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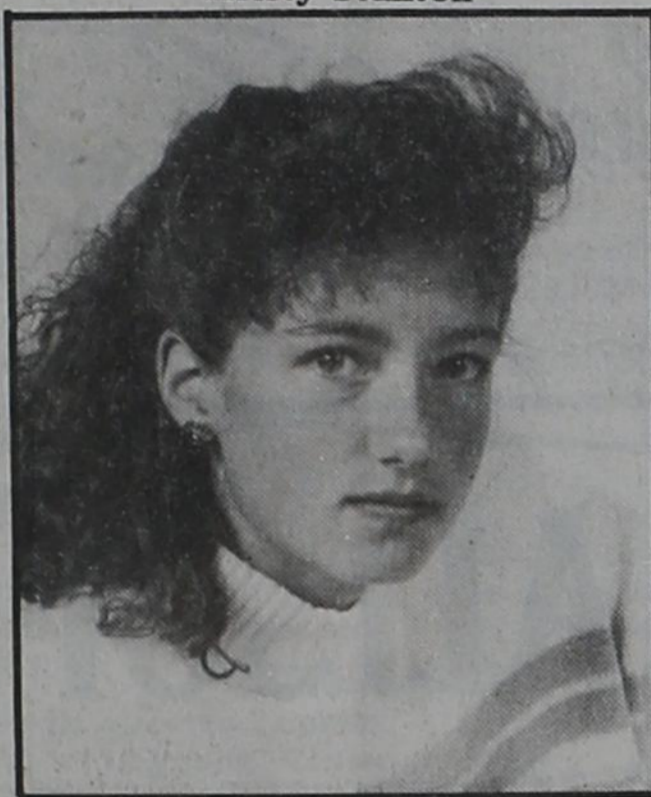

The 24th annual Border Town Days celebration kicks off Saturday.

Here are some of the highlights:

### Saturday events

A highlight of the Saturday events will be the 9th annual Merchants' Giveaway in which 42 merchants will give away prizes throughout the afternoon.

Also, there will be drawings for a pickup truck, TV and VCR.

B & J Plumbing will give away two faucets; names will be drawn from the Merchants' Giveaway boxes (put together). And an anonymous donor will give away a special wall hanging.

The CAKE Train (formerly owned by Glen Shot) is back again to give rides to youngsters.

### Barbeque

Following the parade will be the annual barbeque meal at the Farwell City Park served by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club.

Serving will begin at noon cdt. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children under 12. A drink is included with the price of the meal.

Tickets are available in advance from Rotary Club members (including at the State Line Tribune).

### Bicycle Contest

On Saturday morning the decorated Bike contest will be held at 9:45 a.m. CDT directly west of Texico City Hall.



### Truck giveaway

### Street Parade

The annual parade kicks off at 11 a.m. cdt. It will begin at Griffith Street in Texico and proceed down the highway into Farwell, turning right on Fifth Street and ending in front of the Farwell Convalescent Center.

Willie Dannheim will be at the ending point of the parade to direct parade participants to the park.

One change is that in order to have a better traffic flow at parade end, Fourth Street heading into the city park will be closed to southbound traffic for a short time. This will allow parade participants to exit more smoothly.

Parade entrants are to form at 10:30 a.m. cdt in Texico. A map showing where they should go is elsewhere in today's Tribune. A lineup of the parade will be along side it.

In charge of the parade is the Texico a-Farwell Lions Club. Parade marshal is Hal Helton. The Lions Club members will wear yellow vests and will be available to assist entrants.

### Park Events

The opening ceremonies will take place at 1 p.m. cdt in the park gazebo. Emcee will be Fred Chandler.

The national anthem will be sung by Nancy Miller. Greetings then will be given by Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue and Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas.

The mayors will present the first awards: to Pioneers of the Year Dick and Pearlle Geris, and to the Honorary Parade Marshals - the Texico and Farwell Volunteer Fire Departments.

Then Ann Cooper will give out the cash awards for the decorated bike contest, float contest, best animal unit, and top motorized units.

Then comes a full day of entertainment, culminated in the pickup truck drawing at 5 p.m.

Arrangements have been made so that no Santa Fe Railroad trains will be running through the Twin Cities during the parade.

It is advisable to bring a lawn chair or blanket with you to the park Saturday.

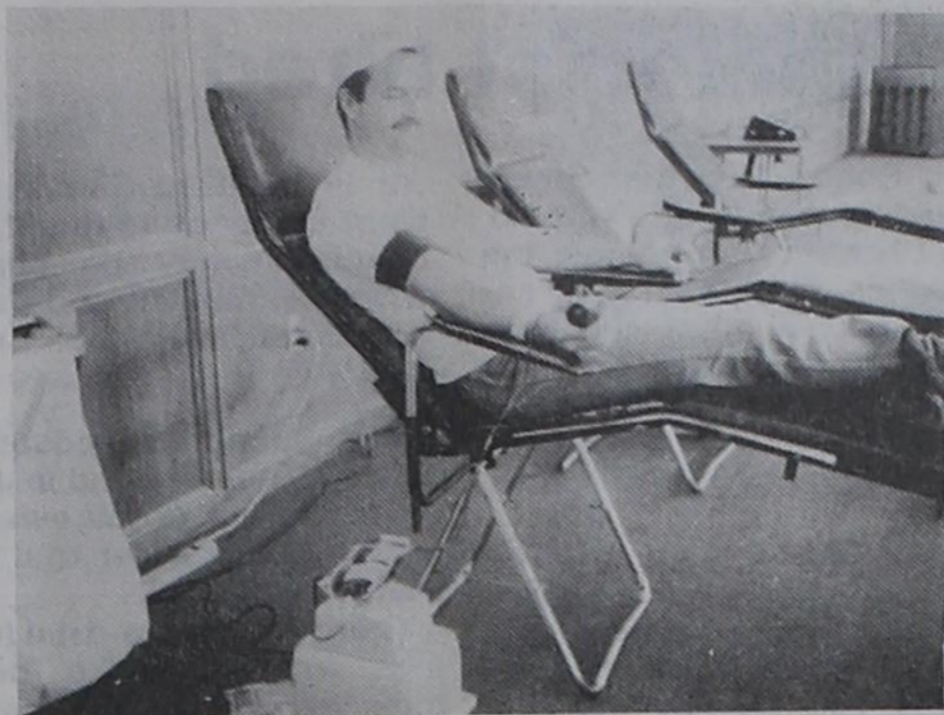

### School request OK'd

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved a request from Friona Schools to take \$16,500 from the county permanent improvement fund.

