Advice for the admiral

The nice thing about sending a newspaper to a serviceman abroad is that you have a captive audience.

I mean, there isn't a whole lot to keep you real busy during your free time when you are in a weird place, such as being aboard ship in the Persian Gulf. Don't forget that some theologians believe that all those captive devils are under water in that gulf.

So when I got a letter last week from Will Anderson, who is aboard ship in that gulf, I thought I would take advantage of that fact. What prompted this column was the note from Will that his ship's staff, including Admiral Bernsen, now reads the Tribune each week (Will subscribes).

I figure this would be a good place for me to advise the admiral on how to clean up the gulf and win the war.

Yes, I know you're batting pretty well so far. Destroying those Iranian oil platforms at Rostam went off without a hitch (at least without a public hitch; one thing I learned from my military tenure is that NO military operation goes off without a hitch).

And it seems Western tankers are plowing their way safely through the Straits of Hormuz, thanks to Allied escorts.

I know that the Iranians have issued a series of Jihad calls against the U.S. and other nations, ranging from Fuji to Lower Slobovia. I have never put any stock in Arab death threats; they're mainly for home consumption, sort of like an American politician saying he won't raise taxes.

But isn't it true that the first maxim for a military commander is not to underestimate his opponent? Surely, those flimsy gunboats carrying Revolutionary Guards can't be a match for a U.S. warship? Surely no terrorist with a truck laden with TNT could get into a Marine compound in Beirut?

Pragmatically, there is no way Iran would provoke an attack on its territory by the U.S. Unfortunately, we are dealing with fanatics, not pragmatists. Thus, I wouldn't put it past some political faction within Persia (my heart is still with the old Persian Empire after the fall of Babylonia) to do such a thing.

My guess is that, under cover of night, the Iranians might try to detonate some bombs attached to the underside of a U.S. warship, docked in some quiet neutral nation like Bahrain. Please watch for that...

And I would assume you are prepared for a Silkworm attack (the Iranians would deny sending them, of course). I still can't figure how that one U.S. warship was struck by that missile. I know the captain got axed, but I figure his staff messed up; please alert your staff, admiral, to the fact that you would like to keep your job (retirement benefits are great at that level) and that they should do theirs.

My personal preference, although I'm sure Will has passed it on already, is for the U.S. to get out of the gulf, and let the French, British and Russians (see my column of 8 weeks ago) handle convoy duties. But I doubt that will occur.

Thus, Admiral, the onus is on you. And please ignore any military instructions from the politico - military

Lynn resigns as grid coach

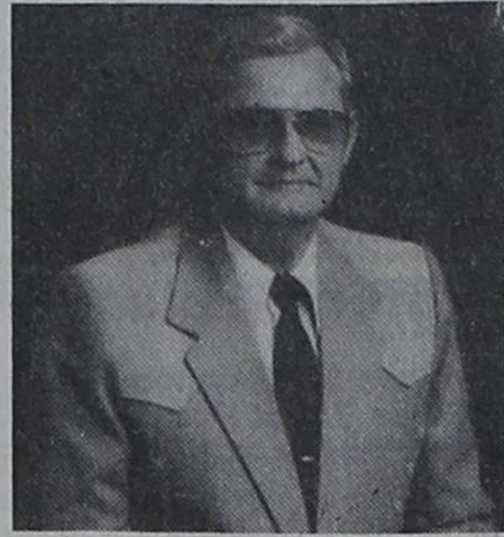
The Texico School Board Tuesday adopted a new communicable disease policy for students.

The new policy statement simply states in formal language a policy which would cover the rights of students who are ill while protecting the safety of other students at the same time.

"We've never had a formal policy on this matter," said Supt. James Pierce.

On short term illnesses such as chicken pox, students would have to be absent from school during the communicable period. Decisions on such matters would be made on the basis of competent medical advice. The school may request a doctor's excuse.

Parents may be required to take a child to a doctor for a physical if the school officials request it for the child's health and safety.

