## Want to learn?

Bridge is a game that doesn't seem to be attracting the attention of younger folks.

Back when I was in college, I picked up the game and really enjoyed it. I played it for a few years, then dropped it after starting my Army years.

So when I went back to it last year, after a 20-plus year layoff, it was with some trepidation. But I'm sure glad I did.

Bridge is the trickiest card game there is, in my opinion. Because not only do you have to figure out where the cards lay, and how to play them, but you have to arrive at "contracts" with a partner. As anyone who is married knows, working gracefully with a partner isn't always the easiest thing there is.

The problem is that it's very, very easy to miscue. And you can be sure that your partner will always be quick to point out your slight errors - or massive blunders, in his opinion.

Anyway, I started playing again last year at the club in Clovis. I just wandered in one night, looking for a partner. There wasn't any, but the fella running the club was kind enough to call me back in a few days, after finding a partner for me for the next weekly game.

I was hooked. At first, I was able to explain away my slight errors (re: "blunders") with a simple "it's been years since I've played, etc..." That line became more and more difficult to use after several months of active participation. That was okay: I still used it.

Then last fall, I made arrangements with a Clovis fella (retired Air Force, now works for the Postal Service) to form a partnership on a regular basis.

There are three parts to bridge: bidding contracts, playing offense and playing defense. If you are weak in any of the three, you cannot compete well. Bidding is my weakness and I have been studying it like a college credit course. Thankfully, although my partner is eons ahead of me in bidding, he is kindly seeing me through my schooling.

I've put myself on a 4-year plan to become a decent player. Whether I can achieve my goal remains to be seen. Since I'm just in the novice stage, it's like a roller coaster: one week you can do great, the next week it's the pits. Consistency is the hallmark of a good player. That's true of any sport.

Last weekend, my partner and I went to Lubbock for a two-day competition. Also coming from Farwell were Dickie Chandler and Jerri Meeks.

On the first day, it was just regular open competition: we did so-so. But on the second day it was "Swiss teams." This is where two partnerships team up. We were teamed with two ladies from Hereford, and had a fine day. No, we didn't come close to winning, but enjoyed the game. After all, bridge, like any other game, is for fun (try telling that to an avid golfer...).

If any of you young folks in the Twin Cities are interested in learning the game, just give me a holler. I'll be glad to explain the fundamentals and tell you where to order the basic learning books.

Bridge is a fun hobby that you can play your whole life. I like golf for that reason, too. I'll always remember reading a quote from comedian Bob Hope on why he enjoyed golf so much, although he was in his 80s. He asked what other sports you could play at that age.

## Community center work scheduled

Lewis Cooper, representing the Texico Chamber of Commerce, suggested to the Texico City Council Tuesday that the two groups cooperate on fixing up the community center building.

The building's east wall has a severe moisture problem (see Texico Chamber of Commerce story elsewhere in this issue) and other work is needed: paneling, new tiles, etc.

The council was receptive to Cooper's idea and said the city would do all it can to help.

Cooper said Steve Meeks was willing to ramrod the project with volunteer labor, for the most part. Hopefully, the Chamber and city would fund the project, along with getting some donations from citizens. But first, Cooper and Meeks will draw up a floor plan and present it to the council.

## Chamber supports scholarship fund

The Texico Chamber of Commerce voted Monday to contribute another \$100 to the Bill Christian Scholarship Fund.

Christian was a prominent Texico civic leader who was active in Chamber affairs. He died last year.

Donations for the fund are being accepted at the Citizens Bank branch in Texico.

In other business, the Chamber:

- Agreed to change its meeting nights to the third Monday of each month.

- Discussed the need to fix up the community center. Lewis Cooper, on behalf of

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he knew someone who could fix the east wall and he will check into the cost.

Also, Cooper suggested that the city push the state into cleaning up the highway in Texico. Councilman Bryan Kube will check on that.

And Cooper said the city should have the "Welcome to New Mexico" sign placed at the state line, instead of its current location on the west side of the community.

In other business, the council:

- Okayed spending \$505 to buy a power booster for the city computer system.

- Learned that the cable company serving Texico is being sold but no changes will occur as far as Texico is concerned.

- Approved an initial application for state funds for a cooperative program with the city for repairing streets.

- Will talk to the City Council about removing empty posts on street corners.

- Noted that several Texico, Clovis and Muleshoe belt buckles are still available. Persons wanting to buy them should call Ann Cooper.

- Discussed possible speakers for the annual Chamber banquet.

## Pierce hired as Texico counselor

Tuesday, the Texico School Board hired Dewey Pierce to fill the position vacated by the resignation of James Harding as Texico High School counselor.

Pierce has been an assistant principal in Clovis, and he will join the Texico staff as soon as he gives notice and leaves his current position.

In other business, the board voted to install fluorescent lights in the high school.

They amended the current bus contract with Max and Pat Carter because the Carters have incorporated their service under the name "To and From Bus Corporation." The change needed to be noted on all of the contracts between the board and the school corporation.

The board also voted to join "Health Net," a program to encourage health awareness for faculty and staff. The Health Net personnel will monitor blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar for the interested personnel. They will also offer coun-

seling on diet, exercise, and other good health habits.

"We hope to encourage good health awareness," said Supt. James Pierce. "We don't have any serious problems with absenteeism with our faculty or staff, but we want to help everyone to keep healthy."

Banks and federal government offices and the post offices will be closed because of the holiday. Most other offices will be open.

## Farwell to seek school funds

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to join Friona in petitioning the Parmer County Commissioners for the release of Permanent School Fund money.