The funds (plus some interest) will go for new ceiling fans.

Including this money, it means that since the commissioners voted to allow local school systems to take money out of the fund - nearly \$1 million at the time, this has occurred:

- Friona Schools have spent \$282,000. It still has \$223,000 left in the county fund for its use.

- Farwell Schools have spent \$14,700, and has \$186,707 left.

- Lazbuddie Schools have not spent any of its \$108,329.

- Bovina Schools have spent all of its \$196,000.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Discussed various ways to renovate the third floor of the courthouse. It appears most of the space will go to the county extension office, currently situated on the second floor.

If that occurs, part of the current county extension office space will be made

into a jury deliberation room. Currently, jurors leave the second floor courtroom to deliberate in a room on the third floor.

All this is just in the discussion stage.

- Heard an explanation of what the Panhandle Community Services (PCS) program does. PCS would like Parmer County to enter it.

- Approved sending the new DARE officer to a training school. The DARE program apparently will be used in Lazbuddie, Friona and Bovina Schools. Farwell Schools is using the Quest program.

- Discussed future railroad signals. The Santa Fe is looking at installing signals at four possible sites (no decisions have been made): 1 - leading to Wells Feed Yard east of Friona; 2 - crossing the county road at the Friona airport; 3 - leading to West Friona Grain and Parmer County Implement just west of Friona; and 4 - the next crossing north of Farm to Market Road 3333 (about one third of the way from Farwell toward Bovina).

The commissioners have suggested that the road leading to West Friona Grain be top priority.

## Feed yards install sprinkler systems

Local feed yards are installing sprinkler systems to help keep the dust down.

Oppliger Land and Cattle had a sprinkler system installed last winter. Farwell Feed Yard installed a system last week, and other feed yards in the area are planning to add them, too.

According to Don Oppliger, the system works well.

The sprinkler systems moisten the soil so that less dust fills the air. This will be beneficial to people who live near the feedlots, but it may be even more beneficial to the animals. Controlling the dust helps to improve the health of

the animals.

The weather conditions this year have been extremely dry. The sprinkler systems will help to alleviate much of the problem, but "when we get into a situation like we had in June, we can be overwhelmed by it. Hopefully, this will help," said Oppliger. June's 100 degree weather coupled with drought conditions would tax any system.

"I don't want folks to think that we'll never have any dust," said Oppliger. But, the new systems should make a major contribution to clean air.

## Legislators meet on Texico plans

New Mexico State Sen. Walter Bradley and Rep. Gary Robbins met with a group of concerned Texico residents Tuesday at the Spur Restaurant to discuss the availability of state funds for several important projects.

If the highway is widened in Texico, it could cut into the Texico City Hall, Community Center, and Senior Citizens Center. It may be several years before this is done, but some Texico citizens believe that now is the time to make plans and find out how to carry them out.

Also, the Texico swimming pool has needed major repairs every year lately. It might be better to replace it.

City Councilman Oran J. Autrey said Texico needs a new community center and a swimming pool.

During the next hour citizens discussed the needs of the community and heard the legislators' suggestions about how to seek government assistance. They wanted everyone to know from the start what to expect when dealing with the government.

"You need to put together a plan; and you need to be able to justify it before we can go before a committee," said Bradley.

The plans would need to include the number of square feet, a general layout and the amount of money needed to build a structure.

"There are a number of ways to get money from the government - general appropriations, grants, matching funds, and so forth," he added. He suggested that the

best approach is to try for more than one type of funding.

The legislators noted that the first question they would be asked in Santa Fe is "Where are you as a community on tax capacity?" The state government will not give away money if the community fails to show that it needs the money.

Texico City Attorney Duane Hamar noted that raising the sales tax rate would not generate much money because there are so few businesses in Texico.

Robbins suggested that having the real estate for the project before asking the state for funds is one way to show that the community is serious about its plans.

He suggested that a logical first step would be getting a consensus of the community - find out what is really wanted and needed in Texico.

The legislators gave the tip that in Santa Fe circles, senior citizen projects are real popular, but swimming pools are not too popular.

"Make a case of what's most important, prioritize," said Bradley.

They noted that the community may have to request funds from several sources or re-apply several years before they get the funds. For instance, "How about a joint community / school venture on the swimming pool?" Bradley asked.

Robbins noted that cooperation between government entities often helps requests for matching funds.

The most important advice they gave the group was "You don't want to go up there with a split community."

"They want to see that the community is making an effort," said Bradley.

They suggested that for this year the legislators would need the proposal within 5 months so that they would have the plans before the legislative session started.

At the end of the meeting Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue summed up the feelings of the group by saying, "At least we know where our homework has got to start."

## Pathologist hired

Dr. Robert Bux, a forensic pathologist in San Antonio, has been hired to review the evidence that local law enforcement agents have collected to determine whether former Bovina resident Diane Lumbrera should stand trial for murder here in Parmer County.

Mrs. Lumbrera has been charged with the first degree murder of her 4-year-old son, Jose, in Garden City, Kan., on May 1. She is awaiting trial there.

When she lived in Parmer County, six other children in her care - including one child who was not her own child - died.

It is believed that if sufficient evidence is found, Mrs. Lumbrera may be charged when the next Grand Jury is scheduled in Parmer County Aug. 7.

Mrs. Lumbrera posted a \$50,000 surety bond in June, so she is out of jail awaiting trial in Kansas. Her trial date there is Sept. 19.

There will be pre-trial hearings in Kansas to determine whether evidence about the earlier deaths of children in her care would be used as evidence in the Kansas trial. They will also determine what other types of evidence would be allowed.

The Texico Marshal's office responded to a call on July 24 of a motor vehicle accident with injuries on Hwy 60-84 near the grain elevators.

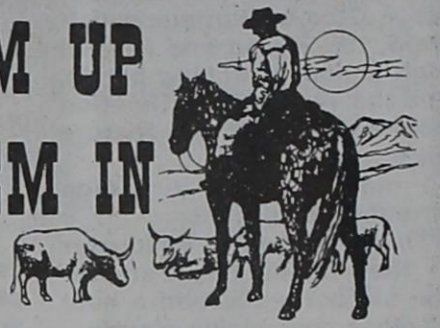
A Clovis resident, Frances Crane, 67, was taken to Clovis Hospital following the collision.