Moseley to retire

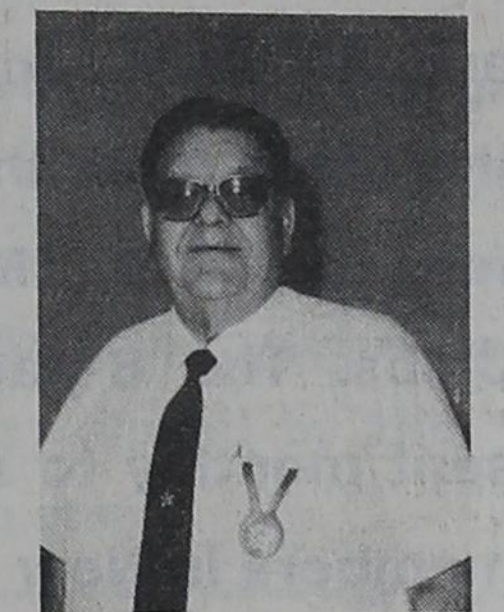
There's going to be a changing of the guard in the Parmer County Tax Assessor's office.

City police setup recommended

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas announced at Tuesday's City Council meeting his intention to organize a night watchman system for the city.

Gikas' plan is two-fold:

- He will suggest to the Parmer County Commissioners that when a call for assistance is made by a Farwell resident to the county sheriff's department but no deputies are on duty, then if an off-duty deputy responds, Farwell will reimburse the county for his overtime pay.

- He plans to set up a volunteer city police department to work with the city fire department and be trained by the city. Volunteers would carry no weapons, but have either two-way radios in their own cars or walkie talkies. Their only job would be to report any possible problems to the sheriff's office; they would make no arrests.

Gikas stressed that these plans are only in the budding stage and a lot more work needs to be done before they could reach fruition. He said the volunteers would primary be for night watchman -type service, with a screening process to be used before any persons were approved for it.

Gikas said city residents want more protection than is currently being provided. But he noted that when Farwell had its own city marshal, the cost was around \$30,000.

The mayor said he has spoken to several persons who said they would support a volunteer police department.

In other business, the council discussed upgrading five ordinances, three of which were approved:

- Approved was an ordinance dealing with peddlers and soliciting. It was modeled after one provided by the Texas Municipal League. The city will only allow bona fide businesses to solicit. The fee is \$25 (for a year).

Every person soliciting will need a permit, and must give information about themselves, such as Social Security numbers.

Groups such as schools and churches would be exempt.

- Tabled was an ordinance prohibiting livestock and fowl from inside the city. Variances can be issued. More particulars as far as what state regulations are will be checked into.

- Approved was an ordinance concerning dogs and cats. The fine for violations was increased to a \$500 maximum.

- Approved was an ordinance for construction. Persons planning any building must notify the city clerk and pay a deposit. Fines are up to \$500.

- Tabled was an ordinance dealing with the volunteer fire department. Clarification will first be sought dealing with the use of lights, sirens and decals on personal vehicles if used in the line of duty. Fines would be given for misuse.

The proposed ordinance will be discussed by the firemen and a report made to the council.

The council also: - Approved Gikas' recommendation to have a combined planning and zoning commission with three members: chairman Ricky Stewart, Ronald Byrd and Jerry Monk.

- Discussed building a

25x40-foot building for the water department next to the water tower. It would cost about \$7.50 per square foot. This is still in the talking stage. Available funds in the bank would pay for it.

- Approved sending Cynthia Thigpen, who takes over as City Clerk Jan. 1, to a special election school in Austin in January.

- Agreed to give a \$10 monthly discount to city firemen on their residential water bills. Currently, they have been just paying the basic rate of \$5.45 a month.

- Heard Gikas say that an open house will be held in honor of retiring City Clerk Janie Bowery later this month. Details will be announced

next week.

- Approved the annual membership fee of \$88 to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

- Agreed to seek bids for the 1988 insurance contracts. Henry Insurance, Muleshoe, currently has the contracts.

