It was July 1, 1957 ...

Ah, it's that time of year again.

The splinter of wood. The whoosh of the ball. The oohs and aahs of the crowd. Batter up!

As longtime readers of this column know, I am a fanatical Chicago Cub fan. There may be something more important in life than the Wrigleys, but I can't imagine what it would be.

And my goal, just as it is with any Cub fan, is to see my team (and Ernie Banks) in the World Series. I really believe it's possible.

Yes, I know that Banks (Mr. Cub for you novices) has been retired for some time. But they can always bring him back as a coach in time for post-season play. The only question is can it be done before his demise.

The Cubs first became omnipotent with me when I turned 8 years old. My older brother had a scrapbook of the highlights of 1945 - the last time the Cubs earned a World Series berth. After reading the exploits of heroes like Passeau, Borowy and Cavaretta, I was hooked for life.

At first, I didn't realize the facts of life. I assumed each spring that the Cubs had just as good a chance to win the pennant as any other team did. Shows what I knew.

The Cubs, as experienced showed me, had a perennial weakness: no pitching. This hurts a team.

But they had power. Boy did they have power (and still do). So you could always look forward to lots of home runs and excitement as the Cubs would lose games by scores of 9-7 and 12-8, for example.

The first time I ever got to beautiful Wrigley Field (you never, ever say Wrigley Field without "beautiful" in front of it) was for a Sunday doubleheader against the New York Giants. Hammering Hank Sauer blasted three homers as the teams split.

It was shortly afterward that Mr. Cub joined the team. What wrists that man had. Two outs in the ninth. The game tied. No one on base. The pitch. A long drive. It's out of here. Cubs win. 512 round-trippers for Mr. Cub.

Of course, those moments were few and far between. Most of my memories were different.

The year is 1957. It's July 1. The Cubs are in first place, a half-game ahead of the Milwaukee Braves. It's the bottom of the ninth at beautiful Wrigley Field with the Cubs down by 2 to Milwaukee. The bases are loaded; two outs. Bobby Thompson, the old Giant World Series hero, steps to the plate. It's a long drive. Center fielder Andy Pafko races back to the fence. He leaps. It's caught. The Cubs go on a losing streak.

The year is 1959. It's June. The Cubs are in first place. The game's at Cincinnati. The Cubs enter the ninth with a 6-run lead. I'm in a barber chair getting my hair cut, listening to the game on the radio. The Reds score 7 and the Cubs end the season in the cellar.

The year is 1969. It's Sept. 3. The Cubs are in first place. The game's at Cincinnati. It's the ninth with the Cubs in front by a run. The Reds have the bases loaded with two out. It's a long drive. Center fielder Don Young races back to the wall. He leaps. He's got it. No, he drops the ball. Reds win. Cubs go on losing streak and end in fourth place.

The year is 1985. The Cubs win their division behind Cy Young Award winner Rick Sutcliffe. In the division playoffs, they easily win the first two games in the Best of Five series against San Diego. It's all over except for the

Ruby Billingsley

Ruby Billingsley has lived in the Oklahoma Lane Community since January 1926. She and her husband, the late Sam Billingsley, moved here from Estelline, Texas. They married on Dec. 6, 1919.

The winter of 1926 was very cold. When they arrived, the Billingsleys moved into a new 20'x 12' home. "Today we would call it a shack, but it was what everybody lived in back then. We didn't feel deprived," says Mrs. Billingsley. "All of our neighbors like the Fosters and the Perkins, lived in houses like that."

There were neither telephones nor electric lines in Oklahoma Lane in those days. There were no paved roads, and the Billingsleys' land had never been plowed.

"We didn't have tractors. We had horses to pull the plow," she said.

They planted sudan, maize, and corn in those first years of farming, and they had a garden for vegetables. They also had cows, and chickens.

In the early years, Mrs. Billingsley helped with the farm, raised her family, and sewed to help make ends meet. She was also active in the women's society at the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church.

"Life is a lot easier today than it was back then. I don't raise chickens, or cows, or pigs anymore. We have paved roads, and telephones, and cars, and most of the comforts anyone would want," she says.