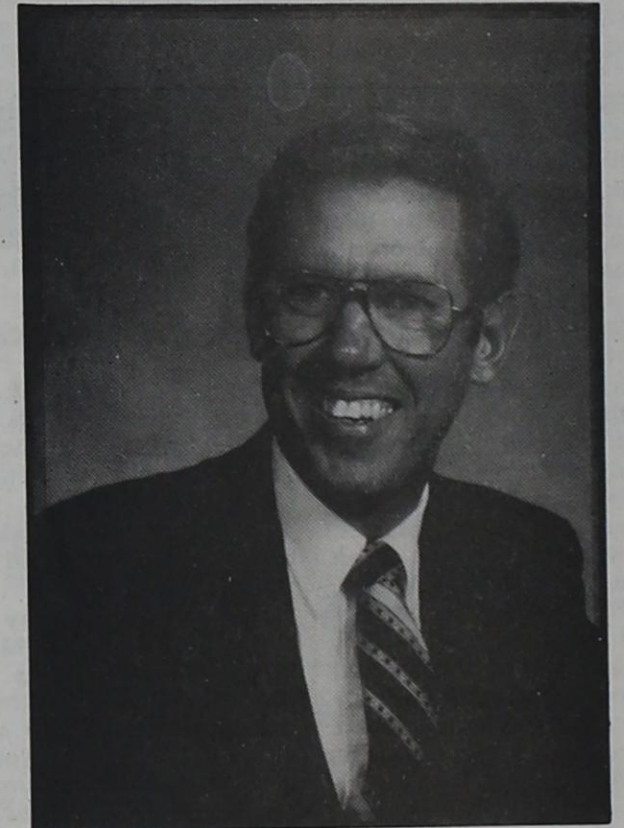

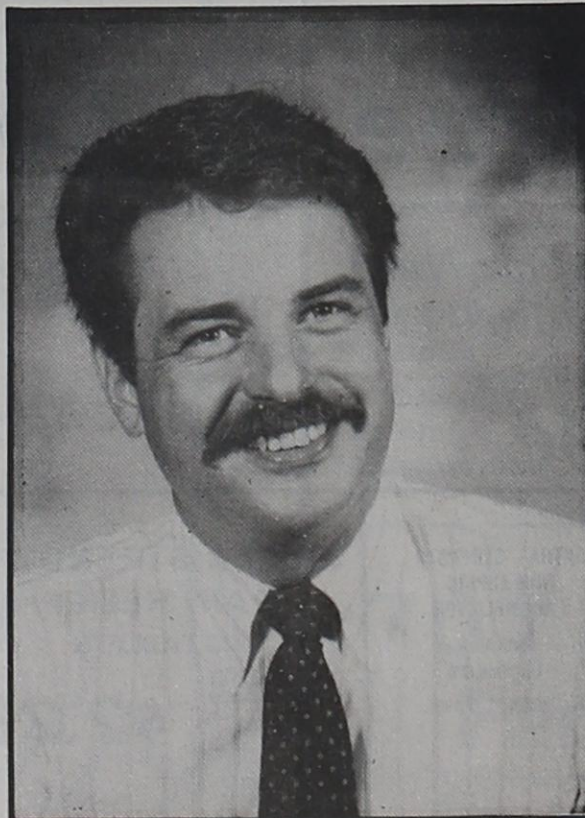

## Kidd attends 'history' meeting

Hubert Kidd, manager of Five Area Telephone Cooperative, attended a meeting in Denver which made history.

Kidd attended a rural development conference which marked the end of the old hand crank telephone era in the United States.

Joe (Dean) Miller, president of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission placed a phone call to the administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) and the audience attending the conference using a new telephone system which ended the hand crank era.

The old 20-party, single telephone line, believed to be the nation's last hand-cranked, magneto-operated system-strung 40 miles on trees, fence posts and anything else it could be fastened to, including treacherous cliffs, high above the Salmon River in Idaho was replaced with a new system.

In place of the 59-year-old line, a one party, touch-tone state-of-the-art digital telephone system has been installed in the isolated East central Idaho area in the Salmon National Forest about 25 miles south of the Continental Divide.

The digital system is a buried cable, most of it in a narrow, dead-end dirt roadbed. It's the only way - other than the river- in and out of the 40-mile canyon, described as a sanctuary for bighorn sheep, white-water rafting and tranquility. Markings attributed to prehistoric man are easy to see on the rocky cliffs.

The system, known as the nonprofit North Fork Telephone Corp. since 1952, will almost triple in size immediately. A total of 37 new subscribers will obtain service from Rural Telephone Company, Glenns Falls, Idaho, which tookover the system following the meeting.

The first call using the new telephone system was made from Shoup's general store and post office in the canyon's only town, population, 2.

Kidd and nearly 700 others in attendance at the historic meeting watched the end of an era in telephone service.

"I'll bet some of your readers remember those old crank phones," said Kidd.

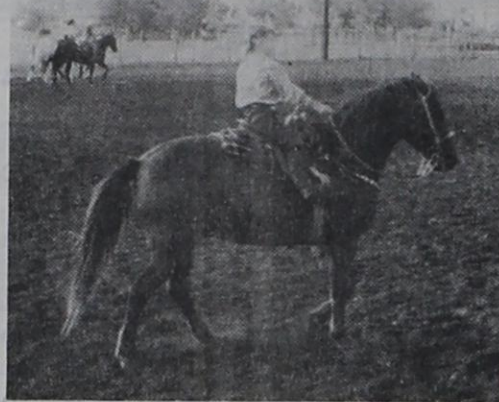
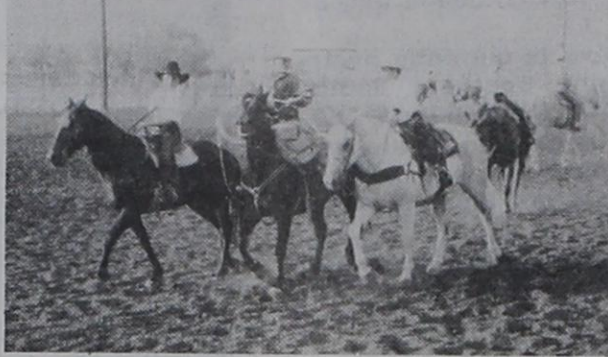
## It's rodeo time!

The second night was rained out, but its events have been re-scheduled for the evening of July 30.

