
Hardage, Curtis win 7th contest

'In the real world'

Business teachers often stress the fact that the skills that students learn in class are directly applicable to jobs that the students will get "in the real world."

Monica Salugero learned that her business instructor, Ann Liethen of Texico High School, was right. Monica spent the summer using her word processing skills at Cannon Air Force Base.

Last spring, Monica was in Mrs. Liethen's Word Processing Il class at Texico High School. She spent the first few weeks of the class refreshing her skills with the WordStar computer program and building speed and skill in word processing.

The second half of the semester she worked with principal Kenneth Shaw typing work for the school on the word processor. This gave her a variety of experiences in an office setting.

Because of this experience, Mrs. Liethen and Shaw recommended Monica as a participant in the New Mexico Youth Employment Program. She was placed in the Publications Distribution Office at Cannon Air Force Base.

An Air Force base as large as Cannon can be intimidating to a high school junior from a small town, but the personnel at Cannon made Monica feel right at home. They were friendly and helpful, and "They escorted me everywhere I had to go on base," she says.

When Monica first arrived, they gave her simple tasks that any high school student could handle. She was asked to help count and inventory stacks of standard forms used by the Air Force and the Tactical Air Command which were stored in a large warehouse.



Wheat program contracts may be modified

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter recently announced his intention to offer producers the option to modify their 1990 wheat program contracts.

"This action is necessary to maintain our humanitarian food aid commitments while adding slightly to U.S. carryover supplies following two consecutive years of drought," Yeutter said. USDA requested and received Presidential authority to use 1.5 million metric tons of wheat for fiscal year 1989 and has requested 2 million metric tons for fiscal year 1990 from the Food Security Wheat Reserve to meet U.S. international food aid commitments. "The action today does not suggest that we expect another year of less than average wheat yields, not will it boost stocks significantly," Yeutter said. "But it will help restore stocks to safer levels. In view of the tight U.S. and world supply and demand situation we should give what producers the option to increase plantings if they wish to do so."



Based on current USDA estimates due to this change. harvested wheat acres are estimated to rise to 69.6 million acres from 67.5 resulting in an expected 2.596 million bushels of wheat compared to 2.530 bushels of wheat.

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
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Steers still unbeaten; race past Hart, 42-11

The following information is from the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.:

The average price paid to farmers for U.S. cotton inched up to 61.1 cents per pound in August, half a penny above the July price and 8.2 cents over the 52.9 cent yearly low established in February. The August increase, together with the months' 430,000 bale marketing, brings the cumulative weighted average price on 5.67 million bales sold through August to 56.2 cents, up four - tenths of a cent from the July figure. Producers are keenly interested in these numbers because they determine the size of deficiency payments due after the end of the year. The per - pound deficiency payment rate will equal the difference between the calendar year weighted average farm price, as reported by the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), and this year's 73.4 cent target. Each farmer's total payment will be determined by multiplying the rate times his farm's established per - acre program yield times planted acres. gram yields instead of actual yields, says Donald Johnson,

up for the low payment rate that appears in the offing for 1989.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture last fall, using world supply - demand estimates in effect at the time, projected a payment rate fo 21.4 cents per pound. Forty percent of that amount, 8.56 cents, has already been paid. And, looking at rising monthly average prices as the season approaches the heavy marketing volume normally seen toward the end of each year. producers now are wondering how much the final payment may be and even if they might be required to repay a part of the advance. Concern about the size of the final payment if fully justified, Johnson says,"but it's hard to imagine the year's total payment falling below the eight - and - a - half cent advance." For that to happen, according to the PCG figures, the farm price for the remainder of the year wiould have to average almost 70 cents per pound and marketings would have to be about nine million bales.
