Bridge is a game that doesn't seem to be attracting the attention of younger

Back when I was in college, I picked up the game and really enjoyed it. I played it for a few years, then dropped it after starting my Army years.

So when I went back to it last year, after a 20-plus year layoff, it was with some trepidation. But I'm sure glad I did.

Bridge is the trickiest card game there is, in my opinion. Because not only do you have to figure out where the cards lay, and how to play them, but you have to arrive at "contracts" with a partner. As anyone who is married knows, working gracefully with a partner isn't always the easiest thing there

The problem is that it's very, very easy to miscue. And you can be sure that your partner will always be quick to point out your slight errors - or massive blunders, in his

opinion. Anyway, I started playing again last year at the club in Clovis. I just wandered in one night, looking for a partner. There wasn't any, but the fella running the club was kind enough to call me back in a few days, after finding a partner for me for the next weekly game.

I was hooked. At first, I was able to explain away my slight errors (re: "blunders") with a simple "it's been years since I've played, etc ... " That line became more and more difficult to use after several months of active participation. That was

okay: I still used it. Then last fall, I made arrangements with a Clovis fella (retired Air Force, now works for the Postal Service) to form a partnership on a

regular basis. There are three parts to bridge: bidding contracts, playing offense and playing defense. If you are weak in any of the three, you cannot compete well. Bidding is my weakness and I have been studying it like a college credit course. Thankfully, although my partner is eons ahead of me in bidding, he is kindly seeing me though my schooling.

I've put myself on a 4year plan to become a decent player. Whether I can achieve my goal remains to be seen. Since I'm just in the novice stage, it's like a roller coaster: one week you can do great, the next week it's the pits. Consistency is the hallmark of a good player. That's true of any sport.

Last weekend, my partner and I went to Lubbock for a two-day competition. Also coming from Farwell were Dickie Chandler and Jerri Meeks.

On the first day, it was just regular open competition: we did so-so. But on the second day it was "Swiss teams." This is where two partnerships team up. We were teamed with two ladies from Hereford, and had a fine day. No, we didn't come close to winning, but enjoyed the game. After all, bridge, like any other game, is for fun (try telling that to an avid golfer...).

If any of you young folks in the Twin Cities are interested in learning the game, just give me a holler. I'll be glad to explain the fundamentals and tell you where to order the

basic learning books. Bridge is a fun hobby that you can play your whole life. I like golf for that reason, too. I'll always remember reading a quote from comedian Bob Hope on why he enjoyed golf so much, although he was in his 80s. He asked what other sports you could play at that

Farwell to seek school funds

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to join Friona in petitioning the Parmer County Commissioners for the release of Permanent School Fund money.

Currently, Parmer County is one of a handful of counties in the state which has a permanent school fund controlled by the County Com-

The fund contains nearly And Cooper said the city \$1 million. Each year the four should have the "Welcome to school districts in the county New Mexico" sign placed at receive a check for their prorated portion of the interest on the account. In recent years, Farwell has been receiving about \$12,000 per year from the fund.

> Last year Friona requested the release of the principal because they need to build new classrooms. They were told by the County Commissioners that fund is there for emergencies only, such as if a major fire occurs.

Friona will try again this year to get some of the money. Its School Board last month asked Farwell to join with it.

Farwell decided to join them this year because they need four new elementary classrooms. Their portion of the principal of that fund is roughly \$180,000.

In other business, the board: - Heard Supt. John Grigsby say Farwell's average daily attendance is 463 students.

There are 3 elementary classes which are dangerously near the 1-22 teacher pupil ratio. The state of Texas has mandated that classes that go above the 1- 22 ratio may be given a waiver for one semester, but they must be split the following semester so that the low teacher- pupil ratio is maintained.

At one point this fall one of the elementary classes had been above the 1-22 ratio. This is the reason why the school board is looking into funding for more classrooms. The board had planned to request a waiver for this class, but it was no longer necessary when one student moved. They tabled the waiver that they were going to vote upon.

- Extended the contract of Grigsby through 1991, and appointed a committee of Steve Pierson, Roberta Johnson and Joe Schilling to review employee salaries (superintendent on down) before decisions are made in May.

- The staff of Farwell Junior High attended the meeting to receive a Certificate of Achievement from the State Board of Education for recognition of their students' outstanding performance on the TEAMS test last year.

The School Board added a letter of recognition to the staff. Its letter said in part: "The certificate recognizes

the Junior High for high achievement of all students in the 1987-89 7th grade on the TEAMS Exam (current 8th grade class).

"This certificate represents a great deal of effort and hard

work, not only by the junior high staff, but by all those teachers in grades K-6 who worked with these students before 1987-88.

"On behalf of the Board of Education, we wish to express our appreciation to all of those students, staff and parents for their commitment to educational excellence."

- Changed the February

lar activities. - Approved a report from principal David Reynolds which covered the schools. stated that there is a lot of interest among Farwell students for adding volleyball and baseball. The board will now look into costs and scheduling problems.

- Discussed needed maintenance and repair work.

- Approved Grigsby's request to attend a weeklong workshop on strategic planning.

- Tabled the annual Performance Report until corrections are made in the information which came from the state.

- Heard a report from Principal Jerry D. Owen on the successes of the Lions Quest program.

- Heard a second report from Owen on the school system's insurance situation. So far this year, the school system has has had a complex

series of insurance problems. They were covered by the C.R.C. which went bankrupt. Then they failed to get cov-

erage through a supplemental program because too few employees joined it. Then they signed up with Diamond Mutual which went into bankruptcy. They are being picked up by American Underwriters during the interim, and are looking at Boston Mu-

tual for coverage. Farwell is only one of over 200 school systems in the state of Texas to have problems due to the failure of the insurance corporation which

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
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Lady Wolverines stun No. 1-ranked Floyd