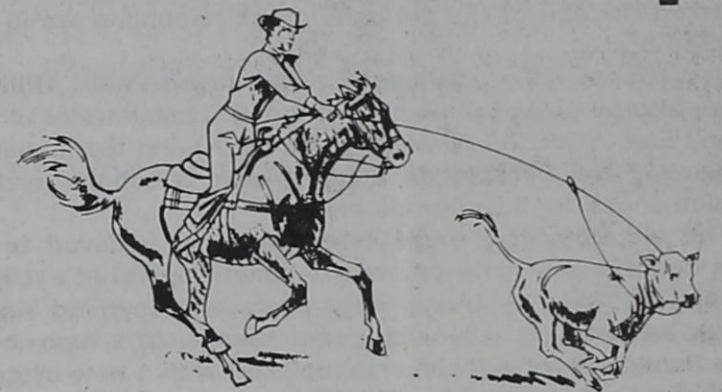

# Texico Council moves forward on communitywide cleanup

The Texico City Council Tuesday moved ahead on the planning for the communitywide cleanup campaign.

A map showing problem areas was presented to the council (see story on cleanup committee meeting).

Two important actions were taken:

1) City Attorney Duane Hamar will draw up a form (in English and Spanish) which committee members can take to property owners or residents to seek permission to assist with the cleanup during the Sept. 20-22 drive.

This form will be ready at the Aug. 14 council meeting, six days before the cleanup committee meets. This way, copies will be given cleanup committee members who will talk with property owners or

residents, thus setting the stage for the Sept. 20-22 drive.

The form will allow work done on private property, such as the removal of weeds, debris and other forms of junk.

2) City Clerk Marie Christian was asked to find out who the property owners and/or residents are where the problem areas are. This report also will be presented at the Aug. 14 council session. This way, the council and committee will know exactly who to deal with on the upcoming cleanup campaign.

The map will be kept at City Hall and as various areas are cleaned up, they will be "whited out" on the map, thus showing the community

what progress is being done.

In other business, the council:

- Voted to ask the state building inspector to condemn the vacant Westerner Motel. Councilman Butch Tharp reported that kids have been staying there and several rooms are a serious health hazard.

- Approved prices for a plaque at K.K. Runnels Park, for \$281, and for the Bill Christian fountain, for \$421. The fountain plaque is being paid for by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club.

- Heard Mrs. Christian report that the state has provided \$567 in beautification funds to help dredge the pond

at KKR Park. Tharp will do the work.

- Heard City Marshal Walt Causey note that he has been on the job for three months now, and asked for a raise. It was taken under advisement.

- Heard Councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that a property owner near KKR Park has offered a site for

\$12,000 to the city for a new city swimming pool. More information will be sought before any decision is made.

- Heard Autrey say that the cars parking along the highway at the Little Mexico flea market weekends are a traffic hazard. The state highway department will be asked to study this.

## Results put on map

The ad hoc Texico cleanup committee held its third session last Friday at the Texico Community Center - with more progress made toward a general communitywide cleanup.

Attending were Mae Stone, Rhonda Qualls, Jim Burrows, Evelyn Warmuth, Mike Pomper, Fern Tharp, Lewis Cooper and chairman Ronnie Warmuth.

Warmuth showed a large map featuring the results of the walking tours conducted earlier this month by committee members. Its goal was to find exactly where the problem areas were, including large junk, abandoned vehicles and homes, etc.

The tour found 20 junked vehicles and 12 abandoned homes. Also, there are some large appliances (with doors) sitting around outside, he said.

The large map will be placed at City Hall and as each problem area is eliminated, it will be "whited out" on the map.

The next step is to find out who owns the areas in question. So Warmuth plans to ask the City Council to act on this (see City Council story).

Also, Warmuth will ask City Attorney Duane Hamar to draft a letter seeking permission to clean up various areas (see City Council story).

The next committee meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. mdt Aug. 20 at the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. All committee meetings are open to the public.

In various reports given:

- Mrs. Stone reported on the cost of shrubs and flowers; she received quotes from two Clovis businesses. She will continue to check with other places.

- Mrs. Tharp reported that \$100 has been donated to the cleanup fund, with an account started at the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. The committee discussed placing glass jars as businesses in town seeking funds for beautification.

- Cooper reported that Clovis Auto Parts will pick up abandoned vehicles without charge if a title is presented. He will check with Lunsford Auto Parts, also.

- It was reported that Butch Tharp has volunteered the use of a front end loader and bulldozer for the general cleanup Sept. 20-22.

- Mrs. Warmuth said she and Mrs. Qualls have made up a float for the Border Town Days parade.

- Warmuth said the Gas Company of New Mexico will pick up small pieces of junk concrete periodically when working in Texico.

- Pomper reported on the education efforts, including the page in the State Line Tribune last week featuring the city's cleanup ordinances.

- Warmuth said Curry County is ready to help in the Sept. 20-22 cleanup, but the National Guard won't be able to.

- Mrs. Qualls said it's obvious that many residents in Texico already are beginning general cleanups of their properties.

- Warmuth reminded the public that they can haul junk to the transfer station at the old Texico landfill by calling City Hall, where an employee will help them.