At 86, Mrs. Billingsley still finds time to make afghans and quilts. She especially enjoys the visits of her great-grandchildren.

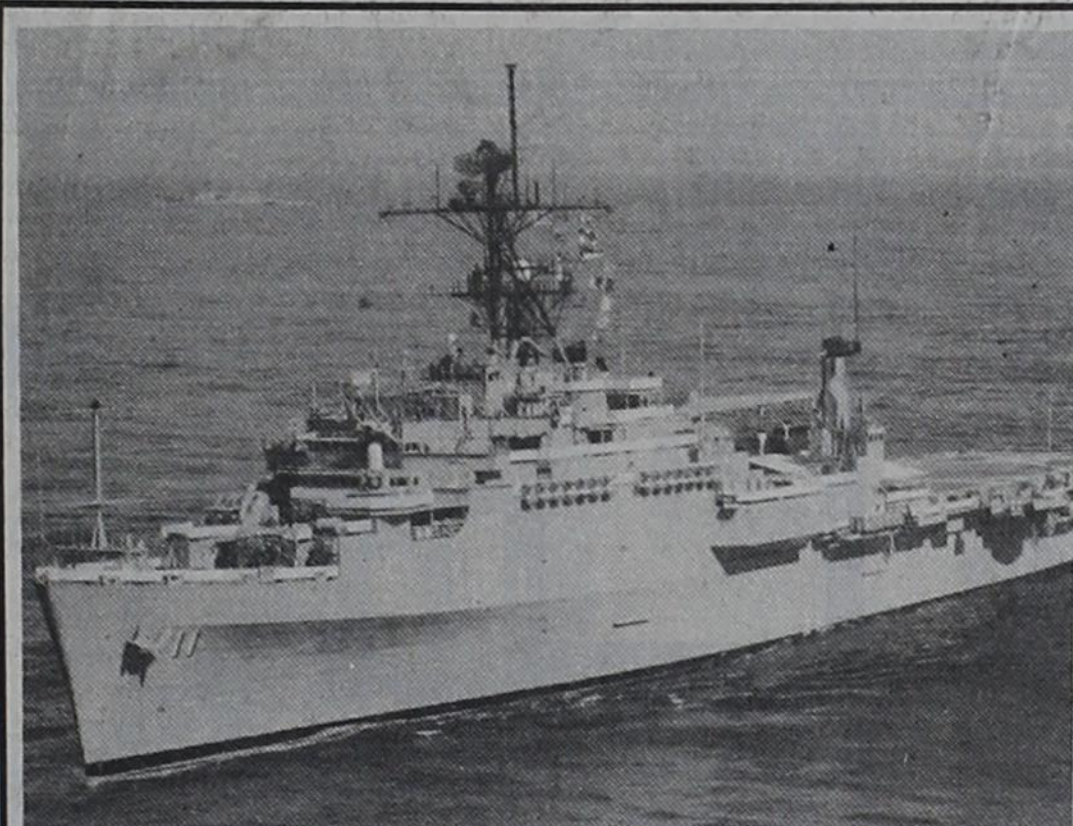
Mrs. Billingsley remembers the early days when her family came to Farwell to get the mail in the old post office on First Street behind Rose Drugs. They didn't have carriers in those days, so the Billingsleys came to town when they could find the time to hitch up the horses and drive in. They would do their shopping at the same time.

"Nelson C. Smith was the first carrier to deliver mail to us in Oklahoma Lane," says Mrs. Billingsley. "I think I've been on Route 1, Farwell since it started."

Says one admirer of Mrs. Billingsley: "She is always cheerful - never complaining, and she really gets around."

Mrs. Billingsley has one son, Condy Garland Billingsley, who is a Church of Christ minister.

Mrs. Billingsley has three grandsons. Brother Sam Billingsley is the Church of Christ minister at Lariat. Rod Billingsley lives in Santa Rosa, and Ted Billingsley lives in Amarillo. She also has 6 great-grand children.



USS CORONADO

**Report from the gulf...**

The Persian Gulf has been very busy indeed the past several weeks. First, Commander Middle East Force (COMIDEASTFOR) staff, got a new flagship, a new name, and a new admiral.

