I believe that both our city zoning ordinances should be reviewed and toughened. Farwell's seems to be a bit stricter than Texico's but still needs work. Texico's is very, very loose. ***

Over the coming months, you will have the opportunity to read lots of stories about a really dry topic - landfills.

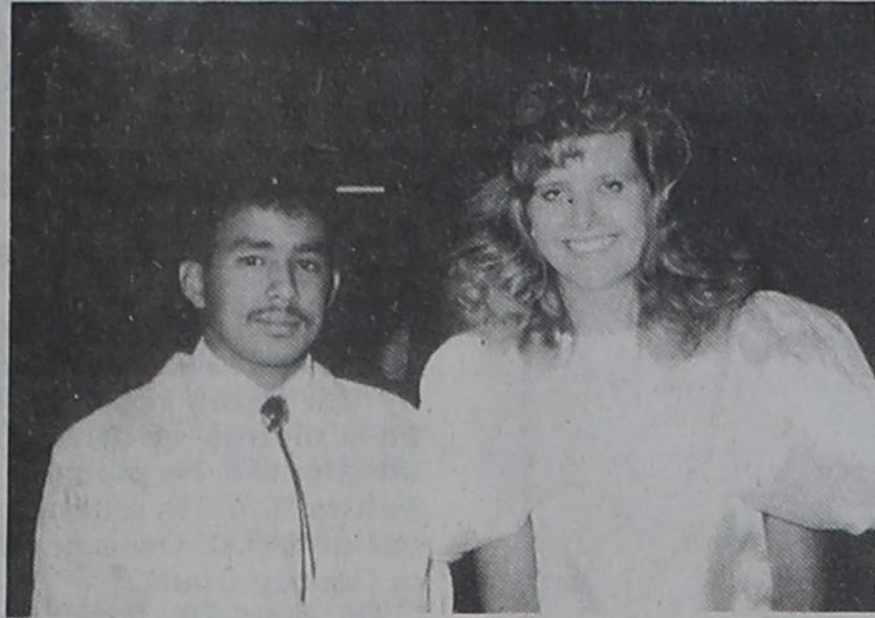
You will read what Farwell is doing, what Texico is doing, what Curry County is doing, what Bovina is doing, what Friona is doing and what Parmer County is doing.

My heart pounded and filled with joy,

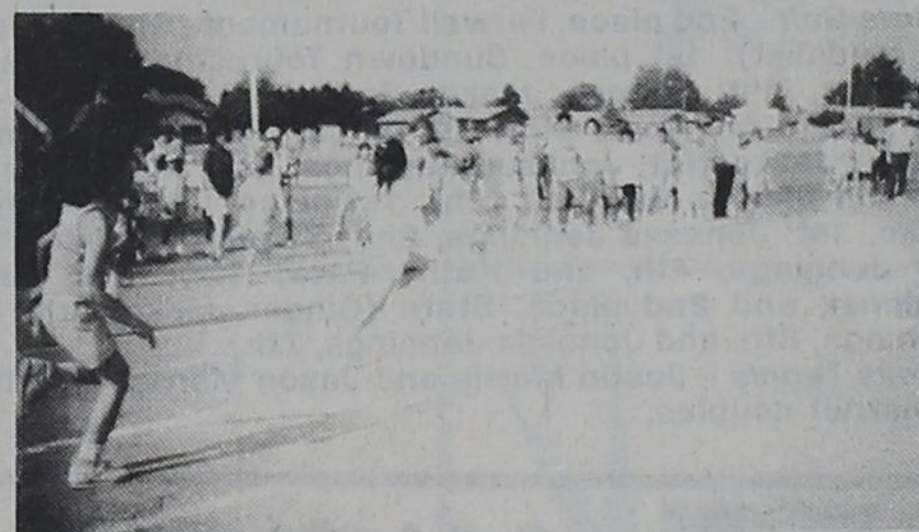
That used to belong to a deserving boy. ***

Carlyle remembered

A fourth memorial scholarship has been established at Lazbuddie School to honor Howard Harding Carlyle, who died last year.

