Parmer County vote totals announced

Parmer County went along with the national results as most voters cast their ballots for the ticket of George Bush and Dan Quayle.

The GOP duo received 2,061 county votes, to Democrat Michael Dukakis' 764.

In races of special note, the county has a new state senator: Republican Teel Bivins, who handily defeated Democrat Mel Phillips. This post was open when incumbent Bill Sarpalius switched to stage a successful run for a U.S. House of Representatives post.

Parmer County will continue to be represented in the House of Representatives by Republican Larry Combest, who won a big victory over Democrat Gerald McCathern. Late statistics showed Combest with about 67% of the vote.

In the only local contested race, incumbent Pct. 3 county commissioner Robert White turned back a challenge from write-in candidate John Getz, 580 to 194. White won all three precincts: 385 to 124 in Farwell; 114 to 48 in Oklahoma Lane, and 81 to 22 in Lakeview.

Ernest Anthony, county commissioner from Friona, was unopposed and received 530 votes.

Texico voters back Bush over Dukakis

Texico was right along with the rest of the country when it came to deciding between the Presidential candidates.

Texico voters cast 238 ballots for George Bush, and 85 for Michael Dukakis. Countywide, the total was 8,032 for Republican Bush and 3,995 for Democrat Dukakis.

and 109 in Texico.

Vote rescinded on changing streets to 1-way

The Farwell City Council unanimously voted Tuesday to rescind its vote last month to allow some streets around the Farwell schools to be one-way part of the day.

The school board had made the request for safety reasons. At that meeting, the council had voted also to buy the street signs for the changes.

But Mayor Chris Gikas reported Tuesday that the signs and posts needed would be more than \$1,000, more than he had expected.

The council voted to rescind its decision to buy the signs, and also its decision to approve the one-way streets, until it could get more information and take a traffic count. Councilman Martin Welling was asked to talk with School Supt. John Grigsby about it.

Councilman Fred Chandler said one thing that might help the safety aspect is for teachers not to park on the east side of the elementary school but to use the parking lot instead.

In other business, the council:

- Formally approved the building permit application of Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Meyer at 401 First St. The letter for the building they moved onto their property a month ago was accepted last week. The council wanted to have the letter added to the deed but legally this couldn't be done, they were told.

- Was told a carport is being built at a residence near the school system. The council plans to tell the owner to stop construction

until a permit is approved. - Denied an application by Vane Doshier to move a mobile home onto the property behind his business, Twin City Machine Works, at Ave. A and Third Street, because it's not in compliance with the zoning ordinance.

The ordinance, passed in 1957, said that, except for existing structures, no wooden buildings could be placed between Farwell's northern city limits and Ave. B.

It was noted that some mobile homes have been placed within this zone over the years. Chandler said it had been believed that the southern boundary was the alleys between Ave. A and Ave. B. He asked City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen to continue researching city ordinances to see if this ordinance section had been changed. She had checked and couldn't find any revisions thus far. The ordinance may be rewritten.

- Approved an application, pending zoning commission approval, from Mr. and Mrs. Tim Engram to move a house to 505 First St. Neighbors will be checked with.

- Agreed to sell property acquired in a sheriff's sale on block 9. A minimum of \$770 will be asked, which would be equal to sheriff's sale costs, back taxes, etc.

- Approved building permits for brothers Oscar and Carlos Saenz, who share a duplex at 406 7th St. Each plans an addition.

- Denied a permit to allow a fence at the former ASCS building on Ninth Street

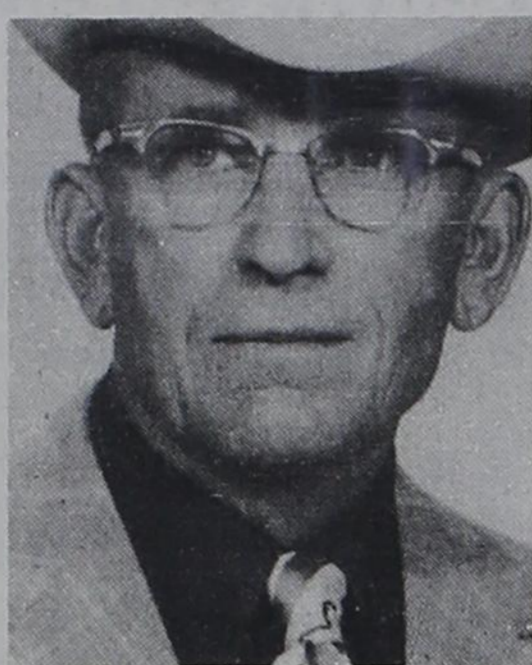
She was a homemaker and member of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church. She was also a member of Farmerette.

