Steve has worked extremely hard as an active member of the First Baptist Church of Farwell, especially with the R.A. kids. He is to be commended for his community work with our young people.

Donna and her husband have bought the drug store and we encourage all area folks to continue to use this very important business.

I've written continually on how fortunate the Twin Cities are to have a drug store here. And this good fortune will only continue if we ALL support it.

Snider, Barnes win primaries

Two area residents - David Snider and Paul Dee Barnes - were victors in Curry County Commissioner primary races Tuesday.

Snider defeated Gabriel Tapia, 417 to 192, in the Democrat primary for the Commissioner District 2 post. The GOP primary was won by Bobby Light, 103. Light was unopposed.

Snider won the Texico poll by a 89 to 18 margin. Barnes defeated William Hart, 848 to 343, in the Democrat primary for the Commissioner District 5 seat. The GOP primary was won by George Patterson, 388. Patterson was unopposed.

Texico cleanup plans progress

Twenty Texico and area residents attended a "brainstorming session" Monday night at the high school called by Ronnie Warmuth, Texico city councilman who is spearheading a major communitywide cleanup campaign.

Signing up to serve on a committee to follow through on the campaign were: Warmuth, chairman; Ann and Lewis Cooper; Jim and Carolyn Burrows; David and Shannon Kube; Juanita Hadley; Evelyn Warmuth; Richard Hadley; Mae Stone; Doyal LaRue; LaDonna Cross; Kathy Dionne, and Mike Pomper.

The committee will meet June 29 to discuss the ideas presented at the brainstorming session.

Groups that have offered support for the cleanup, and those represented at the brainstorming session, include:

1. Curry County Commissioners
2. State Highway Department
3. Texico City Council
4. SPS
5. School groups, such as the FFA, Honor Society, FHA, Pep Club and cheerleaders
6. Elementary and High School principals
7. Waste Management of New Mexico
8. National Guard of New Mexico
9. First Baptist Church youth group
10. United Pentecostal Church
11. State Line Tribune
12. Texico-Farwell Lions Club
13. Texico-Farwell Rotary Club
14. Texico Education Association
15. Texico Booster Club
16. Texico Volunteer Fire Department

One of the main thrusts of the discussion involved city ordinances dealing with trash problems. Warmuth plans to ask City Attorney Duane Hamar to compile a list of relevant ordinances for the council to view. Pomper said the Tribune will publish the relevant portions of these ordinances at no cost so residents will know what the laws are, also.

Also, Warmuth reported that Waste Management has volunteered to place a large container in the city for junk disposal. Mayor LaRue plans to contact the firm immediately.

Following is a list of problems as presented by those attending the meeting:

1. Downtown - brightening, painting, weed removal
2. Streets, alleys and gutters cleaning
3. Junked and abandoned cars
4. Large junk
5. Small junk
6. Litter (in ditches)
7. Mowing vacant lots
8. Tearing down abandoned houses
9. House painting, repairs
10. Trim trees in park
11. Ball pack, swimming pool
12. City Park (fix playground equipment, stock fish in pond, more shrubs, expand playground)
13. Pave roads

Residents talked about health and safety hazards involving junk in the city. One person pointed out how this helps breed rats.

Also discussed were ideas to help fund or promote the cleanup drive. They included:

- Donations from businesses and individuals
- Stiffer penalties in relevant city ordinances
- Media publicity, such as "before" and "after" photos, "most work", etc.; posters, a slogan
- Fund-raisers, such as a communitywide pancake supper in the park
- "Adopt-a-Block," similar to the highway department's "Adopt-a-Mile"
- Contests and competitions, such as "challenges" from one neighbor to another

Next discussed was what could be an ongoing cleanup process. This included:

1. Planting flowers, shrubs, flower boxes along city streets
2. An annual cleanup
3. Enforcing and expanding city ordinances (such as stiffer penalties) dealing with cleanup, zoning, etc.
4. Education
5. Using a large container from Waste Management
6. Curbs and gutters

In addition, other suggestions were tossed around. These included:

- Having wrecking yards pick up junked and abandoned vehicles. It was noted that some of these yards will pay for the vehicles. Warmuth said he was surprised at the large number of such vehicles throughout Texico.
- In addition to the equipment to be provided by Curry county and the city, it was thought that some local residents and businesses might donate the use of their trucks.
- In addition to city ordinances dealing with hazardous junk, the state EID can be asked for its assistance.
- Letters (in English and Spanish) may be delivered door-to-door informing residents of the campaign, asking their assistance and also seeking permission to remove junk and plant shrubs.
- In addition to the ongoing cleanup process, schedule a major day or weekend in the fall for a communitywide cleanup.
- "Walk the city," whereby committee members will walk each block of the city to outline areas to be cleaned up and the type of problems to be handled.
- Get more residents involved.
- Pick out a slogan.
- Start work on main street before Border Town Days.
- Inform residents on how to seek assistance about junk problems.
- Organize a committee and schedule a second meeting

Moths invade area

The moths that have been so plentiful this year are mesquite cutworm moths, said County Extension Agent Gary Patterson.

Patterson checked with Dr. Pat Morrison at the Extension Research Center in Lubbock about the unusually heavy infestation this year.

"They don't affect row crops, and are just a nuisance to homeowners. After about 10 days, they won't be here," said Patterson.

He was told that the unusually mild winter had caused the first generation of moths to come this way. They usually stay much farther south than this.

Mesquite cutworm moths last affected the plains in 1984 when they swarmed around the Lubbock area.

The only advice that Patterson offered homeowners was to reduce lighting at night, since the moths are attracted to light.

The mesquite cutworm larvae feed on mesquite leaves. They feed at night and remain hidden under the rough bark or at the base of a tree during the day. When full grown the larvae are about 1 1/4 inches in length. They are black with light-colored to gray parallel lines running the length of the body.

