ESA to sponsor pheasant hunt for 9th year

Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority is sponsoring its 9th annual pheasant hunt this year.

Hunting sites will be located in Parmer and Bailey counties and will be reserved for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant season dates, Dec. 8-22. Each hunter must have a Texas hunting license.

The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying permits from ESA. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to hunt.

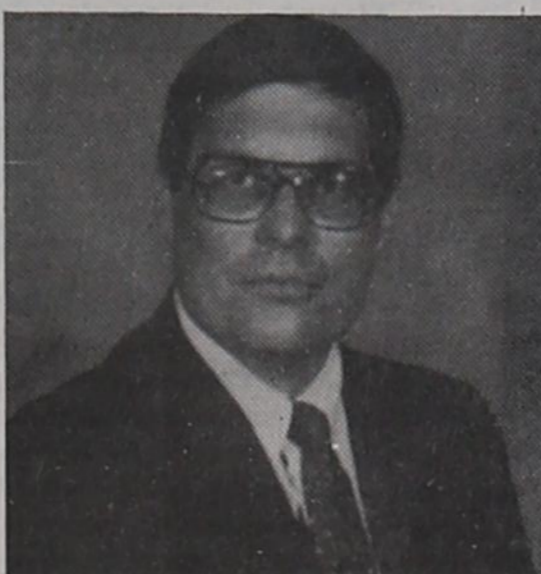
ESA will limit the number of permits to assure that each hunter who buys one will have a chance to meet his quota. All reservations are made on a first come, first serve basis.

Texico water rate may go up

The Texico City Council discussed Tuesday the probability of raising its water rates.

CPA De'Aun Willoughby presented the annual audit which noted that the budgets were very close to actual expenditures, with one exception: the water and sewer account. It was \$8,200 in the red. Also, Mrs. Willoughby complimented city employees for keeping records in excellent shape.

Mayor Doyal LaRue asked city employees to work out figures which would be required to bring this account into the "black." One figure thrown out was an increase of 6 cents per 1,000 gallons.

In other business, the council:

- Received forms to seek the annual beautification grant from the state. City employees will study what can be done to beautify the Tower Park.

- Received a suggested check list from the Chamber of Commerce to use before returning the \$50 deposits to groups using the Community Center. It was taken under advisement.

The Chamber is unhappy that despite the recent center renovation some damage has been done to the center by groups using it. So it wants the center checked before the deposits are given back.

The proposed check list includes: floors, walls, bathrooms, kitchen (stove, refrigerator and counters), tables and chairs, and "any spills must be cleaned thoroughly."

- Heard City Attorney Duane Hamar say he has redrafted the curb ordinance to include new language on "cutting" and it's ready for council perusal.

- Extended the contract with Eastwood Construction to complete the annual street repair work.

- Heard City Clerk Treasurer Marie Christian report that 3 Albuquerque engineering firms have asked for the project specifications for building a new well. Bids will be opened Dec. 18.

- Didn't discuss any possible annexations.

- Had a lengthy discussion on what an agenda should look like.

- Met in executive session

to discuss possible cemetery land acquisition.

- Heard councilman Butch Tharp say he would discuss a study of water and sewer topics at the next meeting.

- Had a long discussion over a problem involving sewer line ownership. There's a sewer off the State Line Road that the council isn't sure if it's on private or public property. If it's on private property, then it's the property owner's responsibility for repairs. If it's on public property (under the alley), then it's the city's.

An engineering study would cost a couple of thousand

dollars and the council would prefer a cheaper way of finding out. The topic was left up in the air.

- Discussed a situation where Water Supt. Billy Hammitt has been using his own personal computer for keeping up city records. Basically, the council feels that it's the city's responsibility to provide a computer. This was considered but no action was taken.

- After hearing a report that someone may have been rafting on the pond at KKR Park, instructed city employees to install 3 "no trespassing" signs there.

Engineer sought for new well

The Texico City Council had a special meeting Nov. 20 to discuss its well problems.

Because KKR Park well has been shut due to contamination and the well on the railroad property has gone dry, the city now has only one functioning well, at the Tower Park.

The council voted to advertise for engineering services, including a complete feasibility study for a new potable ("drinkable") well. This is to include suggested sites for it.

The proposal deadline is Dec. 11. A pre-bid meeting is scheduled for Dec. 11. And bids will be opened at a special meeting Dec. 18.

