The Texas Employment Commission reports that if current trends continue, by 1995 the state of Texas will need fewer farmers, farm workers, tool and die makers, roustabouts, miners, fishermen, and stenographers, but it will need 7,450 more bartenders, and 39,900 more health care service workers.

The State Board of Education is recommending to the legislature to change school funding from average daily attendance to average daily membership.

This change will shift a huge amount of money to the urban areas with little or no funds going to small, rural districts. What this means is that school districts with large enrollments, but poor attendance, will greatly increase their funding, likely at the cost of smaller districts with good attendance, like Farwell and Lazbuddie.

Grigsby said Farwell's attendance runs about 97% while Dallas is in the 80's.

He wants folks to write their objections to this proposal to: State School Board Member District 15, Dr. Paul Dunn, 701 8th St., Levelland, Texas 79336.

Speaking of education, last week was Secondary School Principals' Week in Texas. Let's hear it for Jerry Dee Owen, Roy Willingham and David Reynolds. And let's throw in New Mexico, too: way to go, Ken Shaw and Anne Southard!

Council approves changing some streets to 1-way

The Farwell City Council Oct. 13 voted 3-1 to approve a request from the Farwell School Board to make several streets near the school one-way during daytime hours.

In favor were Martin Welling, Curtis Smith and Ysleta Kittrell. Opposed was Martin Kube. Abstaining was Fred Chandler.

School Supt. John Grigsby pointed out safety problems in the current system and said the board believed it would be safer for children to get in and out of vehicles if one-way streets were used when school opens and closes.

He said school officials will talk to neighborhood residents before the changes go into effect. One-way street signs need to be ordered first.

And the council voted to buy the new signs. A 2-2 vote on this point was broken by Mayor Chris Gikas in favor of the city buying them. Grigsby had offered for the school to purchase them.

The council again held a lengthy discussion on a building that was moved to the back of Stuart Meyer's property on Avenue D.

At a special meeting Oct. 6, the council had asked Meyer to present a statement in writing that showed his intentions for the property.

He was asked to fix up the building so that it will always look like a house. He also was asked to state it will be used as a garage. And he was asked for a date when the changes would be complete.

A letter from Meyer was received at the last meeting stating his intentions.

But the council also questioned whether the structure was meeting the city zoning statutes. A check on the legality of the structure is being made.

The council continued its crackdown on junked vehicles. City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen reported that all the certified letters sent to vehicle owners had been picked up and the 10 days had elapsed (the time given them to move the vehicles).

The council said Lunsford Auto will be asked to tow away the vehicles, at the owners' expense.

Councilman Welling reported on his meeting with the county commissioners on a proposal for Farwell to contact with the county on police service.

He is waiting for a copy of the contract between Garza County and the city of Post, which he believes would be a good model for Farwell to use.

Another idea, Welling said, is for Bovina and Friona to eliminate their police departments and just have an expanded sheriff's office handle the whole county.

Welling said he was opti-

mistic that the county and Farwell could work out an agreement.

Also, Councilman Smith reported that one of the state troopers stationed in Parmer County will be making periodic swings through the city.

In other business, the council:

- Approved construction of a carport next to a home across from the elementary school playground.

- Received 4 bids for a new pickup truck. The council accepted the low bid of Friona Motors, for \$9,650.

- Received 3 bids for a suburban for the fire department, and accepted the low bid from Friona Motors, at \$16,150.

- Agreed to pay the minimum fee of \$75 to join the Panhandle Council of Mayors. Gikas is secretary of the group.

- Agreed to seek bids on the city's old garbage truck and 1975 Chevy pickup.

- Agreed to have city employee Royce Menning attend sewer school in Lubbock in November and to buy manuals for his correspondence school.

- Discussed the Texas Municipal Retirement Service and decided to have a representative attend a council meeting to answer questions on disability insurance and long-term commitments before accepting the service for city employees.

Oct. 31 will be the annual parade of ghouls at Farwell Junior High. Prizes will be awarded for the best costumes.

