Club President Quickel introduced the guests, including a former member who was a charter member - John R. Hadley. There were Lions present from Clovis, Portales and Muleshoe in addition to the widows of several former Lions.

Gloria Hutchins files for council re-election

The filing period for the May 5 local elections is under way. The deadline for filing is March 21.

Three Farwell elections - School Board, City Council and Hospital District Board - will be held at the Farwell Community Center.

Here's a look at the latest filing update:

Lazbuddie School Board

The two seats on the School Board election ballot currently are held by Melvin Morris and Jerry Engelking.

So far, two people have filed for these two seats - Melvin Morris and Robert Gallman.

Candidates must register at the school office. The election will be in the school auditorium.

Farwell Hospital District Board

There are four posts open on the hospital district board ballot, currently held by Bert Williams, Troy Christian, Tom Nichols and Frances Kube.

As of Tuesday, the only candidate to file has been Williams, for re-election.

To file, persons should do so at the District Clerk's office on the second floor of the Parmer County Courthouse.

Farwell School Board

There are two school board seats on the ballot, currently held by Joe Schilling and Roberta Johnson.

As of Tuesday, no candidates have filed for election. Neither Schilling nor Mrs. Johnson plans to seek re-election.

Candidates must file at the school administration building by March 21.

This year the regulations concerning write-in candidates have been changed. Those seeking to be write-in candidates for school board must file at the school administration building by April 5. Election officials will only count write-in votes for people who have registered. A vote for anyone else will be counted as a no vote.

Farwell City Council

Three city council seats are on the ballot, currently held by Fred Chandler, Martin Kube and Gloria Hutchins.

So far, the only persons to file have been Mrs. Hutchins and Kube, both for re-election.

Those interested in running for one of the three positions may file at City Hall.

Clayton, Buske in judge's run-off

Just under 50 percent of Parmer County's registered voters went to the primary polls Tuesday.

The main local race involved the Democrat primary for county judge. The two top vote-getters - Bonnie Clayton and B.K. Buske - will be in a run-off April 10.

Totals were: Clayton, 516; Buske, 373; Eva Ancira, 330; Jimmie Mace, 281, and Leland Gustin, 119. Since none of the candidates got at least 50 percent of the vote, a run-off is necessary.

Persons who didn't vote in the primary can still vote in the run-off election. However, if you voted in the Republican primary Tuesday, you are barred from voting in the Democrat run-off April 10.

The polling places for the run-off will be the same as those used in the primary election. And the hours are the same.

Also of special interest to Farwell voters was the Democrat race for Justice of the Peace. Incumbent Louise Hancock defeated Irene Woods, 278 to 239. Mrs. Hancock got 218 votes in Farwell and 39 in Oklahoma Lane and 21 absentee. Mrs. Woods got 167 in Farwell and 56 in Oklahoma Lane and 16 absentee.

In all, 1,633 Democrats and 187 Republicans voted Tuesday.

'DARE' draws support

The Farwell City Council Tuesday voted to participate in the "DARE" drug education program that may be set up in Parmer County.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams and Friona City Manager Beelee Goodwin appeared before the council to explain the program. It stands for "Drug Abuse Resistance Education."

Goodwin said it has been successful in Hereford and other school systems and has curriculum written for all grade levels. He said it was the "foremost program in the nation" to educate against drugs.

It calls for hiring a deputy to Williams who would serve all four county schools. A rough estimate of the cost for Farwell city would be between \$1,500 and \$3,500; the same cost would be borne by Farwell schools.

Williams and Goodwin plan to call a meeting of the mayors of Frion, Farwell and Bovina, plus the school superintendents and board presidents of the four county schools later this month.

If each agrees to pay for a portion of the deputy's salary (and the county commissioners have allowed Williams to

keep a 1986 Chevy for his use), then it appears the program will be given the go-ahead.

Goodwin also discussed two other topics with the council.

He said Friona has applied for a \$7,000 grant to train 40 persons in Parmer County as EMTs in the ambulance service. The free course will be available to Farwell residents.

The City Council voted to support this course.

And Goodwin talked about the forthcoming problems of waste disposal. The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission is studying a possible landfill serving several counties.

The council also:

- Approved three building permits: Henry Garcia, a tool shed; Roy Lovelady, a storage shed; and Vernon Thigpen, a garage.

- Agreed to send a certified letter to Stu Meyer who is not in compliance for fixing up a building behind his house on

Second Street. If it is not in compliance within 60 days, the council may take action against the property.