Currently, Parmer County is one of a handful of counties in the state which has a permanent school fund controlled by the County Commission.

The fund contains nearly \$1 million. Each year the four school districts in the county receive a check for their prorated portion of the interest on the account. In recent years, Farwell has been receiving about \$12,000 per year from the fund.

Last year Friona requested the release of the principal because they need to build new classrooms. They were told by the County Commissioners that fund is there for emergencies only, such as if a major fire occurs.

Friona will try again this year to get some of the money. Its School Board last month asked Farwell to join with it.

Farwell decided to join them this year because they need four new elementary classrooms. Their portion of the principal of that fund is roughly \$180,000.

In other business, the board:

- Heard Supt. John Grigsby say Farwell's average daily attendance is 463 students.

There are 3 elementary classes which are dangerously near the 1-22 teacher pupil ratio. The state of Texas has mandated that classes that go above the 1-22 ratio may be given a waiver for one semester, but they must be split the following semester so that the low teacher-pupil ratio is maintained.

At one point this fall one of the elementary classes had been above the 1-22 ratio. This is the reason why the school board is looking into funding for more classrooms. The board had planned to request a waiver for this class, but it was no longer necessary when one student moved. They tabled the waiver that they were going to vote upon.

- Extended the contract of Grigsby through 1991, and appointed a committee of Steve Pierson, Roberta Johnson and Joe Schilling to review employee salaries (superintendent on down) before decisions are made in May.

- The staff of Farwell Junior High attended the meeting to receive a Certificate of Achievement from the State Board of Education for recognition of their students' outstanding performance on the TEAMS test last year.

The School Board added a letter of recognition to the staff. Its letter said in part:

"The certificate recognizes the Junior High for high achievement of all students in the 1987-89 7th grade on the TEAMS Exam (current 8th grade class).

"This certificate represents a great deal of effort and hard

work, not only by the junior high staff, but by all those teachers in grades K-6 who worked with these students before 1987-88.

"On behalf of the Board of Education, we wish to express our appreciation to all of those students, staff and parents for their commitment to educational excellence."

- Approved the 1987-88 audit report presented by De'Aun Willoughby, C.P.A.

- Changed the February meeting to Feb. 9 due to a scheduling conflict.

- Called a special meeting for Jan. 26 to discuss insurance coverage and the facilities management plan.

- Approved a new policy regarding student tryouts and participation in extracurricular activities.

- Approved a report from principal David Reynolds which stated that there is a lot of interest among Farwell students for adding volleyball and baseball. The board will now look into costs and scheduling problems.

- Discussed needed maintenance and repair work.

- Approved Grigsby's request to attend a weeklong workshop on strategic planning.

- Tabled the annual Performance Report until corrections are made in the information which came from the state.

- Heard a report from Principal Jerry D. Owen on the successes of the Lions Quest program.

- Heard a second report from Owen on the school system's insurance situation. So far this year, the school system has had a complex series of insurance problems. They were covered by the C.R.C. which went bankrupt. Then they failed to get cov-

erage through a supplemental program because too few employees joined it. Then they signed up with Diamond Mutual which went into bankruptcy. They are being picked up by American Underwriters during the interim, and are looking at Boston Mutual for coverage.

Farwell is only one of over 200 school systems in the state of Texas to have problems due to the failure of the insurance corporation which covered the schools.

"This is the No. 1 morale problem among staff members," said Owen.

- Heard a report from transportation director Joe Stanton that the buried gasoline tanks will have to be tested this year and eventually removed due to EPA regulations.

Stanton also reported that he has been seeking information on the height of the new school bus which has been ordered. He wanted to make sure that there would be sufficient clearance.

- Heard a report from Randy Grady that the ceilings had been repaired and the windows replaced in the Home Economics Cottage.

- Grady will attend a copier repair school in Clovis.

- Heard reports from Linda Moss about the cafeteria and from Gwen Corn on several curriculum meetings and planning sessions which have been held.

## Council moves on junked vehicles

The Farwell City Council Tuesday moved ahead on its project of clearing abandoned and junked cars from city streets.

Last year, the council sent certified letters to owners of such vehicles that were identified, noting city ordinances. Several vehicles were then removed.

The names of owners of vehicles violating the city ordinance and haven't been removed yet are being turned over to the city attorney for further action.

In other business, the council:

- Received two bids for the annual city insurance contract, from Town & Country Insurance and Henry Insurance. Town & Country was the low bidder at \$11,610, and it was accepted.

- Discussed street repairs and the possibility that the city could do some of the repairs itself. Texico's City Council also has been investigating this. Mayor Chris Gikas said he will talk with Texico Mayor Steve Chancy about it.

# Lady Wolverines stun No. 1-ranked Floyd

Floyd planned to stop Texico by boxing in Andria Chadwick. She was only able to score 6 points in the game, but Jennifer Williams came through on the other side and scored 18 points.

"Jennifer Gentry played very well," said King. Gentry scored 22 points. She had 7 rebounds, and 4 steals.

Tracey Askew and Jennifer Williams each scored 18 points. Askew had 6 rebounds, and 3 steals. Williams had 9 assists, 3 steals, and 1 rebound.

Andria Chadwick had 9 assists, 1 steal, and 9 rebounds in the game.

Leslie Steward had 4 points in the game. She had 6 assists, 4 steals, and 2 rebounds.





Entry cards and fees must be returned to the Friona Agricultural Department, Box 97, Friona, by Jan. 23.


