Producers upgrade their efficiencies

Approximately 150 producers within the 15 -county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 efficiencies since 1985 with funds from the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program. The improved efficiencies have resulted in water savings in excess of 25,000 acre-feet of water.
The program can best be illustrated by describing how feet by upgrading his irrigation system from furrow irrigation to a seven - tower LEPA center pivot system. He previously had open ditch losses from deep percolation and evaporation

almost 1,500 acre - feet should be realized during the LEPA sprinkler system's 10 or more year life expectancy. Fuel and labor costs are also reduced as a result of the improved water application efficiency.
"Considering that one acre-foot of water is equal to

groundwater saved through the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Loan Program is quite significant," says