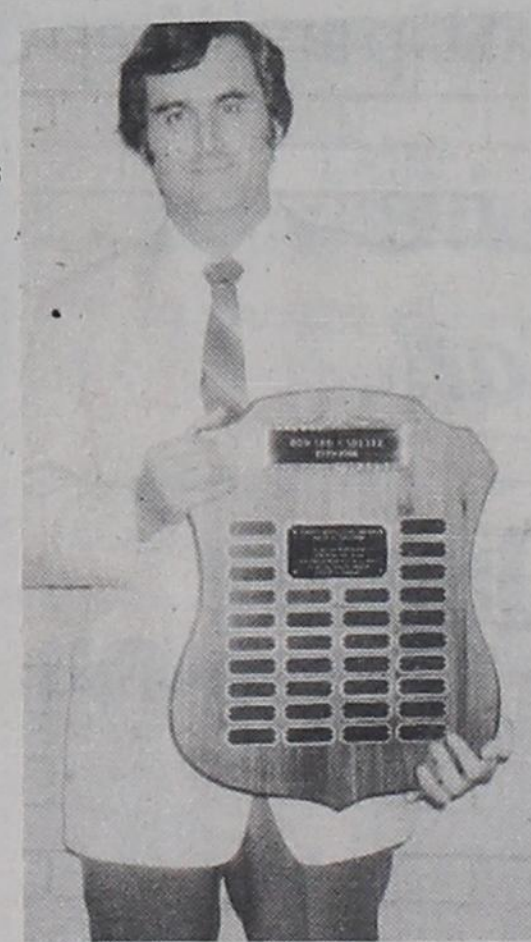
Carlyle was raised in Muleshoe and lived there most of his life. He was counselor for Lazbuddie, Farwell and Bovina schools from 1975 - 1988.

Carlyle graduated from Texas Tech in 1960 and received his master's degree in guidance and counseling at New Mexico State University in 1965. From 1960 on, educating young people was a major focus of his life. His family and friends decided a memorial scholarship in his name would help continue that tradition.

Trustees have been set up for the memorial scholarship fund, being administered through Lazbuddie School and a Board of Trustees. The scholarship is a perpetuating fund and scholarships will be awarded according to the amount in the fund at the time.

The presentation of the scholarship will be at Lazbuddie commencement exercises. Applicants are to be chosen on the basis of character, citizenship, need, overall academic grade average and fu-

Hospital district to be explained

A meeting to discuss the proposed Muleshoe Hospital that would be supported by tax funds has been called for 7:30 p.m. June 12 at Lazbuddie School.

Darrell Jennings of Lazbuddie, a member of the temporary hospital board, and other board members will be on hand to answer questions.

If the hospital district is established, it would include most of the northern two-thirds of Bailey County and portions of the southern part of Parmer County close to Muleshoe.

The proposition, which will be voted on June 20, calls for the district's annual maximum property tax rate be 25 cents.

The maximum rates in both districts (Bailey County and Parmer County) could be raised by voter approval, but in neither case could that exceed 75 cents per \$100 of property value.

The vote by Lazbuddie voters will be considered separate from the Bailey County vote. In other words, if Parmer County voters turn down the district, they will not be included in it if Bailey County voters approve it.

