Walter also sent several letters to the editor from the same paper entitled "A Cubs fan's 20 reasons to hate Thompson (the writer who wrote the above column)."

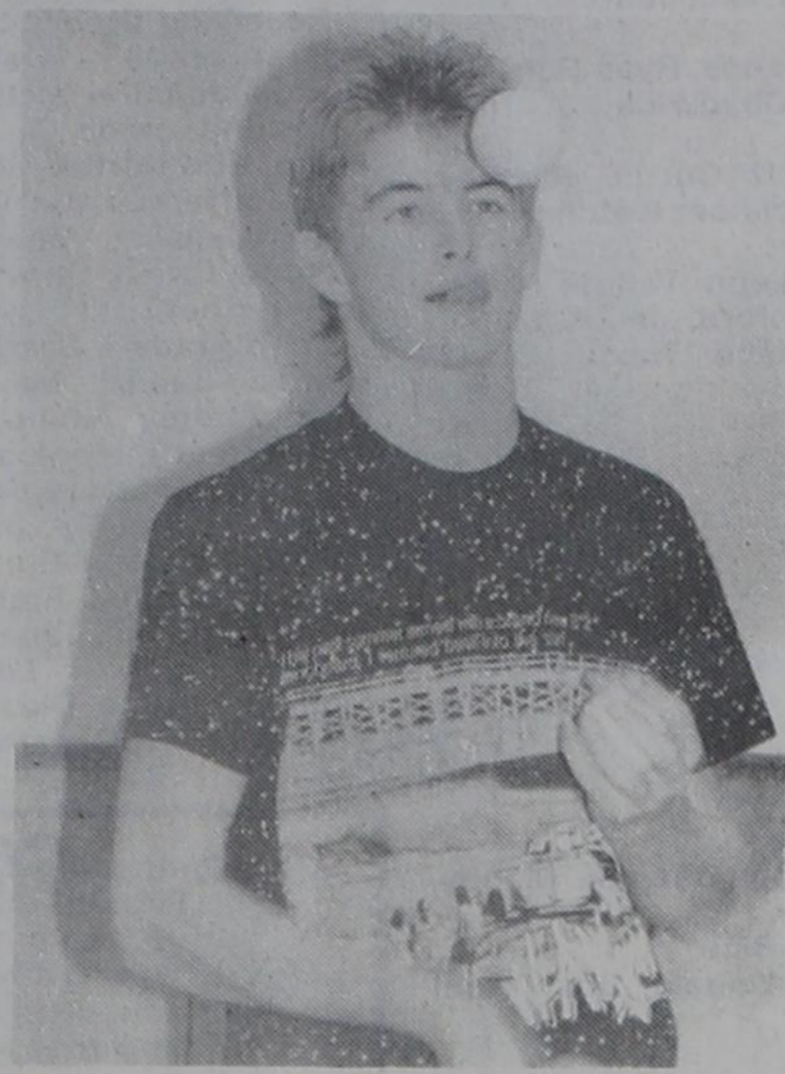
Texico is ranked 5th among Class A schools in New Mexico by the Lubbock newspaper.

Clowning around

Clowning around was actually what a group of Panhandle gifted and talented high school students were supposed to do at a recent seminar held at Region XVI in Amarillo.

Farwell students along with 100 students from 18 Panhandle districts, participated in juggling, clown makeup activities, and in choreographed sound and movement activities.

Terrall Lewis, chairman of the Dance and Theater Department at Amarillo College, choreographed the students. Lewis told the students that the way they posture themselves affects the way people react to them.

"You can learn to change people's attitudes toward you and control what you get from them by the way you handle yourself physically," Lewis told the group.

Certain students donned masks and led small groups in producing actions and sounds and then in describing their reactions. "Actors use body language all the time to add

to their portrayal of a character," he said.

The students also listened to a presentation on humor. Led by a group of Amarillo college students in clown regalia, area students were asked to improvise responses to cues in which they were asked to depict a wide variety of characters in various roles.