Noxious smells reported

Mayor Steve Chancy reported at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting that noxious smells have been detected in City Hall.

Chancy said the smell has caused nausea among

city employees and visitors to City Hall.

He said a gas inspector came to the building but was unable to find the cause.

Chancy said it might be due to the kiln used in the senior citizen's center. It's vented into the attic.

The problem needs to be

solved even if it means removing the kiln, said the mayor. Also mentioned were better ways to vent the kiln.

In other business, the council:

- Received a note from the state that the city has been overpaid \$505. Texico will repay those funds over 12 months, which is acceptable to the state.

- Told Billy Hammit to get telephone bids on burying the electric line and switch line at the Santa Fe well and storage facility. This needs to be done since the railroad tore down the building as part of its overall work.

- Received a request from Sam's Wholesale Club to take out a membership for \$25. The council voted against it.

- Approved a request to help disband the Eastern New Mexico Inter-Community Water Supply Association, a defunct organization. Once it's officially disbanded, some funds will be returned to its member cities. It became inactive several years ago.

because it doesn't conform with the zoning ordinance. It had been requested that the fence be on the property line; the ordinance says it must be 5 feet off the line.

The council was told that the fence already is going up at the site of this planned day care center.

- Met with Eric Davis, Texas Municipal Retirement System representative, on state updates to civil employee pension requirements. The council approved 2 ordinances going along with the changes.

- Received the annual audit from CPA De'Aun Willoughby. In the audit, it was noted that 1987 revenues of \$167,993 had increased to \$172,698 in 1988. At the same time, expenditures were down: from \$139,189 to \$137,093. The ending fund balance was \$255,615, up from \$220,010 in 1987.

Also, in the general fund, Certificates of Deposit for 1988 were \$145,139, up from \$136,182 in 1987.

- Agreed to get a telephone credit card calling number for Wellington.

- Discussed installing a sprinkler system at the sewer plant. More information will be gotten before a decision is made.