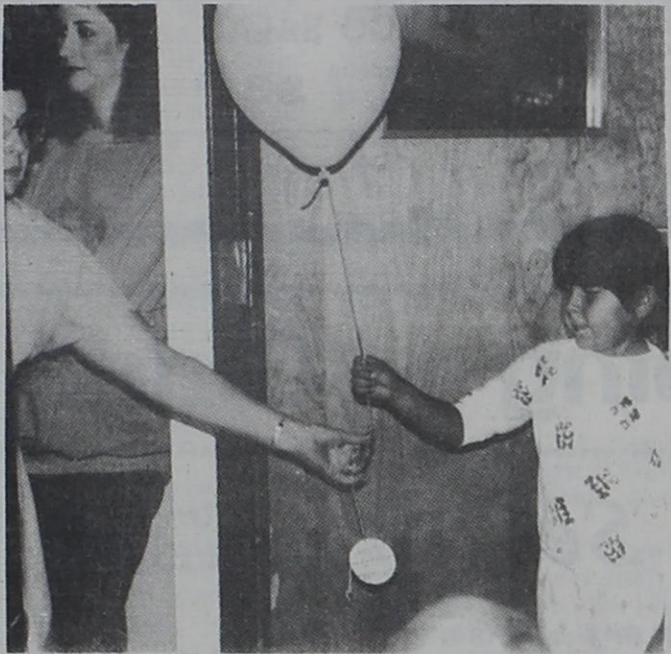

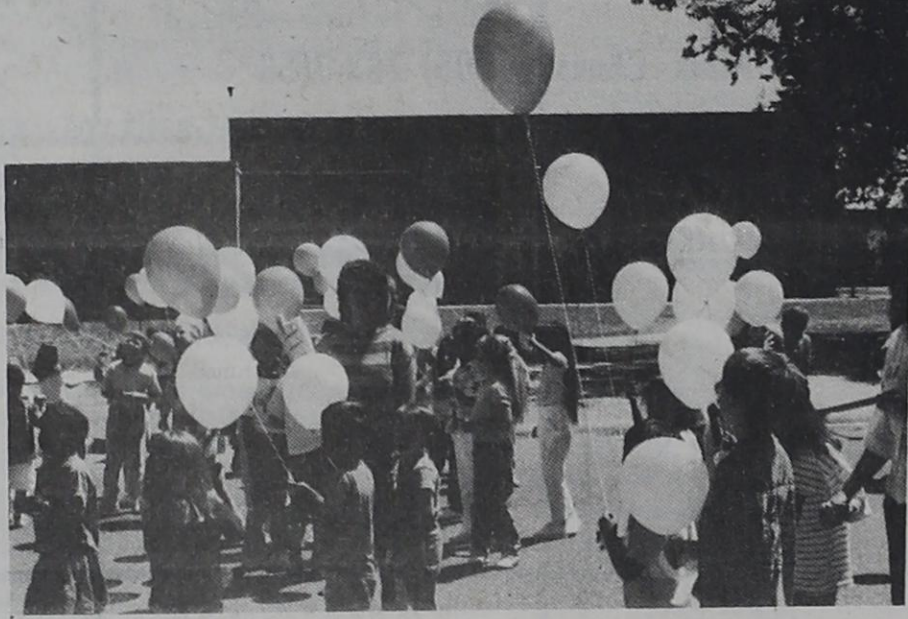

Texico loses out on funding

Texico did not receive any state CDBG funds although it had sought \$194,000 for street improvements.

The state made its decisions last Friday. It had \$6.6 million available and requests from various communities tallied far more.

Texico's request was rated "low" by the Department of Finance. Most of the projects funded were rated "high" or "medium" and involved housing rehabilitation or water projects. Streets were a low priority.

Mayor Steve Chancy said he was not disappointed by the outcome, terming it a "learning experience" since it was the first time Texico had sought state funds in this fashion.

He said, based on the projects that received approval, it might be wiser for Texico to go after the funds again next year, but for a building project, such as a new community center.

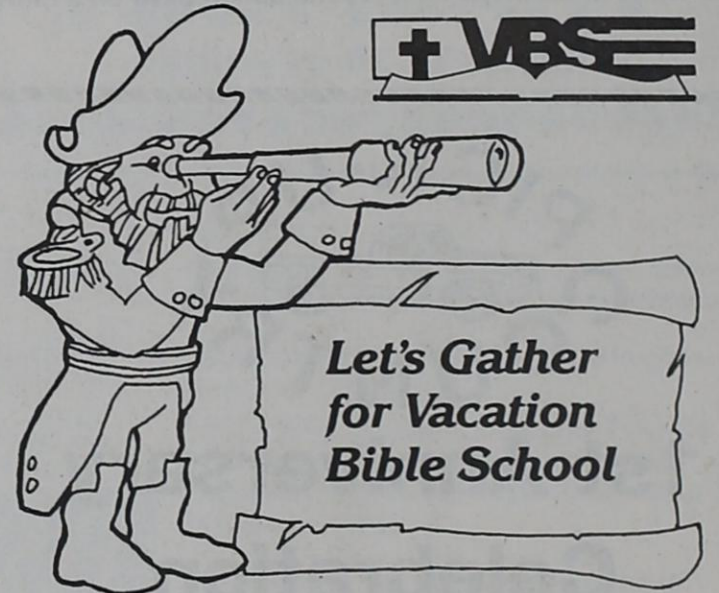

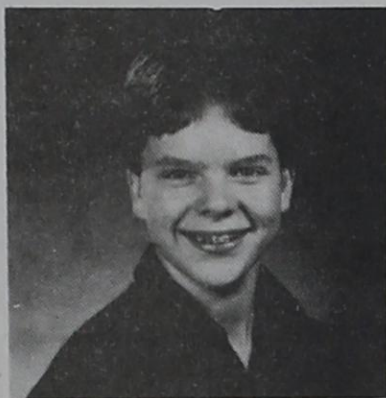

It's time to attack bagworms

Now is a good time to treat trees and shrubs for bagworms if they were not treated last fall. The worms hatched about two weeks ago and they respond to treatment before they grow and form their bags.

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says Parmer County Extension Agent Entomologist Mike Blanton.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long, Blanton adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree soon contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the

bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Blanton. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow the label instructions when applying insecticides.