- Approved a rate hike for Southern Union Gas, which will average about \$1.15 a month for the average user. This is their first rate increase in seven years.

- Accepted a donation from Southern Union Gas to place a gas water heater in the Farwell Community Center, replacing an electric one. The city's cost will be about \$50 for materials.

- Narrowed the list of applicants for the city marshal's post to 5. The council will meet in two weeks in executive session to interview these final candidates.

- Heard Harlin Obenshain request a zoning change for an area along 8th Street (behind the former ASCS office) for mobile homes. Neighbors will be polled.

- Appointed Edwina Owen and Colleen Stover as city election officials in May.

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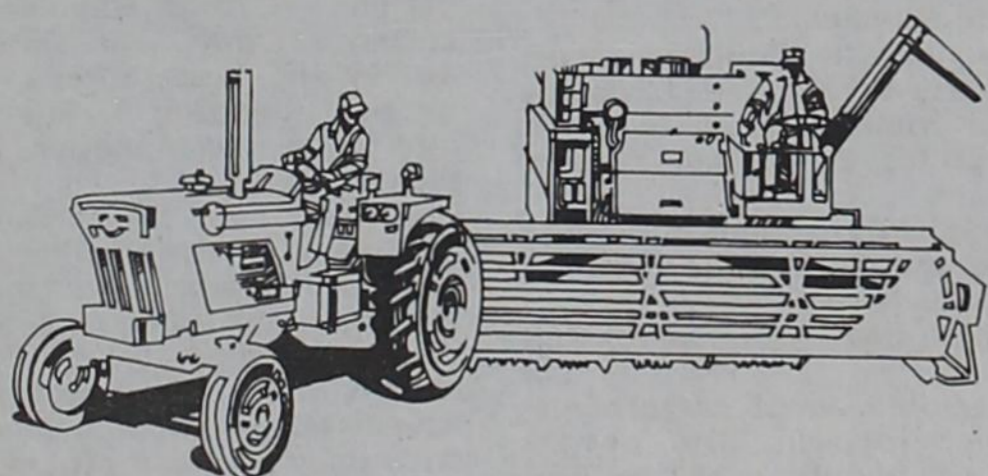
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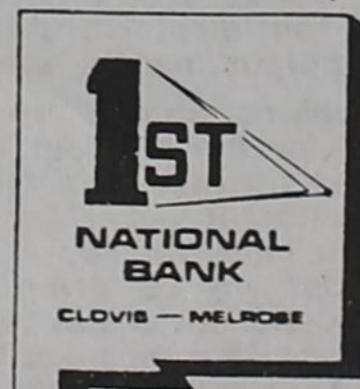

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County schools could face serious financial problems

If the Texas state legislature follows the state Supreme Court's rulings on the Edgewood vs. Kirby school financial case, it could mean severe financial blows to three of the four Farmer County school corporations.

According to a report by the National Center for Policy Analysis, the Edgewood vs. Kirby decision would cause:

- Farwell Schools would lose \$5,342.
- Friona Schools would lose

\$988,101.

- Lazbuddie Schools would lose \$279,744.

- Bovina Schools would lose \$170,693.

This would occur if the state legislature adopted the recommendations of the Supreme Court.

Farwell has a much higher tax rate than the other three school systems. That is why their projected loss would be so much lighter.

Of course, the state legislature may adopt a totally different formula than that recommended by the Supreme Court.

"Many people assume that the Supreme Court decision requires more equality in school revenues. In fact, the court ruled that there must be equal revenue for equal tax effort," said Kathy Hayes, an economist at Southern Methodist University who helped to write the report.

"Because many of the plaintiff school districts in the lawsuit have below average tax rates, this will cause them to have below average revenues."

Using a strict interpretation of the Supreme Court ruling, the NCPA study predicted a number of surprises:

* Of the 67 plaintiff school districts that "won" the case, at least 27 (more than a third) will lose revenue because of the Supreme Court decision. Farwell is one of these.

* Of the 49 defendant school districts that "lost" the case, at least 10 will gain revenue under the ruling.

* Of the 30 districts most affected by the ruling, 19 districts (including Houston, Dallas and Austin) did not enter the case on either side.

Farwell was a plaintiff in this case. Bovina and Lazbuddie were not involved in the case, but they will be affected by it if the state legislature acts as the Supreme Court has ordered.

The Supreme Court ruled that tax rates should be the main determinant of school revenues. The study concludes that this policy of taking from each district according to its ability and giving to each district according to its tax effort will lead to even more inequality than we have now.