The state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) has told Texico it doesn't want a new well built south or southeast of the KKR Park well. Also, it doesn't want it drilled on railroad property due to chances for contamination. The council had considered buying Santa Fe Railroad property for a new well site.

The previous well, the council had voted to seek emergency funds for constructing a new well from the state Community Development Block Grant Committee. Mayor Doyal LaRue and councilman Butch Tharp had planned to go to Santa Fe and appear before the committee Nov. 16.

But on Nov. 15, the state called to cancel the Texico request from its agenda. Texico was told it needed an engineering study completed before making its funding request and also that the proposed railroad site wouldn't work.

Thus, it appears it will be a few months before Texico can seek the CDBG funds - if any are still left at the time.

Meanwhile, the EID has taken ground and oil samples in the KKR Park area. However, federal EPA inspectors haven't shown up as had been predicted.

Longevity pay approved

The Parmer County Commissioners voted unanimously Monday to institute longevity pay for county employees.

Here are the conditions:
A permanent fulltime employee must have five full years of continuous service before being eligible. Beginning with five full years of continuous service, the longevity pay will start at \$50 monthly.

retary or Extension Service agents.

In other business, the commissioners met with Rhea Bradley, resident highway department engineer based in Littlefield.

He said work is under way in four-laning the Amarillo highway from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line.

He said bids will be let in December 1991 to 4-lane the stretch from Friona to Bovina, and bids will be let in May 1994 to 4-lane the road from Bovina to the New Mexico state line. He cited cash flow as a reason for the slowness in getting the job completed.

The commissioners want the work speeded up and plan to talk with state officials about it.

The commission paid its annual dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

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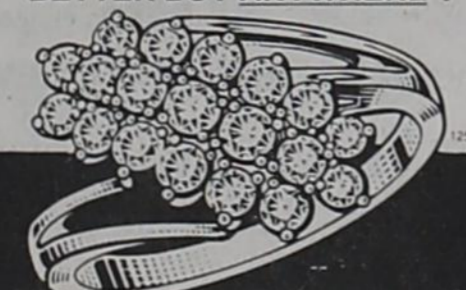
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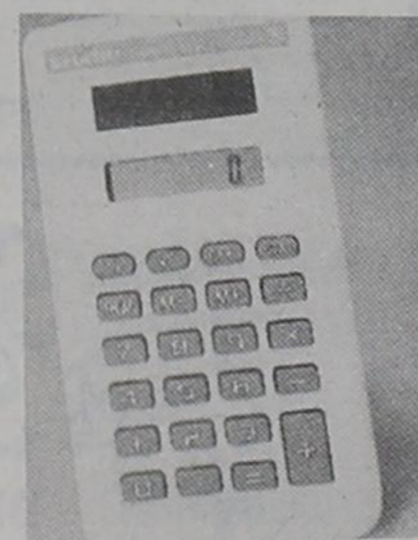
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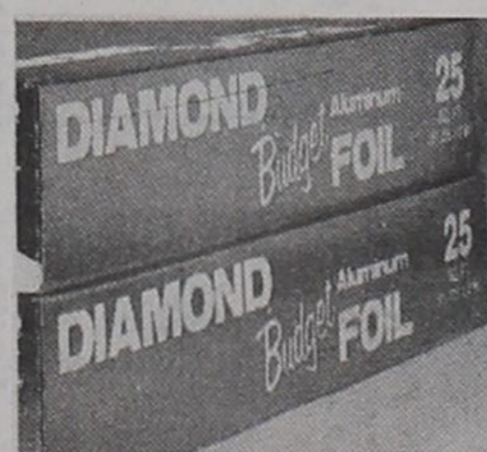


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Steer team makes history by topping Spur

The unbeaten Farwell Steers improved their record to 11-0 by whipping the Spur Bulldogs, 34-6, last Friday at Lowrey Field in Lubbock to capture the Area Championship.

According to longtime Steer fans, this was the first time in history that the Farwell football team has won the second round of the state playoffs.

The Steers will face the Rankin Red Devils, 10-1, at 8 p.m. today (Friday) at Wigwam Stadium in Seminole, Texas, in the Regional semifinals.

It's a 2 hour and 15 minute drive to Seminole if you take 214 through Plains. The stadium is about 100 yards off the highway in Seminole.

