And when one can be used to perhaps save a man's life, then I feel it was used in the best way possible.

Watch out for early signs of drug involvement such as the use of drug terminology, or the wearing of clothing with designs or slogans that promote drug usage.

Sudden changes in behavior such as unusual sleepiness and excessive activity can be either a sign of drug involvement or illness, and these changes should be investigated.

If items in the house are missing or stolen, it might be a sign of drug involvement.

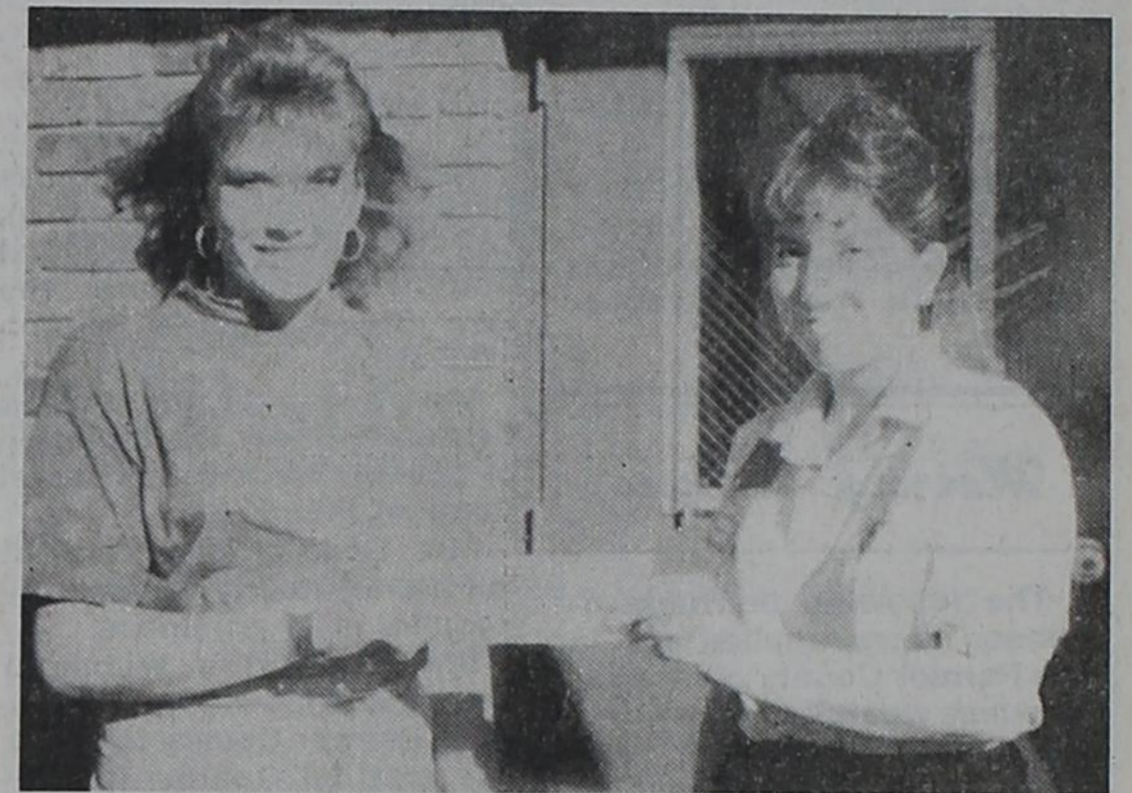

Texico water temporarily to be shut off

Texico will go without water from about 30 to 60 minutes today (Friday) because a main leak needs to be fixed.

Water Supt. Billy Hammitt alerts residents that the water will be turned off throughout the community at 1 p.m. mdt. Friday.

A vehicle has run over a valve, busting it. The replacement work is expected to take less than an hour.

Hammitt discussed the problem at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Also at the meeting, a discussion was held about the traffic problems at the school in the morning. A new traffic flow went into effect this month and the problems are less serious.

City Marshal Walt Causey said there still are problems with parents dropping off their kids in a haphazard pattern - and around the buses.

After discussing alternatives, such as making one block of Katherine or Griffith one way, the council seems to be leaning toward having a "bus zone" painted red in the drop-off area; other vehicles would not be allowed to use this zone.