The state Supreme Court turned the matter back to the state legislature for resolution. The state legislature is currently meeting to set new guidelines for state school spending.

"We had an excellent year. I'm really proud of them, they fought hard. Next year we'll be even better," he said.

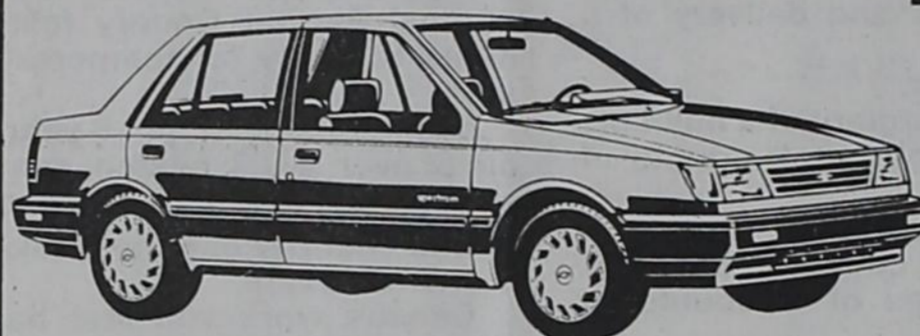
The Wolverines lost by one

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Cutback proposals officially accepted

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to accept the administration's proposals to issue contracts to 42 professional staff members for next year.

They also voted to take final action for the non-renewal of the administrative officer post held currently by Gwen Corn, the high school principal's position held by David Reynolds, and the part time secondary teaching position held by Nancy Reynolds.

They also took final action on reducing the vocational agriculture position from 12 months to 11 months per year.

Specific organizational changes for administration of the high school and junior high school will be made at some time after the new superintendent takes office.

The personnel changes are due to budget cuts.

The board presented certificates of recognition to Kay Stanton, Jo Lynda Lusk, and Leslie Lunsford for their work in the Junior High Chapter I program in the areas of computer literacy and tutorial help. They also presented certificates of recognition to Verona Traynor, Flo Davis, Chris Roach, and Darlene Gonzales for their work in the Chapter I program in the areas of reading, and English at the elementary level.

The board voted to allow this year's senior class to take their senior class trip to Branson, Mo. The one-time suspension of the board's 500 mile limit on class trips was made because the seniors presented the itinerary for a well-planned educational trip to an area that is closer to Farwell than Houston is. The option presented to the board would be less expensive than a trip to Houston.

The senior class is planning a Mother's Day Dinner to raise the rest of the money they need for the trip.

The board accepted the District Health Plan as presented by school nurse Sarah Owen. The district is required by the state to have a report of this nature.

Supt. John Grigsby said there had been a significant cut in expenditures each month for the past three months, and

that there had been a slight increase in revenues due to the higher tax rate.

On the recommendation of Leandra Byrd, the board took no action on the school's computer maintenance agreement; they will simply let it expire.

The board also:

- Accepted the athletic budget as prepared by AD Rex Cumpton for \$27,510. This reflects a 14% cut over this year's budget.

- Accepted the recommendations of new textbooks as presented by the textbook committee.

- Prepared a list of names of people who might act as a nominating committee for the school board since no candidates had filed for the school board positions by the time of the school board meeting, and the filing period ends on March 21. Those suggested by the board as possible nominating committee members included: Richard Haseloff, Margaret Aycock, Carrie Anderson, David Norton, Terry Travis, Vick Christian and Michael DeLeon.

- Heard Grigsby explain that this election all write-in candidates must file for election in advance or they will not be counted. He also noted that starting this year the state requires the board to canvas the election at its May meeting, and the newly elected board members would take office at the meeting following the canvassing.

- Called a special meeting for March 19 to meet with the Search Consultants about the candidates for the superintendent's position.

The \$1 million returned was composed of \$744,000 in capital credits from 1974-75 and an interim refund of \$256,000 from Southwestern Public Service through the Golden Spread Electric Cooperative.

This year, Deaf Smith recorded \$1,488,399 in margins. This is the second largest margin in the cooperative's

history, only exceeded in 1984.

The annual report featured pictures of four projects that occurred during the year. One of them showed the Charles Christian home south of Bovina. The caption noted: "Mr. and Mrs. Charles Christian updated and added on to the original Christian homestead located south of Bovina. Features now include an unusual and attractive doorway, a modern kitchen and a dual fuel heat pump."
