended with an 8-yard run by George for a TD. Jeff Actkinson led Farwell with 18 tackles.

## Use caution during harvest

Cotton harvest is here, and the Cooperative is urging everyone to use extreme care when operating harvest and other farm equipment near electric lines. Cotton module builders, for example, can easily contact an overhead electric line. The same hazard exists with the overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

So the Cooperative urges

— specifically and emphatically — that operators of module builders make sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go before moving the implement from one place to another. And the Cooperative further urges

stripper operators using an overhead basket to check for overhead lines before dumping the basket.

If some piece of equipment does contact a 7,200-volt overhead line, the operator should not try to back

away. The line could break, or if the line is already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

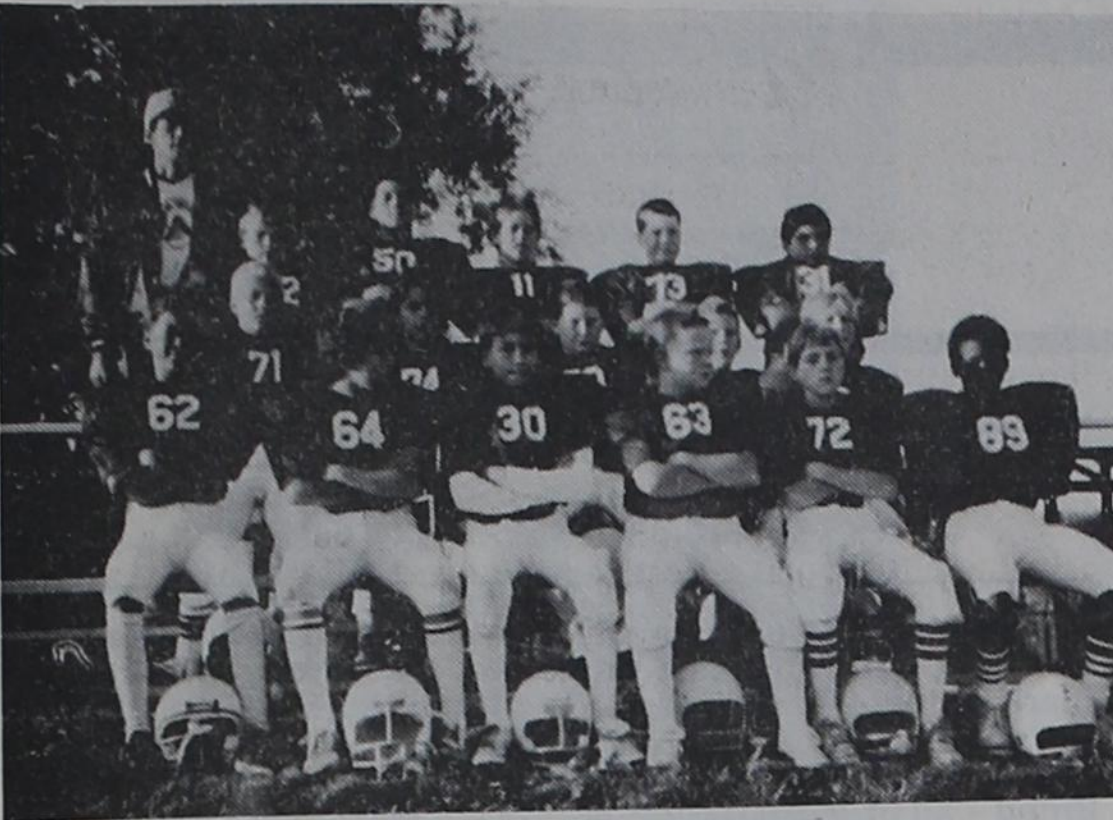
The thing to do when equipment contacts an over-

head line is to jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Once clear of the machine, the operator should move quickly away from it at a right angle to the power line. Then, whether the line is broken or not, he should call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (806) 272-4504 just as soon as possible.

