

For you non-military types, "USAREUR" stands for "U.S. Army - Europe." These were


the European championships for all Army personnel.)

Texico discusses zoning problems

Career ladder sways in wind

for the Farwell School Board.

Earlier that day, School Supt. John Grigsby had invited teachers to the board meeting to hear what would be done with the career ladder program.

Eleven teachers and the three principals showed up at 7 p.m. But the board called an executive session and didn't reconvene publicly until 10 p.m.

Executive sessions normally 37 - Rhonda Grissom, Dutch are legal for individual personnel matters, legal problems and land acquisition.

It appears the board discussed the career ladder program and budget reporting procedures in the executive session. District auditor De'Aun Willoughby attended part of the executive session. It seems some thought that the career ladder program would touch on individual personnel and the budget reporting procedures would do likewise, so the executive session was called for.

At 10 p.m., when the meeting was opened to the public, the teachers present said they had only come to hear what the board intended to do about the career ladder and the method of appraising them.

At 10:10 p.m., the board went back into executive session.

The board re-convened at 11 p.m. and approved a motion to set stricter performance standards for teachers to meet for the ca-

Tuesday was an off night the local school system over \$63,000 for the program. He said this would have added \$22,000 to the budget problem.

> Board member Roberta Johnson moved that the career ladder be for full time personnel only. The motion passed unanimously.

It was noted that standards for qualifying for the career ladder can be reviewed later and set downward, but they cannot be raised this year once they are set.

Grigsby planned to meet with the teachers Wednesday afternoon to fully explain the board session mix-up.

In other business, the board: - Accepted the early dismissal days as proposed on the school calendar. Oct. 12,

Jan. 18, and April 19, will be early dismissal days so that parents may pick up report cards and meet with teachers. Nov. 22, Dec. 20, and May 31 will be early dismissal days before holidays.

- Accepted the guidelines for making teacher appraisals as proposed by Grigsby.

- Discussed House Bill 82 which sets forth the procedures for changing the taxing methods for the school system. The board had discussed at an earlier meeting the possibility of taxing automobiles as Friona and Bovina do. They indicated that this can wait until next spring.

- Heard High school Principal David Reynolds suggest two proposals.

1) The board passed the first proposal to offer Farwell High School students the option of earning an Advanced High School Honors diploma. Under the new program, English IV-A, Spanish III, Physics, Computer Math, Trigonometry, and Elementary Math Analysis would be designated as honors courses. If a student completed 5 of these 6 classes, they could have their transcript stamped to show that they had completed a program above and beyond the advanced diploma.

Cavallero home from Brazil

"I had a blast," says Sarah Cavallero of her year in Brazil as a Texico - Farwell Rotary Club foreign exchange student. Much as she loved her trip, Sarah was glad to be home.

Sarah's flight home started at 9:45 p.m. on Aug. 5. It took her from Sao Paulo, Brazil to Rio de Janerio, Brazil to Los Angeles, Calif. to Phoenix, Ariz., to Albuquerque, N.M. Her family met her at the Albuquerque airport, and greeted her with lots of hugs and tears. It was late in the evening on Aug. 6 before she was home in her own bed again.

The Cavalleros celebrated Sarah's arrival by eating a pizza in Albuquerque because American style pizza was a food that Sarah had missed.

"In Brazil they make it different. They have a thin crust, and they put eggs on it. They use a cheese like cream cheese and they put corn on pizza," she explains. She quickly adds that Brazilian pizza is good- it's just different from American pizza.

Another thing Sarah missed during her months away from the U.S. was Dr Pepper. She could get other soft drinks in Brazil, but she never found Dr Pepper there. Little things mean a lot when you are far from home.

According to Sarah there were some little habits that she had that "freaked out" her hosts. "They thought it was really strange that I'd eat catsup on everything like meat or french fries." And, her hosts were surprised when she put ice in her drinks. "They drink everything warm. They buy milk in plastic sacks or boxes that you leave on a shelf. They add chocolate syrup or strawberry syrup to their warm milk. I'd add ice cubes to mine." Learning to appreciate each other's differences is part of the foreign exchange experience.

Sarah learned to enjoy the wonderful fresh fruits available in Brazil, some of which are not available in this part of the U.S. And, she learned to enjoy the daily luncheons that featured several types of barbecued meats along with beans and rice. She will especially miss the pleasant evenings she spent with friends playing games or singing along to guitar music. Sarah is glad to be home with her old friends and family, but she will miss her Brazilian friends and host families, too.