City councilman Oran Jay Autrey will discuss this idea with school officials before a decision is made.

What was supposed to be the main topic at the meeting didn't materialize because of the absence of the city attorney.

Ten residents who live outside the city limits - Ave. F, North Craig and areas west of Texico - attended the meeting to oppose possible annexation attempts.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said annexation would be brought up again at the next council meeting, Nov. 13, when the attorney is present.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Juanita Hadley say that the Chamber of Commerce requested that the city check on the Community Center more thoroughly before refunding deposits. Some damage has been observed, such as a hole in one of the bathroom walls.

- Agreed that specific addresses are needed for the trailers in the mobile home park at 701 State. Recently, the ambulance was called there but it took awhile to find the specific resident since the trailers were not individually numbered. The council will direct the park owner to number the lots.

- Heard LaRue say that his committee (himself, Autrey and Causey) hadn't gotten together yet to see what junked vehicles need to be removed throughout the city.

- Discussed a water and sewer survey being taken by Hammitt. The council wants to know what lines are on private properties where there are no easements.

- Authorized buying 12 new meters, 12 stop signs, 12 sign posts and 15 miles per hour signs.

- Allowed Causey to work part-time at other jobs on his days off. He may be doing cleanup work at a local feedyard.

- Cancelled the Dec. 25 meeting due to the holiday. Only the Dec. 11 meeting will be held that month.

- Discussed partial payment for work Eastwood Construction has done on the roads. A scandal has developed within the New Mexico Highway Department and all local governments throughout the state are being asked not to spend money that involves state road funding.

The council may extend Eastwood's contract and give partial payment but tabled the matter until it is discussed with the city attorney.

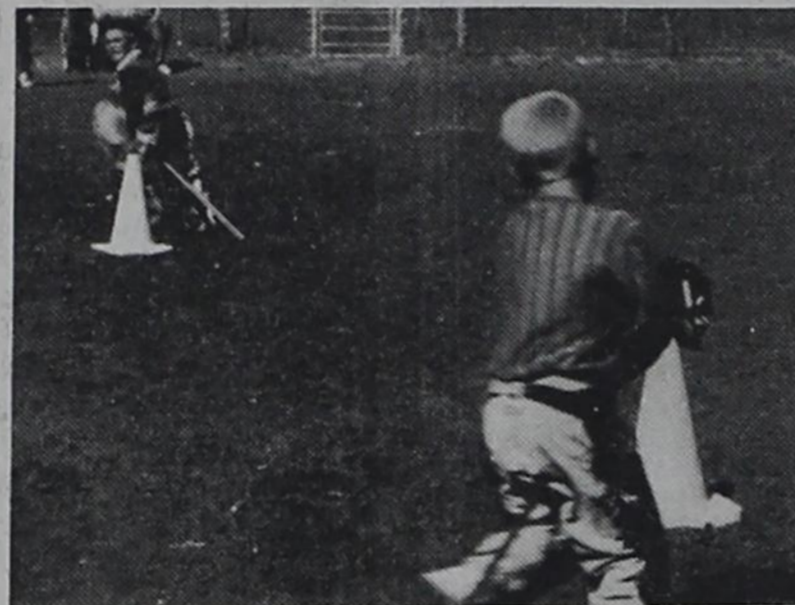

## Principal serves students breakfast

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test has replaced the "TEAMS" Test to determine mastery for graduation. Rather than just testing minimum skills, TAAS targets higher level thinking skills and is considerably more difficult than TEAMS.

Each morning of the actual testing, Principal David Reynolds served breakfast to all students. He arrived very early to get the sausage rolls and muffins ready before students arrived. Some results of the preparation may already be seen in the attitude of the students (some seemed to attach more importance to the actual testing time).

Several teachers attended a TAAS writing program this summer - Huddle, Riddle, Ray, Frances and Merritt. To use the information, Kay Ray read TAAS writing samples from some of the high school prep classes. She offered helpful suggestions to students about how to improve their writing.

Patsy Camp and Mona Merritt helped Mrs. Sullivan in coordinating TAAS tests. Tests are given in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11.