- Approved Christmas bonuses of \$100 for permanent employees and \$25 for part-time workers.

- Heard councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell complain of trucks parking on Third Street near the Grain Exchange building, which could cause accidents. Mrs. Bowery was instructed to write a letter to the Grain Exchange suggesting that the trucks not park on Third.

Water, sewer rate hikes suggested

The Texico City Council Tuesday night heard a recommendation to increase the city's water and sewer rates.

A council committee headed by Butch Sharp had been checking into the water and sewer funds for some time. Sharp reported that the year's water department expenses are \$62,319, while revenue is only \$51,401 - a deficit of more than \$10,000.

To remedy this, Sharp said his committee is recommending that the monthly minimum water rate of \$6 (for the first 4,000 gallons) be increased to \$8.50.

The cost for the next 2,000 gallons would stay the same. However, for each additional 1,000 gallons, the cost would increase from 35 cents to 50 cents.

Of the \$8.50 minimum monthly charge (if approved), 75 cents would go into a permanent account for long-range repairs and capital improvements, the committee urged.

Also, the committee suggested raising the monthly minimum fee of \$9 for users outside the city limits to \$11.80. This is proportionately the same rate increase as that proposed for in-city users.

Also, the committee recommended that the sewer rate monthly minimum (a house with five outlets) be increased from \$2.65 to \$4.15.

Currently, there is an added 15-cent charge for each additional

ditional sewer outlet. This would stay the same, meaning the overall proposed increase is \$1.50 a month across the board.

Of the \$4.15 monthly charge (if approved), the committee suggested that 50 cents of it go into a permanent account for long-range repairs and capital improvements.

The committee also recommended that the city drop its City Hall equipment maintenance contract and buy a computer for billing, etc. Sharp said they suggested buying it from police grant funds but a question was raised to its legality. City Attorney Duane Hamar will check into it.

Lastly, the committee suggested that the city discontinue using its well on Santa Fe property due to that well's increased costs and lack of efficiency.

If this well's use was discontinued, it would leave Texico with two water wells. If one of them went down, water would still be able to be provided in an emergency but the city would ask for cutbacks in usages such as lawn sprinkling. This would be for a limited time until the well was repaired.

Texico will now publish a notice of intent to discuss these recommendations and likely will discuss them at the council's first January meeting.

The committee's report said that if the increases are approved, it would result in added revenue of \$24,756.

In other business, the council:

- Heard councilman Steve Chancy thank the Curry County Sheriff's Department for its increased patrols in the city since there is no city marshal at present.

- Ratified the decision two weeks ago by the city personnel manager (the mayor) to dismiss City Marshal Alvin Pittman, who was on probationary status.

Supt. Joe Hall was evaluated at the meeting. Evaluations of personnel occur one month prior to contract renewal dates.


Following the agenda items, principals Roy Willingham and Anne Farris reported to the board on current school activities.

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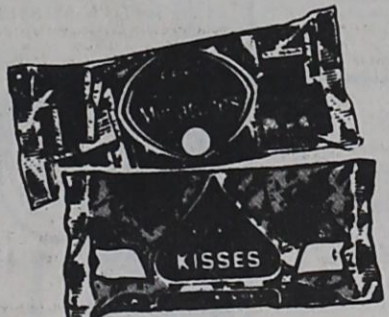
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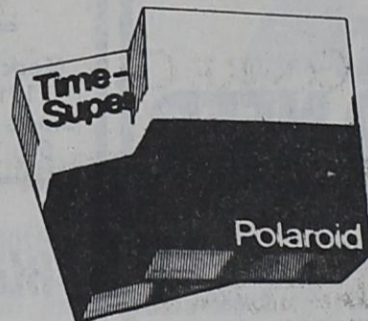