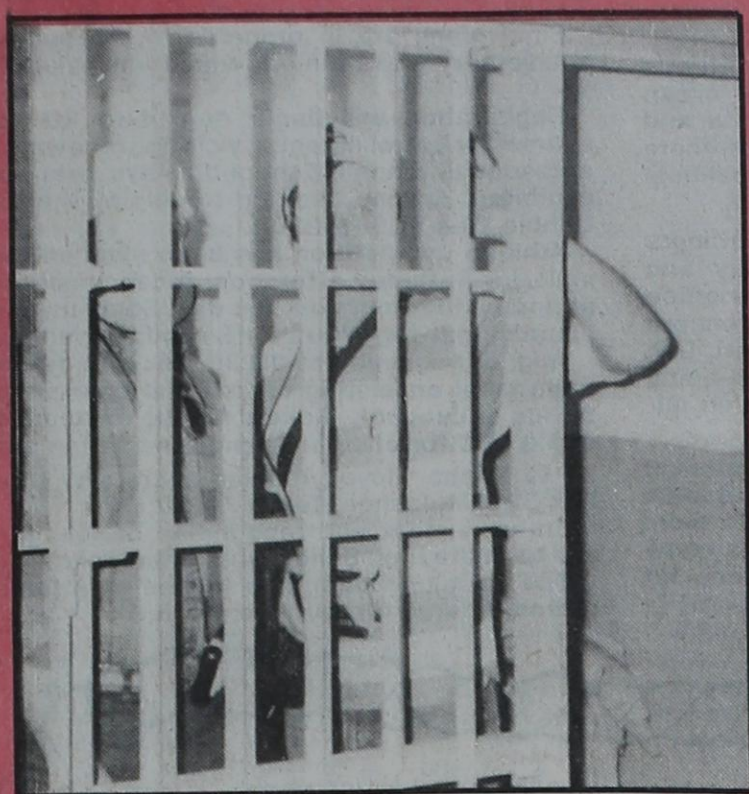

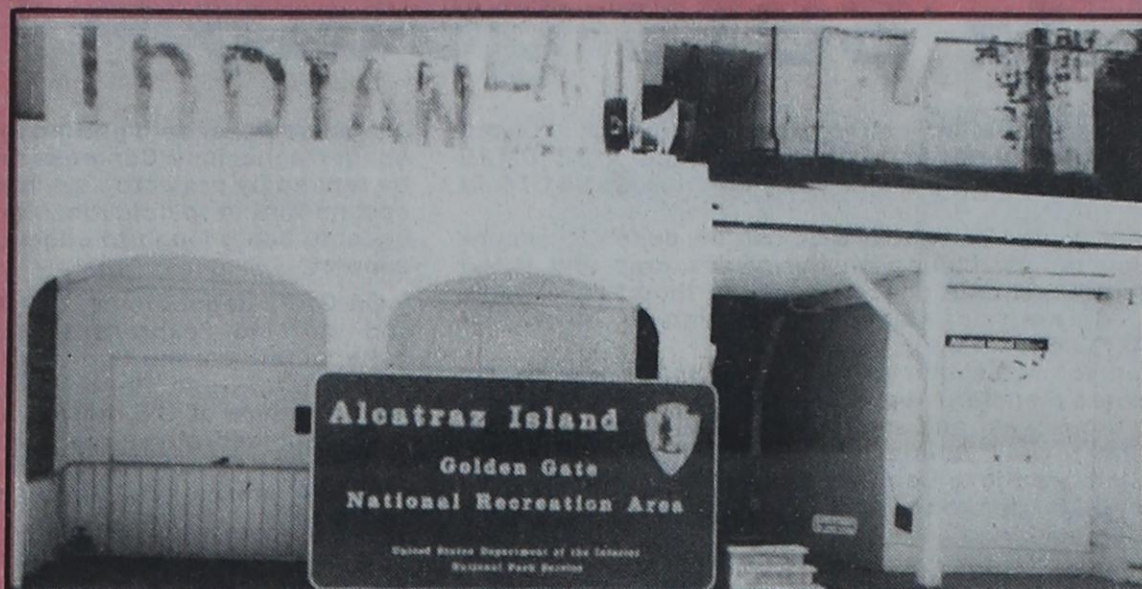

# Stopping off at 'The Rock'

Texico's Larry Cochran went to prison - on his vacation. One of the highlights of the Cochran family vacation this summer was a tour of Alcatraz, the world famous maximum security prison on an island in San Francisco Harbor.

The Cochran family- Larry, Darla, Tasha and Chad -and the Allen Cochrans- Allen and Dorothy- traveled in separate cars to Kerman, Calif., to visit Larry's brother Troy Cochran and his sister Brenda Johnson and their families. The family reunion was a really pleasant and important part of the vacation.

But the Cochrans also wanted to see some of the sights before they returned to the Twin Cities.

On June 7 they drove from Kerman to San Francisco - about 150 miles away.

"They talk about distance in miles there, not time," Larry Cochran observed. When you live in an area where traffic can be heavy, it is difficult to compute a trip in terms of time. Luckily, on the day they visited San Francisco, the traffic was "not too bad; about like Dallas," according to Cochran.

They arrived in the city by crossing the Bay Bridge - the same one that collapsed last October during the earthquake. But the group was already across the bridge before they thought about what it looked like just after the earthquake hit.

They found their way to the wharf where they climbed aboard a two story high ferry boat that

took them to Alcatraz.

They were met there by a National Park Ranger who posed as the warden. He briefed the group about the 13 story prison, and directed them to a place where they could see a film about the prison in its prime.

There is currently a controversy about the prison: Did anyone successfully escape from it? Many believe that it had the tightest security ever, and no inmate ever successfully escaped from the island. Others believe that five inmates did successfully escape.

Alcatraz housed the most incorrigible inmates in the federal prison system, but the guards did not use physical abuse to keep the inmates in line. Boredom and loss of privileges were the primary punishments in the prison. There was also solitary confinement for those who committed serious disruptive offenses. The average stay in these steel boxes was three days, often in total darkness.

They also saw the solitary confinement cell where inmates would sit in total darkness. "They told us that one guy would take the snaps off his overalls so that he could throw them around and find them while he was in solitary confinement; it gave him something to do in the dark," said Cochran.

Among the famous inmates of Alcatraz was Robert Stroud, "the Birdman." He had raised canaries when he was in Leavenworth Penitentiary, but he was not allowed to keep them at Alcatraz. His real nickname was the "Bird Doctor of Leavenworth."

While the Cochrans toured the prison, a former inmate who has written a book about the possible escape was there to sell and autograph books.

During the 2 1/2 hour tour, the group saw the place where some of the most hardened criminals in the country were housed, and they learned many tidbits about those men.

For instance, "Birdman of Alcatraz," wasn't the pleasant person depicted in the movie Hollywood made several years ago. According to the tour guides, he was a cold person who could irritate you just by looking at you. The Birdman spent his final years in the prison hospital.

The dining hall was one of the most dangerous places in the prison because the inmates were armed with metal forks, spoons and trays while the guards on the floor with the inmates were unarmed. They could use the tear gas canisters to defend themselves, and they could rely on the officers who patrolled on catwalks outside the windowed cafeteria.

The prison was said to have had the best food in the federal prison system to help reduce tension and keep the men even tempered.

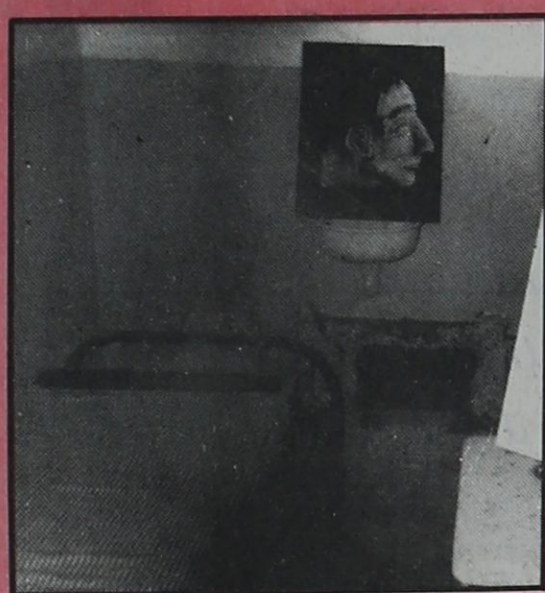
While it was a Federal prison, 36 men tried to escape from Alcatraz in 14 separate attempts. The most notorious escape occurred on June 11, 1962.

