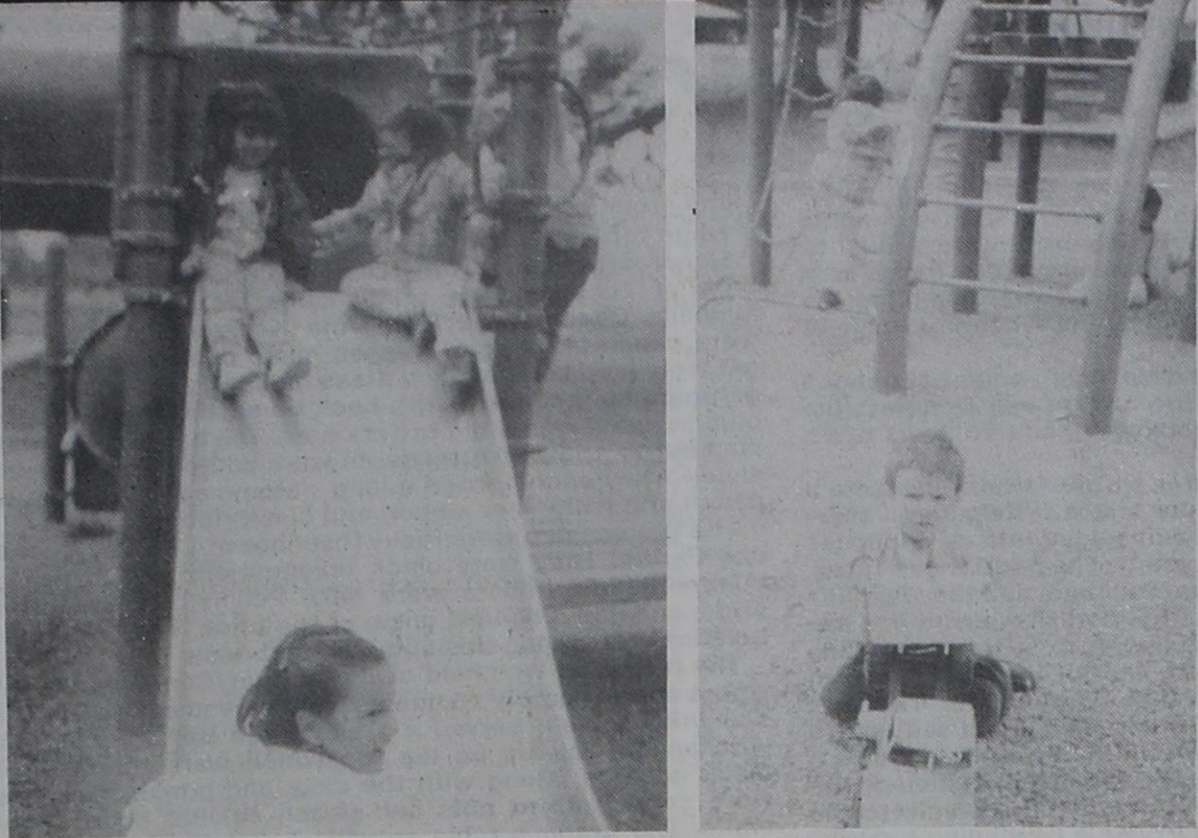

Later in May they flew to Houston where they attended

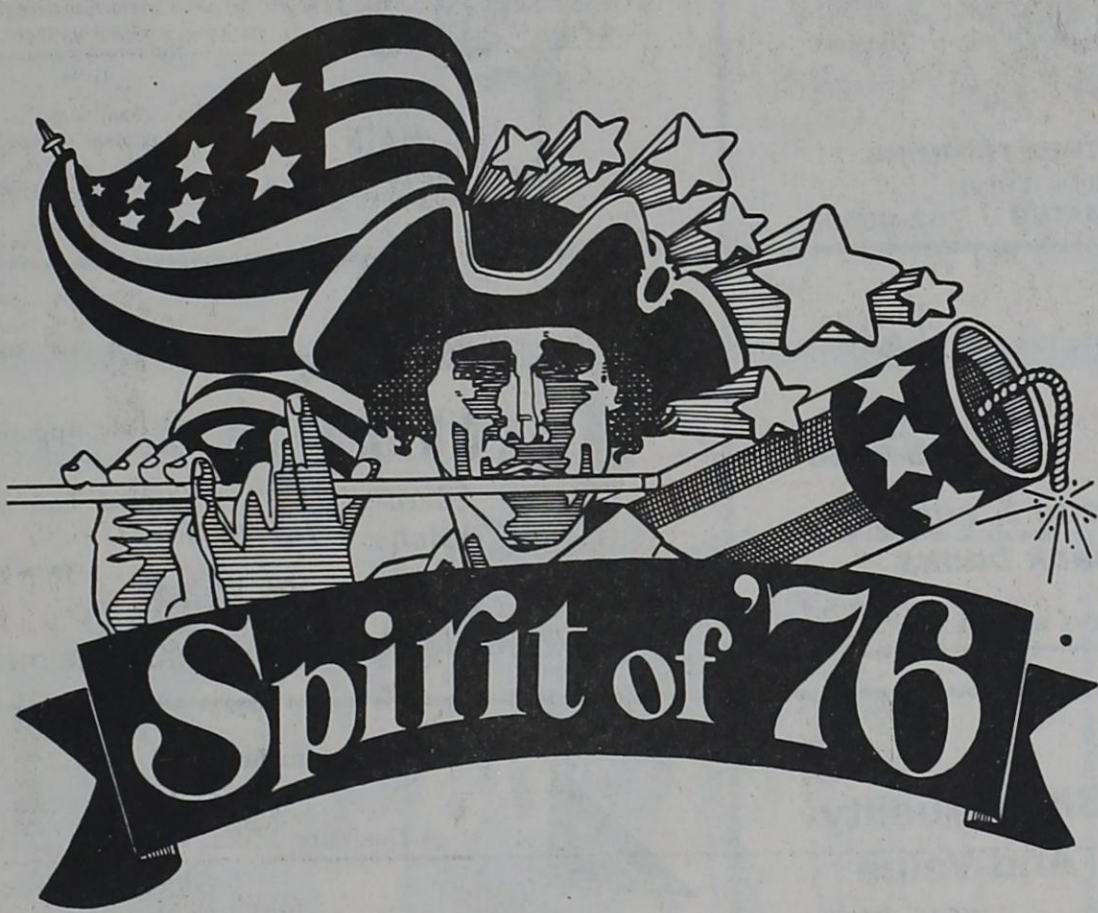

On May 26, Jack attended his 60th high school class reunion in Hollis, Okla.