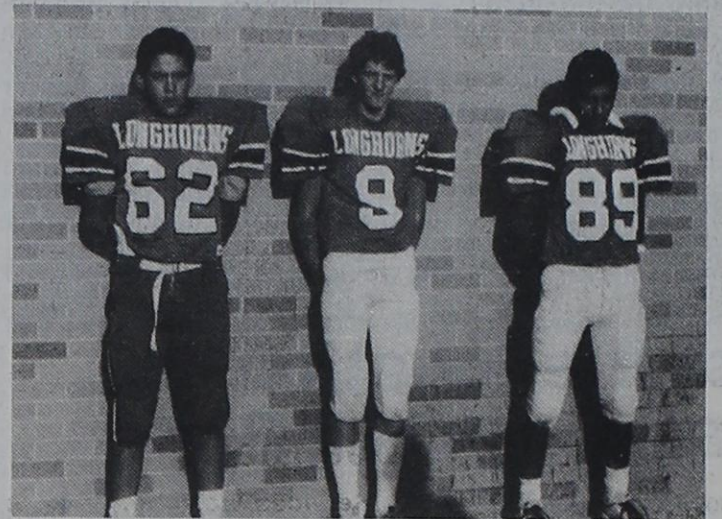

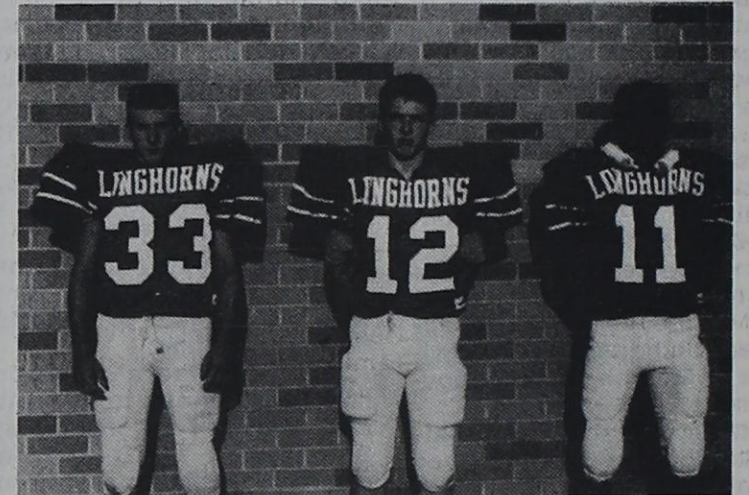

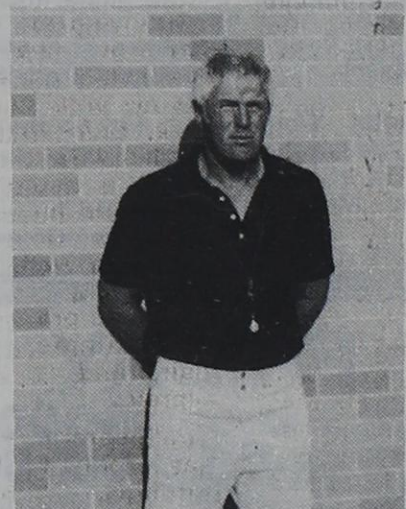

Funds sought for school building addition

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to submit an application for a grant to the Texas Education Agency that would provide funds to build an addition to Farwell Junior High School which would include restrooms equipped for use by handicapped students and a hallway to connect the junior high and cafeteria buildings.

If the application is accepted, the restroom would be built west of the Farwell Junior High, and northeast of the cafeteria.

"The state has earmarked funds to complete 38 projects in the state of Texas to remove architectural barriers for handicapped students, and to provide employment. I think we have a chance to get this money," said Supt. John Grigsby as he made his recommendation to the Board.

The board will find out in February if the grant application is accepted.

The restroom addition is not part of the facilities management plan that the board is considering. No action was taken on that.

The board did vote to replace the ceiling and install two new safety-glass doors in the home economics cottage.

The board also voted to accept the Mission Statement prepared by the faculty of each school. These mission statements will be used to formulate the goals for each campus.

In executive session, the board voted to extend the career ladder to cover two part time employees. They also voted to extend domain VI care of district property.

Athletic director Rex Cumpton reported that basketball season is about to begin. This year there will be both 7th and 8th grade teams for both boys and girls in the junior high. These teams will play every week.

"Boys will play away one week, girls will go another. If

we tried to play four away games each time, we wouldn't get home until very late," Cumpton explained.

Cumpton also reported that Dickie Sosa had represented Farwell in the Regional Cross Country Meet where he finished 24th.

Cafeteria director Linda Moss reported that the old icemaker had broken, and a new one has been purchased for the school. She also reported that the number of students eating breakfast at school is increasing.

Maintenance director Randy Grady reported that he had attended a roof maintenance and a preventive maintenance workshop in Austin on Oct. 14 and 15.

Grady also reported that he had gotten two bids for the enclosure of bleachers, but was waiting to hear from a third firm before the board takes action on it.

Grady said he had received stitches in the head on Nov. 3 after an accident at work. A fluorescent light broke while he was changing it, causing glass to cut his scalp.

Transportation director Joe Stanton said a school bus was involved in an accident about three weeks ago. He said that no one was injured when a bus collided with cattle on a country road. He was able to replace the fender.

Stanton also reported that the school system will receive a new school bus by April 28.

Principals David Reynolds and Jerry Owen reported on enrollment and attendance during the month of October. Both were pleased with the results.

Owen reported that the eighth grade had visited the Discovery Center in Amarillo on Nov. 7. They saw two educational films, "Genesis" and "The Coral Reef" in the

Omni Theatre there. The group also visited the Amarillo Globe News.

"It was really a pleasure to go on this trip," said Owen. Supt. John Grigsby read a report from James Craig that attendance was up in the elementary school.

The board received a request from the Friona School Board asking it to join with the Friona folks to seek some of the county school funds from the Parmer County Commissioners.