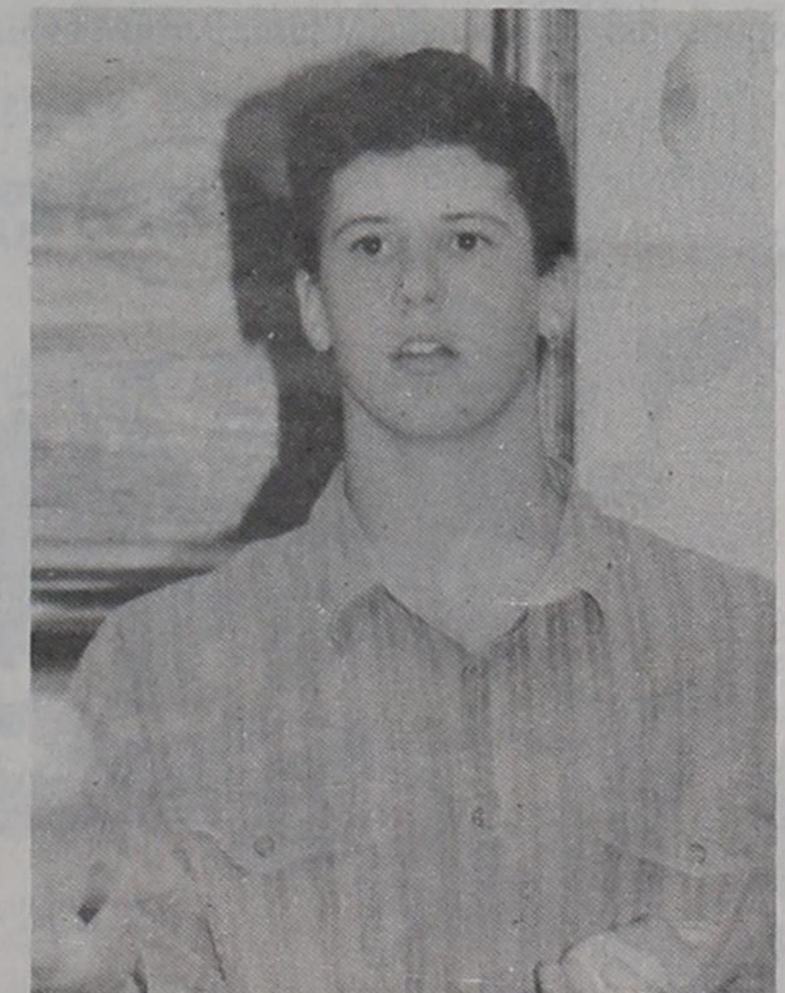

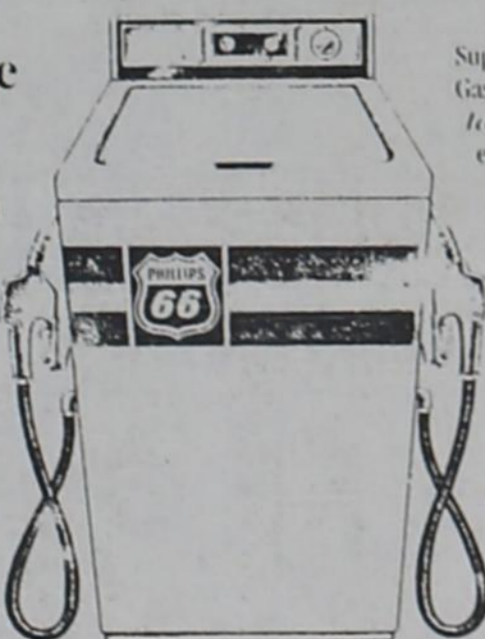

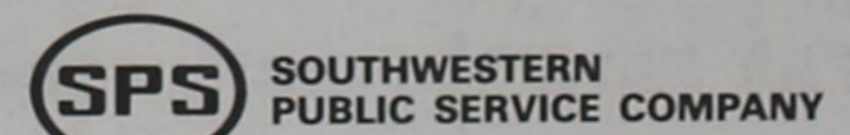

## 'In the real world'

Business teachers often stress the fact that the skills that students learn in class are directly applicable to jobs that the students will get "in the real world."

Monica Salugero learned that her business instructor, Ann Liethen of Texico High School, was right. Monica spent the summer using her word processing skills at Cannon Air Force Base.

