We got a nice note last week from our former pharmacist, Steve Breckenridge. We thought you'd like to know how he's doing:

Hello everyone,

It's about time we dropped you a note. Remember everyone, especially John Hadley, telling me how hot it was going to be out here. Since I arrived, the temperature only once has topped 100 and the average high has been 92. It rained almost every day, which was terrible for using the telescope, but it did keep things cool, and the desert turned very green.

Southern Arizona is great! The kids and myself go out driving a lot in search of bugs, rocks, tarantulas, snakes, etc. About 30 miles north if beautiful Rucker Lake - it's a small mountain fishing lake. The last time we were there, some teen-agers caught some trout and placed them in a small pond - the kids really enjoyed watching them. We also found geodes there (the rocks you cut in half and crystals are on the inside). Helen enjoyed throwing sticks in the lake and having Mattie (dog) fetch them.

There are countless places for rock collecting. At one place, we found four rattle snakes within a 30 minute period. Later on, someone told us the area is known for them. There are mountains all around us, with each mountain range being unique. The sunrises and sunsets are beautiful with the mountain backdrops. Tucson (U. of A.) is only two hours away. We travel there often to visit Helen's parents.

I am really enjoying work at the hospital. The people I work for are great (not as great as the Farwell bunch). The working hours are nice as I am off by 5 p.m. daily. Currently, we are staffing the hospital at Bisbee (about 20 miles away) until they find a permanent pharmacist.

Our Hawaii trip was terrific. We stayed on the island of Oahu at the Makaha Valley Towers. It's about 30 miles from Honolulu and is really nice. Here are day by day highlights:

Day 1 -Drove around Oahu, walked up Sacred Falls (picked and ate jungle apples on the way), and snorkled at Mokuleia Bay.


Day 2 - Snorkled at Hanamua Bay. Helen's fin came off while we were over the reef and the waves carried us across the reef, resulting in some cuts and scrapes what an adventure. We also saw Sea Life Park, which is like a small Sea World - they had sea turtles you could

Day 3 - Pearl Harbor tour, then swap meet at the Aloha Bowl. Toured the Dole cannery where they served the freshest and best pineapple we ever had. Went on a Windjammer sunset dinner cruise.

Day 4 - Took a jet to Hawaii the big island. Drove around Volcano's National Park and saw a very large lava tube. We drove to where new lava is crossing the road and saw some still very warm! You could see the steam rising where the hot lava met the ocean. We visited Akaka Falls, over 400 feet high.

Day 5 - Went to Waimea Falls and saw the cliff divers. Went on the Atlantis Submarine, saw a shipwreck and lots of marine life. Had dinner at the Windows of Hawaii, a

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Dyer sees Americanization taking place

Periodically, Rob Dyer from Farwell, who is studying this semester in Spain, will be sending notes on his experiences:

By ROB DYER

Hola! Buenos Dias from Espana! How is everything in Farwell? I hope everyone is doing great.

I have been having an exciting time in Spain. I have gotten to do many things, and I'm really learning a lot. There is so much to do, and I am constantly busy. I am finally settling down to home life in Spain, and I really enjoy everything. My host family is really great, and they help me in everything that I do. I have made a lot of new friends and meet a lot of really nice people. All the people here are so friendly and there is always someone to help me in everything that I do.

I have been a lot of places here in Asturias, and I really love my province. Several weeks ago my family took me on a trip through the mountains in the east. Asturias is called the

"Picos de Europa" (European Peaks). We went to the place where Pelayo, who was king of

Asturias, and one of the most important people of Spanish history, is buried. Pelayo was the one who led the rebellion against the Moors and drove them from Spain.

Then we drove to Llanos where my host father's family was from. From there, we drove along the ocean back to Aviles. The sight of the mountains bordering against the beaches along the ocean is one of the most beautiful things I have ever seen. Everything is really green and there are many plants and trees. They definitely receive a lot more rain than

Last week, my family took me to the western part of Asturias, where we visited Luarca, the town that my host mom's family has a house in. We stayed there with her cousin and his family. The house was really beautiful, and it had its own chapel and formal gardens.

The name of the house is Villa Argentina, because the family returned from Argentina over 100 years ago and settled in Luarca. Many of the families in Luarca are descended from wealthy Argentinian plantation owners who returned to Spain in the late 1800's.

My host mom's cousin is a veterinarian, and he took my host brother and I with him when he went to the different farms. Farmers in Spain are very different from farmers in America. I saw farmers who were extremely poor, and practically lived with their cows, and I saw wealthier farms with modern equipment and farming methods. But rich or poor, they all worked from morning until night and they all seemed to have a hard way of life.