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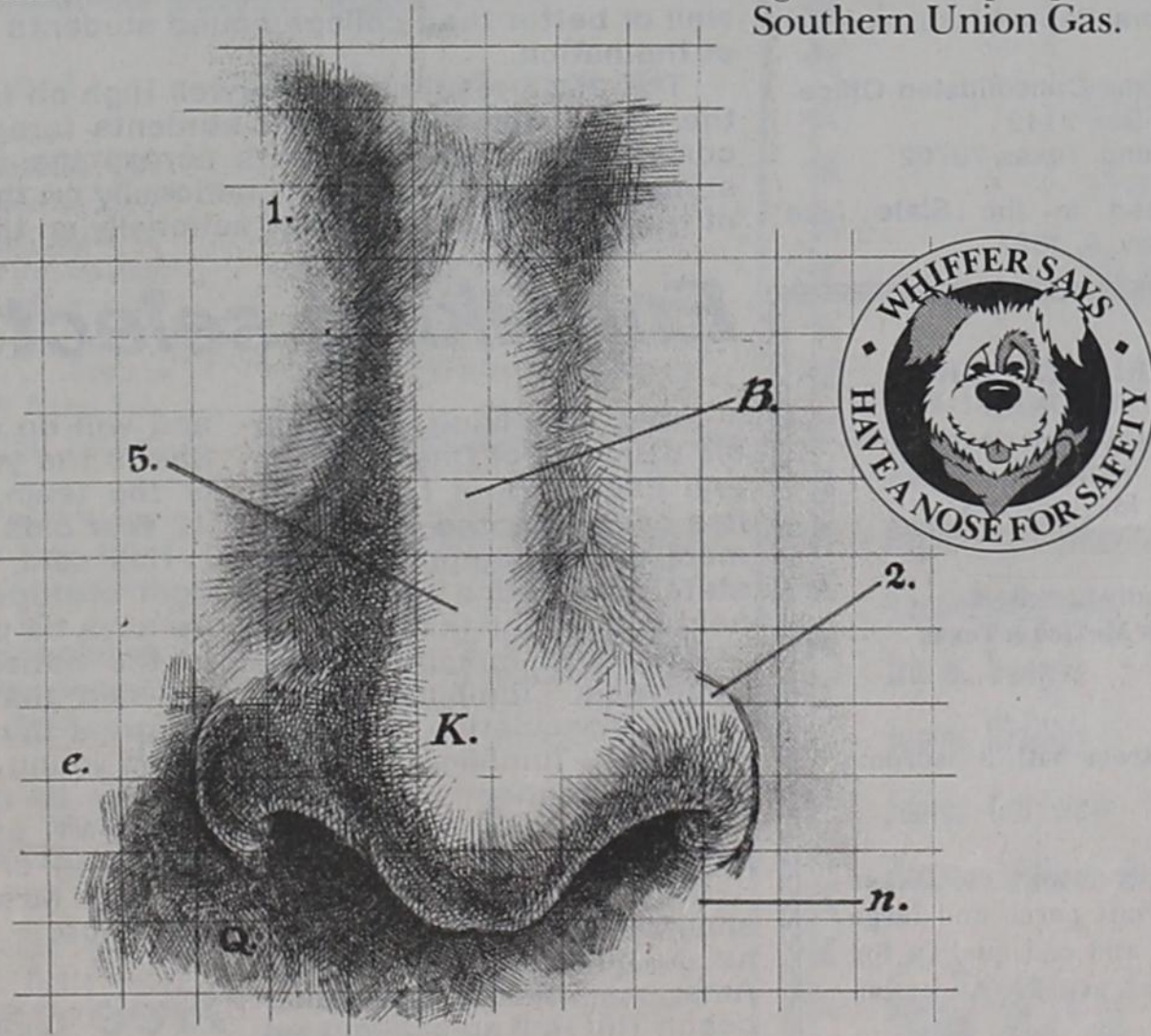

## Farwell High School TEAMS results given

Ninety-five percent of the Farwell High School 11th grade students who took the math section of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test last year passed it.

Ninety-one percent of the 11th grade students also passed the language arts section of the TEAMS test. The year before, 100% of the 11th grade students passed the math, and 91% passed the Language Arts.

The TEAMS test is also administered to ninth grade students. In Feb. 1987, 85% of the 9th grade students passed the math portion of the test; 93% passed the reading portion of the test, and 61% passed the writing portion of the test.