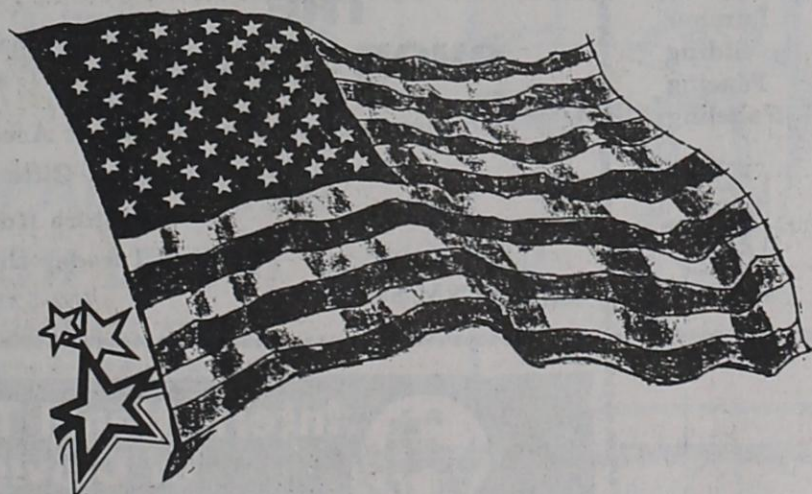

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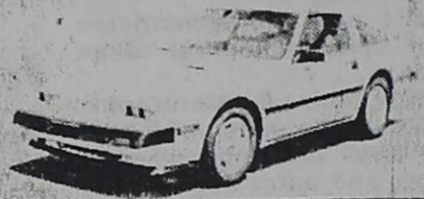
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Wedding vows told

It will be held a week before Border Town Days.