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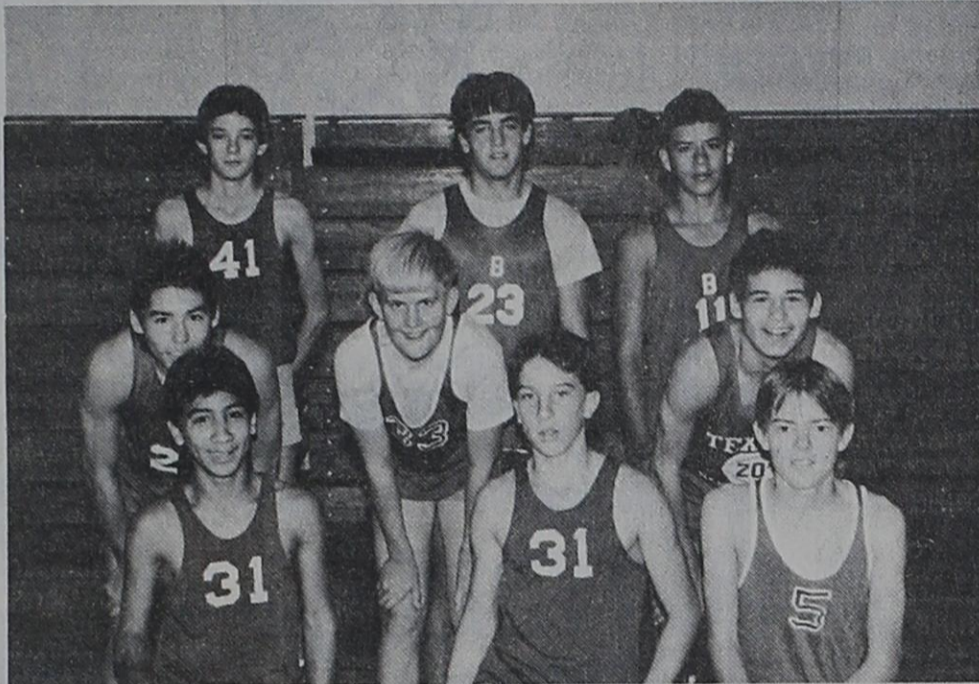

'Horns unbeaten

The end of the 1987 football season marked the end of the first year of six-man football play for the Lazbuddie Longhorns and found the Horns undefeated. Ineligible for UIL district competition until the 1988 season, the Longhorns played an independent schedule this year. Though they did not suffer a loss, the Longhorns were not eligible for state play-offs.

Nevertheless, there are those who believe that Lazbuddie could have won a state title this year. Among them are several coaches, players, and fans from schools that Lazbuddie defeated during the season. A leading newspaper printed comments from opponent coaches that Lazbuddie "could have made a run at a state title." Lazbuddie fans reported hearing numerous comments from opponents that Lazbuddie had the best six-man team that they (the opponents) had ever played.

The Longhorns' impressive statistics also say that Lazbuddie would have been a force to contend with in any phase of the play-offs for state. The following statistics were reported by head football coach, C.W. Williams.

Coach Williams is new to Lazbuddie this year, but he is not new to six-man football. He coached for three years at Three Way prior to moving to Lazbuddie to head up the Longhorns' first six-man season.

Coach Williams reported that the Longhorns defeated all of their opponents by a combined score of 501 to 99 points. This was an average of 55.6 to 11.

Defensively, the Longhorns gave up only 1,507 yards while offensively they gained 3,461 yards. This was an average of 384.6 yards per game for the Horns. Longhorn rushing yardage totaled 1,633, and passing yardage totaled 1,828.

These offensive figures would have been higher had Lazbuddie played a full four quarters in more of their games. According to six-man rules, if one team has a 45 point lead over the other team after the end of the first half, the game is over. Lazbuddie saw eight of nine "short" games.

In individual statistics, senior quarterback Tim Lust had an outstanding passing record with 31 touchdowns thrown, 78 of 123 passes completed, and only three interceptions. This record made him first on the South Plains. His total passing yardage was 1,529. Lust scored 2 TDs rushing.

