

Football Contest starts in only two more weeks!

Normally, I don't like to write columns about major issues about which most folks agree. In this case, it's the Iraqi situation.

I think it's safe to say that most Americans favor the course that President Bush has taken. I do.

And I think that, over a period of time, it will be effective and Kuwait returned to its legal status.

My only objection is how the news media has been treating the situation. I guess I sometimes get overly critical of news coverage since that's my profession.

No. 1. At no time has it been indicated that Iraqi forces were going to invade Saudi Arabia.

Yes, I believe it important for the U.S. and its allies put troops on the Kuwaiti border as a safeguard. And the ships are necessary for the blockade.

But the TV commentators and blaring newspaper headlines all but made it seem that invasion was imminent. Never has that been the case.

Here's my perspective:

Saddam Hussein goofed.

Nothing more than a street thug who attained power over a nation (like Hitler), he never anticipated the worldwide reaction against his move. I doubt he ever reviewed 1938 news clips of Neville Chamberlain brandishing that "piece of paper" Hitler signed, pledging "peace in our time."

He wanted Kuwait due to economic reasons, the main reason most wars are fought. And the reason why the U.S. is involved.

So I don't buy the screaming headlines about "crisis." I do believe there will be a crisis - but further down the road, when the pinch hits the average Iraqi citizen.

It's okay to have a 200,000-man military - but you better make sure you can make the payroll. When Iraq can't, that's when the crisis starts - for Saddam Hussein.

An awfully nice thing happened to me last week.

I got a newsletter from the San Diego (Calif.) Service Center for the Blind which contained a personal note from a gal who is its volunteer coordinator. About 18 years ago, I encouraged her to work in a volunteer position back in Indiana. That work led to her current job.

Isn't that nice that someone remembers you after a whole bunch of years have gone by?

Farwell School Board lowers its tax rate

The Farwell School Board Tuesday proposed a tax rate 2 cents lower than last year.

The rate proposed is 1.2770, down from 1.29 last year. The county appraisal district has set an effective tax rate of 1.2398, which is almost 6 cents lower than the tax rate Farwell set last year. The Farwell school board anticipated that it would need the 1.2770 rate to meet its expenses this year. It is the highest rate they can set without being subject to holding additional hearings.

During the regular meeting which followed the budget hearing, the board adopted the tax rate and the budget as proposed by the administration. It is projected that this budget will meet the school system's expenses and generate some funds for reserves which had been severely depleted.

"One of our priorities is to build our reserves so we can deal with emergencies," said Supt. Richard Boothby. He noted that the crisis in the Middle East will affect the gasoline price paid by the school system, and it may affect the price of food and other items which will be shipped here. This makes planning for the future extremely difficult. Having a reserve fund at this time is very important.

He also noted that the tax rate set by a school system affects the projection of state revenues for the next 5 years. The new budget can be lower than last year because Farwell will pay off its bonded indebtedness this year, and because employees have cut expenditures dramatically.

Board president Doyle Johnson expressed the appreciation of the board to Boothby, Gwen Corn, and Leandra Byrd for the work they did on the budget, and to the entire staff for cutting expenditures in the past year.

The board accepted the resignations of elementary teacher Cindy Bradburn and aide Sandra Turner.

The board hired the following teachers: Edris Klucher, elementary Chapter I and compensatory reading teacher; Robin Gregory, 4th Grade; Karon Risher, High School Special Education; Laura Adkins, High School Vocational Home Economics; Sheree Montgomery, Library Aide (reinstated position); Cindy Patterson, Aide; Lisa Osborn, Aide; Sherry Curtis, Aide; Lynn Roberts, Elementary E.S.L. Teacher, 1/2 time. The board also granted power to the administration to fill one other staff position which is open.

Johnson announced that plans are being made for a reception to be held on Aug. 26 so that the public may meet the new superintendent and his wife.

In other business, the board:

- Renewed health care contracts for employees through the Texas Association of School Boards.
- Terminated professional services of a lawyer working on the E.G.H. T. Bankruptcy. The board did not feel that they would recover any more money from the health insurance which had filed bankruptcy.
- Entered into a lease agreement for 3 copying machines for the schools. It will include all repairs and upkeep. The bid went to Baker Graphics in Lubbock for a Lanier Copier.
- Accepted the bid of Bell Milk Company for milk for the cafeteria.
- Amended the salary of an employee.

