## Texico purchases Autrey property

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted to purchase property owned by F.E. Autrey directly east of KKR Park.

The price is \$12,000. Potential uses of the property include a new City Hall or new swimming pool.

In other business, the council congratulated everyone who participated in the cleanup Saturday. Mayor Doyal LaRue thanked Oran Jay Autrey and said that the cleanup couldn't have been held without his assistance and use of his equipment. Also cited were city employees who volunteered their time.

City Clerk Treasurer Marie Christian estimated that about 315 cubic yards of trash were removed Saturday, in addition to the concrete removed Friday.

A proclamation was issued thanking the ad hoc cleanup committee, headed by Ronnie Warmuth. The proclamation also honored all who helped in the cleanup.

It was suggested that another, smaller cleanup be held in the spring.

The cleanup is part of a

major community renovation campaign. The problem of junked vehicles was placed on the agenda of the Oct. 9 meeting.

Also on the agenda for the next meeting will be discussion of annexing land into the city. All three directions (the city cannot expand eastward due to the state line) will be discussed.

One possibility is to have the city's boundaries be the same as the school district's.

One reason the topic has come up is the knowledge that Clovis seems to be expanding eastward.

The council also: - Appointed Mary Jones to the vacant post on the cemetery board.

- Heard Mrs. Christian report that the preliminary census figures show 958 citizens, down from 985 in 1980. She said "everyone's disputing" the new figure because, apparently, many census forms were not collected from Texico residents.

The report also said there were 58 vacant housing units

## Area corn harvest is in full swing

The local corn harvest is in full swing in the area.

Fred Chandler, manager of the Sherley Anderson Pitman grain elevator in Farwell, reports that, "We are getting real good, heavy corn. We are getting cleaner corn with less worms on it."

Some reports show per acre yields are down for some local farmers due to the drought and extreme heat in June "Once it cooled off, everything looked respectable from then on."

Darrell Stephens brought in the first load to the Farwell elevator.

Lonnie McFarland reports that the Sherley Anderson grain elevator in Lariat is seeing a fair crop this year. Quality is down a little, but it is a fair crop.

Local elevators are seeing little aflatoxin here. In some parts of the state where heat

stress has affected non irrigated corn plants, the aflatoxin fungus has been a problem.

According to McFarland, he checks the corn very carefully because this fungus has been such a problem in some parts of the state that the corn could not even be used as animal feed.

J.W. Herington brought in the first load at the Lariat elevator.

In Lazbuddie, Scott McFarland of the Sherley Anderson grain elevator reports "some surprisingly good yields." The quality is good, and bushel weights have been "right on target at 54-57 lbs. per bushel."

Quinn Weaver who farms the land that was owned by the late Finnis Jennings brought in the first bushel at the Lazbuddie elevator.