Three inmates- Frank Morris, John Anglin, and Clarence Anglin - spent many months planning their escape. They made dummy heads and covered them with hair from the barber shop so that guards would think that they were sleeping in their beds. They worked at night and carefully concealed their work. They chipped holes through the rear walls of their cells and got into a utility corridor behind the cell walls. From there they made their way out of the prison to the north end of the island where they had hidden a makeshift raft.

It is presumed that all three are dead because there has been no trace of any of them since the escape.

The escape attempt raised doubts that the island fortress was inescapable. Less than a year after the escape attempt, the Federal prison system decided to close Alcatraz because the cost of operation of the island prison was almost twice the cost operating any other Federal prison. Food, fuel, and water all had to be transported by boat to the prison.

Today the forbidding 13 story building is starting to look pretty shabby because sea gulls have made a mess of the outside of the building. But, the inside of the building has been restored.

# PCG sets goals

The 50-member Board of Directors of Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. July 11 adopted a \$310,125 budget for the 1990-91 fiscal year, up from \$294,075 in 1989-90.

The board vowed to "do all that can be done" to secure federal disaster assistance on this year's crop and voted to express its "extreme concern" for the threat to cotton's future posed by ongoing General Agreements on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) negotiations.

The need for a disaster program was made abundantly clear by Board members' reports on dryland crop conditions. In a word, crops west and south of Lubbock were described generally as "gone." Sadder of the lot was the report of Yoakum County's Ricky Bearden. Of the county's estimated 70,000 to 75,000 dryland cotton acres, no more than 200 are left, Bearden said. And he quoted an old-timer in the county as saying crops are the worst he's seen in 60 years.

Prior to the PCG vote on disaster aid, discussion revealed that four disaster bills have been introduced in Washington, one in the Senate and three in the House, but none "appear to be going anywhere." PCG Executive Vice President Donald

Johnson further said getting a disaster measure through this budget-conscious Congress would require, first, that it can be funded by projected savings in deficiency payments, and second that crop conditions in the mid-west and elsewhere become bad enough to engender a broader base of political support.

On GATT negotiations, the Board instructed PCG officers and staff to "express to the appropriate senators and representatives, the Secretary of Agriculture and the office of the U.S. Trade Representative PCG's extreme concern for the future of U.S. cotton if, as has been indicated, U.S. trade representatives are willing to sacrifice its well-being as a means to achieve outer objectives in pursuing an all-inclusive international trade agreement."

The fundamental U.S. policy calling for global elimination of all agricultural subsidies and import barriers, long a source of anxiety in cotton circles, of late has become even more portentous in light of indications U.S. negotiators may now lean toward accepting something less than a tit-for-tat commitment on subsidies from foreign competitors.

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# Hamilton, Martin attend Boys' State

Two Texico youths, Dwayne Hamilton and Warren Martin, attended Boys State June 3-8 at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell. The Boys State activity is designed to teach youth about the way that government works.

Hamilton was assigned to the mythical "Trujillo City" and Martin was assigned to "Cortez City." Through elections and governmental meetings the students were supposed to learn about the workings of government.

The 400 participants were divided into heterogeneous groups to get students working with new friends from around the state, and to eliminate bloc voting on important issues. Unfortunately, the highly populated cities sent so many delegates that bloc voting was still a very real problem in the elections.

"I never knew what a big advantage big cities have in politics," said Hamilton.

Albuquerque schools sent 60 delegates to the Boys State, and many of the delegates knew each other before they arrived in Roswell. Most of the people elected to office at Boys State were from were from Albuquerque or Las Cruces.

Both Martin and Hamilton ran for the same office in their cities (city treasurer), and each was defeated. But each of them was later put to work in law enforcement.

"I didn't realize that most people don't respect law enforcement officers," said Hamilton. "They are easily taken for granted and picked upon."

At Boys State the boys made their own rules and regulations about how they would live. "We'd make our own laws, and then break them," said Hamilton. Nobody wanted to be told to pick up their own trash or to stay off the grass or to be quiet at bedtime. The police officers had to learn to politely tell people what they needed to do.

Hamilton gained a lot of respect for the police officers who can enforce the laws effectively and still keep people satisfied in a community.

Because the Boys State was held at New Mexico Military Institute, the participants had a slightly more military lifestyle at Boys State this year than previous participants have had. There were morning room inspections each day, and the groups with the neatest living quarters got to eat meals before those with messy rooms.

"You stood in the hot sun until the others were served," said Hamilton. Since the thermometer often went above 100 degrees, the groups competed hard for clean rooms so that they could be served first.

Each day the participants also engaged in calisthenics and

running before breakfast. But, it wasn't very stressful for the Texico students who are accustomed to varsity athletics. "It was just some stretching and running," said Hamilton.

Once the groups had selected officers, they met in governmental sessions to debate important real-life issues. Then they drew up resolutions which represented the views of the group, and they presented these to New Mexico Governor Gary Carruthers.

This year's debates included flag burning, abortion, and the location of the WIPP Site in New Mexico. Participants were divided on the first two issues, but fairly unified on the last one.

On the flag burning issue, participants could see two sides to the issue. "Most people at Boys' State felt that freedom of speech is very important," said Hamilton. "They respect the flag and like the amendment idea, but they aren't sure it would work."

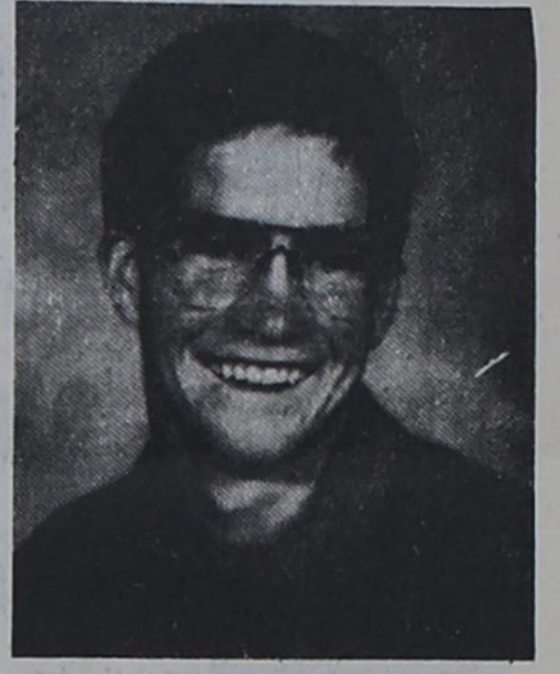
The group was nearly evenly split on the abortion issue, but the pro-choice group had slightly more votes.