USS LASALLE departed for the U.S. Naval Base at Yokosuka, Japan, for drydock (warships are drydocked every five years or so for maintenance and repair overhauls). My staff embarked the new flagship, USS CORONADO, who will be out here for several months until LASALLE returns. CORONADO is an AGF, like LASALLE, which is an amphibious assault ship that has been specially configured to embark a staff. She has previously served as flagship for Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean, and for Third Fleet back in Pearl Harbor, which is where I originally met her and many of her officers.

COMIDEASTFOR staff was combined with the Commander Joint Task Force Middle East (CJTTFME) staff in the North Arabian Sea when our previous flag officer, Rear Admiral H.J. Bernsen, was relieved by Rear Admiral A.A. Less. RADM Less is a two star admiral, and assumed command of the combined staffs. He was commissioned in 1960 and originally flew the A-4 Skyhawk (carrier launched jet bomber). In 1966, he was one of the first pilots to convert to the newer A-7 Corsair, which he flew in combat over Vietnam. In 1973, he was named the flight leader and first Commanding Officer of the newly commissioned Navy Flight Demonstration Team, the Blue Angels.

As a joint task force, we have officers and men from all the other services involved in the Persian Gulf, Army, Air Force, and Marine. The deputy commander is an Air Force brigadier general (one star) named James Record, and he took a number of the staff down to the carrier in the North Arabian Sea, USS ENTERPRISE, for meetings with the Battle Group Staff.

I took my camera, and had intended to get a number of good pictures on the flight down there. Unfortunately, we flew to the carrier on a C-2, which is something like a boxcar with wings. It has no windows, all the passenger seats face the tail of the plane, and it is definitely a "no-frills" light. I

**Texico honors Herringtons**

A husband and wife team, George and Jere Herrington, were named Man and Woman of the Year at Tuesday's annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Herrington retired last year as principal of Texico Elementary School. Mrs. Herrington is employed at the Texico branch of Citizens Bank.

Guest speaker at the affair was John Good, eastern New Mexico manager for Waste Management, Inc., headquartered in Oak Brook, Ill.

Waste Management, the nation's largest trash hauler, acquired Waste Control, Inc., on April 1, Good announced. Waste Control handled trash pickup in Texico, as well as several other New Mexico and Colorado communities.

Good gave a very interesting speech dealing with the future problems of handling refuse.

He pointed out that half the cities in the U.S. will run out of landfill space within four years. New Jersey already exports 40 percent of its trash.

Problems in dealing with trash include possible pollution of water supplies and toxicity in the air.

The future, he said, points to a combination of waste-to-energy plants and sanitary landfills. Both must be carefully operated.

In the U.S., Good said 3 percent of the nation's trash is handled by plants which use it to generate electricity. The U.S.'s 70 such plants compares to Japan's 300-plus plants.

He said the U.S. must look to Japan and Western Europe for better answers because those areas have been dealing with the problem longer and have more experience.

He also mentioned recycling as part of the future's salvation. Currently, Japan recycles 95 percent of its glass and 75 percent of its aluminum cans. The U.S. lags far, far behind in both categories.

"Landfills will always be needed, but we must reduce what goes in them," he added.

Also at the banquet, directors for 1988 were announced:

John Hadley, president; Charlotte Pierce, vice president; Ann Cooper, secretary-treasurer; and Cliff Blakely, Jim Pierce and Ted Lopez, directors.

Dinner music was provided by Ed and Juanita Hardage and Truman Welch. The centerpiece was won by Wanda Mitchell.

Lewis Cooper gave the annual progress report, which included several new homes, a new bay for the fire station, street repair work, and the office and classroom additions at the school.

Rev. Raymond Parks gave the benediction and invocation.