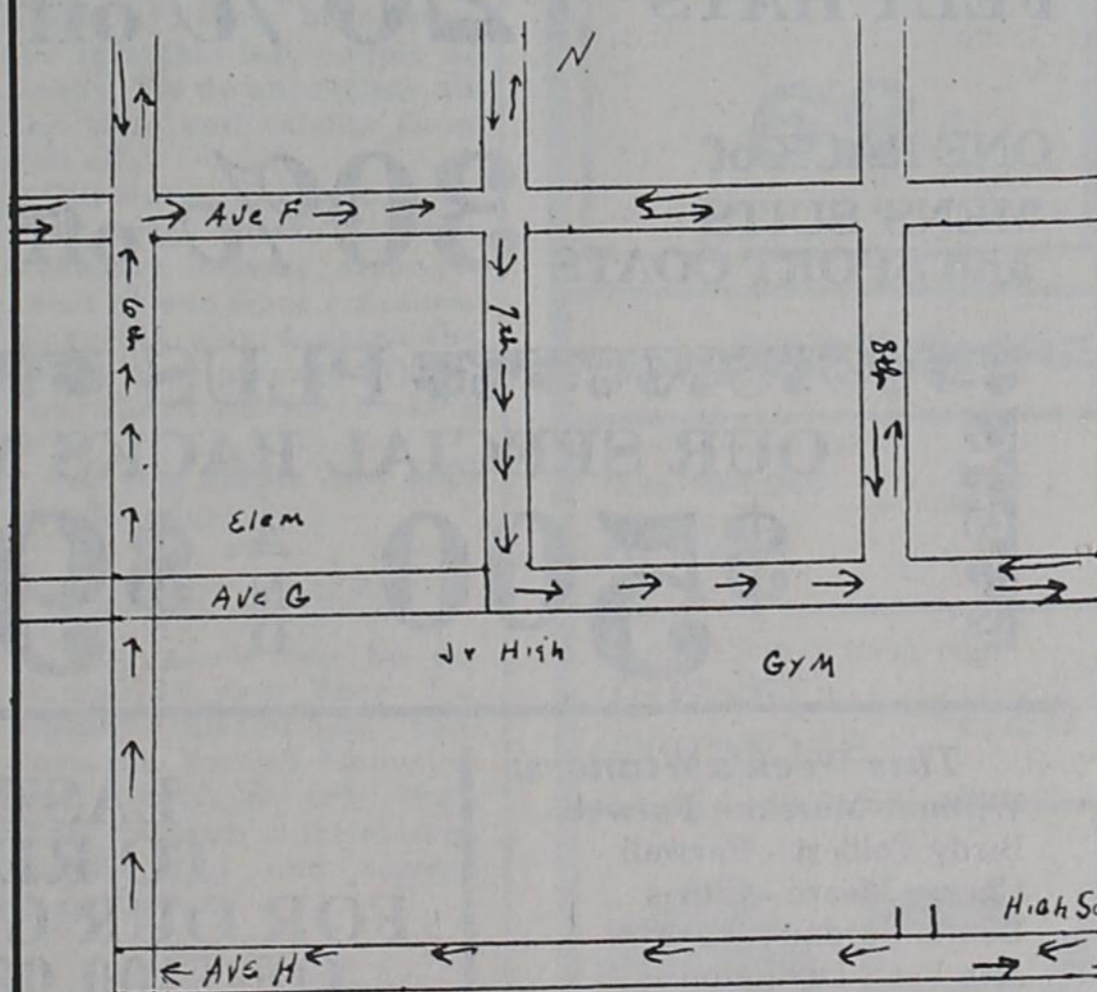
Seed company honors Coates

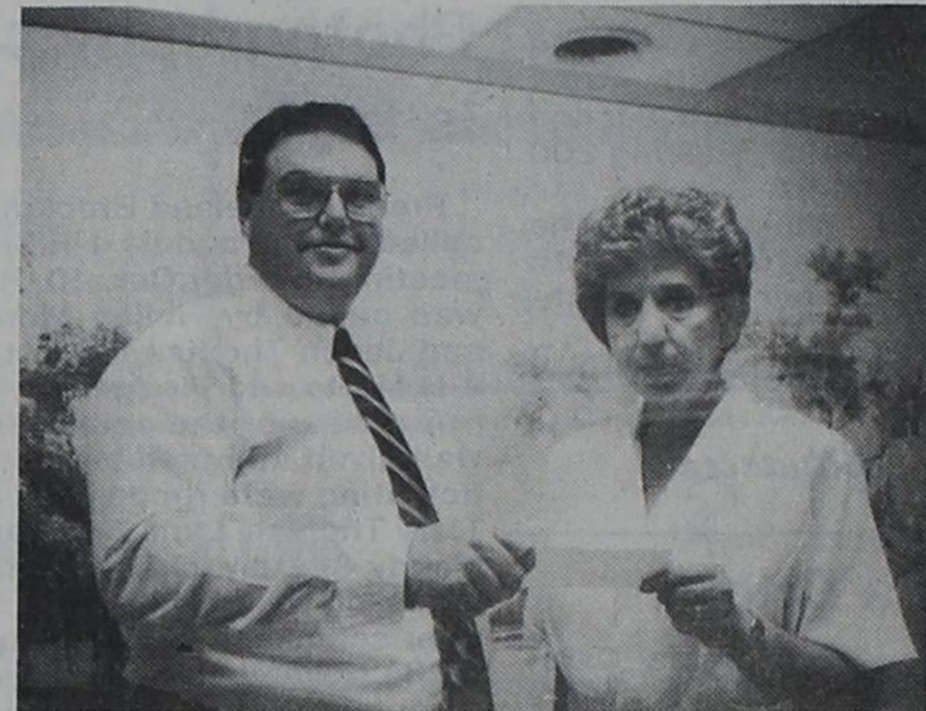

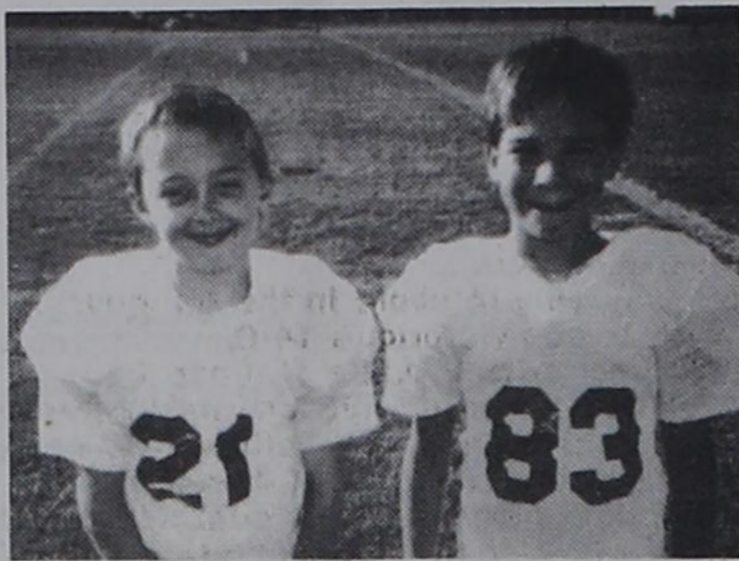

Burial followed at Lawn Haven Memorial Garden