Tuesday was observed as "Boss Day" when teachers gave Reynolds a balloon bouquet.

One surprise, though, was that the bills for indigent health care for the past two months were about the highest ever.

The county paid \$3,300 in August and nearly \$7,000 in September on indigent health. That almost equals all of last year.

Here's how it works:

When a county resident seeks help with a health problem that they cannot afford, they have to fill out a form in Bovina. If they fall within the state guidelines, they are sent to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

At the Friona hospital, the decision is made whether the person can be helped there or needs to be sent to a specialist or another hospital.

Parmer County is a member of the Panhandle Health Care Coalition. This agency handles the paperwork. County Judge Porter Roberts estimates that the PHCC has saved Parmer County a lot of money through its efforts.

State law says that a county must budget 10 percent of its gross tax levy for indigent health care. This means that Parmer County has over \$70,000 set aside for this.

At the Friona hospital, the decision is made whether the person can be helped there or needs to be sent to a specialist or another hospital.

Parmer County is a member of the Panhandle Health Care Coalition. This agency handles the paperwork. County Judge Porter Roberts estimates that the PHCC has saved Parmer County a lot of money through its efforts.

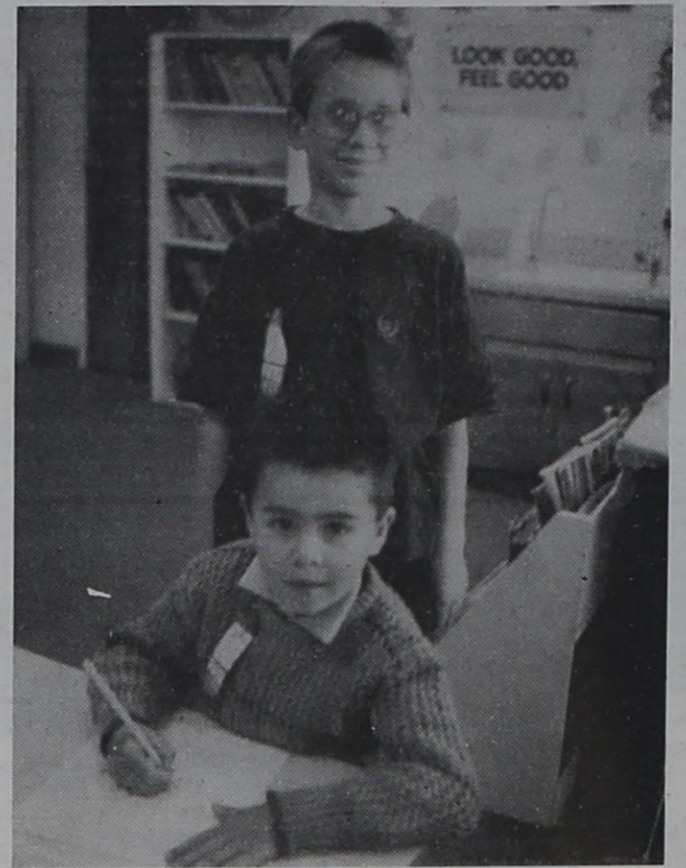



# Yum, yum, yum

## CHOCOLATE ANGEL FOOD CAKE

1 pkg. (14.5 ozs.) angel food cake mix  
 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa, sifted  
 1/4 teaspoon chocolate extract

Combine flour packet from cake mix and cocoa. Prepare cake according to package directions; fold chocolate extract into batter. Bake according to package directions. Sprinkle cooled cake with powdered sugar. Garnish cake with fresh strawberry fans, if desired. Makes 32 (1/2-inch) servings.

NOTE: Convection-microwave ovens cook angel food cake to a golden brown color in only 25 minutes.