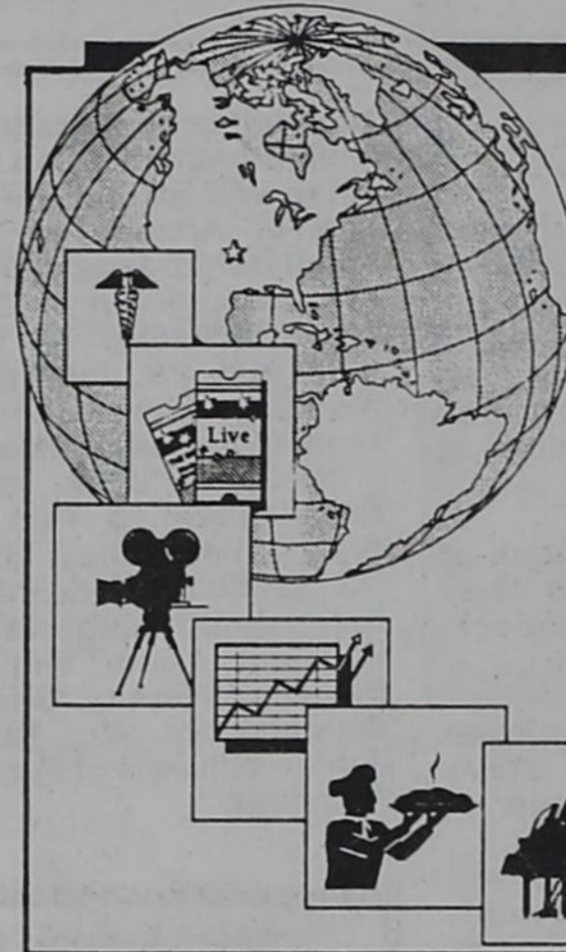

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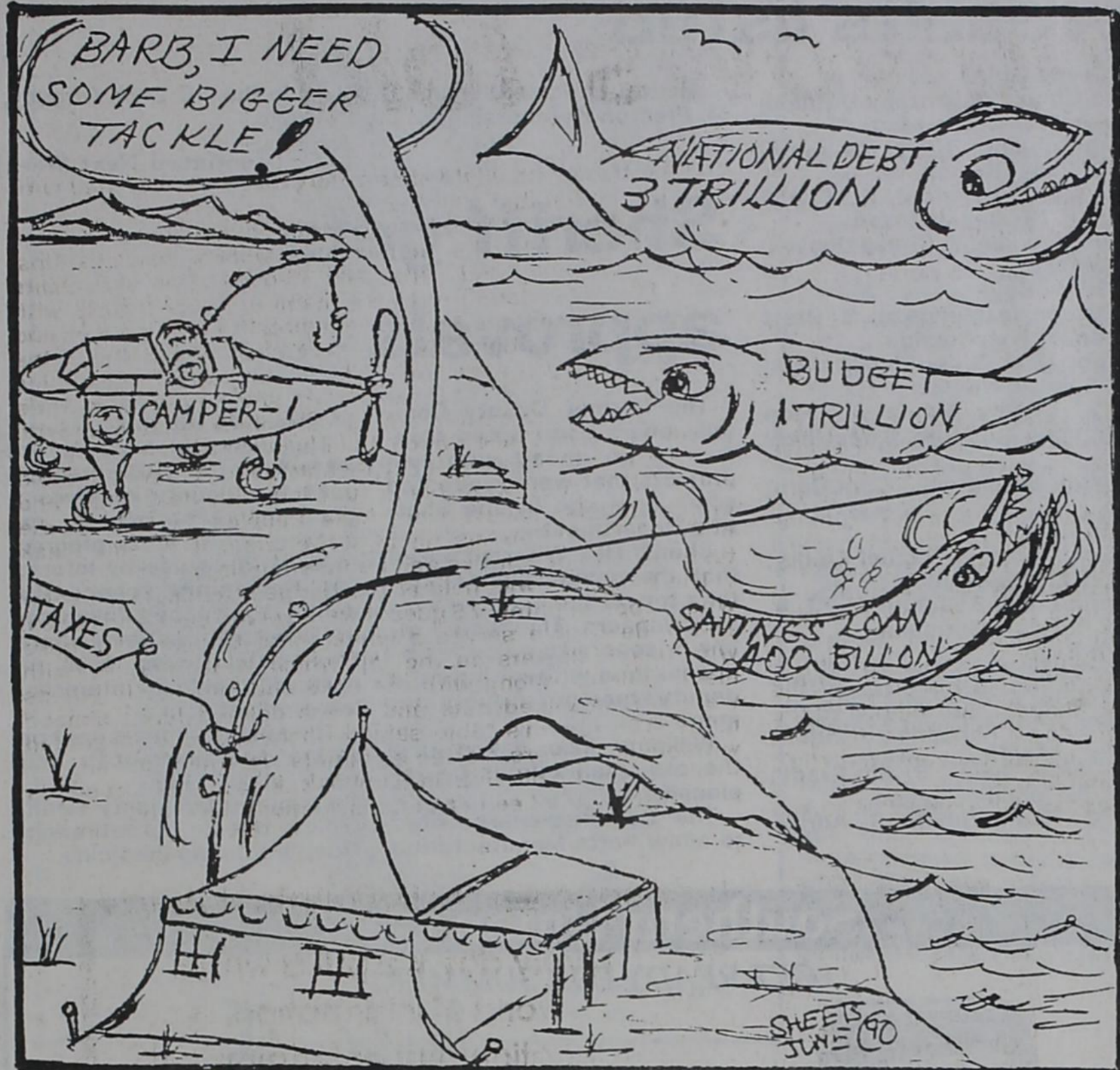

- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 c. quick-cooking oats
- 1 pkg. (6 oz.) semisweet chocolate morsels
- 1 c. chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease a large baking sheet. Cream shortening and sugars together in mixing bowl until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Sift flour, soda, cinnamon and salt together; blend into creamed mixture. Stir in oats, chocolate morsels and pecans. Drop dough by level tablespoonfuls two inches apart onto prepared baking sheet. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on wire racks. Makes 70 cookies.

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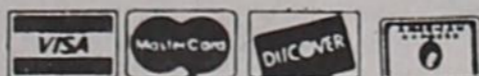

Spring as the County Health Officer due to his retirement from practicing medicine.

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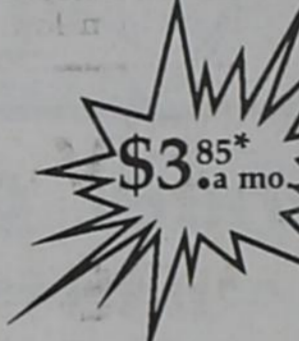


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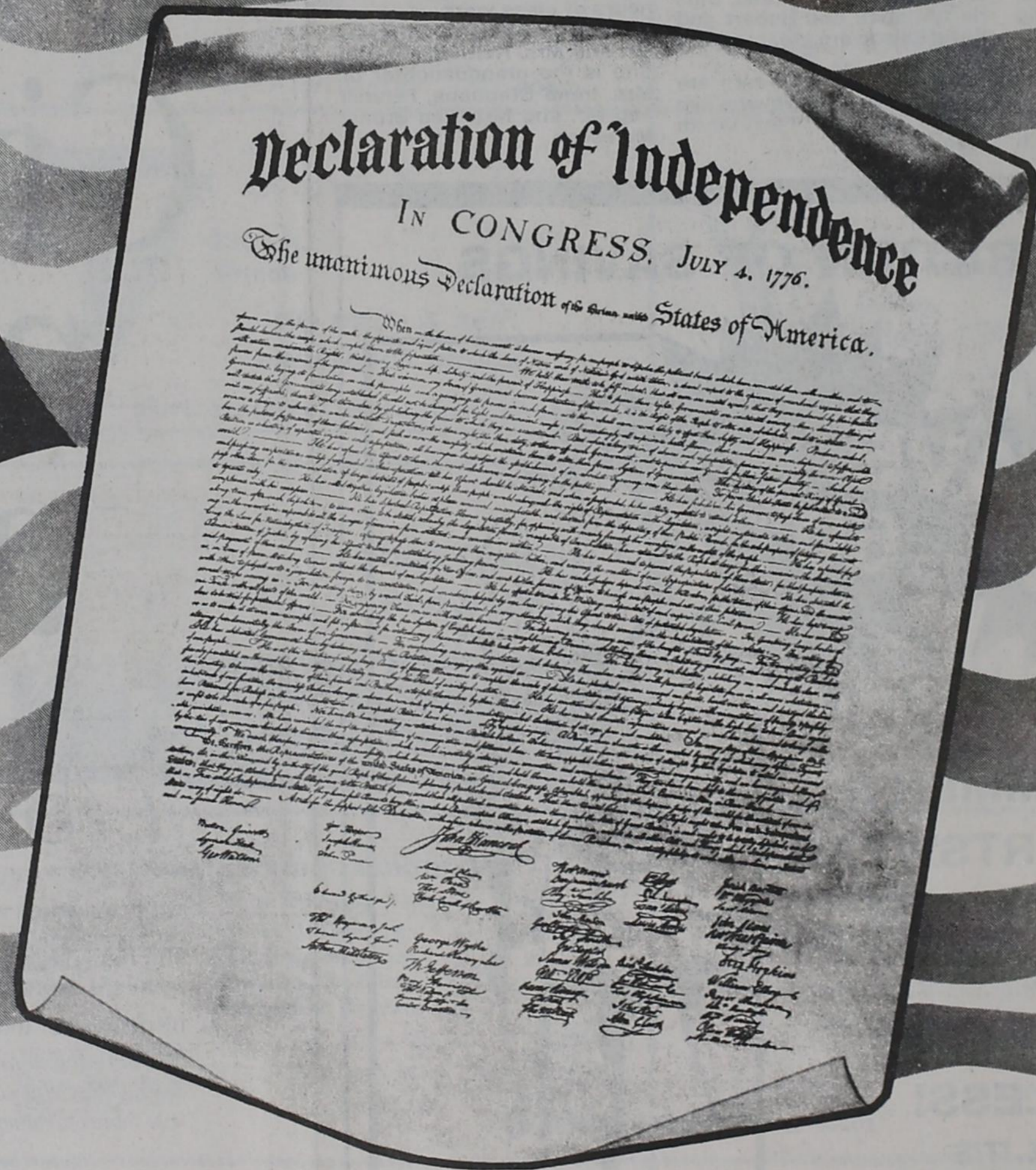
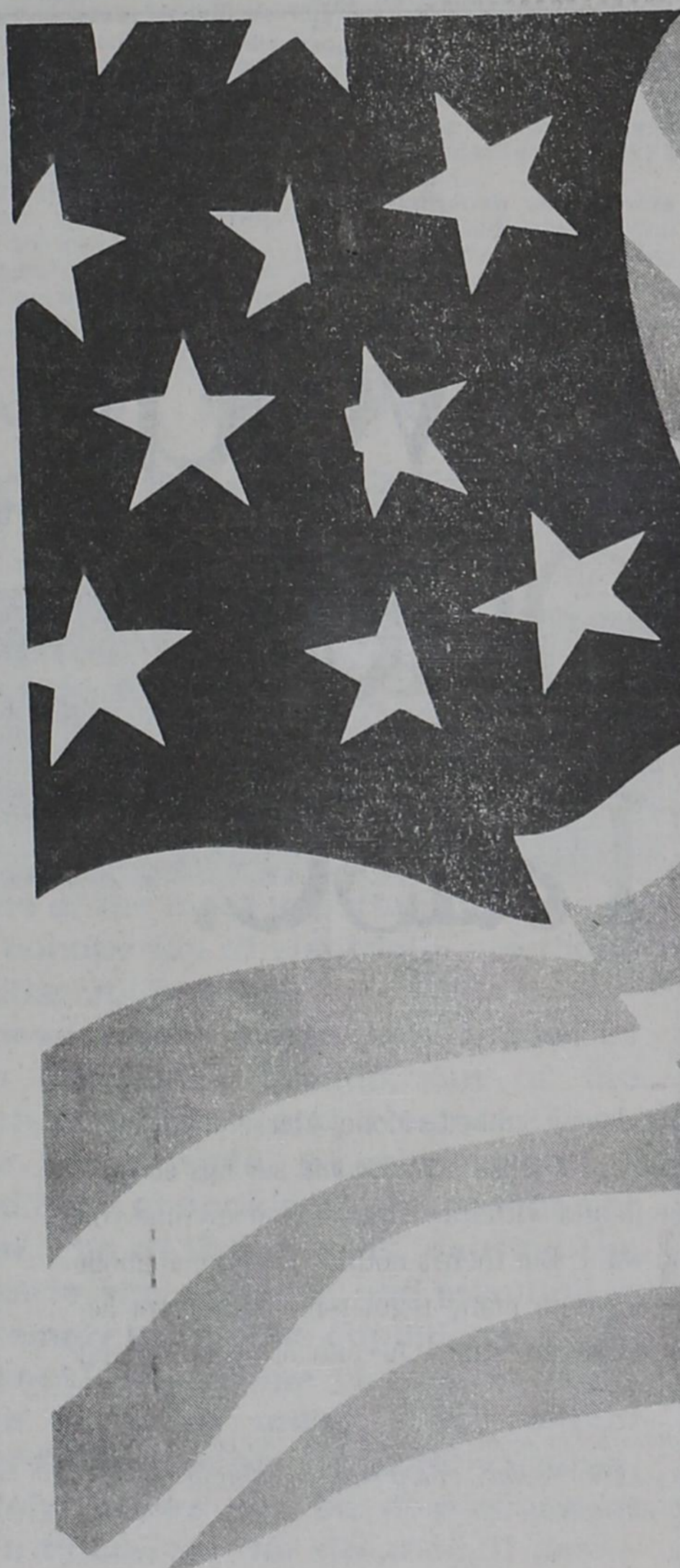
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Hromas descendants meet in Bowie, Texas