Texico attacks vehicle problem

At a landmark meeting Tuesday, the Texico City Council moved forcefully ahead on the proposed communitywide cleanup campaign.

The council instructed City Marshal Walt Causey to immediately "red tag" the 20 vehicles that had been identified as possibly abandoned by the ad hoc Texico Cleanup Committee.

The vehicles are listed on a map which is hanging at Texico City Hall. City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian had been asked at the previous meeting to get the list of their owners, if possible.

According to the city ordinance, once Causey "red tags" the vehicles, the owners have five days to move them. If they are not moved within five days, the city is authorized to impound them.

City Councilman Ronnie Warmuth stressed to Causey that the city ordinance is to be enforced.

Causey said he has contacted a wrecking service which has agreed to pick up the vehicles. He said he will call them after the five-day period ends.

One question that still needs to be answered is how long the vehicles need to be impounded before the wrecking yard can use them for parts. The state will be checked with.

The action taken on these vehicles was only one of many that the council took involving the cleanup. The others were:

* Warmuth said that starting about Sept. 10, city employees will begin mowing alleys and vacant lots in preparation for the general cleanup campaign Sept. 20-22.

* The council told Water Supt. Billy Hammit to hire four teen-agers to help clean city curbs and gutters before the general cleanup.

* Mayor Doyal LaRue, as personnel manager, plans to hire a person to man the landfill for about three hours Saturday afternoons. Specifics will be announced in next week's Tribune.

Currently, residents wanting to take items to the landfill must contact a city

employee weekdays during working hours. Some residents have complained that they have to work at that time and Saturday hours would help.

Here's what can be taken to the landfill:

1. Household trash must be placed in the transfer station.
2. Metal must be placed in a stack in the designated area.
3. Burnable wood items must be placed in the "burn pile."

After the person is hired, he would show residents where to place their trash. No food items are allowed.

* In discussing the recent accident that knocked down a tree at KK Runnels Park, the city will seek \$900 from the insurance company. A discussion ensued over what type of trees should be planted as replacements.

Eddie Dunsworth, a visitor, suggested pecan trees. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he could help on a project of getting several

pecan trees. No decision was made.

Warmuth asked Mrs. Christian to contact the state to see if they could put together a plan for KK Runnels Park development.

Also, Warmuth said drip irrigation is needed at both city parks, although one city employee has been assigned to the task of watering both parks.

* At the last meeting, the council had asked that Bill Nance, state building inspector, condemn the Westerner Motel due to problems there. Nance reported he couldn't condemn it because it still is structurally sound.

The council was told that the owner plans to sell the motel and has two potential buyers.

* The council agreed to advertise for bids to dredge the pond at KK Runnels Park, and also for street chip and sealing work.

* Heard Causey say that vehicles parking in front of

the flea market sometimes back out onto the highway, which is dangerous. The state highway department has been asked to check on this.

Casey said two persons are living at the flea market and Nance will be asked to check on this.

* At the last meeting, the council had asked Mrs. Christian and City Attorney Duane Hamar to prepare forms that the ad hoc cleanup committee can pass out, getting approval from property owners for the upcoming general cleanup campaign. These forms were finished and given Warmuth, cleanup committee chairman.

Warmuth also received a list from Mrs. Christian of owners of the areas that were listed on a map put together by the cleanup committee and marked as hazardous.

When the cleanup committee next meets (Monday, 7 p.m. mdt at Citizens Bank, Texico branch), Warmuth will assign areas where committee members can seek to get approval for cleanup.

* Heard Dunswoth say that communities such as Melrose, Grady and Rosedale have large containers available for residents to place junk in. The council asked Mrs. Christian to check with Curry County to see if the county could place a container in Texico, too.

* Heard Councilman Butch Tharp say that two residents who signed aesthetic review permits when they moved their trailers into Texico haven't fixed them up according to the permits.

