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Coleman home from hospital

Bovina Chief of Police Gary Coleman is home from the hospital, and "looks good," in spite of being shot in the face last week.

According to Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, Coleman had stopped a vehicle Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Maberry driven by Travis Gene Lambert, 24, of De Soto, Mo., about 11:30 p.m. on July 13 of her activities revolve around because the vehicle had only one headlight working.

A check of the vehicle's license plate showed an irrevehicle.

As Coleman bent over beside the police vehicle, Lambert allegedly shot him in the face. The bullet traveled through the officer's sinus cavity, nose and throat.

Lambert escaped from the vehicle while the officer was down. Coleman reportedly recovered quickly enough to shoot the fleeing man in the leg twice in spite of the fact that the officer's glasses had been blown off his face when he was shot. Coleman reportedly walked up to Lambert and disarmed the man. The weapon was, according to Williams, still loaded with one bullet in the chamber, and one in the clip. The weapon was put in the patrol car. While Coleman was inspecting the weapon and putting it in the patrol car. Lambert fled.

Williams arrived minutes after the shooting while Coleman was being loaded into an ambulance.

"It made me feel good that so many people responded that quickly," said Williams. It is estimated that 17 law enforcement officers from at least 7 different agencies in two states responded to the call for assistance. "It was really amazing the way people responded to it." It took about 4 hours before Lambert surrendered. He was discovered atop a building in Bovina. Lambert has been charged with attempted capitol murder. Bond is set at \$150,000. The case is pending before the grand jury.

The floats are manufactured from high tensile strength steel.

"We need steel with 100,000 lbs. of tensile strength to build farm equipment that will last," said production manager Waverly Coates.

DORL began manufacturing the farm equipment about one year ago. About six months later they started making tool bars as well.

The farm equipment can be manufactured to suit the needs of the farmer. The floats come in 20', 24' and 28' widths normally, but they can also be manufactured to the buyers specifications. They can also be painted to match

the color of other equipment that the farmer owns.


DORL also repairs broken farm equipment. They repair shredders, wheat drills, and other equipment.

Water tests important

Heavy rainfall runoff from thunderstorms can transport contaminants into rural domestic water wells through cracks in pumpbases or through rodent holes.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 urges rural residents who depend on groundwater for their drinking water supply to have an annual bacteriological test of their domestic water wells to ensure their family's health.

Dan Seale, High Plains Water District Engineer -Technician, has investigated several cases where rodent holes and other openings have allowed contaminants to enter domestic water wells.

'I checked a well in a garage and found nothing about its outward appearance to suggest a contamination source. Yet the well owner specifically complained that the water was muddy whenever it rained. After closer examination, I found places where the rainfall runoff from an adjacent cow lot was entering the well through rodent holes. Proper chlorination has made this once - contaminated well safe to drink from," says Seale.

Upon request, the High Plains Water District samples domestic well water for contamination within its 15 county service area. The testing will detect the presence of fecal coliform bacteria from the intestines of warm - blooded animals.

When a bacteriological test reveals fecal coliform bacteria, Seale says the first priority is to notify persons to quit drinking the contaminated water and switch to bottled water. "After the persons are on an alternate water source, we try to identify the contamination source and make recommendations to solve the problem. Once the contamination source has been removed, we recommend chlorination of the entire water distribution system from the well to the faucet," he says.

If the contamination has been removed, the chlorination will normally disinfect most wells and make the water safe

bacteria should be sampled immediately after chlorination, as well last six months later, to be sure that the contamination source has been eliminated.

"The best advice I can give people is not to put anything in their well houses that they don't want ending up in their water supply. People shouldn't store any fertilizers, herbicides or pesticides near their well sites. Also, it's important that people keep their well houses clean. Allowing things to stack up may provide rats with an ideal nesting place," says Seale.

utive committee of the Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. is Donald Christian of Farwell.

PCG directors met on July 12 and approved a 1989 budget of \$294,075, almost nine percent above the \$270,000 budgeted for 1988 -89 and the largest budget since 1986.

The new figure is the projected amount needed to conduct the producer organization's wide range of research, legislative and other services to cotton producers in its 25-member counties on the High Plains.

Funding for the organization's activities come from 25 cents per bale producer's dues, supplemented by dues from oil mills, compresses, banks and others either directly or indirectly benefiting from cotton's contribution to the High Plains economy. PCG calculations show a farm level value of the area crop in excess of \$1 billion for each of the past two years.

In response to a query from area members of the **House Agriculture Committee** in Washington, the PCG group decided on what was termed "the lesser of three evils" under discussion in a hearing program cost.
