Lazbuddie Elementary won the District UIL Literary and Academic competition, despite being the smallest school in its contest. Students

The junior high team placed 3rd, with 26 students placing high school level, 5 students placed in the upper academic positions and one went on to plagional.
The no-pass, no-play rule had a negligible effect at the
high school, but did impact at the junir high school, but did impact at the junior high level. Almos
no students at the high school were ineligible but 5 percen no students at the high school were ineligible, but 5 percent