Mrs. Christian noted that in the past, when two other residents had not complied with the permits they signed, Hamar had written them and they both complied immediately.

If they don't comply, the trailer must be removed.

Mrs. Christian said letters will be sent to the two residents Tharp mentioned.

In other business, the council:

- Heard Tharp say that the curbing ordinance needs to be clarified. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

- Appointed Tharp as mayor pro tem, replacing former councilman Bryan Kube.

- Allowed Larry Cochran to cut curbing for a driveway.

- Heard that Deputy City Marshal Fry Urioste will attend a criminal justice course in Albuquerque.

- Tentatively planned a dedication ceremony for the new Bill Christian memorial fountain in KK Runnels Park Aug. 29.

- Heard that some Texico businesses are not listed on the tax sheet. The state Bureau of Revenue will be notified.

- Heard Causey ask for a

new police car, to replace the Ford. This was put off until next year due to lack of enough funds; \$6,000 will be carried over from this year toward the purchase.

- Heard Causey say about 15 kids are looking for a place to ride their dirt bikes. They were encouraged to go to three Clovis sites since riding them on Texico streets is unlawful.

- Heard a report of pit bulldogs being in the community. A possible ordinance regulating them will be discussed at the next meeting.

- Heard Autrey say he is still checking on possible sites for a proposed swimming pool. The community will be asked what their priorities are for construction: a pool? a community center? a City Hall? After that, state funds will be sought.

A guest column for wife Judy:

The High School class of 1990 is busy packing its bags to go off to college or preparing to find its niche in the business world. What are they like? What attitudes do they bring with them that are different from previous generations?

The Class of 1990 was born after the fairy-tale hype of Kennedy era, after the civil rights era, after the idealism of the 1960's. They grew up in an environment of cynicism and tough realism that earlier generations did not know.

Many in the class of 1990 were born about 1972. From their cribs they watched television news scenes of the Vietnam War. They saw our nation portrayed as bad guys. They watched as peace marches became confrontations. They listened hopelessly to stories of MIA prisoners in Vietnam. They were not yet in school when Saigon fell and U.S. troops withdrew - in disgrace, according to news media.

The Class of 1990 was still in diapers when the last oil embargo hit in 1973. They do not remember waiting in line for gasoline. They do not remember what the oil shortage did to grocery bills or to the inflationary spiral. They do not remember what it did to the cost of farm chemicals. They may not have understood what was causing tension in their homes; they only knew that their parents were unhappy. They only remember that many of their moms took jobs outside their homes for the first time.

They became a generation raised by babysitters. They were a generation that was expected to get up and get dressed and leave the house each morning. They could not stay home and play with their toys, but they may have

learned to get up and work.

The Class of 1990 remembers that their favorite television shows were pre-empted by the Watergate hearings. They knew that Bozo's Circus wouldn't be on because some people were talking about President Nixon. They didn't understand all of the arguments, but they heard the phrase "all politicians are crooks," repeated many times. On the other hand, they also learned that no one is above the law in this land. Anyone who breaks the law must face the consequences.

The Class of 1990 grew up watching material on daytime soap operas that would have been labeled "adults only" in earlier generations. In many cases their moms were not home to change the channels. They heard language that their parents did not use at home. They watched movies that earlier generations would have branded as obscene. They saw graphic depictions of death. They became a sophisticated and somewhat jaded group of viewers.

They have not become any more immoral or lawless than previous groups. If anything, they have seen enough of the damage done to others because of drug abuse and alcohol abuse that some of them are more temperate than their older brothers and sisters. They do not have the

attitude that "nothing bad can happen to me," that other generations had.

What contribution will the class of 1990 make to our society? How will they react to the world they did not make? Only time will tell for sure, but they may be hardworking, realistic pragmatists.

The work on the fountain in Texico's KKR Park honoring Bill Christian should just about be finished by now.

It's beautiful. A lot of thanks to the Rotary Club, Volunteer Fire Department, City Council and individuals like George Herington and Chuck Stallings for their assistance.

A note to local and area businesses:

Every now and then I hear of businesses being billed for ads by an area newspaper - although the businesses didn't approve of the ads being run.