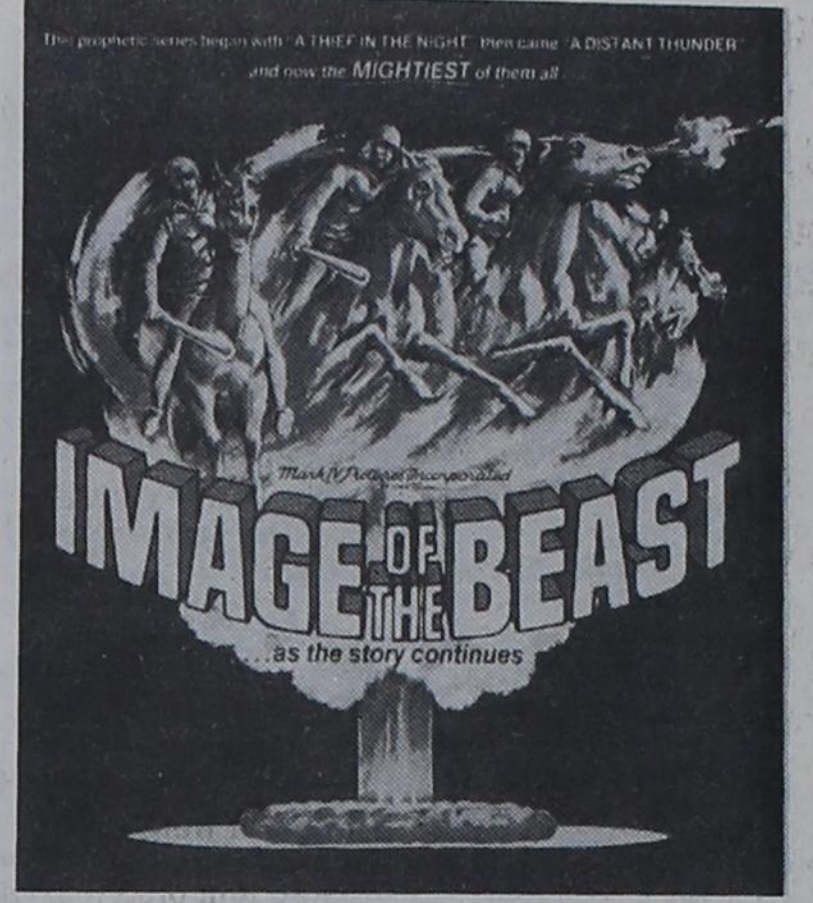
The movie is uncompromisingly truthful and frightening. All who refuse the "mark"

## Recipe of Week

Warm green beans  
And potatoes

1 lb. green beans, trimmed  
1 1/4 lbs. small red new potatoes  
6 oz. bacon, finely chopped  
1/3 c. leek, chopped  
1/2 c. sherry vinegar  
1 tsp. Dijon style mustard  
1/2 c. olive oil  
1/2 c. corn oil  
3/4 tsp salt  
1/2 tsp. coarsely ground pepper  
2 cucumbers, peeled

Cook beans in boiling water. Drain. Cook potatoes until tender. Drain. Cut into quarters. Fry bacon in heavy skillet until brown; remove bacon. Reserve 1/4 c. drippings. Saute leek in dried drippings 2-3 minutes or until tender, stirring constantly. Stir in vinegar and mustard. Cook until heated through. Stir in olive oil and corn oil. Add salt and pepper; remove from heat. Mound potatoes in center of serving platter. Pour

1/3 of dressing over potatoes.

Add beans to remaining dressing. cook until heated through, stirring gently. Remove with slotted spoon; arrange around potatoes. Cut cucumbers lengthwise; remove seed. Slice 1/4 inch thick. Add to remaining dressing. Cook until heated through, stirring constantly. Remove with slotted spoon; arrange around beans. Pour remaining dressing over salad.

# Parmer, Bailey nitrogen amounts listed

Soil tests reveal that soil fertility levels in the Southern High Plains of Texas will limit average crop yields to less than 300 pounds of lint per acre if producers do not apply fertilizers.

Cotton requires about 18 inches of water and from 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen to yield 300 pounds of lint per acre. Five hundred eighty samples collected from 200 farms contained an average of 30 pounds of nitrate nitrogen in the top two feet of the soil.

These soil samples were collected in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's service area by the USDA-Soil Conservation Service and Water District personnel in December 1987 and January 1988 while making the pre-plant soil moisture survey.