## SPICY APPLE SOUR CREAM CAKE

1 3/4 cups flour  
 1 cup packed light brown sugar  
 1/4 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice  
 1/2 cup butter, room temperature  
 1/4 teaspoon baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon soda  
 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon powdered sugar, sifted  
 Fresh strawberries, if desired

1/4 teaspoon freshly grated lemon peel  
 3/4 cup sour cream  
 2 large eggs  
 1 large (about 1 cup) tart apple, peeled, quartered, cored, and sliced thin  
 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped

Mix flour, sugar, and pumpkin pie spice in an ungreased 8-inch square cake pan with a fork. Add butter and stir until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Set aside 1/2 cup. To the mixture in pan, add baking powder, soda, salt, and lemon peel. Stir to blend. Add sour cream and eggs; stir until thoroughly blended and smooth. Using a rubber spatula, scrape sides, corners, and bottom of pan, blending batter. Arrange apple slices in rows on batter. Sprinkle reserved crumb mixture and walnuts evenly over top. Bake 55 to 60 minutes at 350 degrees until a toothpick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on rack. Serve warm or at room temperature. Makes 8 servings.

 1 teaspoon almond extract

Beat egg whites stiff to stand in peaks. Set aside. Cream sugar and shortening, beating well. Add egg yolks and cream well. Sift together flour, soda, and salt. Add alternately with buttermilk. Fold in flavorings, folding in egg whites last. Bake in a greased and floured tube or bundt pan at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes. May sprinkle chocolate chips, flaked coconut, or nuts on top of batter before baking. Heavier additions sink throughout the cake. Makes 12 servings.

 Non-stick spray coating

In a medium mixing bowl, combine cornmeal, paprika, salt, garlic powder, pepper, and cumin. Rinse chicken (do not pat dry); coat chicken evenly on all sides with cornmeal mixture. Spray a large cold skillet with nonstick coating. Heat skillet over medium-high heat. Cook chicken for 8 to 10 minutes or until no longer pink, turning occasionally to brown evenly on all sides. Makes 4 servings.

1/2 cup vegetable oil  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 Vegetable cooking spray  
 1 teaspoon sifted powdered sugar  
 Fresh strawberries (optional)

Sift first 5 ingredients together in a large bowl; make a well in center of mixture. Add buttermilk, oil, and vanilla, stirring until smooth. Spoon batter into a 9-inch round cake pan coated with cooking spray; bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely in pan. Sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar and garnish with strawberries, if desired. Cut into 18 portions to serve. Makes 18 servings.

Put apple juice in blender container and sprinkle on gelatin. Let stand 1 minute until gelatin softens; add boiling water. Cover and blend until gelatin is dissolved. Add frozen berries. Cover and blend until liquified. Pour into 4 glass dessert cups and chill until set. (This will separate into layers.)

NOTE: For variety, use other fruits and juices, except pineapple.

 1/2 cup water  
 Chopped pecans

Add dry ingredients to liquid ingredients; mix thoroughly. Spray bundt pan thoroughly with vegetable cooking spray. Sprinkle chopped nuts in bottom of pan; carefully pour in cake batter. Bake for 55 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 12 servings.

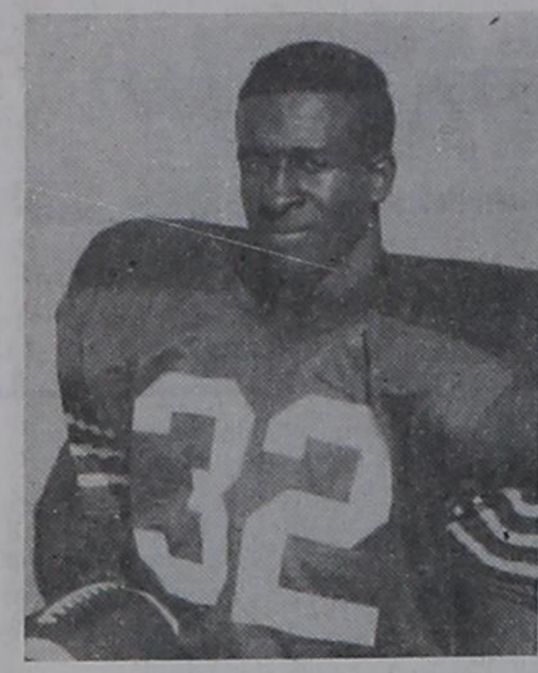
**Steers stop Swifts; stay undefeated**

 Many second stringers got into the ball game with 8 minutes left. There was no scoring by either team. On defense, Ray Haseloff had an interception.