Cemetery. Steed-Todd Funeral Home handled the arrangements.

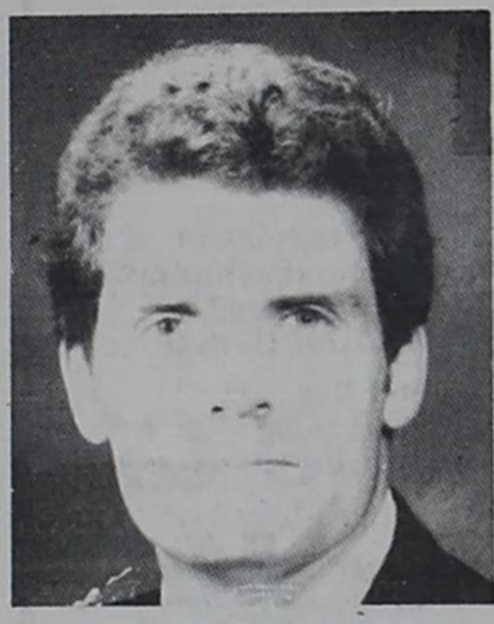

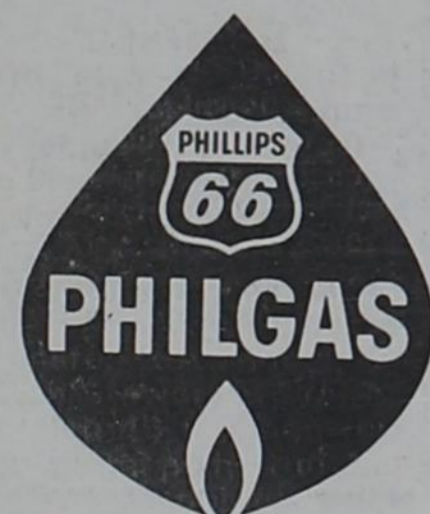
She was preceded in death by her husband, Ervin Cribbs on Feb. 3, 1975.