Spur was hurt by the loss of its star running back Terrell Brantley, who had gained over 2,000 yards on the season. He had an injured leg.

But Farwell also was hurt by the loss of Darren Haseloff - middle linebacker, tight end, kicker and place kicker - who had suffered a broken arm in the victory over Booker the preceding week.

Replacing Haseloff were: Roger Billingsley at tight end - who caught 2 passes for 43 yards; Kirk Lingnau at middle linebacker - he had a solid game in anchoring the Steer defense that allowed only 24 yards on 22 rushes; and Victor Andriani at kicker and place kicker. Andriani, a Texico-Farwell Rotary Club foreign exchange student from Argentina, boomed most of his kickoffs to around the 10 yard line, while making 4 of 5 extra point tries.

Before a huge Steer crowd at Lubbock, Andriani, after a penalty, kicked off to the Spur 15; it was returned to the 32. The Bulldogs gained only a yard in 3 tries and punted - only their 9th punt of the year. Farwell took over at its 49.

An Actkinson pass to Stewart gained 21 to the Spur 27. On 4th and 7, Actkinson hit Stewart with a TD pass. Andriani's kick made it 7-0 at 7:46 of the first quarter.

Andriani's kick carried to the 7, and was returned to the Spur 23. Lingnau had a strong tackle and Actkinson knocked down a long pass. Spur quarterback Heath Givens showed his expertise throughout the game by completing 19 of 37 passes for 320 yards.

In attempting to punt again, the Spur snap was bad and the punter threw the ball for a short completion - far short of the first down needed. So Farwell started on the Spur 33.

Stewart ran for 9 yards. Joel Smith, showing his usual hard-driving fullback style, punched for the first down at the 20. Stewart rambled for 19 yards to the 1. And Actkinson snuck over for the TD at 4:00. The Andriani kick made it 14-0.

Andriani's next kick was downed in the end zone. Monty Delgado, who has been on a rampage lately in intercepting passes and recovering fumbles, recovered a fumble at the Spur 15. Smith immediately ran for 11. And the drive was capped by Delgado's 4-yard TD run at 2:32 of the first period. The Andriani kick made it 21-0.

Ray Haseloff tripped up the punt returner at the Spur 19 after Andriani had kicked to the 4. Kade Kent had a good tackle on defense.

In the second period, Spur moved the ball behind Givens' pinpoint passes to the Spur 43. But they had to punt again. Stewart took the punt at the Farwell 35 and returned it to the Spur 48 - which meant the punt ended up a plus 3 yards.

For the fourth time in its first four offensive series, Farwell scored again, virtually putting the game out of reach. Actkinson ran the keeper for 14 yards. Then Actkinson hit Billingsley with a 33-yard TD pass at 10:21. The Andriani kick made it 21-0.

Spur was held again. But on a fake punt, a Bulldog pass gained 20 yards to the Steer 35. Another pass got Spur to the 16. Then the Spur runner fumbled and the ball popped into the air. Michael Arce grabbed it and galloped 53 yards to the Spur 37.

Smith ran for 8 and Delgado made the first down. But a penalty gave Farwell a 1st and 25. A pass to Stewart gained 12 but on 4th and 11 a run by Actkinson was short.

Late in the second quarter, Spur again went to the pass effectively. On a 4th and 7 at the Steer 43, they hit a pass

for 36 yards. The 7-yard TD was made by Givens on a keeper at 1:27. The extra point pass was intercepted by Stewart and Farwell led 28-6 at the half.

Any hopes of a comeback by Spur were dashed when Farwell used its first drive to score again. On the first play from the Steer 32, Stewart took a pitch and raced 43 yards to the Bulldog 25. A pass to Billingsley gained 15. And the drive ended when Stewart ran up the middle for a 7-yard TD at 9:33. The kick was low and Farwell led 34-6.

Spur didn't quit. They used the pass to get to the Steer 2. Three rushes gained only 1 yard as the defense (including a big stop by Ruben Lucio) dug in. On 4th down, a pass was caught - out of the end zone - and the Steers took over.

Farwell was stopped and punted to its 34. Then cornerback Chad Byrd made two big breakups of Givens' passes. On 4th and 6, a pass failed and Farwell took over on its 31.

Stewart went out at this point with a leg muscle strain. On offense, Lingnau caught a 13-yard pass. Billingsley then grabbed one for 12 yards as the fourth quarter started.