This bugs me because it we don't do that - ever.

It's my belief that a business should only pay for ads its approves. If it's not approved, then throw away the bill.

I don't think highly of that

"practice." I've been called by local businesses and asked if it is illegal. I don't believe it is but I have a problem with its ethics.

The important thing is that every businessman should always check every bill he receives, regardless of what it's for.

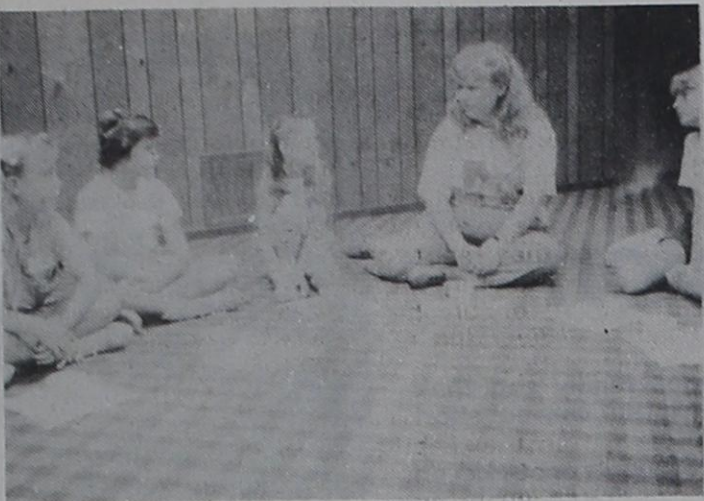

Farwell teachers attend workshop in Dallas

Five Farwell teachers, JoEllen Cahill, Nancy Roberts, Nancy Reynolds, Candy Dyer and Ruth Anne Bennett, attended a workshop in Dallas this summer sponsored by the Developmental Learning Materials. They were among more than 3,000 elementary teachers who attended.

Farwell schools use the DLM materials and curriculum with kindergarten and pre-kindergarten students. The institute itself was free for teachers who use the DLM materials; airfare and accommodations were not.

"All of us came back just super excited," said Nancy Reynolds.

The workshop was designed to give teachers ideas that they could carry back to their classes. It even had the theme, "A Pocketful of Miracles." Throughout the day the workshops stressed items and ideas that could be tucked into a pocket and carried back to the students.

Each of the Farwell teachers attended different small workshops during the day so that they could share the ideas and materials that they had picked up.

"We sat up and talked till all hours of the night," said Mrs. Reynolds.

That didn't stop them from attending the 7:45 a.m. "early bird" sessions because free materials were given away in

drawings during those sessions. "Everybody went to those," she said.

The workshops continued until 4:45 p.m. with only a quick break for a sandwich or salad.

Then the fun began. There was time to socialize with teachers from other school systems, and there were enjoyable activities.

Lazbuddie tax rate stays same

The Lazbuddie School Board held a hearing on the proposed 1990-91 school budget and tax rate on Aug. 14. Only one person attended in addition to the board.

The hearing was followed by the regular school board meeting. During the meeting, the board approved the amended 1989-90 school budget, and proposed the 1990-91 school budget.

The new budget proposes revenues of \$1,348,105 and expenditures of \$1,347,532. "It's a barely balanced budget," commented interim superintendent Tom Jarboe. The budget is based upon a tax rate equal to last year's.

The effective tax rate set by the appraisal district for Lazbuddie is .9560, and the maximum tax rate for the district without being subject to a rollback is .9847. The board decided to leave the tax rate at .98.

The board has contracted with the Texas Association of School Boards to help search for a new superintendent to replace Joe Hall who resigned this summer. They hope to replace him by Nov. 21, but they may not do so until Jan.

1. Until that time, Tom Jarboe will continue in the position.

In other business, the board: - Established new school hours of 8:10 a.m. - 3:20 p.m. for this year.

- Accepted the TASB Insurance program.

- Approved Policy Handbook revisions and early dismissal schedules.

- Approved the substitute teacher list.

- Added one half-time special education aide.