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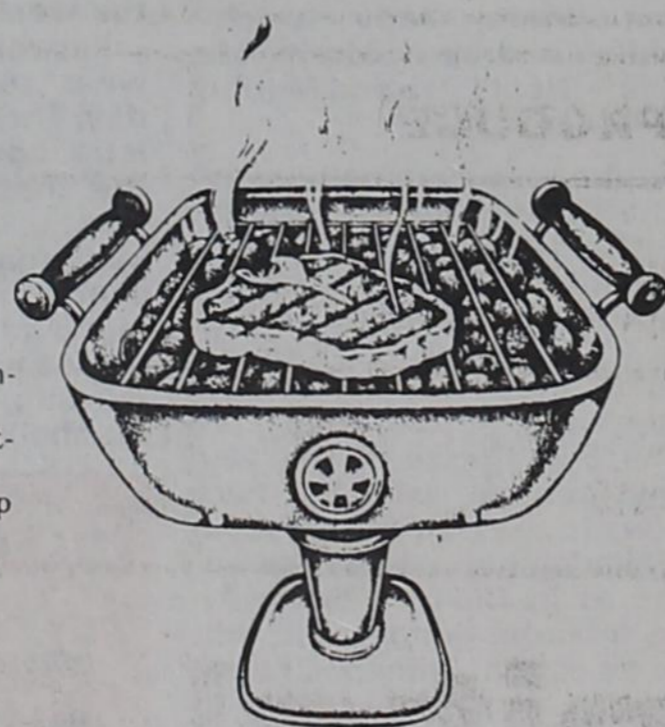

The Yearlings play Lockney here at 5 p.m. on Oct. 20.

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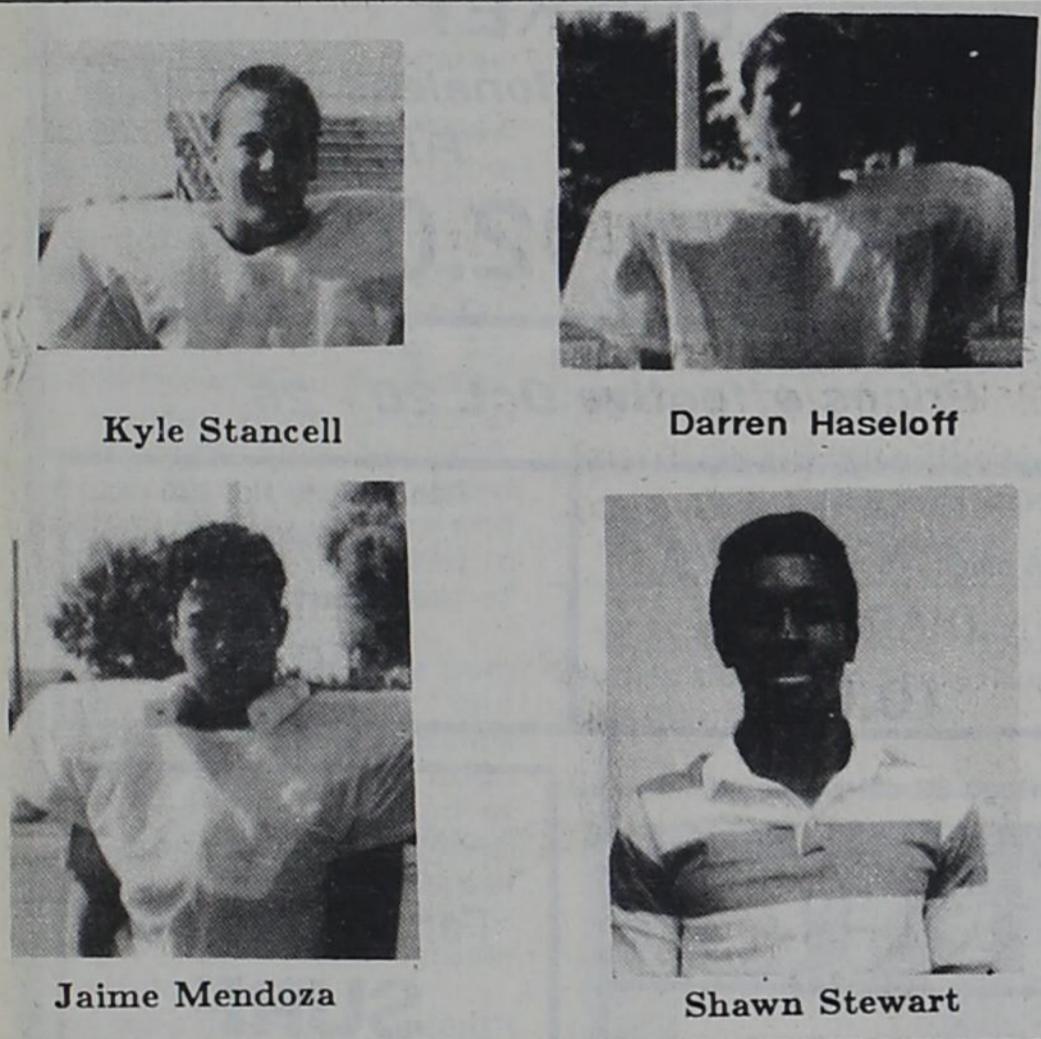

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Holly Sugar gives tour of plant

Local growers like Vick and Troy Christian, David Norton, and Joe Schilling are harvesting their sugar beets. They will market them at Holly Sugar in Hereford.