The commissioners have denied this request for the state funds by Friona in the past. The commissioners believe the funds should only be used in an emergency.

No decision was made by the Farwell board. Grigsby gave an updated report on the status of the Corporate Risk Counselors bankruptcy case. Farwell and 209 other school districts in the state were covered by the CRC for health insurance coverage. They are all being sued by the lawyer and trustee appointed by the bankruptcy court for the claims outstanding against CRC. The suit, which is expected to be long and complicated, will be monitored as it progresses.

The school system has since gotten insurance coverage under another company.

After executive session, Grigsby reported that several high school students have been identified as "at risk" pupils. The school is working to help these students do their best, and stay in school.

Adult education classes enroll 35

About 35 people are enrolled in adult education classes at Farwell High School this year. The classes in Farwell are fully accredited to count toward the federal government's immigration amnesty program.

Federal government officials expect about 1.5 million of the 1.8 million non-agricultural workers who applied for amnesty under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 to apply for permanent residency. One of the requirements for permanent residency is that the applicant demonstrate a knowledge of English and U. S. government.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service released its guidelines for the civics classes only about two weeks ago. Farwell adult education teacher Lucille Franse is sure that the school program meets the guidelines.

She gave the Tribune the information for this article.

Amnesty recipients who apply for permanent residency must either take a 60 hour course from an INS certified school or pass an oral and written examination similar to the citizenship test given to permanent residents who entered the country legally.

Amnesty recipients can work and receive temporary U. S. residency for 31 months. If they fail to apply for permanent residency at that time, they are subject to deportation at that time.

After five years of permanent residency, immigrants can apply for citizenship. Spouses of U. S. citizens can apply for citizenship after three years.



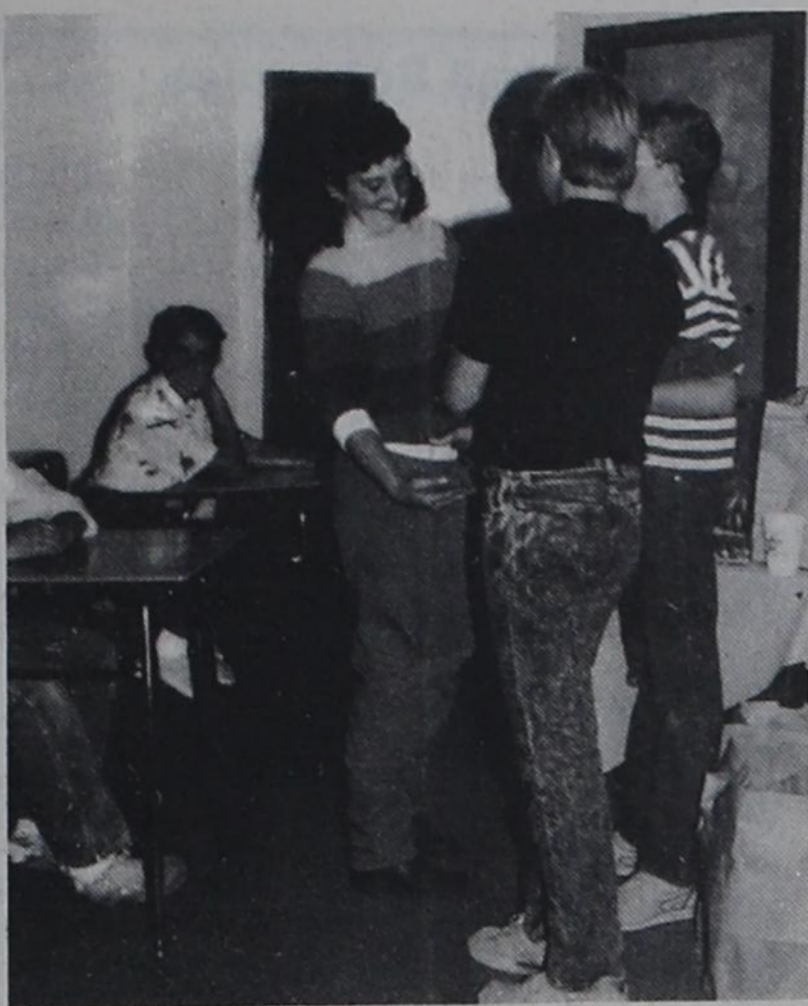

Lazbuddie was the top area six-man team on both offense and defense, according to the Lubbock newspaper.