The future of the WIPP Site for disposal of hazardous materials was the only issue on which the group showed unity. The students felt that the WIPP Site would benefit New Mexico financially, and that outweighed any potential environmental hazard. And, since the federal government had already spent \$1 million dollars in New Mexico, and it was already doing so.

The Boys State delegates gave the results of their debate Governor Gary Carruthers when he came to speak at the

Boys State inaugural dinner. Even though the Governor might not take action on the legislation that Boys State had enacted, the participants felt like they had made their views known to the highest elected official in their state.

Hamilton was positively impressed by the experience. "It was really interesting, and worth your time," said Hamilton of the experience. "Sometimes there was work to do until all hours of the night, but you get out of it what you put into it," said Hamilton.

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# A crops' perspective

The following article comes from *The Agriculture Program - Texas A&M University System*. It will help local farmers put their wheat crop yields into perspective compared to other places in the Panhandle.

It's very nearly been a feast or famine year for winter wheat producers across the Texas plains as harvesting nears its end.

Both the High Plains and Rolling Plains account for 4 million acres of wheat, approximately 60 percent of the state's 1990 crop.

The winter wheat crop has undergone various extremes of weather, from hard and prolonged freezing temperatures at year's end and April, to drought followed by floods in May and now to extremely high temperatures in June.

Fields in the northern High Plains report average or better yields and test weights, Bean said. "but between Amarillo and Lubbock, we've had low weights and low yields," he said. "Some of the irrigated crop in Swisher County yielded only around 25 bushels an acre."

At the top of the Texas Panhandle, in the "Wheatheart" country of Ochiltree, county Extension Agent Ronnie Gooch said farmers are having "one of the best harvests in years." About half of the county's 200,000 wheat is cut, and the rest should be harvested by Sunday if the weather stays good, he said.

"Some of our dryland wheat is running over 60 bushels an acre," Gooch said. "We're probably going to average 40 bushels." He said test weights are running 60 to 65 pounds per bushel.

"After three years without a (wheat) crop here, an average crop looks pretty good," said Danny Nusser, Carson County Extension Service agent. Carson County has some 100,000 acres, about 60 percent of it dryland.

With harvest in full swing in late June, Nusser said, yields are looking better than expected. "A lot of test weights are coming back to 60 to 61," he said. But some fields hit by

subfreezing temperatures in late April have a lot of blank heads, the county agent said.

Kenneth Holloway, Extension Service agent for Moore County in the Panhandle, said several days of early June when temperatures hovered around the 100-degree mark "are probably going to cost us 10 bushels an acre."

On the Rolling Plains, the eastern counties of Wichita, Wilbarger, Baylor and Knox had yields of over 30 bushels an acre, a little better than average, Alexander said. Early varieties that were harvested before the heavy May rains had good test weights, but fields harvested after the rains were averaging about 55 pounds a bushel, he said.

"But west of Knox County, yields are well below average and a lot of it was grazed out," Alexander said.

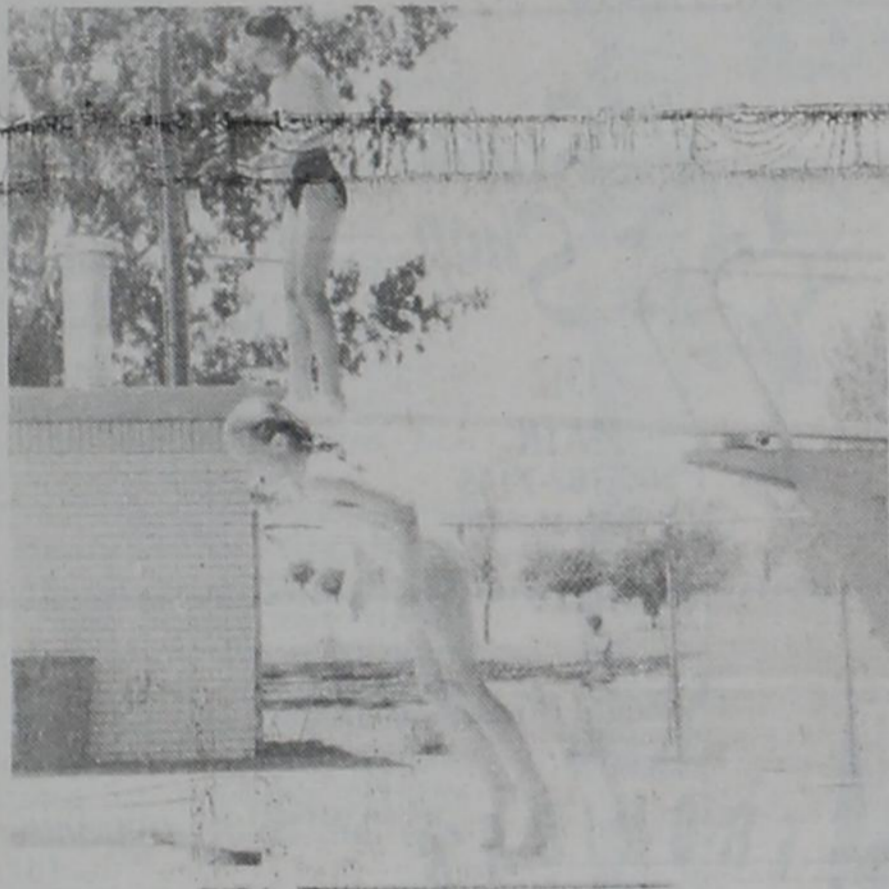
## Wolverines to have band camp

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# Tips on how to have a weed-free lawn

Four simple but important steps will do more to provide homeowners an attractive, weed-free lawn than an arsenal of weed-killing potions, says an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. And now is the time to begin those four steps, he adds.

"When weeds invade lawns, many homeowners seek quick solutions through the use of herbicides," said Dr. Brent Bean, an agronomist. Herbicides are only one tool and have only temporary effect on weed control unless other management practices are used, he said.

"The best weed control practice is maintaining a dense, actively growing lawn," Bean said. A well-maintained lawn minimizes weed competition and helps prevent establishment of new weeds.

"Turfgrass vigor is generally affected most by four cultural practices: selecting a good grass variety, mowing, nutrition and irrigation," the Extension Service specialist said.

When choosing a turfgrass variety, select those with a history of doing well in this area, he said. "Use mixtures and blends, rather than a single species," he recommended. "This helps the turfgrass compete under a wide range of conditions and lowers the chances of weeds invading the lawn."