On 4th and 3 at the Spur 31, Delgado used good effort in getting the first down. But Spur recovered a fumble at its 26.

On defense, Delgado got a "hurry" on the quarterback, causing a bad pass. But Givens hit a pass for 51 yards to the Steer 19. Byrd intercepted in the end zone killing this Bulldog drive.

Farwell was held and had to punt. Freshman Lupe Garza was now used as the punter and hit one for 40 yards.

Actkinson quickly intercepted at the Steer 34 as the Bulldogs went for broke.

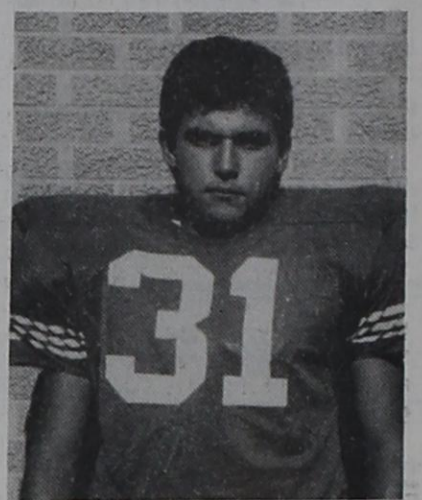
With 4 minutes left, the first stringers were taken out. The Steers were stopped and Garza punted again, for 34 yards. Time then ran out on the Bulldogs.

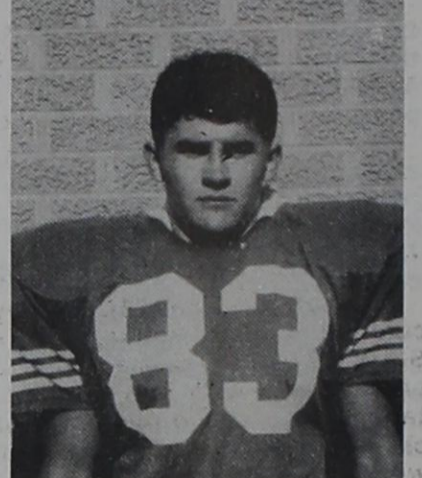

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It's been quite a year for area grid teams

The final regular season area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper showed that Texico - Farwell and Lazbuddie football players had super seasons.

Texico

Among the area New Mexico teams, the Wolverines finished 2nd (to Clovis) in team offense. Texico gained 2,830 yards rushing and 369 through the air for a total of 3,199, en route to a state Class A championship. This averaged to be 319.9 yards a game. Clovis averaged 335.5. Third was Lovington with an average of 315.

On defense, Texico again was 2nd, this time to Lovington. The Wolverines allowed 732 rushing yards and 538 passing yards - a total of 1,310. Thus, they gave up 131 overall yards a game. Lovington allowed an average of 125.3. Clovis was third, allowing 132.7 yards a game.

Among the individual leaders: Josh Autrey led all area rushers. He carried the ball 186 times for 1,705 yards, an average of 9.2 yards per carry. He averaged 170.5 yards a game, including 24 touchdowns. The second top rusher gained 1,150 yards.

Among the passers, Benjy McDaniel finished 8th. He

completed 26 of 52 throws for 353 yards and 7 TDs. He averaged 39.3 yards a game. However, he probably will best be remembered for his running in the title game against Hagerman, helping Texico to the state title.

Autrey led all area scorers with 160 points. He had 24 TDs rushing, 2 on pass completions and 2 extra-point plays.

Lazbuddie

The Longhorns, after a slow start, came on strong during the regular season. They finished 4th in team offense among area 6-Man teams. They gained 2,453 yards on the ground and 1,461 yards via the pass. Their total of 3,914 meant they averaged 391.4 yards a game.

The Longhorns finished 10th in team defense, allowing 3,209 yards - 2,218 on the ground and 1,081 through the air. Thus, they gave up an average of 320.9 yards a game.

Among area rushing leaders, Kirk Jesko finished 3rd, with 1,464 yards. He carried the ball 162 times for an 8.6 yard average.

Paul Williams finished 4th among the passers, with 85 completions in 183 attempts for 1,332 yards and 15 TDs. He averaged 133.2 yards a game via the aerial.

The Longhorns had two receivers among the top 10 in the area. Doug Barnes had 29 receptions for 468 yards and 7 TDs. Matt Cozby had 29 catches for 500 yards and 6 TDs.

