Good of days recalled

Most of the 11-13 year old children in Eva Dean class at Farwell Junior High School hardly remember the days before microwave ovens were used in their homes.

So they listened in awe as Edwina Owen, Gladys Hardage and Irene Stephens explained what cooking was like in the early days of their marriages

- 50 or more years ago. "How did you learn to cook?" asked Eva Dean Stephens of her guests.

"I stood on an apple box so I would be tall enough to reach the stovetop," said Gladys Hardage. She laughed as she told the class about her disastrous first experience with fry bread. She said that she had stirred the batmake a mess instead of a tion, didn't you?" she said.

Irene Stephens told about making biscuits on an old kerosene stove back in 1935. The kerosene stove did not as hot as the wood burning stove she had learned to cook on as a child. "My biscuits came out about as thick as cookies. I got teased about them for years."

"You take temperature gauges for granted, but we had to learn to by trial and error when the oven was hot enough," said Edwina Owen. She added that she could bake an angel food cake in a

wood stove. She went on to tell the class that when she grew up the farm houses did not have electricity, so they did not

have refrigerators.

"We had a milk trough and a pie safe to keep our food in, and we kept a lot of things in the cellar. We canned most of our food ourselves. We didn't go to town to buy groceries often - maybe once a month.

"We only had soft bread when we went to town, the rest of the time we baked biscuits. When we went to town we would buy things we couldn't make at home, like coffee or tea. Sometimes we would bring home a 50 lb. block of ice so we could make ice cream or snow cones."

Gladys Hardage dipped into a big sack of old time kitchen gadgets that she had brought and showed everyone a device for shaving ice to make snow cones.

"I'll bet you thought snow ter and grease together to cones were a modern inven-

> She also showed the students a solid walnut rolling pin, a butter mold, a chore girl, a device for lifting the lid on an old wooden stove, a sauerkraut chopper, a wrench for a Model T Ford, lemon squeezers, serving devices, strainers for making potato cups, a non- electric curling iron, a tea bag holder, a biscuit cutter, a can opener, a canning jar with a glass lid, porcelain lids for canning jars, and a pie bird.

Some of the items were strange devices that haven't been seen in use in many, many years. Others can be found in gourmet cooking catalogues today. She passed the items around and explained the use of each.





Weed control needed

This has been a good year erosion control." for grass in Parmer County, according to John Fancher of the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

Grass seed production has been very good on one year old and older plantings. The abundant rainfall this summer has really provided excellent conditions for grass growth and development.

"A lot of people believe CRP land should look like a golf course - short grass! A lot of the grass that has been planted such as Kleingrass, a green sprangletop and yellow bluestem, are grasses that can easily be waist tall or higher," Fancher said. "These types of grasses can't be kept short or they will disappear. That will defeat one of the objectives of the CRP program which is

CRP land with weeds that will blow off and cause offsite damage will be shred before frost. "Reluctance to do timely weed control means that grass establishment can be delayed for years. This can translate to money out of your pocket for quite some time," Fancher said. "I have been watching many acres of

CRP land and timely weed

control is the key." There have been seven CRP sign-ups since the beginning of the program. In two sign-ups this year there were 34 new contracts for 4,548.1 acres. The total for Parmer County now stands at 215 contracts for 46,280 acres, of which 37,007 acres have been planted with 9,273 acres to be planted between

1989 and 1990.


Thus the theme of the upcoming National 4-H Week Oct. 2- 8, "4-H for Youth for America," points to this country's richest resource, its young people.

The students enjoyed the pleasure of gathering their own plums, but they quickly learned that picking the bounty of nature is hard work.


When they returned to school, Mrs. Stephens took the plums home and made jelly for the students.





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Safe cotton harvest calls for constant vigilance

In recent years, many incidents have occurred involving cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not very careful. The same pattern exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.


Cotton harvest is here again and the Co-Op urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines!

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and to take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or even death. When you are moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

If some piece of equipment does tontact the 7,200-volt overhead lines, it is important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call the Co-Op office whether or not the line is broken so Co-Op employees can help you.

Remember - it's your life that is at stake!

'Criminal justice system not working'

AUSTIN - More and more people these days share our concern about the state of Texas' criminal justice system, and there is a growing concensus in Texas that changes in the system cannot be delayed.

James Lynaugh, Texas Department of Corrections director, is the latest to voice concerns about the system. Speaking recently to the Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Lynaugh painted a very bleak picture of the existing system.

"The criminal justice system in Texas is not working," Lynaugh told the journalists. "In my opinion, it's broke. We lack an overall goal, and without an overall goal, planning for growth is difficult."

Lynaugh said the symptoms of the system's failure are obvious. Texas prisons are crowded to the breaking point, and a federal court has ruled that crowding unconstitutional. The state is under court order to take no more than 38,900 inmates until prison facilities are expanded.

Because of that, Lynaugh says 95 percent of all TDC inmates will serve less than six years.

Senator Sarpalius Reports

The short-term solutions are obvious, and they are expensive. The state is constructing two 2,250bed TDC facilities, one of which will be in Amarillo. In addition, the state will pay for the construction of four 1,000-bed, mediumsecurity prisons and 12 trusty camps that will house 200 inmates each.

But, Lynaugh says, even more construction will be needed. Lynaugh said he will ask the next Legislature either to fund the construction of 10,000 new prison beds or to divert 10,000 felons into alternative programs.

"We don't have a good solution to the overcrowding problem," he said at the TDNA meeting. "We didn't get into this problem overnight, and we're not going to get out of it overnight."

Lynaugh didn't say what he thought the ultimate solution would be, and that's too bad. Because there is a solution. It won't solve our problems overnight; Lyaugh is right there. But, it will solve our problems in the long run. We refer, of course, to an effective

criminal and juvenile justice system that focuses on deterring people from a life of crime at the earliest possible age. This is the only realistic, effective long-term solution to our prison crowding

Why? Because the only way you can reduce crowding is to reduce the number of inmates going to the prison system. And, the only way you can cut down on inmates is to deter people from a life of crime.

Now, we understand rehabilitation programs have failed miserably in the past, but that's because so many of those programs have focused exclusively on adult criminals. Many adult criminals, frankly, have lived a criminal life too long to be effectively rehabilitated.

What many people don't seem to understand is that an adult doesn't decide one day, "Gee, I'll be a criminal." A person begins a pattern of criminal behavior at a very early age, sometimes before they even have turned 10. The crimes are petty at first, but they grow and become serious late in a person's teen-age years. By the time the person can be tried as an adult, the crimes often have become violent,

The best time to stop that criminal behavior is when a person is young. The pattern isn't ingrained; it hasn't become the only way of life for the defender. We're not saying rehabilitation is hopeless for adults. But, we are saying that it's a lot easier with kids.

As many of you know, we have been working for effective juvenile justice for years. Currently, we chair a select committee that is looking at ways to improve the juvenile justice system. We think we're going to have some good recommendations to make, and we hope the Legislature will implement

Otherwise, Mr. Lynaugh will have to keep asking for more prison







According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Thursday, October 13, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age one baseline mammogram.

2. 40 - 50 years of age a mammogram every 1 - 2 years; depending on breast type and risk factor.

3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.