Plant nutrient levels measured in the soil samples were nitrate nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium, zinc, iron, manganese, copper, and sodium. In addition, soil pH and salinity were measured. Only nitrogen appeared to be low enough to limit crop production.

Cotton requires about 22 inches of water and 80 to 90 pounds of nitrogen to yield 500 pounds of lint per acre. If a higher yield goal of 750 pounds per acre of lint is desired, 30 inches of water and 110 to 120 pounds of nitrogen are needed. In addition to nitrogen, 20 to 25 pounds of phosphorus are required for a yield of 500 pounds of lint per acre, while 35-40 pounds of phosphorus are required for a 750 pound yield. The sample sites had an average of 122 pounds of phosphorus in the top two feet of the soil.

Research demonstration plots at Texas Tech University on the Texas A&M University Research Station, and on the producer's farms in 1987 did not show significant responses to the addition of phosphorus on cotton.

Nature provides about 20 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year from soil organism activities, soil chemistry interactions and from the atmosphere in this area where cotton generally follows cotton. It should be safe to assume that one-half of the nitrogen provided by nature will be available during the growing season.

If you add this 10 pounds of nature-provided nitrogen to the average of 30 pounds of nitrate nitrogen found in the top two feet of the soil, 46 pounds of nitrogen would support a cotton lint yield of little less than 300 pounds of lint per acre, which would not be a break-even yield for most producers.

The average amount of nitrogen in the top two feet of soil in Parmer County had 27 pounds per acre; Bailey County had 16 pounds per acre. Castro County had 66 pounds per acre. Deaf Smith County had 97 pounds per acre. Lamb County had 24 pounds per acre.

These averages should not be used to determine fertilizer needs for individual farms in the counties represented. Producers are urged to collect soil samples from their own farms for fertility analysis to make these determinations.

Nitrogen moves with the moisture in the soil. Therefore, a split application of nitrogen helps prevent leaching losses. A

small pre-plant application of nitrogen helps insure seedlings vigor and provides the plant with adequate nutrients to retain an early fruit set. During the growing season, the addition of five pounds of nitrogen per inch of water applied as irrigation or received from precipitation will insure an adequate nitrogen supply for maximum water use efficiency and yields. Water use efficiency can be increased by 20 to 30 percent with a balanced fertility program.

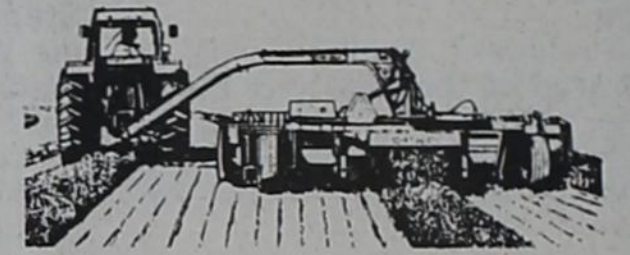

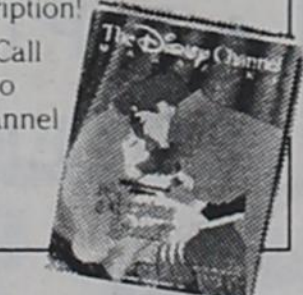

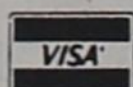

brought my own prayer beads, which is unusual for a good Baptist like me, but I just about wore them out because this was to be my first carrier landing and takeoff.