Farwell

The Steers finished 3rd in team offense, gaining 393.9 yards a game. This included 2,581 on the ground and 964 through the air for a total of 3,545. On defense, the Steers were 1st, allowing a measly 138.9 yards a game - 719 rushing and 529 passing.

Shawn Stewart was 2nd among the area rushers with 1,261 yards - an average of 140.1 a game. He averaged 10 yards per carry. First was Spur's Terrance Brantley with 2,003 yards - an average of 222.6 yards a game.

Greg Atkinson was 3rd among the passers, with 45 completions in 102 tries for 931 yards - an average of

Rick finished second this year. Two years ago, he tied for third. He's good; in fact, he's leading the "Fearless Forecasters" in the Hereford Brand newspaper.

On the international front, I'd like to say how pleasantly surprised I am at the handling of the Iraq situation by President Bush.

I have a tendency to frown at the jobs our national leaders do, since it so often involves politics, to the detriment of the long-term success of the U.S. Not so in this case.

Bush was 100% correct to take the lead among the United Nations in confronting this aggression. Not only is it right from the viewpoint of our economic future, but it's ethically and morally correct. With the demise of Communist Russia, the United States has to be the world's policeman.

As I wrote during the midst of the "CRISIS," I didn't expect a fast war and favored a long-term embargo. I still feel the same way. But I can already see the short patience (and short sightedness) used by Americans, who always want a quick solution to world problems.

We must stand fast in the gulf, maintaining a strong military presence until Saddam Hussein caves in, which he will. But I'm afraid that those stupid public opinion polls will force Bush's hand. The public wants a resolution - yesterday.

Speaking of those polls - which are a bane to our leadership - it shows Bush's popularity has declined. All I can say is that if our President - whoever it is - starts basing his decisions on opinion polls rather than what he considers to be in the best interests of the U.S., then we all are in trouble. Please, Mr. President, ignore the polls.

Once again, I'd like to take this opportunity to blast the news media and the usual group of politicians who want to be president for their criticism of President Bush meeting with the Syrian president, since Syria has been labeled a terrorist state.

What folks must understand is that when you deal with Middle East situations you can't look at things from the usual perspective. The Middle East is a quagmire. Today's friend is tomorrow's enemy - and vice versa.

If you are going to dabble in Middle East politics - as the U.S. currently is doing via the Gulf Crisis - then you have to play the game correctly. If we continue to view Syria, a major frontline player, as an enemy, we can defeat ourselves. It's like being a partner with Russia during World War II. We didn't exactly love it - but it was in our best interests. The same goes for

dealing with Syria.

We're entering a new world order. Russia is so weak it can't even put down rebellions in its own minor provinces. Red China is faced with a divided populace - and unsure of how far to go down the capitalist road.

France traditionally only worries about its own former colonies (and has done an excellent job the past three decades at keeping Communism out). England is only strong enough to help out as a partner in major crises.

That leaves the U.S., by far the richest and strongest nation in the world. I'm not prepared at this point to talk about our "manifest destiny," but I would allow that we need to concern ourselves throughout the world when our national interests are involved.

Iraq must be forced to relinquish Kuwait. But patience is needed.

What a year it has been for our area football teams.

* The Wolverines win a state grid title for the first time since 1983.

* The Steers go through the regular season undefeated (their closest margin was by 3 TDs).

* The Longhorns shrug off injuries and get into the state playoffs.

First, the Wolverines: In my Dec. 1, 1989, column, I wrote "don't be surprised if the Wolverines end up going for a state football title next year."

The nucleus was there last year but the team was young. This year, the experience paid off. And add to that running back Josh Autrey, who skipped football the preceding two years, and you have a state champ.

I hope you were pleased with the excellent write-ups by Janice Jenkins of the Texico games. Mrs. Jenkins, a Texico elementary teacher, did an outstanding job at giving credit to all the players, including the blockers and the tacklers.

It's always a problem for large newspapers which carry game results to go beyond the scorers. That's why it's nice for a small, weekly paper like the Tribune to give space to as many of the kids as possible. Mrs. Jenkins always tried to mention the kids who made the big blocks or the kids who made the tackles forcing punts. That was superb.

We also have photos of the offensive and defensive Players of the Week, picked by our local coaches. That also helps credit the linemen.

When you get a chance and see Mrs. Jenkins, please thank her for her excellent work. With her covering the Wolverine games and me at the Steer games, I think it works out well for our football coverage.