On offense, the Longhorns had 1,660 rushing yards and 2,546 passing yards for a total of 4,206, an average of 420.6 yards per game. And almost all their games were cut short due to the 45-point rule.

On defense, Lazbuddie permitted 1,840 yards, an average of 184 yards per game.

Among the passing leaders, Michael Williams, Longhorn quarterback, was ranked 1st. He hit 103 of 186 attempts for 2,232 yards and 38 TD's. He threw 10 interceptions. He averaged 223.2 yards a game.

Among top area receivers, Brian Glover was 7th, gathering in 26 passes for 324 yards and 6 TD's. Wes Jarman was 8th, with 25 catches for 634 yards and 14 TD's.

In the scoring column, Glover ranked 9th with 114 points.

Steers lose finale to Hale Center

It was yet another close loss for the Farwell Steers last Friday night when they lost to Hale Center in an away game, 6-0.

It ended Farwell's season at 5-5 overall and 0-5 in district. The five district losses were by a total of 24 points.

Injuries played a part in the season which saw the Steers break out to a 5-0 mark, then fall in their last 5 games. Jeff Actkinson, mentioned for all-state honors, who doubled at linebacker and fullback, went out early due to a knee injury. Also injured were starting linemen David Price and Bruce White. And halfback Shawn Stewart was injured in the final game.

Coach Rex Cumpton tried a different tactic in the final game when he started Jaime Mendoza, a linebacker, at fullback.

Michael Arce returned the opening kickoff to the Farwell 36 and Mendoza gained 6 yards on his first carry. Farwell was held and punted to

the Owl 30. During the defensive series, Darren Haseloff made a strong tackle.

Farwell recovered a fumble on its 37 but was forced to punt. Farwell recovered another fumble on the Owl 27 but coughed the ball up on the next play.

Tony Nicolas partially tipped the Owl punt and Farwell got the ball on the Hale Center 42. Farwell was stopped and the Owls completed a 50-yard pass play to the Steer 10. Shawn Stewart intercepted a pass in the end zone to end the threat as the first quarter drew to a close.

The Steers had some bad luck in the second quarter when an apparent 69-yard TD run by Stewart was nullified due to a penalty.

After a possession exchange Curtis Chisom recovered an Owl fumble on the Steer 48. A good run by Arce brought the ball to the Owl 36 but Farwell lost a fumble on the 33.

With 3:45 left in the half, the Steers took over at their own 21. Moving the ball on the ground, Farwell got to the Owl 1 yard line before time ran out in the half.

In the third quarter, an Owl

runner raced 48 yards to the Farwell 32. The Owls got to the Farwell 1 before a 6-yard loss forced them to try a field goal. The 16-yard attempt was wide left and the score remained at 0-0.

Neither team could move the ball in the rest of this quarter. Kyle Stancell had a quarterback sack while on defense.

But at 10:49 of the final period, Hale Center moved in for a TD. The kick failed.

Farwell fought back behind runs by Mendoza, Arce and Monte Delgado. The Steers drove to the Owl 15 before a 15-yard penalty stopped them.

"We've been so close this year; in the last 5 ball games we've lost by a combined total of 25 points - less than one TD per game," said coach Rex Cumpton.

"We made some mental mistakes - one TD was called back, and we had a clipping penalty. We've just got to learn to eliminate the mental mistakes," said Cumpton. "Defensively, we played pretty well but we just sputtered along on offense.

"Next year all of our offensive backs will be back, and four of our six linemen should be back," said Cumpton.

Farwell had 142 yards rushing, 40 yards passing with 6/15 completed, 10 first

downs, and 6 penalties for a loss of 60 yards. The Steers punted 4 times for a 30 yard average gain.

Their opponent had 165 yards rushing, 57 yards passing with 2/5 completed, 11 first downs, 1 penalty for a loss of 5 yards. They punted 3 times for an average of 23 yards gained.

Shawn Stewart carried 8 times for 33 yards. He also caught 2 passes for 17 yards.