On defense, Lust made 62 tackles with 13 made behind the line for opponent yardage lost. He made 6 interceptions, caused three opponent fumbles, and recovered 7 fumbles. Lust was twice picked by Amarillo Globe News as "Most Valuable Player."

Senior tailback Omar Sanchez scored 269 points, which was unsurpassed on the South Plains. He scored 25 TDs rushing and passing. Sanchez carried 79 times for a total of 978 yards and an average of 12.3 yards per carry. He caught 13 passes for 249 yards and an average of 17.6 yards per completion. On defense, Sanchez made 54 tackles with 16 made behind the line. He caught one interception and caused 5 fumbles. He was chosen by Amarillo Globe News as "Most Valuable Player."

Senior end Pat McBroom scored 24 points, received passes for 4 touchdowns, and caught 11 passes for yardage total of 233 and an average of 21.1 yards per completion. Defensively, McBroom made 39 tackles with 8 tackles behind the line, intercepted once, caused two fumbles, and recovered 5 fumbles.

Junior Scott Miller scored 56 points with 8 touchdowns from pass receiving. He caught 20 passes for 543 yards and an average of 22.6 yards per carry. On defense, Miller scored 59 tackles with 6 behind the line.

Junior Brian Glover scored 54 points, made two touchdowns rushing and 7 in pass receiving. He had 12 carries for 106 yards. He caught 25 passes for 386 yards and an average of 15.4 yards per completion. Defensively, Glover made 46 tackles, 4 interceptions, and recovered two fumbles.

Sophomore Michael Williams made 42 points, with 3 touchdowns rushing and 4 in pass receiving. He completed 9 of his 20 passes thrown for 98 yards. He carried 12 times for 40 yards and received 7 passes for 180 yards.

Sophomore Eddie Zamora scored 4 touchdowns, completed 3 of 4 passes thrown for 59 yards. In rushing, he carried 12 times for 89 yards. Zamora made two interceptions.

Other outstanding defensive performances were turned in by seniors Scott Mitchell and Steve Bradshaw and by sophomore Kevin McGeehee. Junior Wes Jarman caught a pass for the final touchdown that ended the game against top-ranked Jayton. Lazbuddie's half-time 48-0 win over the much-acclaimed Jayton team was a sweet victory for the Longhorns.

Several of the Longhorns were on the Amarillo Globe News "Most Valuable Player" honorable mention list. Omar Sanchez received honorable mention several times, as did Tim Lust. Also listed were Brian Glover and Scott Miller.

Coach Williams said that Lazbuddie will be in district next year, but it has not been decided which district. He said that it will probably be 1-A. Coach Williams said that he expects the team to do well next year.

Lazbuddie will lose seniors Bradshaw, Lust, McBroom, Mitchell and Sanchez. However, he said that returning players have racked up some outstanding statistics.

Lazbuddie's football program will benefit in future years from the boys who played junior high football this year. They finished first in their district with a season of no losses and one tie. These boys will be coming up, and the coaches predict that the Lazbuddie Longhorns will be greatly respected in district football in the coming years.

Customers may bring in packages for UPS to the drug store. A UPS truck will pick them up there daily. Overnight and next day service are available.