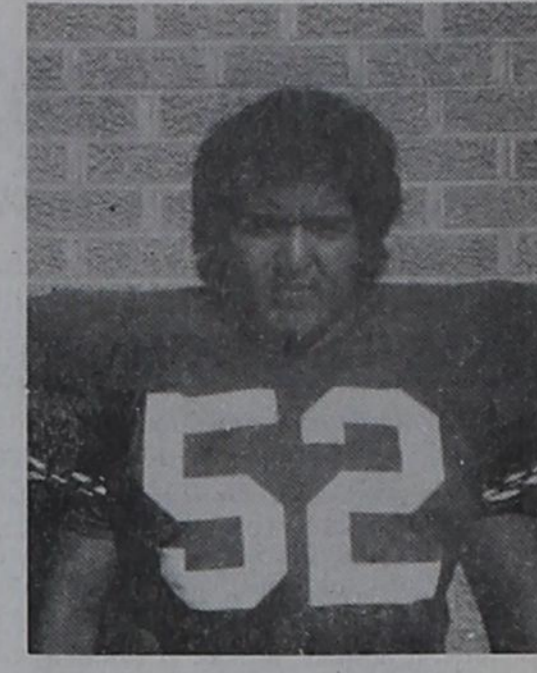

# Wolverines pound Tatum; hike record to 7-1

The Texico Wolverines, ranked No. 2 in New Mexico, upped their district record to 3-0 with a 35-10 pounding of Tatum at home last Friday.

Texico, 7-1 overall, hosts Melrose tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. The junior high game starts at 5 p.m.

The Wolverines kicked off. Tatum's first pass was intercepted by Kenny Shaw, who had 3 interceptions for the night. Texico moved the ball behind running backs Josh Autrey and Hector Orozco. Then with 8:11 left in the first quarter, Autrey scored from the 11. Texico picked up two extra points on a pass from Benjy McDaniel to Autrey.

The Tatum kick returner was tackled by Warren Martin and Chad Dunsworth. Steven Horner and McDaniel made good tackles to hold Tatum to short yardage. Then a Tatum runner broke loose for 30 yards. A potential TD was averted by a super tackle by McDaniel. Dwayne Hamilton also contributed a strong tackle during Tatum's drive. But with 2:55 left in the quarter, Tatum's Dale Scott ran in from the 3 for a TD. Billy Watson ran in the extra points to tie the game at 8-8.

On Texico's possession, Texico fumbled but got the ball right back. After an incomplete pass, Orozco broke through the middle for a long run. McDaniel picked up 9 yards. Then Autrey sped around end behind some good blocks and scored from the 46. Orozco kicked the point after with 1:30 left in the quarter. Texico now led 15-8 at the end of the first stanza.

During Tatum's drive, strong tackles were made by Orozco, McDaniel and Lelo Perea. Tatum went for the bomb but it was tipped and Shaw came up with his second intercept.

Texico was stymied and punted. Good tackles were made by Warren Martin, Rusty Foreman, Horner and Josefre Gonzales. And McDaniel just missed an interception. Tatum punted.

McDaniel busted through for 20 yards. And with 5:35 left in the half, Autrey ran around and through Tatum for 17 yards and a TD. Orozco's kick was good.

Tatum didn't have the ball long. Orozco contributed a strong tackle. Tatum went to the air and Shaw came away with intercept No. 3, then had a healthy runback. Orozco plunged over from the 2 for the TD, then kicked the point after. Texico now led 29-8.

Tatum got the ball back but Martin and Billy Rogers made good tackles. Other major league stops were made by Greg Akers, Tom Derouin, Rogers and Hamilton. Tatum punted and an apparent 70-yard TD return by Autrey was nullified due to a clipping penalty.

In the third period, the Wolverines' ground game of Orozco and Autrey moved the ball downfield. But a Texico punt was blocked and Tatum got to the Wolverine 10. But they couldn't score as McDaniel, Hamilton and Rogers contributed important tackles. Tatum ended up with a 4th and 28.