On Oct. 12, Holly Sugar held a media appreciation day. It included a tour of the plant and fields, and lunch.

Local growers will probably be harvesting from now through December. Harvesting is a two-step operation. One machine is driven through a field to loosen the beets from the soil and chop off the leaves and roots. Then a second machine drives through to harvest the beets and load them onto trucks.

The beets grown here are then driven to Hereford where they are unloaded at the Holly Sugar plant. Last year the plant processed between 700,000 and 750,000 tons of sugar beets. This brought \$30 million to the approximately 300 farmers associated with the plant.

The beets are washed, sliced,

and placed in a difuser which cooks the beets into a syrup. The syrup is purified and concentrated several times in the process. Finally, the saturated sugar solution is spun in a centrifuge with a few sugar crystals, and crystalized sugar is formed. This is dried and packaged at the plant. Some is even ground into powdered sugar.

By-products such as molasses and beet pulp are sold by the company to cattle producers for use as feed.

The plant is now owned by Imperial Sugar which became famous processing cane sugar. Chemically, the end product is the same whether it is made from sugar cane or sugar beets.

Local growers sign participating contracts with the manufacturer that seem very restrictive at first glance. They are told when to plant, and when to harvest their crops. When the processing plant first opened, some growers were very upset by

the restrictions. Today they understand the logic behind them.

Growers are told to harvest only three days per week so that the Holly Sugar never has more beets than it can handle. There is no sense in harvesting all at once and letting them rot while waiting for processing. It also means that all of the growers sell some of their product at the

peak of the season when the beets contain the most sugar.

The manufacturer then processes and markets the product for the growers who are paid in three installments which arrive at times when the growers need the cash most.

It costs the average grower about \$70,000 to produce his crop each year.

The growers also partici-

pate in a voluntary program to fund research, get publicity, and lobby for their programs in Congress.

The result of this restrictive contract system is that both the grower and the company make money while the price of sugar remains very stable. In the 1970's the U.S. imported more of its sugar than it does today. There were large fluctuations in the cost of the sugar. When the price

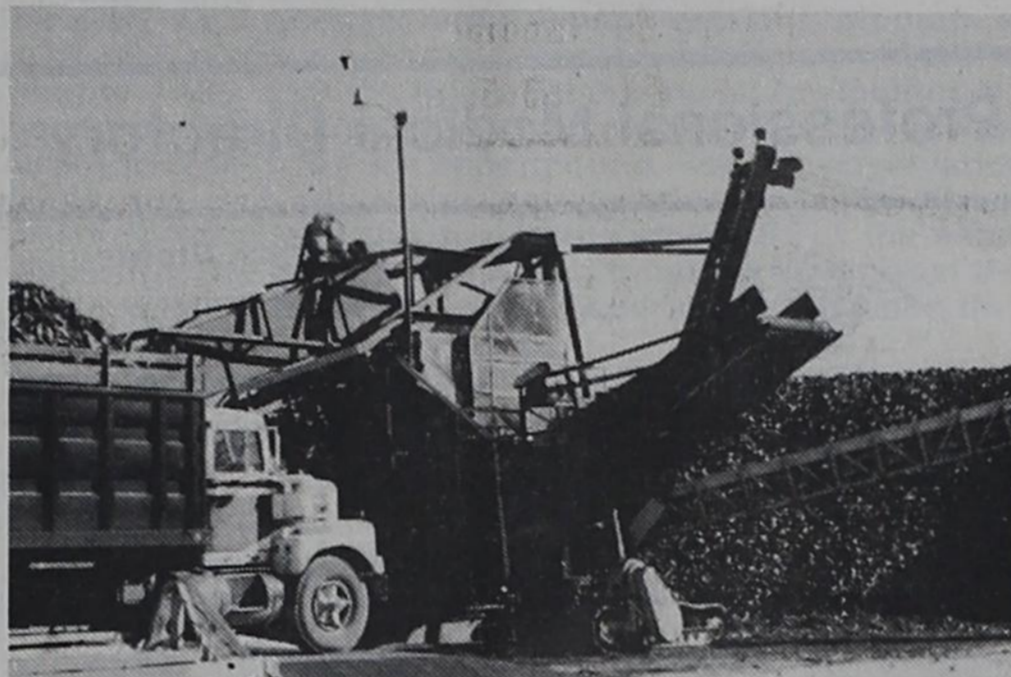
of sugar went up, manufacturers of products that contain sugar blamed the rise in the price of finished products on the cost of sugar.