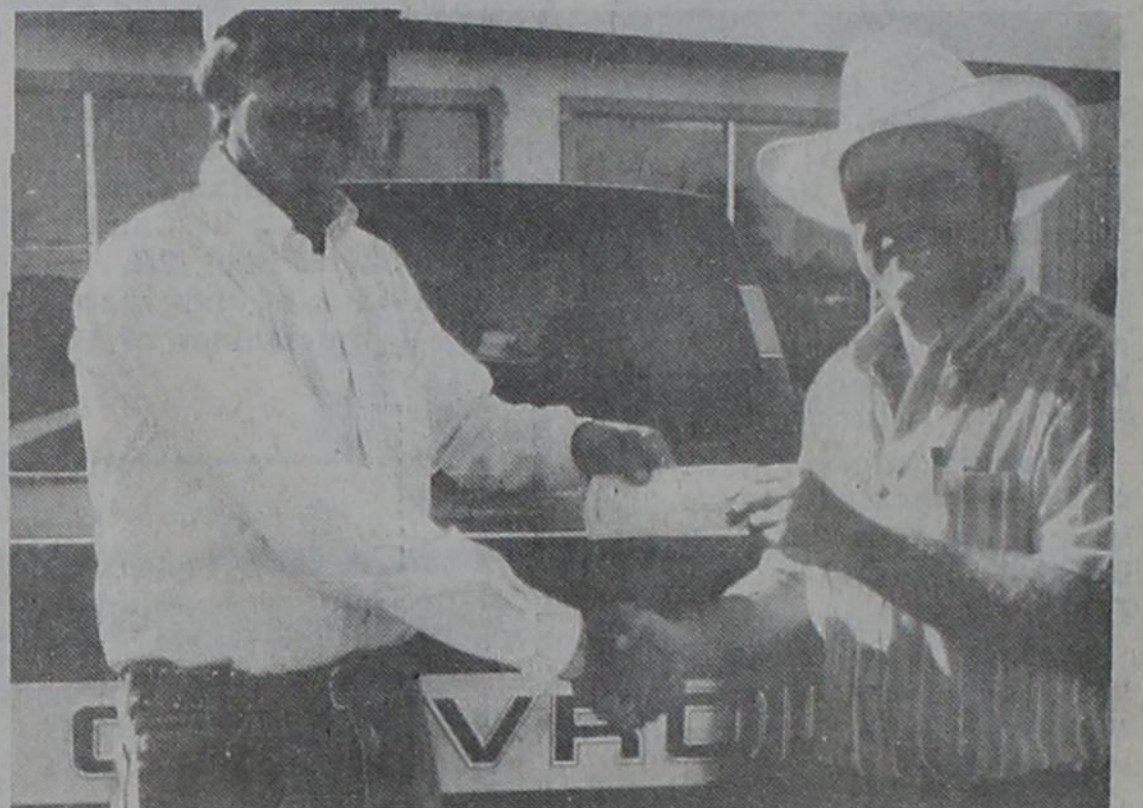

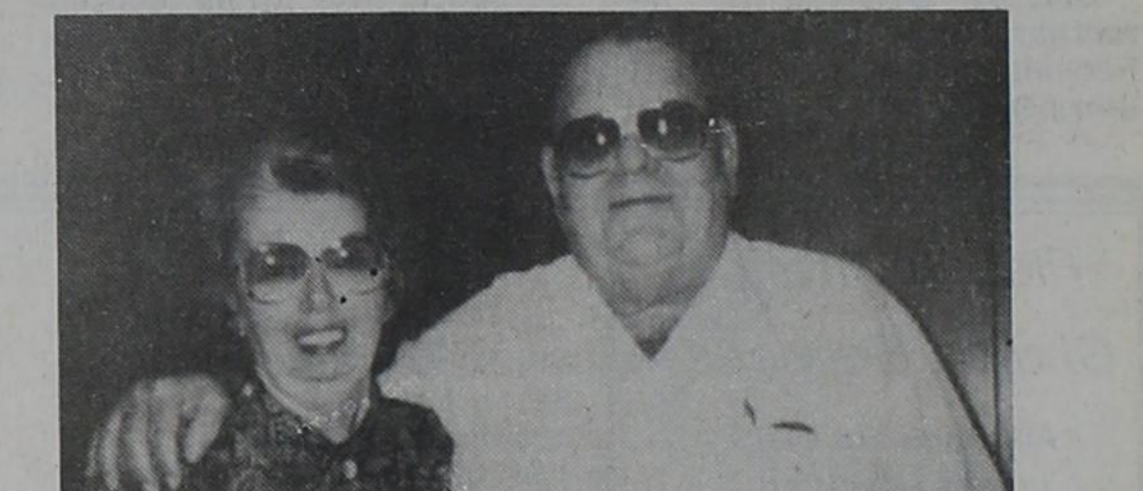


Mike Grissom, left, receives his cash prize for winning last week's football contest from John Slentz, of Pickup Country, one of the contest sponsors.

## Lumbrera Kansas trial under way

The first degree murder trial of Diana Lumbrera has started in Garden City, Kan.

The former Bovina resident is on trial for the May 1 death of her 4 year old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera in Garden City.

She has also been indicted in Parmer County in connection with three other deaths. And she has been indicted in Bailey County on a murder charge in connection with the death of her cousin's child.