- Established the prices for school meals. Meal prices are: Pre kindergarten, Grades 1 and 2 - 40 cents for breakfast and 85 cents for lunch; grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 - 45 cents for breakfast and \$1 for lunch; grades 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 - 50 cents for breakfast and \$1.15 for lunch. Adults will pay 90 cents for breakfast and \$1.55 for lunch.

Wheat growers warned about virus threat

West Texas wheat growers should avoid planting in August and early September to reduce the threat of infection with the devastating wheat streak mosaic virus, cautions Dr. Harold Kaufman, a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Some counties in the South Plains and Texas Panhandle have been hit hard by the virus since 1988, said Kaufman. Several fields in Parmer County had nearly 100 percent of the plants infected this spring, he said.

The disease is spread by a wind-borne wheat curl mite that is most active in warm weather. The mite generally moves in a northeasterly direction with the prevailing summer winds. Infected plants have yellow, discontinuous streaks on the leaves.

The mite thrives on the tender, young growth of many grasses, corn, wheat and other small grains, such as barley, oats and rye.

Kaufman said volunteer wheat, one of the two most important hosts for the mite, should be plowed two weeks before planting the wheat crop.

"However, the past three years' experience has convinced me that Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres are the most important host of the wheat curl mite in our area," said Kaufman. "Volunteer wheat can be destroyed, depriving the mite of food and shelter it needs before moving into the young wheat crop. But CRP acres can't be destroyed. These acres are an ever present menace for the wheat farmer, a source of wheat streak mosaic virus he must learn to avoid."

He suggested four steps to control the virus: destroy volunteer wheat; avoid planting near CRP land; plant later, and plant resistant varieties.

Planting in late September or early October, after mite populations usually have declined, may keep the field from becoming infected or at least delay the time of infection and thus reduce the destructiveness of the virus.

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Plantings surveyed in area

A survey of 19 county extension agents early in the week of July 30, coupled with estimates supplied by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. for the other 6 counties in its territory, offers the only available assessment of overall High Plains cotton crop conditions since two successive weekends of beneficial rains.

The information was gathered at the request of Congressman Larry Combers (R-Lubbock) for use in a continuing effort to build support for disaster assistance on the 1990 crop. The 19-county survey was compiled by Dr. John Gannaway, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Cotton Breeder at Lubbock.

Combined survey and PCG estimated figures put total plantings in the 25 High Plains counties at 3.158 million acres, close to the 3.2 million-acre round number used by most crop observers all season. Lending further credence to the accuracy of the survey's figures is the 57.5 percent to 42.5 percent dryland-irrigated acreage split. That's near the mid-point of the dry-irrigated acreage split. That's near the

mid-point of the dry-irrigated ration reported by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service for 1988 (60-40) and 1989 (53.5 - 46.5).

The Extension Service - PCG estimate of acreage planted under irrigation came to 1.344 million compared to plantings of 1.814 million dryland acres. Irrigated acres, excepting an estimated 30,000 lost to hail, was rated in good to excellent condition.

Of total dryland acres, 531,000 are reported abandoned, with another 505,000 said to have only a 0-50 percent yield potential and put in a "potential abandonment" category. Of the remainder, 625,000 acres are given a yield potential of 50-100 percent, and 153,000 are reported to have a good chance to make 100 percent of potential yield.

PCG, in an interesting but "by no means prophetic" exercise, converted the acreage figures into bales of production. For lack of a better guide, the five-year average area-wide irrigated (490-pound) and dryland (342-pound) yields were used. The 490 pounds was applied to all standing irrigated acres; 342 pounds was applied to the dryland acres listed at 100 percent of potential, and 75 percent and 25 percent of the average dryland yield, respectively, were applied to dryland cotton in the 50-100 percent and 0-50 percent potential categories.

The end result: a 25-county total of 1,843,574 bales, 1,310,750 from irrigated acreage and 532,824 from dryland.