"Today the average candy bar contains about 4-5 cents worth of sugar," said Bill Cleavinger, president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association.

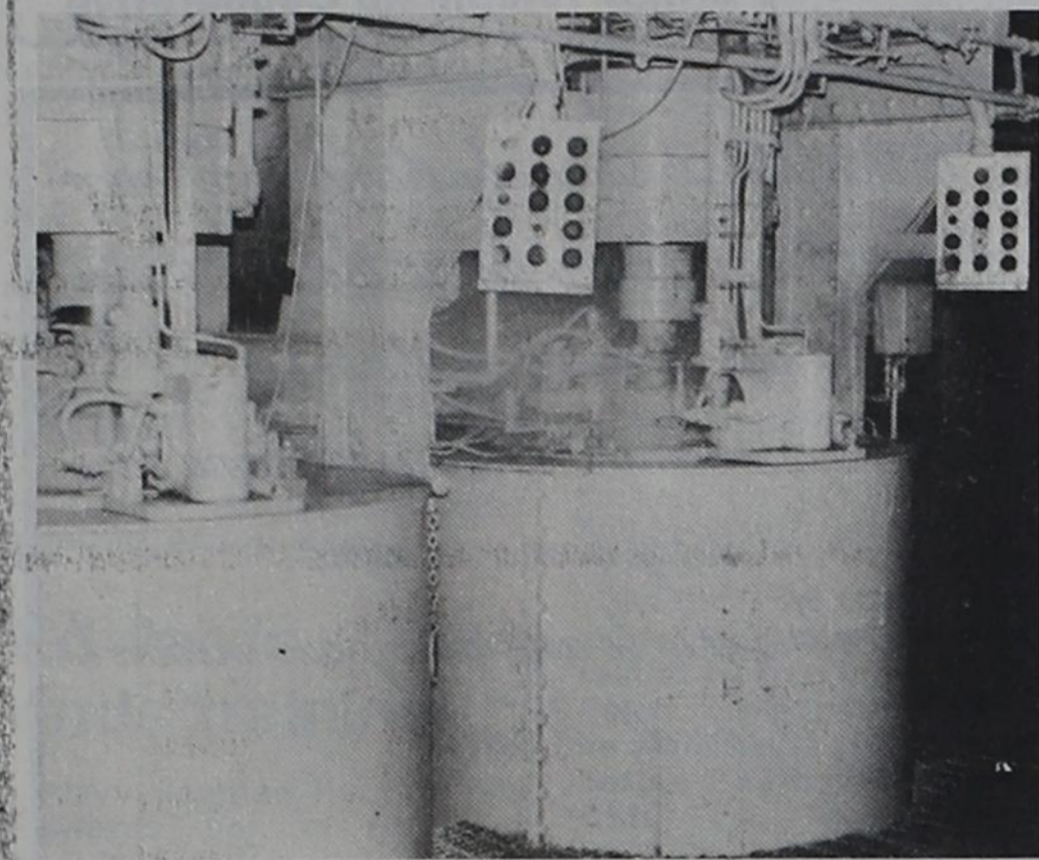
He noted proudly that "This program does not cost the government one cent."



Sugar beet harvest is under way. The long, cool nights encourage the plants to convert starch into sugar.



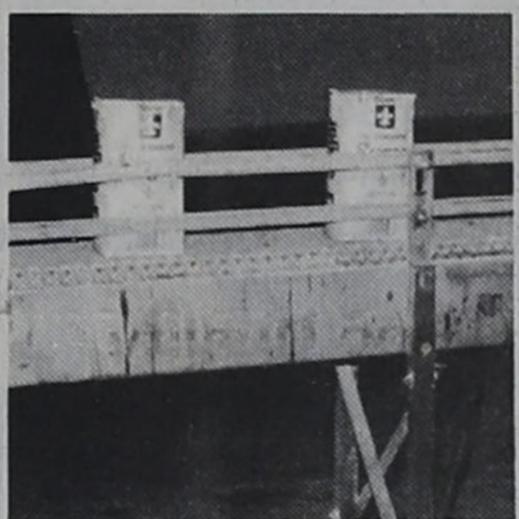
7,000 tons of sugar beets are unloaded each day at the Holly Sugar plant in Hereford. Some of them are grown by local farmers like Vick Christian.