With the ball back, Texico went to work. Autrey was met by a squadron of Tatum defenders so he pitched the ball back to McDaniel who ran for 6 yards. Orozco punted to the Tatum 15.

It was a hard hitting game. Neither team scored in the 3rd quarter. But with 11:52 left in the game, Autrey intercepted a pass and returned it 20 yards for a TD. The extra point attempt failed when the snap was fumbled.

On defense, Horner and Matthew Williams had good tackles. And Horner picked up a Tatum fumble. Texico also fumbled the ball away. The defense held and Tatum punted. Texico held the ball from 5:31 to 3:20 before allowing Tatum

to get a safety when the ball went out of the end zone.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented: "The first half went pretty decently but we lost our intensity in the second half. Looking ahead, Melrose hasn't got as good a record as we do but they are pretty physical and it should be a pretty good game. If we win this game, we will be district champion as we head into the state playoffs."

According to New Mexico area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper, Texico ranks 4th in team offense, with 309 yards a game, and 2nd in team defense, allowing 136 yards a game. Autrey ranks 1st among area rushers, with 1,310 yards - an average of 163.8 yards a game. Orozco is 10th among the rushers, with 452 yards. McDaniel is 8th among the passers with 21 completions in 47 tries for 260 yards. Autrey ranks 1st among scorers, with 112 points. Texico ranks 2nd in the state, behind Loving.

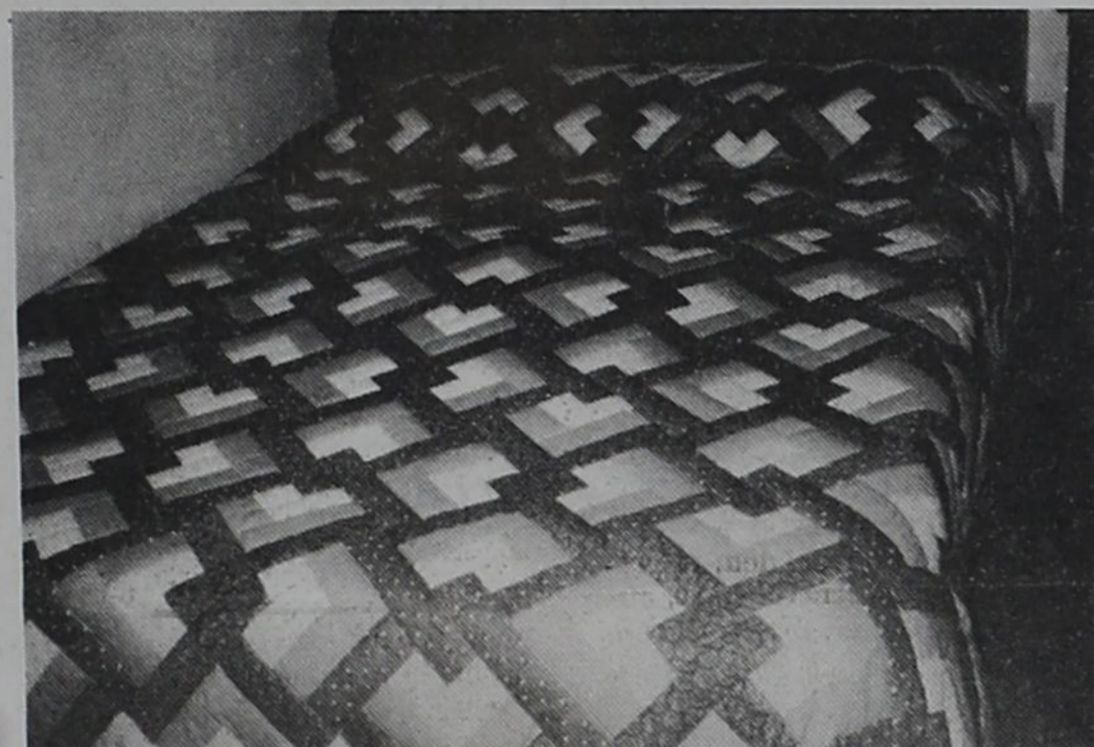
**Lady Wolverines win a pair**



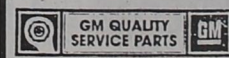