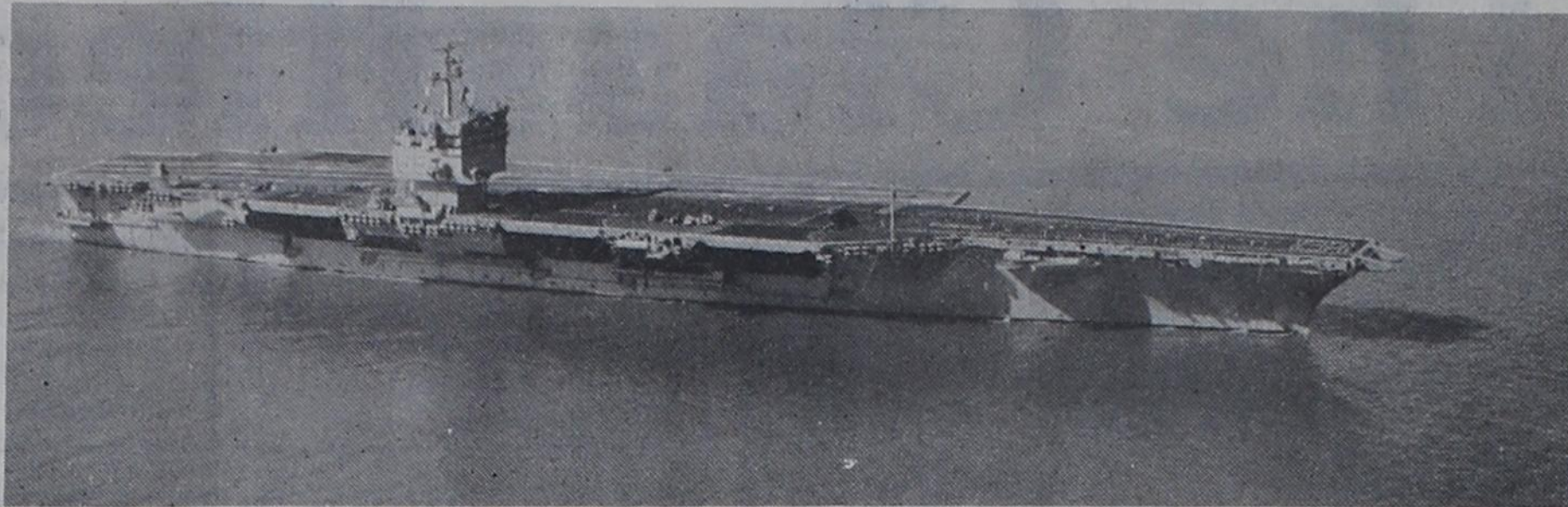
A carrier from the air looks about as big as a shingle, so it was fortunate that I was strapped into my seat in the back of the flying boxcar because I don't think that I would have wanted to watch the landing anyway. We hit the deck going about 130 knots (about 150 miles per hour ground speed) and a hook on the rear of the plane grabbed a cable and we stopped in two seconds flat.

The crew came around with crowbars to pry us out of the upholstery, and I was very glad to be walking on a level deck again, let me tell you! I will never begrudge an "airdale" his flight pay again.

ENTERPRISE is a beautiful old girl, the first nuclear powered super carrier in the world and still among the largest. Her flight deck is bigger than 5 city blocks combined. From her keel to the top of her mast, she's taller than a 25 story building. You could borrow the Eiffel Tower from Paris, France, and lay it flat on her deck. (I don't know of any plans to do that, but if someone does, they'll find that the Eiffel Tower is 125' shorter than ENTERPRISE's flight deck).

She's all warship, with almost 100 aircraft and over 5,000 men. ENTERPRISE and her escort cruisers, destroyers and frigates are together called Battle Group Foxtrot. This was the Battle Group my ship in 1984, USS ROBERT E. PEARY, served with in the Indian Ocean. And now ENTERPRISE is here again to support our missions in the Persian Gulf, and I was glad to see her.

Or, more precisely, I hated to think of leaving her deck on that damn flying boxcar a couple of hours later. The squad of Marines found the fanroom I was hiding in and got me strapped back into my seat on the C-2 and we taxied across the deck to the steam catapult. Now I knew for a fact that one of my old ships, a carrier named USS FORRESTAL, made

the best steam in the world and her steam catapults could throw Volkswagon vans so far and so hard that they'd skip like stones across the ocean until they were out of sight. But ENTERPRISE's catapults must be somewhere in the same league.

It sure felt like it when we took off. That boxcar with wing went from dead stop to 140 knots (over 160 miles per hour) in two seconds, and I guess we skipped across the ocean five or six times before we finally clawed our way into the air.