Many things seemed unfamiliar to Sarah when she returned home to the U.S. She was surprised by several little every day things about her home country that she had never noticed as a child growing up in the U.S.

"It was weird hearing everybody speaking English," she says.

She also noted that people here look different than they do in Brazil. "It was strange to see so many blondes again,"she laughed. She also noted that, "the Brazilians are very relaxed and natural. They don't wear a lot of eye makeup. They just wear lipstick. They just take a shower and fluff their hair a little bit." Sarah noted that it was really strange to see American girls at the airports here spraying their hair with hair spray and applying layers of makeup. Yet, it was something she herself had done just a few months before. While Sarah was in Brazil, she lived with three different host families. Each was different, and each taught her about Brazilian life. By living with three different families she was able to learn which traits were common in the Brazilian culture, and which were particular to one family. She also learned to speak Portuguese while she was there. "Everyone says it is similar to Spanish, but I don't really speak much Spanish." "I can understand everything people say to me in Portuguese and I can usually say what I mean pretty well, but writing is a lot harder." Sarah found spelling and conjugating verbs especially tricky in Portuguese. "Because I had graduated from high school before I left Texico, I did not have to take my classes for credit in Brazil. I only took tests to see how my Portuguese was coming along." This took pressure off her and allowed her to enjoy her stay in Brazil. At times on her first day back in the United States, Portuguese came to her tongue more easily than English did. Shifting from one language to another made her exclaim, "I can't think of the word!" a few times. At other times a Portuguese phrase would come out of her mouth before the English equivalent would.

Peanut Butter Snack Bars

2 1/4 c. oats 3/4 c. chunky peanut butter 1/3 c. water 1/2 c. honey

1/2 instant non - fat dry milk 1/2 c. raisins

Place oats on ungreased jelly roll pan or cookie sheet. Bake in preheated 350 degree F. oven about 15 minutes or until edges are light golden brown, stirring once during cooking. Combine peanut butter, water and honey in 2 1/2 quart glass mixing bowl: mix well.

Cover and microwave on high about 3 minutes or until mixture comes to a full rolling boil. Combine toasted oats, dry milk and raisins. Add to peanut butter misture, mixing well. Press firmly into greased 8 inch square baking pan. Chill several hours or until firm. Cut into bars. Store in tightly covered container in refrigerator. Makes about 24 bars.






Farwell kicked off and held Gruver. Farwell was stopped on an interception. But a QB sack stopped Gruver.

Kelley rambled 4 yards to







have upgraded their irrigation application and distribution efficiencies since 1985 with funds from the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program. The improved efficiencies have resulted in water savings in excess of 25,000 acre-feet of water.

The program can best be illustrated by describing how one irrigator eliminated annual water losses of 159 acre feet by upgrading his irrigation system from furrow irrigation to a seven - tower LEPA center pivot system. He previously had open ditch losses from deep percolation and evaporation of about 25 acre - feet per year before the water reached the field. Deep percolation and evaporation from the furrow stream equaled about 125 acre - feet of the water that was delivered to the field. Tailwater runoff from this farm had been about nine acre - feet per year.

By changing his irrigation methods from furrow irrigation to a LEPA center pivot system and eliminating open ditch and tailwater losses, this irrigator was able to realize an annual groundwater savings of 144 acre feet - even though the LEPA system had a water loss of 15 acre - feet. Water savings of almost 1,500 acre - feet should be realized during the LEPA sprinkler system's 10 or more year life expectancy. Fuel and labor costs are also reduced as a result of the improved water application efficiency.

"Considering that one acre -foot of water is equal to covering an acre of land with water one foot deep, the groundwater saved through the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Loan Program is quite significant," says Ken Carver, High Plains Water District Assistant Manager. Deep percolation, evaporation and tailwater runoff have

historically resulted in high water losses for irrigators on the Texas High Plains. By taking advantage of the low interest loans available through the Pilot Loan Program, producers have purchased water conservation equipment such as underground pipelines, surge valves and center pivot irrigation systems to reduce these water losses to a very minimum.

In 1985, the Texas Legislature approved the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program. A two - year time limit was given to evaluate the pilot program; and in 1987, the legislature extended the evaluation period to August 1989.