In opening arguments in her Kansas trial, the prosecution charged that one motive was that Ms. Lumbrera had a \$5,000 insurance policy on Jose. Also, he called her a "sympathy junkie" who smothered the boy so that other people would feel sorry for her.

The defense attorney described Ms. Lumbrera, 31, as a caring mother. He also said she had tried to cancel the insurance policy before the boy's death and that she spent nearly \$3,000 on the funeral.

## Atchley honored upon retirement

Parmer County Chief Deputy Jerry Atchley has retired after 18 years of law enforcement in Parmer County.

Atchley has been the Chief Deputy in the Sheriff's Department for more than 10 years. Prior to that he served as Chief of Police in Bovina

for 2 1/2 years and he was with the Friona Police Department for 5 years before that.

Sheriff Rex Williams presented Atchley with a plaque from the Sheriff's Department at a retirement tea that was held in his honor on Sept. 21 in the County Courtroom.

## DPS starts testing

On Sept. 17, the Texas Department of Public Safety began uniform testing of all currently licensed commercial and bus drivers.

All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded are required to have a commercial drivers license by April 1, 1992. Bus drivers, including school bus and church bus drivers, who drive buses designed to carry 16 or more passengers, including the driver, will also be required to obtain a commercial drivers license by the same date.

Farmers, when driving within 150 miles of their farms are exempt from this law, so are military personnel, fire fighters and recreational vehicle operators.

Approximately four out of five Texas teachers are unhappy with the state's teacher career ladder, a merit bonus program established in 1984 to identify and reward quality teachers, according to a survey conducted by the 50,750-member Association of Texas Professional Educators.

# Eunice nips Wolverines

Texico suffered its first loss of the season last night against Class 2A school Eunice, 8-6, in an away game.

The Wolverines are now 3-1 on the season. Eunice is 3-1. Texico played a good game and statistically outplayed Eunice. But Eunice just got the ball across the goal line one more time than Texico.

Neither team scored during the first quarter. It wasn't until late in the second quarter that Eunice's Randy Gladden ran in 3 yards for a TD. Texico probably should have punted but went for it on 4th down, hoping to score late in the first half. That put Eunice in good scoring position and they capitalized on it. Eunice's Craig Hughes ran in the extra points to put Eunice on top, 8-0.

Neither team scored in the 3rd quarter. Texico had to punt twice for 32 yards and Eunice three times for 104 yards. Neither team fumbled the ball and penalties were even. Texico had 4 penalties for 30 yards and Eunice had 4 for 33 yards.

With just 4:02 left in the game, Shaw scored on a 4-yard pass from McDaniel. The Wolverines knew they had to run in the extra points to tie the game. Texico was stopped just inches from making the extra two points. The game ended at 8-6 in Eunice's favor.

Josh Autrey caught 3 passes for 94 yards, and Shaw 3 for 35 yards. Autrey rushed for 156 yards. Hector Orozco had 27 rushing yards and McDaniel rushed for 33.

Texico will host Jal tonight (Friday) at 7:30. It's "Parents Night" and support from all the fans will be appreciated.

Texico made 15 first downs and only allowed Eunice 6 first downs. Texico's defense played tough. They allowed a total of 82 net yards rushing and only 15 net yards passing. Texico's offense was able to make 216 net rushing yards and 44 net passing yards - about 3 times that of Eunice.

Texico Quarterback Benji McDaniel completed 6 of 12 passes for 44 yards. Eunice completed 1 of 6 for 15 yards. Texico didn't throw any interceptions but Kenny Shaw intercepted a Eunice pass.

"Whenever you play these 2A people, it's an uphill battle. We'll face an even bigger uphill battle this week. These bigger teams can hurt you quicker," said Coach Bruce Scroggins. "We played pretty well. But they were a better level of

competition. "We had four long drives, but we got only 6 points out of one of them. We've got to convert those drives into points."

In area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper, Texico ranks fourth in offense among area schools in New Mexico (Clovis is second). Texico has rushed for 1,091 yards and passed for another 145 - a 309 total. Artesia ranks first and Lovington third.

In team defense, Texico tops the entire state. The Wolverines have allowed a measly 60.5 yards per game - 211 rushing and 31 passing. Lovington is second and Clovis is third. Eunice is fourth.

