So you can see the good doc Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays.


Farwell water Supt. Dee Hammit suggests that residents watch their water usage carefully.

Hammit reports that several residents have exceeded the 50,000 gallon figure.



not within either the Muleshoe or Farwell hospital districts were eligible to vote. They are now in the new district. The new district has the

authority to set a tax rate up to 25 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

But the Parmer County Community Hospital Board of Directors announced earlier this month they would recommend setting a tax rate of 18 cents if the district were approved by voters. This means, for example, that property having an assessed value of \$50,000 would have a tax rate of \$90.

New pump to be installed

The Texico City Council held a work study session May 16 with a representative of the Weston Co., Albuquerque, to discuss the contaminated well at KKR Park.

Levels of carcinogens were found in the well, forcing its closing earlier this year.

After discussing the problem, the council plans to order a new pump installed at KKR Park well. However, the new pump will be placed 60 feet lower than the current

It is hoped that the contaminants will be diluted enough by this extra 60 feet so that it won't cause a problem.

If all goes well, then the KKR Park well will again be used as the city's primary water source, with the Lions Park well as the backup.

However, if the contaminant levels are still a problem, then the council will look at a possible filtration system for the KKR Park well. These systems start at \$65,000 - and go up from there.

Coping with stress


Texico Junior High School 7th and 8th graders participated in a one day program called "A New Attitude" presented in conjunction with the Mental Health Resources Center in

Checking soil moisture emphasized

Since the availability of water is the principal factor that limits plant production on the Texas High Plains, it is important for irrigators to know exactly how much moisture is available in the 5-foot root zone soil profile of their fields throughout the growing season.

Soil moisture monitoring devices, such as gypsum blocks and tensiometers, allow paroducers to determine when an irrigation is needed and the amount of water needed to refill the soil profile.

Gypsum blocks and resistance meters are the most commonly- used soil moisture monitoring device on the Texas High Plains. The gypsum block is made by casting an inch-long cylinder of gypsum around two stainless steel electrodes with lead wires.

Gypsum blocks are buried int he soil profile shortly after crop emergence. If a producer uses an auger to dig the hole, four gypsum blocks can be installed int he same hole at onefoot intervals. If the producer uses a push tube or drive rode to make the hole, only one block should be installed per hole.

The lead wires from the buried blocks are attached to a wooden stake at land surface and coded to indicate the depth at which the block is buried. Most producers simply tie a knot in the lead wire which corresponds to the depth of the buried block. For example, one knot indicates one foot, two knots indicate two feet, and so on. The blocks are 'read' by connecting the lead wires to a small portable resistance meter which measures the electrical flow between two

The meter measures electrical resistance and displays it as a percentage of field capacity value. Electrical resistance varies with the amount of moisture in the soil. A meter reading of "0" is dry, and a "10" is wet.

Another soil moisture monitoring tool commonly used by High Plains products it the tensiometer. These water-filled tubes have a special porous tip and a vacuum gauge which measures the soil water suction required for plants to extract water from the soil:

When soils are at field capacity, soil water suction ranges from two to five pounds per square inch (psi). As the soil becomes drier, more suction is needed to extract moisture. When soil water suction reaches 220 psi, the plant's permanent wilting point is reached, and the plant dies.

Tensiometers measure negative soil suction up to 14.7 psi (100 on the vacuum gauge.) For example, a reading of 66 on the gauge means the soil is dry and the plant must exert almost 10 psi to extract water from the soil. A reading fo 9.5 means the soil is went and only about one psi is needed to extract water.


Tensiometers are best suited for higher water demand crops, such as corn and other vegetables. Tensiometers do not wok as well when installed infields with lower water demand crops, such as cotton and grain sorghum.

The key to successful use of soil moisture monitoring tools is taking frequent readings to track crop root development and soil moisture conditions at each foot in the soil profile and keeping careful records.

These "windows into the soil" help irrigators determine what is occurring in the root zone soil moisture profile. With this soil moisture data, producers can determine from which level water is being extracted from the soil and how much water has been used.