Extra loan \$\$ available

An additional \$1 million loan has been approved by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) to continue the pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan program offered through the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

Irrigators who farm within the Water District's 15-county service area and who wish to upgrade their irrigation equipment for better water application and/or distribution efficiency can finance a part of the cost through this special loan program. Any individual, partnership or corporation farming or owning land within the Water District's 15-county service area may make application for a loan.

Landowners or operators who qualify may borrow up to 75 percent of the purchase price of permanently installed equipment and 50 percent of the cost of contract services, installation and non-recoverable items.

Funds are currently being loaned at a 7.27 percent interest rate, and there is a one-time service fee of 2.5 percent of the amount borrowed to cover administrative costs. Applicants may borrow up to \$100,000. The terms of the loan depend upon the loan amount.

While most of the funds borrowed to date have been used to purchase center pivot sprinkler systems, other equipment, such as surge valves, low pressure drip systems, soil moisture monitoring equipment and underground pipe, may be purchased with the loan proceeds. "The response to the ag loan program has been very positive," says Becca Williams, director of the Administration for the Water District. "Those producers who have taken out loans have honored their commitments and have made their payments. We have not had any problem with late payments," she says.

The pilot water conservation equipment loan program is part of the water package approved by Texas voters in November 1985. Through this program, the state allocated \$5 million to the Texas Water Development Board to make loans at low interest rates to underground water conservation districts and soil and water conservation districts. These Districts, in turn, lend the money to individuals at the same interest rate. The Water District first received funds from the TWDB in May 1986 and has been disbursing them since that time.

The two-year Pilot Ag Loan Program was set to expire in August 1987, but the 70th Texas Legislature extended the program until 1989 for further evaluation. In 1989, a two-thirds majority vote in both Houses will be required to approve a permanent Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program involving the sale of up to \$200 million in bonds.

Defensive players of the game were Scott Miller and Wes Jarman.

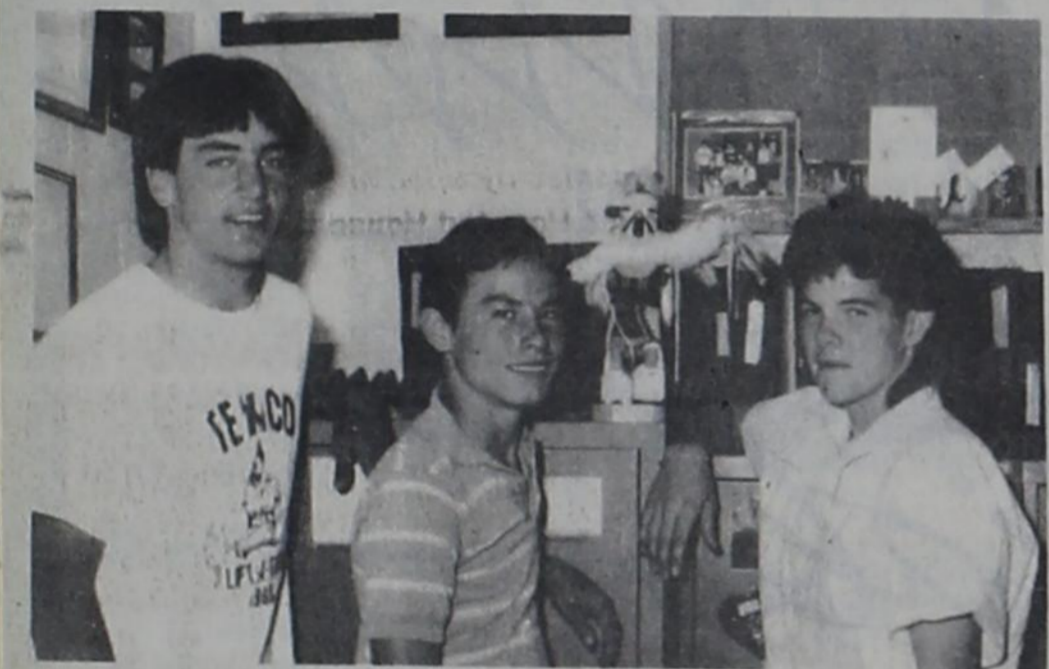

Roberts visits Yellowstone Park

Parmer County Judge and Mrs. Porter Roberts planned their vacation before the forest fires began raging over hundreds of miles of forest and national park land this summer.

Luckily, they missed any direct contact with the fire, but they did see much of the aftermath.