## Furloughs may be coming

Martin Chandler, executive director of the Parmer County ASCS, reported that Parmer County producers are approved for the Emergency Feed Program if they have eligible cattle and have suffered at least a 40% loss in production of livestock feed. Other provisions of the program include:

1. You must have owned the cattle for at least 6 months or the county committee must determine if it is a part of your normal operation to not own livestock for 6 months at a time (must be evident 4 out of 5 years).

2. You must have a livestock feed loss (pasture, haygrazer, cane, etc.).

3. You must be purchasing livestock feed above normal.

The ASCS office in Farwell will begin furloughing employees as of Oct. 1 unless the federal government votes to change the federal debt ceiling. The local office plans to be open on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday each week with Monday and Friday as furlough days. The Farwell office will have to cut out some of its services, such as the newsletter, until the furlough period is over.

## Jail bars to be cut

The Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to hire Steve Taylor, Friona, to cut the bars in the old jail, behind the county courthouse.

Commission President Ernest Anthony had solicited two bids for the work. Taylor bid \$1,200.

The commissioners want the bars removed so shelves can be placed in the building and it utilized for storage space by county offices.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved absentee voting for the November election in Bovina and Friona.

- Passed a resolution supporting the Groundwater Conservation Districts of the Panhandle, which are seeking more local control.

- Continue keeping the fees charged by the sheriff's department at the current level. This is for items such as small claims citations, summons, etc. There's a new Texas law that states that unless county commissioners vote annually on such fees, the fees automatically revert back to the 1981 prices.

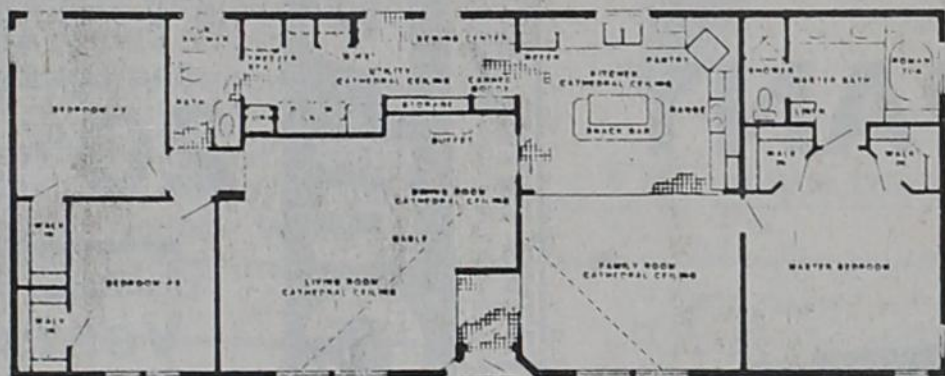

The team missed Brent Harrison, who connected for most of Farwell's points against Olton the previous week. Harrison was sidelined due to an injured ankle.

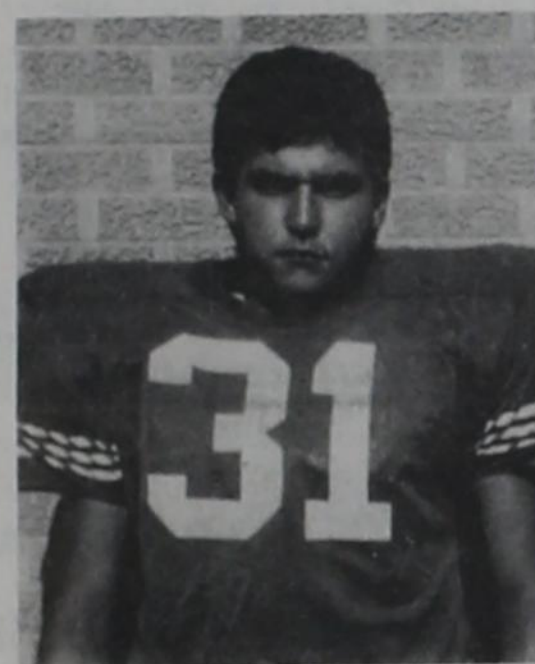
