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

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

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Where will cotton price deficiency payment be?

The guest for clues to the size of this year's cotton price deficiency payment is off to an early start. And High Plains' producers are into the hunt with a heightened sense of

The deficiency payment rate will be determined by subtracting the calendar year weighted average farm price from the 1989 target of 73.5 cents per pound. Higher prices mean lower payments, lower prices mean higher payments.

But higher prices mean nothing to the producer with nothing to sell, so the theory becomes myth to the thousands of producers on the Plains with hailed - out, droughted out or washed - out crop prospects, note officials of Plains

The U.S. Department of Agriculture last fall projected

Executive Vice President. On the opposite side of the question, Johnson also thinks it unlikely that the payment rate will drop below 8.56 cents. That's the amount of the total advance payments producers already have received. Any part of that amount that isn't justified by final price calculations would have to be repaid. 
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
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

Here's how communities are facing burning ban

The Texas Department of Health has notified all communities of a federal ban on the burning of trash effective Aug. 30, and a subsequent ordinance to enforce it.

Some of our local communities will be affected by this more than other communi-

According to Pat Bragan, an engineer with the Texas Air Control Board, the burning of trash at all landfills must cease on Aug. 30. So, too, must the burning of trash by residents in communities which provide trash removal.

This specific law does not affect the burning of domestic waste at property outside city limits. Miss Bragan said that farmers may continue to dispose of their personal trash on their own property by burning and-or burying.

Farwell and Bovina will be greatly affected by this new law, but Lazbuddie and Friona will not be affected very much.

In Farwell, residents have been burning trash behind their homes, and city workers have hauled away the ashes that remain.

City workers use a huge roller at the city landfill to compact the trash, and then the trash is covered by dirt. The city has recently purchased a D7 Caterpiller tractor to cover the trash.

At the current rate of usage, the city's 6 - 7 pits in the landfill would probably serve the community for at least 10 years, according to City Water Supt. Dee Hammitt. But when unburned and uncompacted trash starts coming into the dump, the pits will fill up much faster.

"We've got a big pit that would last us 5 years at present usage but when we begin putting tree limbs in it, it probably won't last 2 years," he said.

Farwell plans to comply with the ban on burning in the city landfill as of Aug. 30.

trash because "we can't carry hot loads to the landfill." The fire hazard would be too great, and the city could face the possiblity of a fine or loss of license if the landfill ignited.

Hammitt stressed that Farwell is on top of the situation. "The city is aware of the problem, and is working toward a solution we can live with. We are looking into a machine for shredding tree limbs right now," he said.

Mayor Chris Gikas noted that it is important for Farwell to comply with the new regulations because the Environmental Protection Agency has indicated that all federal funds will be withheld unless the city complies.

Bovina, like Farwell, currently allows residents to burn trash behind their homes. The ashes are hauled to a city landfill.

According to Pat Kunselman, Bovina has no choice its residents must quit burning. "We have the equipment to pack and put dirt over the trash," she said.

Bovina also bought a tractor to pack the trash and cover it with a layer of dirt every day. It also has sufficient city landfill space to

last for a long time. "After the pit fills up," said Mrs. Kunselman, "we will have to face that problem."

One Bovina resident raised some interesting questions. Farwell and Bovina currently allow open burning. If they pass city ordinances against open burning, who will enforce the city laws? If they don't pass these ordinances, who will enforce the state statute?

County Judge Porter Roberts said the state - through the Texas Department of Health - would enforce the state statute. He noted that in past years the Texas Department of Health has ticketed the Friona Wheat Grower's Elevator because of blowing chaff during harvest, and they have ticketed the City of Bovina because of air pollution in connection with trash burning. He did not know the outcome of either case.

Roberts stressed that the county sheriff would not be enforcing city ordinances in either Bovina or Farwell because that is not his jurisdic-

Each city has to police its own city ordinances," he said.

Miss Bragan indicated that there is great pressure on counties to provide area-wide

Roberts added that Parmer County is studying the landfill situation. County Commissioners Ernest Anthony, Tom Weir, and Robert White went to Austin on July 10 to a school on landfills. They wish to study the pros and cons of the situation before they make any decisions.

The county has a trash container placed just south of

Friona on a trial basis. The trash placed there is hauled away to Amarillo. The county paid almost \$600 for the first month of this operation.

On one hand, the communities in Parmer County are widely spread apart. It might not be cost effective to haul trash from one community to another. On the other hand, it is currently not cost effective to recycle trash on a small scale, but a regional landfill might be able to recycle on a larger scale. Such a landfill would also be easier to police for water pollution and health violations than several scat-

tered dumps would be.

seen their local dump closed. The state wants to fine and penalize Parmer County for having left it open as long as it did. The county opposes being penalized and it's been left to the attorneys at present.

Lazbuddie residents have

Currently, Lazbuddie residents are burning their trash and hauling ashes to the Muleshoe City landfill. Because Lazbuddie is an unincorporated area, its residents may legally do this.

Lazbuddie School is the community's largest producer of trash. It has a large incinerator to burn the school's trash, but it too must haul its ashes away.

Friona provides twice weekly trash removal in residential areas and daily trash pickups in the business district. Residents do not burn their trash.

Friona city employee Roger Fields said, "I don't forsee any drastic changes here." Friona has 2 city landfills, one of which has quite a bit of storage space remaining.