When I look back on this

Texico team (I did get to see three games), though, my mind will flash to Autrey carrying the ball and outracing the opposing defenders. And Benji McDaniel running the option play to perfection. And Hector Orozco hitting those points after. And those team tackles.

Congratulations, Wolverines, on a fine season. And judged by that huge crowd at the title game, it was very much appreciated by the community.

It's hard for me to catch Lazbuddie games so we really appreciated Coach C.W. Williams calling in game results each Monday. He's done a great job at keeping the Longhorn football program strong.

This has been a tough year, what with injuries, academic problems. But the Longhorns edged their way into the playoffs with an upset of Silverton.

Then the next week, they take on 9-1 Meadow and cream 'em. Are they done yet? Heck, no. The Longhorns come back the following week and utterly shock the state's No. 3 ranked team, Guthrie.

I don't think it's in the realm of fantasy to predict that Lazbuddie has as good a shot at a state title as any other 6-Man team in Texas. As an underdog, they have a lot of folks rooting for them.

The kids - Jesko, Barnes, Brockman, the Gonzaleses, Williams, Cozby, Bradshaw, Russell, Zamora and the others - have played tough all year to give their fans a lot of thrills.

Keep it up, Longhorns! - Finally, the Steers - still in the hunt.

What a team. In talking to longtime Farwell fans, this is the best team in almost 30 years. It likely will be another 30 before we see such excellent teamwork and super athletes.

I always appreciate good line play, especially defense. And the Steers led the area teams in that category this year. That's remarkable when you think of the time each game when the first string is taken out.

It takes a lot more than just having some super athletes to have a super team. Often, you have conflicts within the team that can destroy it. Or drug problems can also ruin the best of teams.

What I see this year is a real fellowship among the Steers and their coaches. I see a "team." And I enjoy that.

Sure, there are the super athletes - Shawn Stewart, Greg Actkinson, Darren Haseloff, and others. But it doesn't matter how good a running back is - if the offensive line doesn't block for him (just ask Eric Dickerson of the Indianapolis Colts).

How many times did we see Stewart almost stroll into the end zone untouched as

his blockers cleared the way. Heck, I might even have been able to score some of them (maybe). And just as many times, I saw Stewart use his God-given moves to avoid tackler after tackler. He's an outstanding player.

The Steers suffered a tough loss when Haseloff broke his arm. To show his importance, here's how they replaced him:

Victor Andriani, the foreign exchange student from Argentina, took over his kicking and place kicking chores. Kirk Lingna took over his middle linebacker role. And Roger Billingsley took over his tight end responsibility.

That says something about a ball player when 3 others are needed to fulfill his role.

I know Darren is down after the injury but he ought to feel real good about the role he played in getting the Steers to where they are now. He'll be remembered for his tough, aggressive linebacker play; his clutch pass receptions (he's one of the area leaders); his end zone kicks which always gave the Steers good field position - a prerequisite to having a successful season; and his extra point consistency. Most of all, he'll always be part of the best Farwell Steer football team in history.

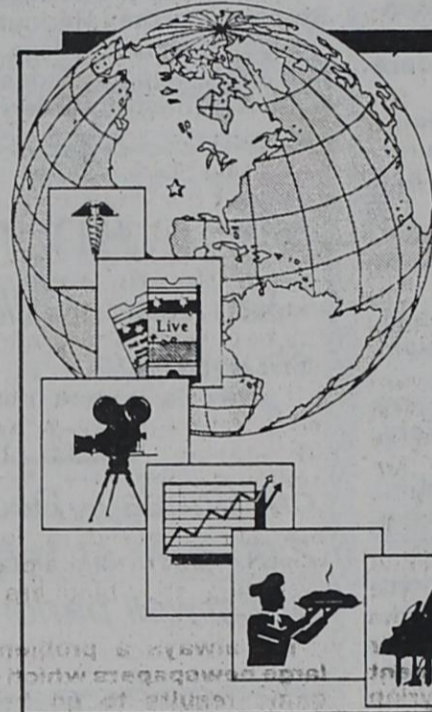

Bailey County Co-op gets rate reduction

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative reduced wholesale power rates by 10 percent and paid \$6,233,485 on Oct. 29 in refunds and interest to 11 of its member systems. Bailey County Electric Cooperative received \$533,614.18.