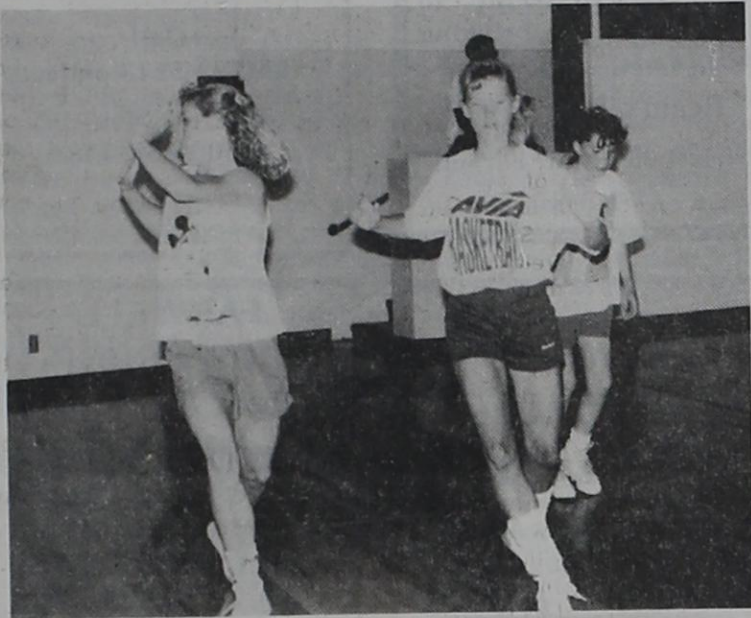

Congress takes up work on 1990 Farm Bill

The onus of sending a cost-conscious farm bill to the House and Senate floors this year weighs more heavily than ever before on the respective agriculture committees, according to a long-time veteran of farm program involvement.

"Anything less would invite vicious floor attacks and risk significant loss of committee control over the end result," says Donald Johnson, 25-year Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock. Johnson has witnessed and participated in the development of every piece of cotton legislation enacted since 1960.

There's always been plenty of floor debate on farm bills, and modest revisions of what came out of committees, Johnson recalls, "but for the most part farm law has been written in committee."

And that's as it should be, he says, "because by virtue of their interests and experience committee members understand agriculture and its needs far better than most in either the House or Senate."

But under this year's severe budgetary constraints, preserving any semblance of that historical pattern, Johnson believes, calls for the committees to strike a delicate balance between what's needed to maintain a viable agriculture industry and what Congress, and to a degree Administration, can accept as fiscally responsible.

Criticism from Agriculture Secretary Yentler and partisan posturing notwithstanding, there is evidence that agriculture committee leaders, while dedicated to meeting their responsibilities to farmers, are nevertheless well aware of budgetary pressures.

For example, the House Agriculture Committee, following the lead of the Cotton, Rice and Sugar Subcommittee, has grudgingly agreed to freeze target prices on all major crops for the five-year life of the farm bill in an effort to meet the budget baseline and weaken the effect of potential challenge on the House floor to raise target prices if the budget baseline can be raised as a result of the budget summit meetings now going on.