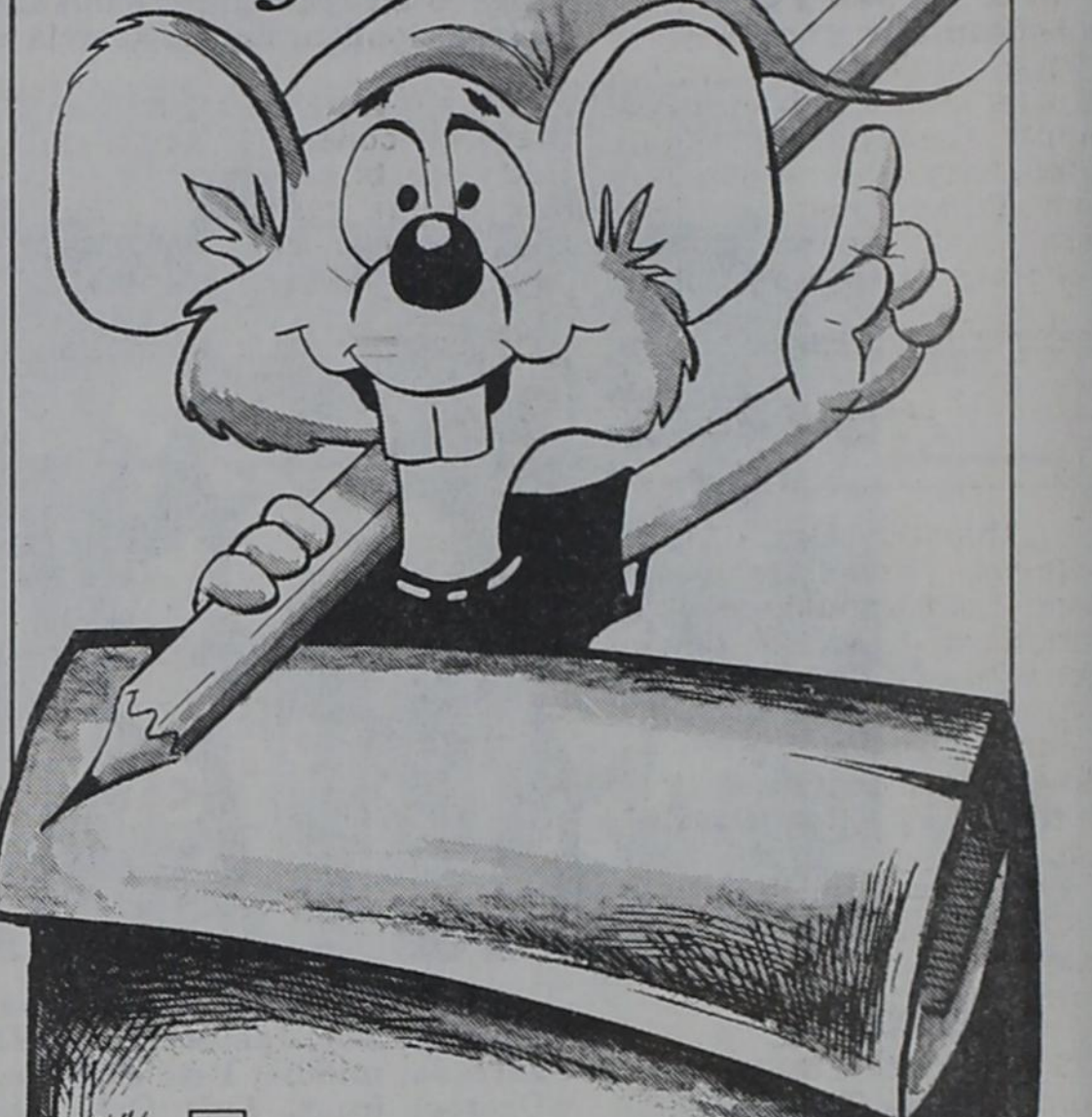
If there are packages which

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

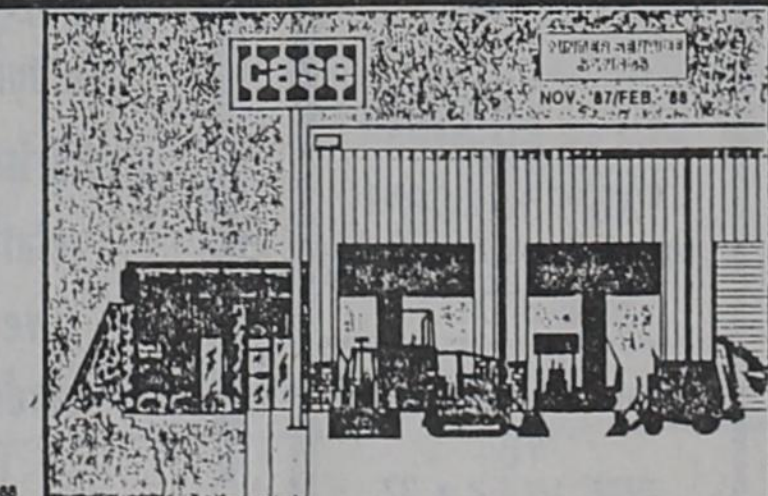

Insurance program participated in

The Farwell School Board has agreed to participate in a school insurance program.

This means that the school corporation will pay \$25 per month for fulltime personnel who use school insurance coverage.

Supt. John Grigsby said this decision, made at a called meeting Nov. 24, ties in with one of the board's goals: to improve the benefit package offered school employees.

"We were the only district in this area which wasn't participating in this way," said Grigsby. "This will allow us to get more bids from major insurance carriers, and also it will help as an inducement to getting quality personnel."

He gave as estimates that Muleshoe was paying \$30 per month; Clovis, \$60; Texico, \$50, and Bovina, \$25.

This will cost the school system \$12,000 this year and probably \$15,000 for the next school year.

At Tuesday's School Board

meeting, reports were made on the TEAMS test results, which students must pass in order to graduate high school.

Of the 40 juniors taking the test this fall, 93 percent passed the language arts portion and 65 percent passed the math portion.