Most of the foliage may be stripped from mesquite trees that are heavily infested by mesquite cutworms. When

these cutworms are damaging mesquite trees in the home landscape cabaryl (Sevin ©) will provide effective control when sprayed on the foliage.

The moths which are almost black have a light colored line about 1/3 of the way back across the wings. When the wings are folded this line forms a V. There is a crescent shaped orange spot on the end of the underwings.

If the moths become a problem in the home aerosol sprays containing pyrethrins or resmethrins will be helpful in controlling the moths. They will not cause any damage in the home but may be a nuisance. Use yellow lights that do not attract the moths if the presence of large numbers of moths become a problem.

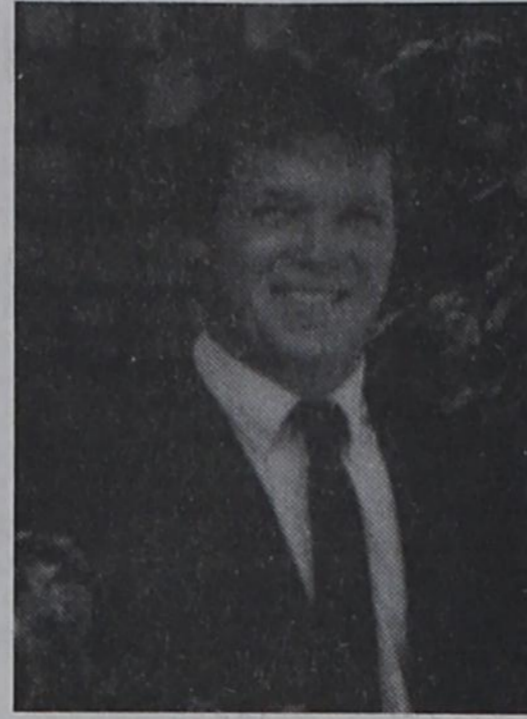

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## Hearing set for Lumbraera

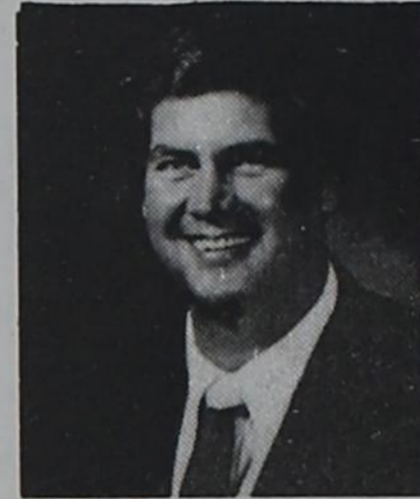

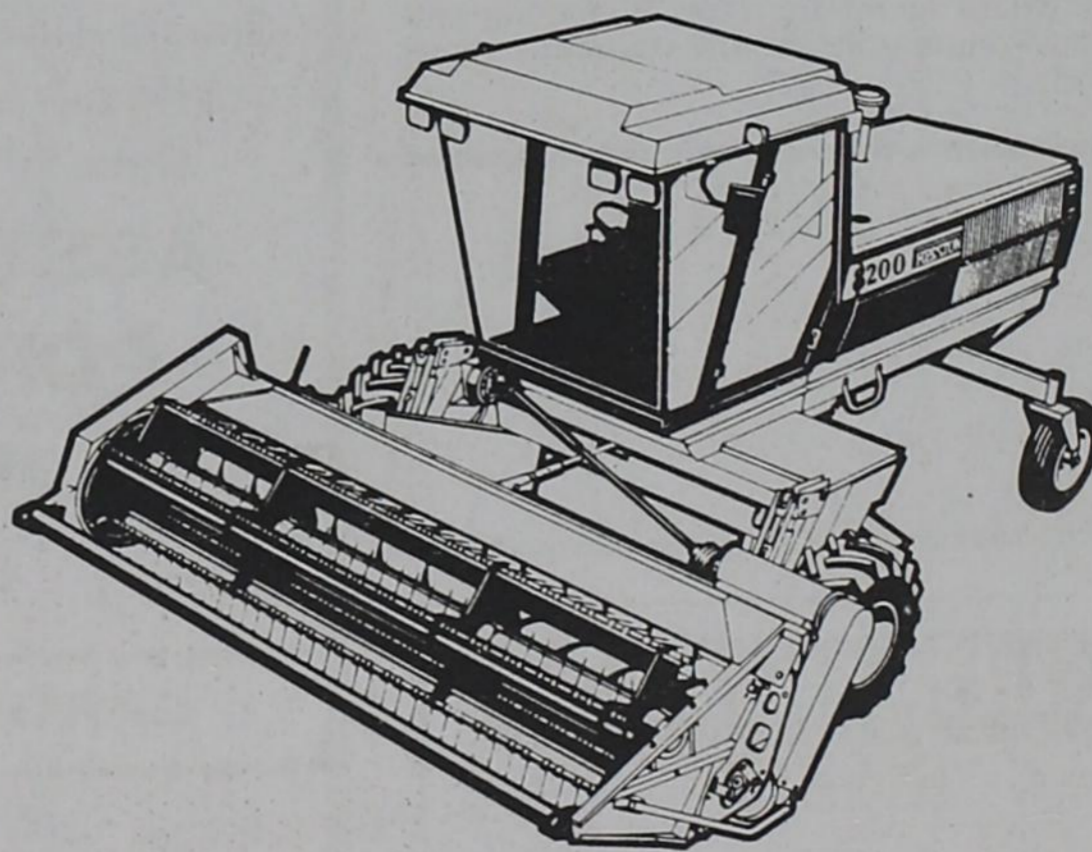