Anyway, we made it back into the Persian Gulf, and now we've settled down to our new situation. Some things haven't changed, though. The Iranians and the Iraqis are still shooting high explosives at each other. We're still escorting ships up and down the Gulf. And I'm probably in trouble with my friend, Colonel Brill, up in Maine for my sea stories again. Sorry 'bout that. Hello to the home town, and I'll be in touch.

**Watch the forecast**

Spring rains and temperature variations make it critical that cotton farmers pay close attention to the five-day weather forecast, says a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Proper moisture, aeration and temperature conditions are essential for good germination and emergence of cotton, said Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton specialist.

If fields are too dry at planting, it hinders germination and seedling development; if they are too wet, it restricts the oxygen needed for germinating seed, Supak noted. And cotton seed are highly vulnerable to chilling injury for approximately five days after planting, he stressed.

"Ideally, soil moisture levels at planting are at or near field capacity," Supak said. "this not only assures adequate moisture for seed hydration, but also sufficient oxygen to support germination."


Inadequate moisture slows the germination and seed development and may even be fatal to stands if fields "dry out" too rapidly, the Extension agronomist said.

"Waterlogged conditions, on the other hand, restrict free air movement to germinating seed and the lack of oxygen may also cause stand failure," he noted.

To minimize chilling injury, the agronomist urged producers to also consider extended weather forecasts when selecting a planting date. "Keep in mind that the five days after planting are critical. Plantings just ahead of a wet cold front are likely to encounter periods when soil temperatures in the seed zone fall below the critical 50 degree level."

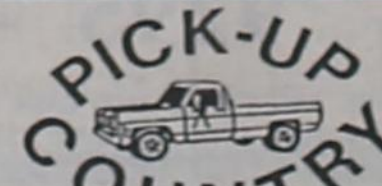

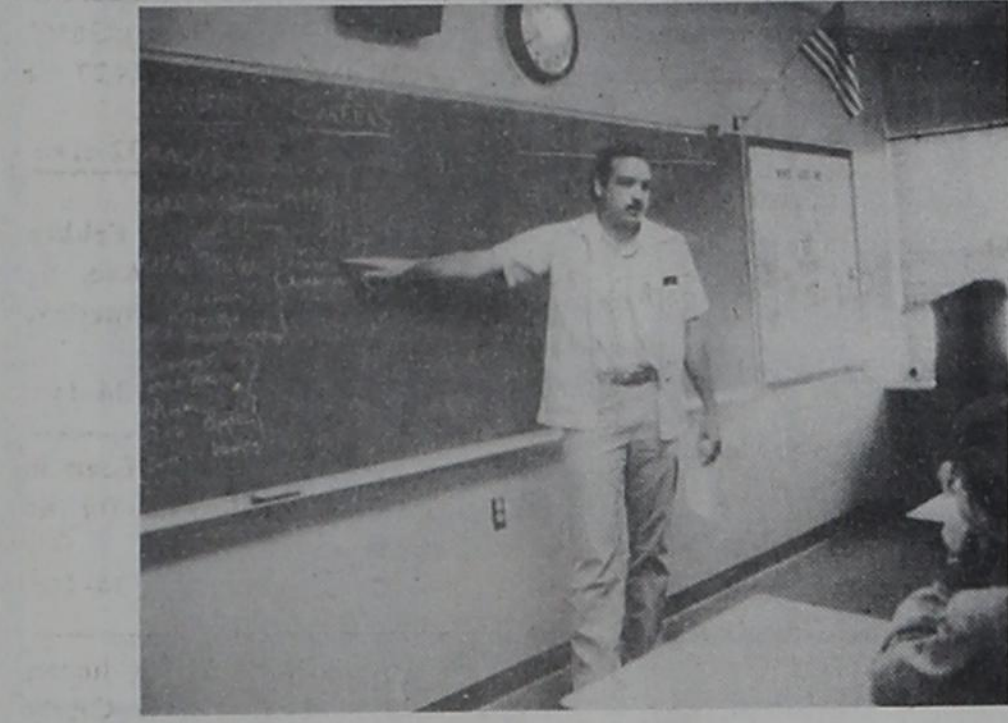