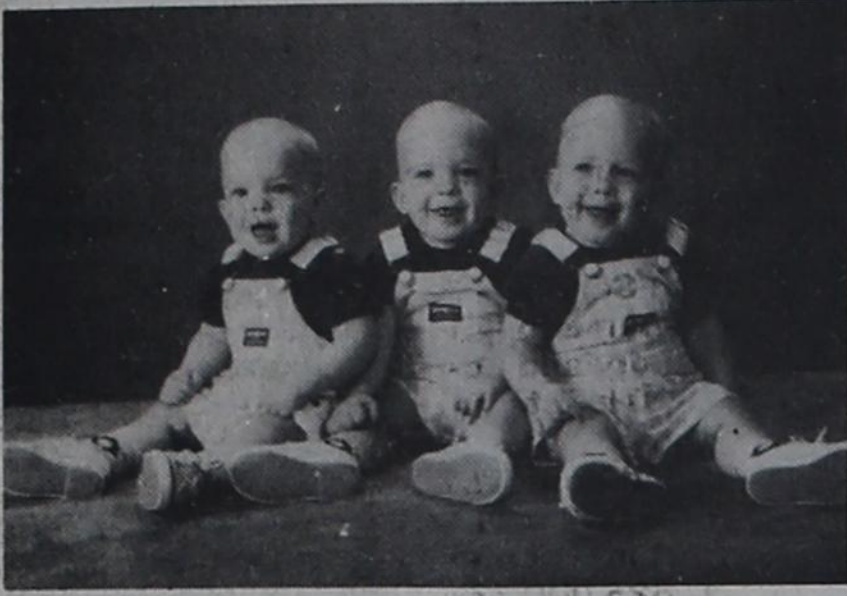

Holly Sugar to expand

Operations at Holly Sugar factory in Hereford will be expanded as construction gets underway on the sugar industry's newest ion exclusion facility, a state-of-the-art extraction process that produces refined sugar from beet molasses. Groundbreaking on the site of the new plant is scheduled Sept. 13.

The new \$11 million addition, which extracts the sugar which remains in molasses following the traditional processing of sugar beets, will increase plant utilization and create additional jobs in the Hereford area, according to Holly President Roger Hill. Holly already is the area's largest employer, with more than 375 workers on the payroll during the sugarbeet harvest.

"For the past 25 years since it was built, the Hereford factory has been virtually idle at the end of the annual beet slicing campaign," Hill said. "Now we can use the facilities longer with an economical process that produces more sugar and benefits the community. If all goes as well as expected here, it's quite possible ion exclusion capabilities could be installed at the other Holly facilities."

According to Hill, officials at the Colorado Springs-based Holly Sugar Corporation and its parent, Imperial Holly Corporation of Sugar Land, Texas selected the Hereford site as the prime choice because of the spirit and support of the Hereford community. "Sugar beets are in good supply and Hereford has a good market for cattle feed that uses beet sugar by-products," Hill said. We want to reassure our growers that Holly is planning for now and the future and that includes the support of our mutual interests in sugar beets with the newest technology available."

The board is seeking help from the Friona Methodist Church again this year for back to school clothing for the county's foster children.