Jaime Mendoza carried 17 times for 78 yards.

Monty Delgado carried 4 times for 7 yards, and caught 2 for 12 yards.

Michael Arce carried 4 times for 31 yards and caught 1 for 7 yards.

For the season, Farwell was rated as the No. 2 team on defense in area Class 2A action, according to the Lubbock newspaper. Farwell permitted 168.9 yards a game, just behind Seagraves at 167.8.

On offense, Farwell finished 8th, with 259.8 yards per game.

Greg Actkinson was listed as 6th among area passers, with 70.5 yards a game. He hit 58 of 160 passes with 4 interceptions. Overall he gained 705 yards and 6 TD's.

Darren Haseloff was listed as 3rd among area receivers. He hauled in 21 passes for 309 yards. Shawn Stewart was ranked 5th, with 19 completions for 253 yards.

In the scoring derby, Stewart was 5th, with 13 TD's and 3 extra points. Overall, he had 81 points.

Yearlings defeated

The Farwell Junior High Yearlings ended their season without a victory this year. They lost their final game to Hale Center, 32-6. The Yearlings' TD was scored by Lupito Garza.

"This was our worst game," said coach Kendall Devault.

Looking ahead to the basketball season, coach Kendall Devault noted that Farwell Junior High will have two teams this year. The seventh grade team will be small - 9 players, but they will still play a schedule.

The teams will play on Mondays at 5 p.m. If the two boys teams play at home, the two girls teams will travel each week.

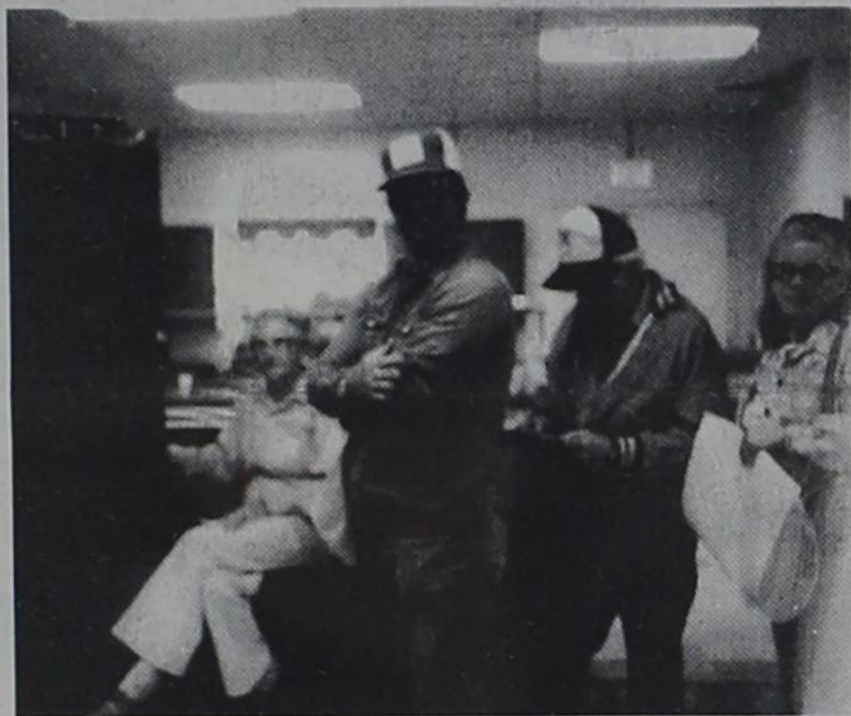
Reception set

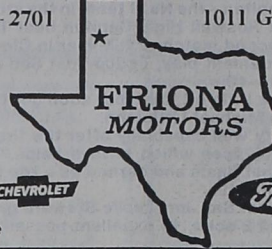

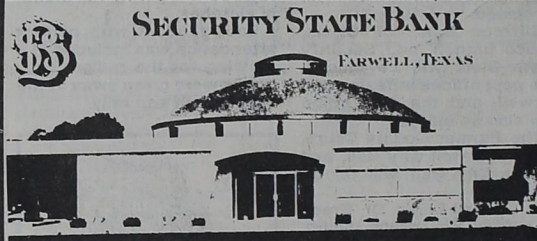