In February 1986, 82% of the 9th graders passed the math; 89% passed the reading, and 76% passed the writing.

In February 1985 the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) test was given rather than the TEAMS test. At that time, 91% of the ninth graders passed the math; 91% passed the reading, and 83% passed the writing.

On the basis of these results, it appears that writing skills have declined among ninth graders while reading skills have improved.

In dealing with fewer than 50 students in a test group, it is difficult to draw accurate results on the basis of a test. A few high or low scores can skew the results for the whole group. The results on the California Achievement Test (CAT), the American College Testing (ACT) test, and the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) give a clearer picture of how our students fared in comparison with students from other parts of the United States. The following results are expressed as national percentiles.

On a test which is given to large numbers of students across the whole country, about half of the results will be very close to the 50 percent mark, and about 25% will be in the top or bottom quarter.

Farwell's results show that on all the CAT tests, only one below average score was made by a class at Farwell High School - a 48% in spelling by the eleventh grade class. A 48% is very close to the middle statistically.

Some of the scores are significantly above average - a 78% in by the 12th grade in social studies, is exceptionally high for a class average, and a 71% in science by the 9th grade, is also outstanding.

The CAT test is given at school to virtually all of the students. The ACT and SAT tests, on the other hand, are given only to students who elect to take them. They are given on specific days and at specific places during the year. Normally, most of the students who take the ACT and the SAT tests are college bound students.

The ACT test has four areas: English, Math, Social Studies, and Natural Sciences. The composite scores range from 01-35, with 16-19 as the average composite scores.

The 1987 results from Farwell High students on the ACT test were: English, 17.69; Math, 17.25; Social Studies, 16.50; Natural Science, 21.50, and Composite, 18.38. The 21.50 in

natural science is significantly above average for a group of students from one school. Farwell's results on the ACT test show that college bound students from Farwell High do as well or better than college bound students from other parts of the nation.

The 1987 results from Farwell High on the SAT reinforce the conclusion that Farwell students fared similarly when compared to other students across the U.S. The Farwell students scored in the 53% nationally on the verbal section of the SAT and in the 48th% nationally on the math section.

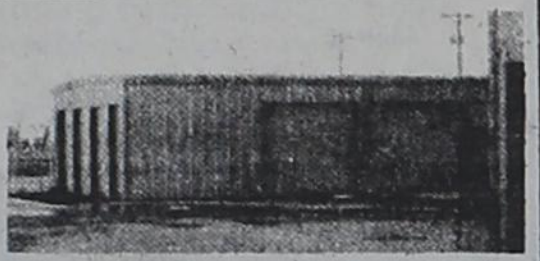

**Wolverines end season with victory**

 The Wolverines upset the highly ranked Fort Sumner Foxes Friday night at Texico, 14-3.  
 Texico finished the season with 1-4 district and 2-8 season marks.  
 Both teams played outstanding defense throughout the first quarter of play and neither team was able to score.  
 Texico's Paul Brown scored quickly in the second quarter on a 18 yard run. Larry Powell kicked for the extra point.  
 Texico continued to tackle well and they hold the Foxes scoreless throughout the second quarter. Texico went in at halftime with a 7-0 lead.  
 Both teams continued to play strong defensively. Texico attempted six passes, but was unable to complete any of them. Fort Sumner attempted 14 passes and completed only one. The Foxes' passing game was shut down when Larry Powell intercepted one pass and Robbie Edwards came up with two pass interceptions.  
 Texico did not throw any interceptions and made six first downs to Fort Sumner's three. Texico worked hard for their 81 total yards that were all made in rushing yards. The third period of play ended with Texico holding a 7-0 lead.  
 Ft. Sumner's Billy Skidmore kicked a 20 yard field goal in the fourth quarter when Texico held them tight, and they were unable to make a touchdown. The three point field goal was not enough, and Texico widened the gap when Robbie Edwards scored again to give the Wolverines a 13-3 lead with 3:36 left in the game. Larry Powell kicked the extra point.  
 "I appreciate the attitude of all the players. Our worst record was not good, but the players showed a lot of character through the entire year. It was satisfying to win our last game because the players had been so close to winning in several games and they deserved the victory. The nucleus for a good team is there for next year.