The full Senate Agriculture Committee has yet to take final action on a farm bill. But Chairman Patrick Leahy (D-VT) has expressed a personal reluctance to go to the Senate floor with a bill that would prove "divisive".

Creating a climate for reaching potential

The Gifted and Talented program at Farwell Schools is an extension of the regular classroom. An example of this can be seen in our U.S. History and English classes.

I will attend workshops at the education service center in Amarillo this summer to learn how to adapt regular curriculum to meet the needs of the Gifted/Talented student and how to create a climate for those students to better express their potential.

In addition to the target price freeze, other cotton provisions of the House Committee measure include:

- The current loan formula and 50-cent minimum;
- Current marketing loan procedure with the addition of a three-step competitive price provision;
- An acreage reduction program, not to exceed 25 percent, at such level as necessary to maintain a carryover equal to

30 percent of projected offtake;

- Required paid land diversion when carryover is projected to exceed 8 million bales;
- A 50-92 program with guaranteed payment rate;
- Authorization for a 0-92 prevented planting program, and
- Prohibition of both cross and off-setting compliance requirements.

46,000 well permits have been issued

The following is a roundup of short agriculture-related stories from a variety of sources.

The following is from the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association newsletter.

Residues of toxic drugs have virtually disappeared from the nation's supply of beef and poultry, the US Department of Agriculture said in Washington in June.

They noted that the department's 1989 slaughterhouse inspection program found that drug residues in beef and poultry have continued to decline. Of 5,439 samples of beef tested last year, just 8 had illegal levels of drugs according to the USDA. Poultry inspections reveal only 10 out of 9,463 samples analyzed contained drug residues.

From the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1:

Resampling and analysis of groundwater from irrigation wells shows no trace of pesticides.

A. Wayne Wyatt, manager of the Water District, points out that this sampling effort indicates that the chemicals being used in agriculture within the Water District service area are not percolating down through the soil and entering the groundwater.

"Every indication we have says that in this area, the chemicals break down and/or bind up with the soil before they get anywhere near the groundwater. We are very fortunate that our groundwater is deep enough below the land surface that it is somewhat protected from pollution through percolation of chemicals through the subsurface strata (nonpoint source pollution)," says Wyatt.

This assurance comes as a result of the most comprehensive ground water sampling effort in relation to agricultural chemicals yet made in the United States.

Also from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1:

The exact number of water wells drilled on the Texas High Plains since large-scale irrigation began in the late 1930's is unknown. However, more than 46,000 permits have been issued by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. Many of the wells drilled prior to the District's creation and some drilled since then have been abandoned, the pump removed and the opening at the top of the casing left uncovered. Without a proper covering at the land surface, contaminants can enter these "open holes" and alter the quality of groundwater stored in the Ogallala Aquifer.

Water District rules define an open or uncovered well as any artificial excavation drilled or dug for the purpose of exploring or producing water from the underground water reservoir, not capped or covered as required by District rules.

"Any open hole can provide a direct route for pollution to enter the Ogallala Aquifer," says Engineer Technician Obbie Goolsby, who has been in charge of the Water District's abandoned well program since 1971.

For example, if an airplane, tractor boom or other chemical application system passes over or near an open well, the chemical can enter the hole leading straight to the aquifer. Also, rainfall runoff can carry chemical residues off

fields and into open holes without a cement pump base. However, the potential use of open, abandoned wells as chemical disposal sites poses a greater risk of groundwater contamination compared to overspraying or the accidental introduction of small amounts of chemicals into the aquifer at the well site.

"If you have an open hole on your land and someone disposes of old chemicals in the hole, the chemical goes directly to the aquifer. Once the aquifer is polluted, it is difficult—sometimes impossible—to clean up," notes Goolsby.

Proper covering of abandoned wells is equally important to prevent people and/or animals from falling into the well and becoming trapped.

"Open wells are death traps. The most dangerous open hole are those without pump bases and casings. Small animals or even people could easily fall into these gaping holes. People need to understand how dangerous these open holes are," he says.

Rules for the proper capping of such wells are available from the Water District. More than 1,200 such abandoned wells have been located and capped or covered since the District was created in 1951.