Last spring, Monica was in Mrs. Liethen's Word Processing II class at Texico High School. She spent the first few weeks of the class refreshing her skills with the WordStar computer program and building speed and skill in word processing.

The second half of the semester she worked with principal Kenneth Shaw typing work for the school on the word processor. This gave her a variety of experiences in an office setting.

Because of this experience, Mrs. Liethen and Shaw recommended Monica as a participant in the New Mexico Youth Employment Program. She was placed in the Publications Distribution Office at Cannon Air Force Base.

An Air Force base as large as Cannon can be intimidating to a high school junior from a small town, but the personnel at Cannon made Monica feel right at home. They were friendly and helpful, and "They escorted me everywhere I had to go on base," she says.

When Monica first arrived, they gave her simple tasks that any high school student could handle. She was asked to help count and inventory stacks of standard forms used by the Air Force and the Tactical Air Command which were stored in a large warehouse.

The next day Monica started working on the computer in the Publications Distribution Office. She was surprised to find that the office was using the very same program that she had learned in Mrs. Liethen's class. Because she already knew how to use the program, she could begin doing her work with little or no training time.

As part of her job, Monica had to keep a computer log of the jobs that came into the office and one of those that were completed and shipped from the office. She also had to keep a written backup log for the office.

Her work in the Publication Distribution Office included several other things besides word processing. Sometimes Monica filed finished forms in a huge filing cabinet. At other times she operated some of the machinery in the office. She learned to operate a high speed copy machine. By the time summer ended she could run off reams of paper and solve most of the minor problems the machine might develop. She also learned to operate a machine to staple large stacks of paper, and a commercial hole punching machine as well.

Monica enjoyed her job because each day she had a variety of tasks to do. "I learned a lot of things thanks to my supervisors, Mr. Gregory L. Brown and Sgt. Clark. I have to thank Cannon Air Force Base for the opportunity they gave me to work there. I also thank my supervisors for the experience they gave me," said Monica.

Monica summed up the summer's work experience in three words, "It was fun." She especially liked meeting all the people.

Monica is a senior at Texico High School this year. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Salguero of Texico. She hopes to work again next summer before starting computer science classes at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces next fall.

## Wheat program contracts may be modified

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter recently announced his intention to offer producers the option to modify their 1990 wheat program contracts.

"This action is necessary to maintain our humanitarian food aid commitments while adding slightly to U.S. carryover supplies following two consecutive years of drought," Yeutter said. USDA requested and received Presidential authority to use 1.5 million metric tons of wheat for fiscal year 1989 and has requested 2 million metric tons for fiscal year 1990 from the Food Security Wheat Reserve to meet U.S. international food aid commitments.

"The action today does not suggest that we expect another year of less than average wheat yields, not will it boost stocks significantly," Yeutter said. "But it will help restore stocks to safer levels. In view of the tight U.S. and world supply and demand situation we should give what producers the option to increase plantings if they wish to do so."

Producers may obtain further details from their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

Based on current USDA estimates due to this change, harvested wheat acres are estimated to rise to 69.6 million acres from 67.5 resulting in an expected 2,596 million bushels of wheat compared to 2,530 bushels of wheat.

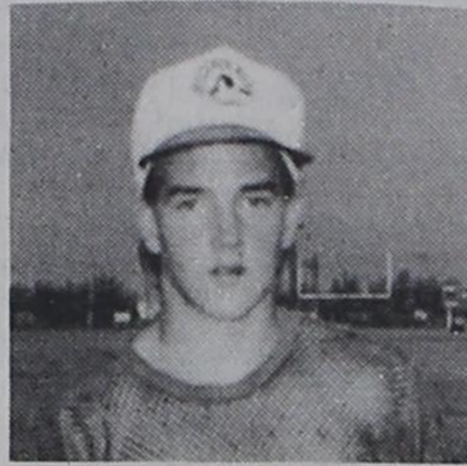
An onside kick worked. And with 39 seconds left in the half, Martin scored again, from 5 yards out. The extra point attempt failed. Texico led 14-12 at the half.