The rate reduction and refunds are the result of an agreement between Golden Spread and its power supplier, Southwestern Public Service Company, that settled a complaint which had been filed by Golden Spread with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in August, 1989. Golden Spread had charged that SPS's wholesale rates were excessive.

As a result of the settlement agreement, SPS has reduced wholesale rates to Golden Spread and paid refunds on wholesale power purchased by Golden Spread since January 1, 1990. Golden Spread has passed the refunds and lower rates on to its member systems.

The agreement also extends the contract between Golden Spread and SPS to Dec. 31, 2004, and permits Golden Spread to obtain a portion of its wholesale power supply from other sources beginning Jan. 1, 1997.

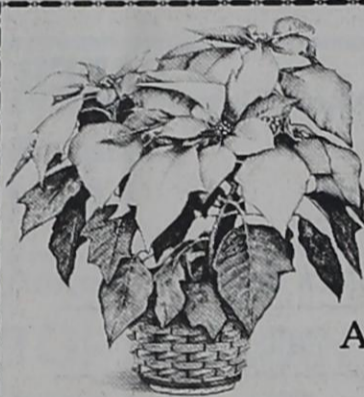

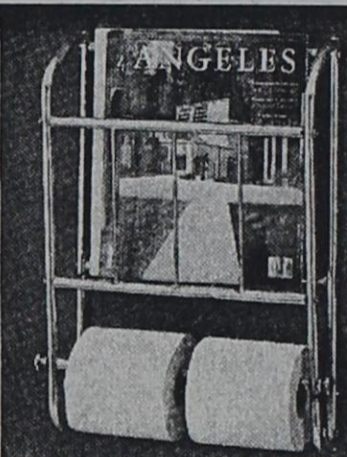

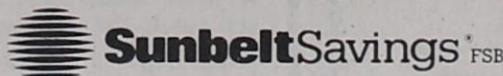

Lazbuddie pushes past Guthrie for area title

The Lazbuddie Longhorns shocked the Guthrie Jaguars, ranked No. 3 in Texas, last Friday at Smyer, 50-47, for the Area Championship.

The victory improves the Longhorns' record to 9-3. They now face the top-rated team in Texas, Ft. Hancock, in the Regional semi-final at 2 p.m. Saturday at Wink. It's a 218 mile trip from Lazbuddie. Ft. Hancock, near El Paso, is 11-0.

"We got after them and we played a super game," said Coach C.W. Williams. "We figured if we could keep up with Guthrie for 3 quarters, we'd be in good shape."

The game went down to the wire. Longhorn Paul Williams intercepted a Jaguar pass on the Lazbuddie 5 as time ran out.

As usual, the Longhorn offense was paced by Kirk Jesko and Williams. Coach Williams felt a key to the victory was that it seemed Guthrie keyed on Jesko, allowing Williams to pick up large chunks of yardage.

The Longhorns were buoyed by the return of Cozby to the lineup. Coach Williams said doctors gave the okay for him to play.

Lazbuddie was hurt though by the absence of place kicker Luis Gonzales, due to academic reasons. All but one kick for the extra points missed. The one was made by Eric Williams after the final Longhorn TD.

Lazbuddie opened the scoring when Williams hit Barnes with a 25-yard pass for a TD. After Guthrie scored twice - first on a 13 yard pass, then on a 62 yard run, Lazbuddie rolled up 3 TDs in a row.

First, Williams scored from the 8. Then he scored from the 1. And Jesko ran one in from the 18. Just before the half, Guthrie responded when Miller ran in a TD 62 yards. At the half, Lazbuddie led, 24-19.

It was a wild third quarter as a total of 40 points were rung up on the scoreboard. Guthrie took the lead on an 8-yard TD pass. Lazbuddie answered with a 3-yard TD run.

Guthrie scored twice more - on a 65 yard kickoff return and a 51-yard pass.

Now it was the Longhorns' time to light up the scoreboard. Barnes took a 40- yard scoring heave from Williams. Then Jesko galloped for a 45-yard TD run. The third period scoring ended when Guthrie tallied on a 49-yard run. And the Longhorns held on to their precarious lead, 42-41.

The final stanza saw only two TDs. Brockman scored on a 4-yard pass from Williams at 9:51. And Guthrie tallied on a 3-yard run. But Guthrie's hopes for a miracle finish were dashed by the Williams interception.