The farmers here are mainly dairy men, and most of Asturias is devoted to dairy cattle. Milk production is their only source of income. Cattle here are very expensive, and may farmers were shocked when I told them the price of cattle in the U.S. I thought cattle in America were expensive at this time, but the American price is nothing compared to the price in Spain. One dairy cow costs about 3,000 American dollars. Beef cattle, which are much smaller than ours, cost even more. To the farmers here, their cows were worth more than gold to them, and it was a major loss to lose one to illness or death.

Here in Asturias, even though the ocean is practically ice cold, surfing and wind surfing are both popular sports. My host mom's cousin in Luarca taught us to windsurf, and I

really enjoyed it. I have also tried surfing, which my host brother does, but I think windsurfing is more fun. Here, you have to wear a wet-suit because the water is so cold.

Last week, I went with my host brother and a bunch of friends to see David Bowie in concert. The Beach Boys are also coming to Ovido (the capitol of this state) so'l really don't miss American music. Actually, American music is really popular here, and in most of Europe. There are really more American music and American movies than Spanish. I have seen several new American movies here such as "The Hunt for Red October," "Gremlins," and "Die Hard II." The only problem is that they are in Spanish! Sometimes some of the older movies that we rent are in English, but all the new ones are dubbed in Spanish. For me, it nearly kills a movie to hear someone such as Sean Connery with a different voice!

Here, everything is becoming very Americanized. With hearing the same music, movies, foods, and conveniences, it really makes me feel more at home with all their American things, but it's also sad in a way, because it really suppresses the real culture, and way of life. My family here is practically a typical American family. More typical than most real American families. The businesses are much more like American ones, much of the food is the same, and you can buy a Coke or a Pepsi anywhere. If it weren't for the language difference, my city could be a typical American city. There are still a lot of customs and ways of life that have been preserved, but there is an increasing amount of Americanization in everything.

I am still surprised at the number of languages everyone here seems to speak. I am now seeing how limited Americans really are in only knowing English. I know very few people that can speak more than two languages. However, here people speak several languages. Aside from Spanish, most people speak Asturian, (the old language of Asturias), and many speak English, French, and Italian. Many also know German, and even several other languages. And, nearly everyone has studied years of Latin. I really feel bad because I know so little of other languages when everyone around me is fluent in several different languages. My advice to Americans is to learn as many languages as possible, because there are uncountable benefits to those who are fluent in other languages.

My school starts the first of October, and I am a little apprehensive. Spanish schools are extremely difficult, and studying in a different language from my own will be the biggest challenge of all. I have a feeling that I will miss American classes before I leave.

I have enjoyed Spain so far, and I am confident about the rest of my stay here. I really miss everyone, and I would love to hear from some of you. Being away from home has made me appreciate Farwell a lot more, and Its also made me appreciate my friends and family. I would like to thank everyone who has done so many things for me, and I hope you all have a great year!

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
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

Guidelines to be met

The Farwell Convalescent Center is working to meet the guidelines set by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act which took effect on Oct. 1. It has been called the most sweeping change in nursing home care in over 20 years.

Some of the highlights of the changes mandated by this law are listed below.

 Increased nurse staffing. 24 hours, 7 day a week nurse staffing plus registered nurse coverage 8 hours a day, every day.

- Training of nurse aides. In Texas, new nurse aides must complete an 80 hour curriculum and pass a competency exam. A registry of nurse aides certified as competent will be maintained by the Texas Department of Health.


- Pre-admission screening and annual resident review. Residents must be screened and reviewed annually for mental health and mental retardation or related conditions. The state must provide alternate placement or active treatment within the nursing home as needed.

- A new national comprehensive assessment tool. Provides a standard for a thorough assessment of a resident's need on which to base a plan of care.

- Increased resident autonomy. Guarantees basic residents' rights and allows residents to have more say in their care and treatment.



Colonial Pumpkin Spice Cake

1 c. whole wheat flour

1/2 c. all - purpose flour

1/2 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt

1 1/4 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

3/4 c. canned, solid pack pumpkin 1/2 c. buttermilk

3/4 c. firmly packed brown sugar 1/4 c. granulated sugar

6 Tbs. margarine, softened

2 eggs

1/2 c. coarsely chopped walnuts

Stir together the whole wheat flour, soda, salt, and spices; set aside. Stir pumpkin and buttermilk together, set aside. Beat margarine, sugars and eggs until smooth and creamy.

Add pumpkin mixture alternately with flour mixture, mixing well. Stir in 1/4 c. of walnuts.

Grease (not oil) a 1 1/2 quart round glass casserole. Sprinkle remaining 1/4 c. walnuts in the bottom of the casserole. Spread batter over nuts.

Microwave at Medium for 13 minutes, rotating twice during cooking. Then microwave at High for 2 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out dry. Let stand 10 minutes. Invert onto serving plate: Serve warm or cooled with whipping cream.