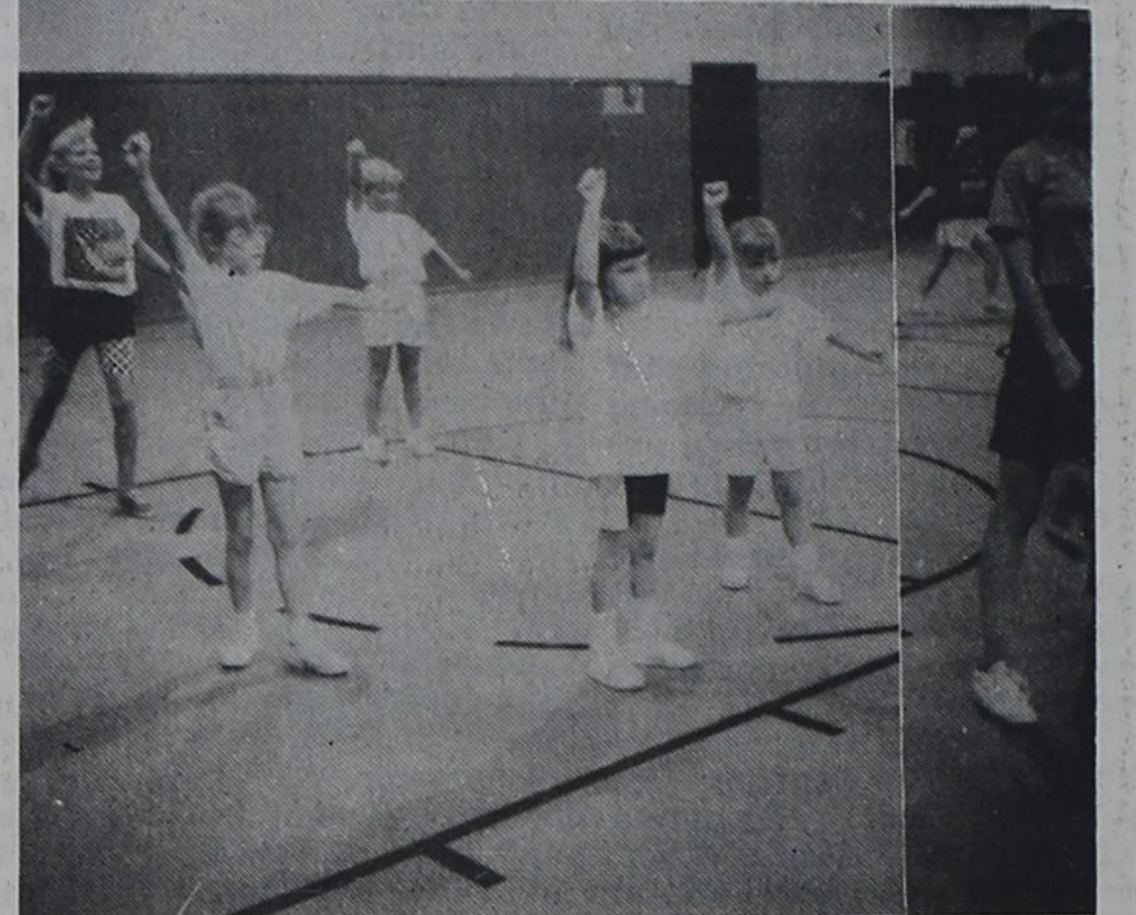
The board also voted to provide some money for school clothing and school supplies for several Parmer County school children who are severely in need of assistance.

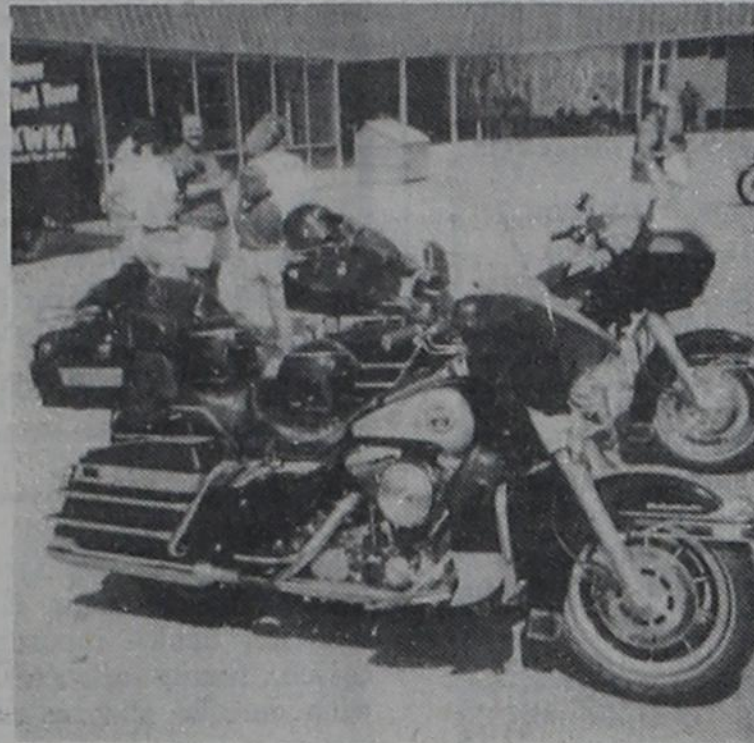