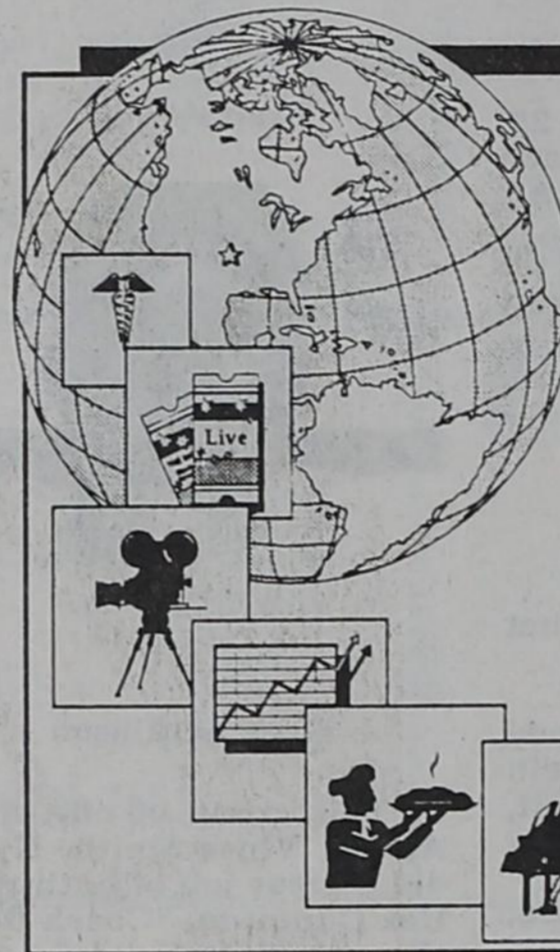

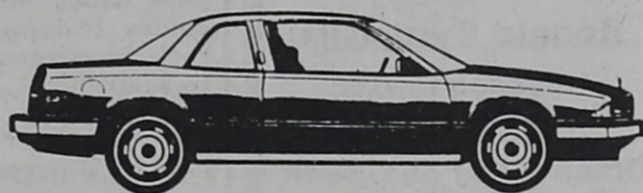



## Prices paid for cotton inch up

The following information is from the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.:  
The average price paid to farmers for U.S. cotton inched up to 61.1 cents per pound in August, half a penny above the July price and 8.2 cents over the 52.9 cent yearly low established in February. The August increase, together with the months' 430,000 bale marketing, brings the cumulative weighted average price on 5.67 million bales sold through August to 56.2 cents, up four-tenths of a cent from the July figure.  
Producers are keenly interested in these numbers because they determine the size of deficiency payments due after the end of the year. The per-pound deficiency payment rate will equal the difference between the calendar year weighted average farm price, as reported by the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), and this year's 73.4 cent target.  
Each farmer's total payment will be determined by multiplying the rate times his farm's established per-acre program yield times planted acres.  
Basing payments on program yields instead of actual yields, says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, is a significant feature of the current cotton program. "When we have a bad crop year like this year," he explains, "some producers would get no payment at all and others very little if payments were made on actual production." That feature, however, can't make

up for the low payment rate that appears in the offering for 1989.  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture last fall, using world supply-demand estimates in effect at the time, projected a payment rate of 21.4 cents per pound. Forty percent of that amount, 8.56 cents, has already been paid. And, looking at rising monthly average prices as the season approaches the heavy marketing volume normally seen toward the end of each year, producers now are wondering how much the final payment may be and even if they might be required to repay a part of the advance.  
Concern about the size of the final payment if fully justified, Johnson says, "but it's hard to imagine the year's total payment falling below the eight-and-a-half-cent advance." For that to happen, according to the PCG figures, the farm price for the remainder of the year would have to average almost 70 cents per pound and marketings would have to be about nine million bales. The marketing figure is entirely possible, Johnson says, "but the chance for an average price above about 65 cents is remote at best."  
A more realistic projection for the final four-month period, he thinks, is about nine million bales at an average price between 62 and 64 cents, resulting in a year-long average price of 61 or 62 cents. The total deficiency payment under that scenario would be between 12.4 and 13.4 cents, leaving a payment above the advance between 3.8 and 4.8 cents per pound.