Grigsby explained that the language arts test has stayed the same the past few years (91 percent passed last year).

However, the passing grade on the math portion was changed dramatically. Previously, 39 correct answers to the 72 questions allowed a student to pass; the number of correct answers needed to pass was raised to 50 this year.

Thus, he felt this was the major reason why the low 65 percent mastery score resulted (down from 95 percent last year).

Students have three more chances to pass the test: in May 1988, October 1988 and May 1989.

In other business, the board:

- Amended some budgets, and set aside extra funds to hire a substitute for school counselor Howard Carlyle, who has been ill. Carlyle was scheduled to return home this week but further hospital tests will be needed.
- Scheduled a special meeting Dec. 18 to review board

goals and strides being taken to achieve them.

- Concluded an evaluation of the superintendent.

- Agreed to seek bids for carpeting some of the elementary school classrooms.

- Put money aside to pay the first month's classes for any school employee who signs up for Jazzercise.

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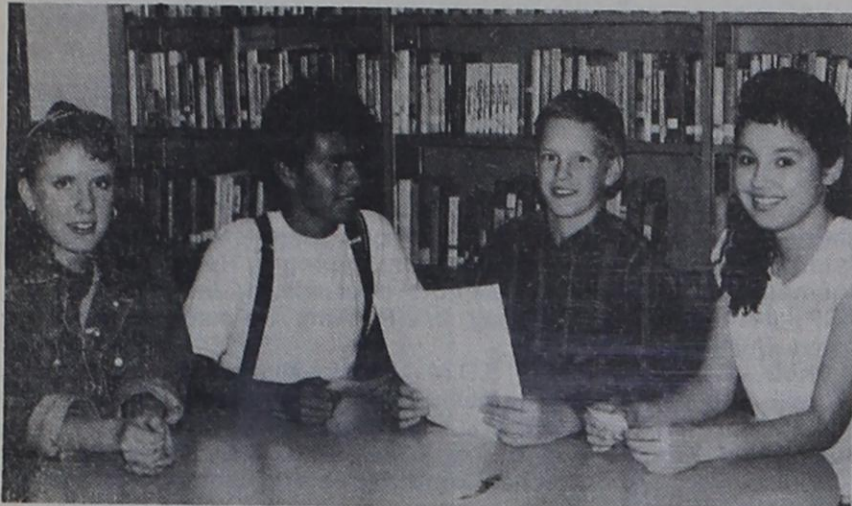