"You could see smoke in the air 100 miles from Yellowstone," said Roberts.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts left Friona on Sept. 3. They drove first to Denver, where they visited Cara Hugly, a physical therapist who had helped Judge Roberts during his seven month stay in St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo a couple of years ago.

The next day they drove to Worland, Wyo., where they visited Sally Bridwell. Mrs. Bridwell's husband was a school chum of Roberts.

From there they went to Yellowstone National Park. The smoke hung in the air for 100 miles before Yellowstone; it was so thick that they had to drive with their headlights on. Breathing was somewhat difficult.

Trees near the park looked like blackened telephone poles

Their leafless limbs were lopped short by the flames. Fallen trunks littered the forest floor.

The couple was in Yellowstone before the worst of the forest fire ravaged the park.

In spite of the fire's pall, they enjoyed watching Old Faithful spout off. They geyser performed on schedule that day.

From Yellowstone they drove east to Cody, Wyoming. In the Bighorn National Forest, they came across an unusual sight. "Between Gray Bull and Sheridan, Wyoming I saw more deer than I've seen in all my life." At one point the Roberts' car had to slow down to a crawl while a doe crossed the road.

In Crazy Horse, Mont., they admired the model of the sculpture of Indian Chief Crazy horse. When the finished model is complete, it will cover most of the 1 1/2 mile-wide Crazy Horse mountain. The model, which is 1/64th the size of the finished project is more than twice as tall as Roberts.

The completed project will be big enough for a 10 story building to stand under the sculpture's arm. 4,000 people could stand on the

outstretched arm.

From there they went to visit Mount Rushmore. "Mount Rushmore doesn't look like much in a picture, but it is very impressive in real life," said Roberts.

From there they went east to Omaha, Neb. to attend the 78th Division Veteran's Association Reunion. More

than 500 vets attended.

Roberts met with 11 members of his combat medic unit from World War II. Some were friends he had not seen since January 1946 when he left Germany. They enjoyed their reunion tremendously.

Ret. Major General John K. Rice, who was the general Roberts served under, played

"God Bless America" on the piano for the group. Rice, is 92 years old.

The Roberts' returned to Friona by way of Oklahoma

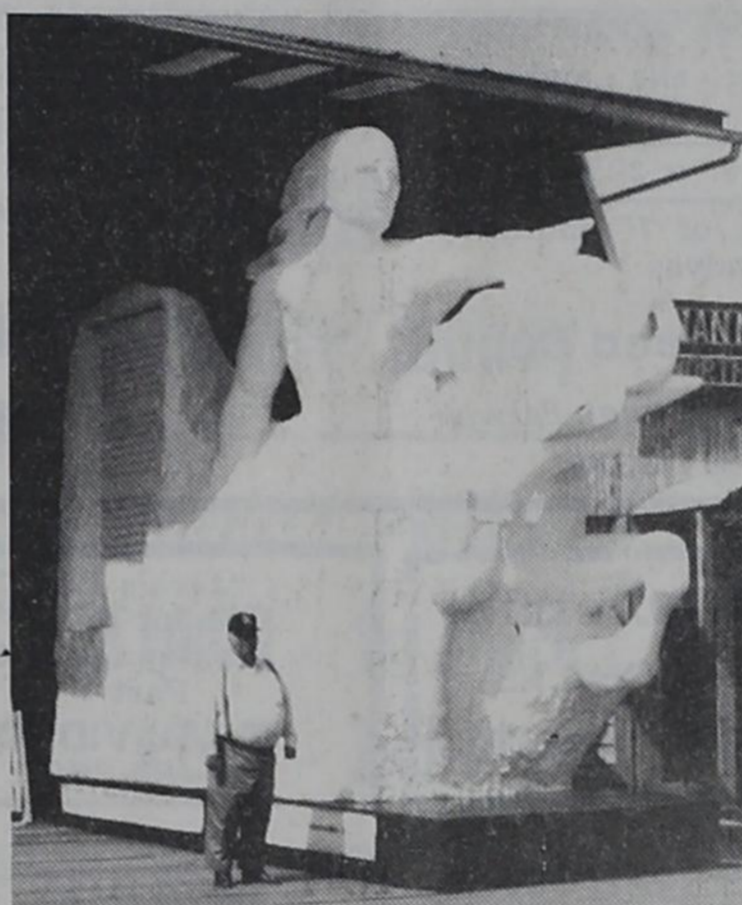
where they visited the Judge's aunt. In the 10 days they were gone, they traveled 3085 miles, visited 9 states, and drove 7 days.