Proper mowing is often overlooked for maintaining a healthy lawn, he said. Mowing height and frequency should be adjusted depending on the type of grass and time of year.

Cool season grasses, such as Kentucky bluegrass and fine fescue, should be mowed at one and a half to two inches in the spring and fall, and at two and a half to three inches in summer. "Higher cutting height in the summer helps insulate the grass crown from high temperatures," Bean explained.

In general, bermudagrass performs best at mowing heights of an inch or less, the agronomist said.

"Regardless of the type of grass, it is best to not remove more than a third of the leaf area with any mowing," he said.

A properly fertilized lawn may not be weed-free, but it will be better able to compete with weeds than an undernourished lawn, Bean said. The most effective way to determine a lawn's fertility needs is to take a soil sample and have it analyzed, he said. Your county extension agent can

tell you how to take the sample and suggest where to send it for inexpensive testing, he noted.

Kentucky bluegrass and fescue lawn should receive the bulk of their fertilizer in April, May and September. A total of five pounds of nitrogen for 1,000 square feet should be sufficient for most cool season lawns, with a third to a half of the nitrogen applied in the spring and the rest in the fall.

"For best results, use a combination of fast and slow release sources of nitrogen, with not more than half being fast relief," Bean suggested. Adding iron will help give the grass a darker green color, and other nutrients should be added if the soil test indicates a need, he said.

Bermudagrass should receive between four and six pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn each year. "A

split application in May and September is generally best. As with cool season lawns, a mixture of fast and slow release nitrogen is best," Bean said.

Watering is the final cultural practice that will help a lawn compete with weeds. Irrigating deeply and infrequently is preferred over light, frequent waterings which lead to shallow root systems, the agronomist said.

Bluegrass and fescue require significantly more water than bermudagrass during the heat of summer, Bean said. "In some cases, up to two inches a week may be needed to maintain a cool season lawn through the summer," he said.

By watering early in the morning, less water is lost to evaporation. Watering at night should be avoided, Bean said, since it tends to make the grass more susceptible to disease.

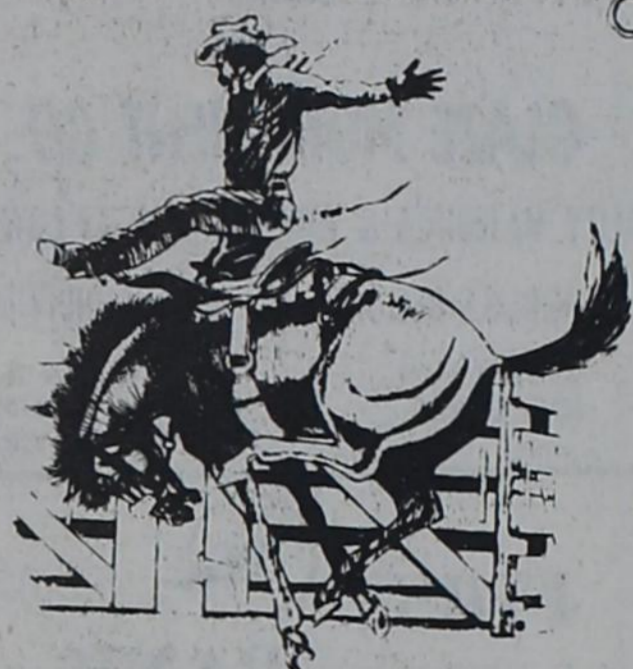

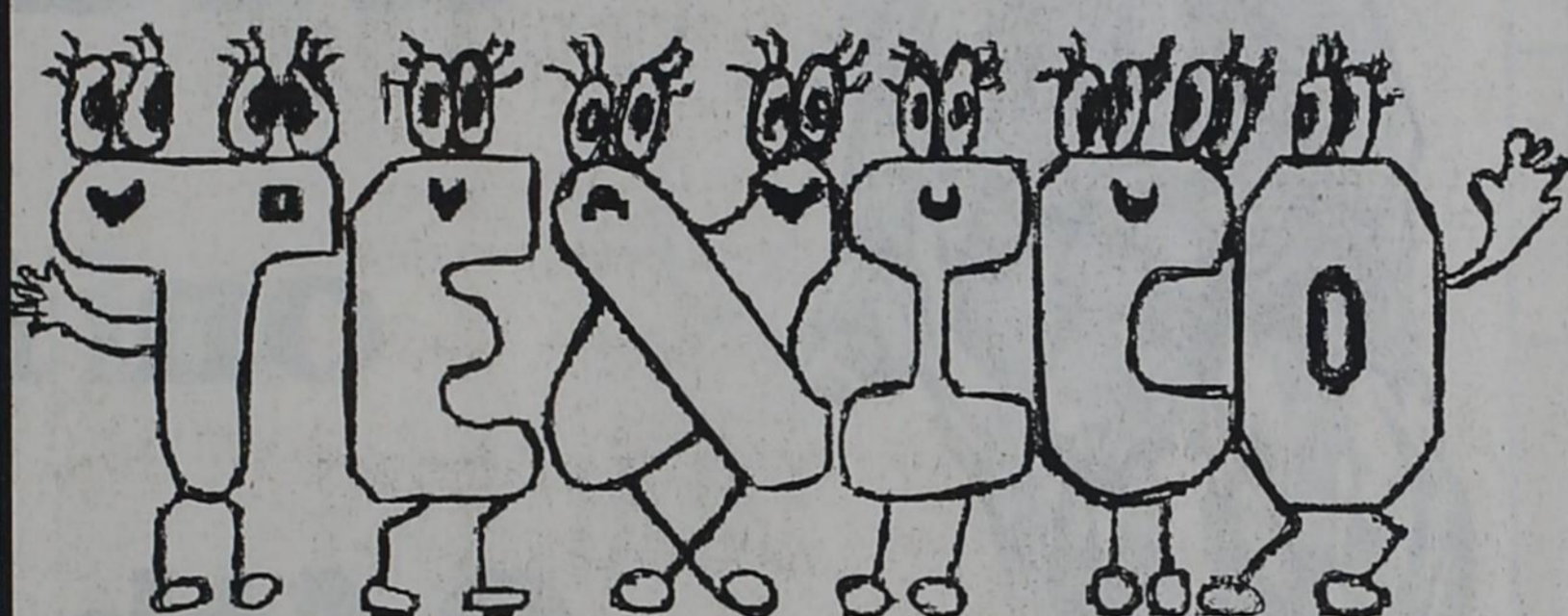

ticipants an opportunity to learn a bit about what the school program does, and it would be especially helpful to parents of boys playing.

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
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
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
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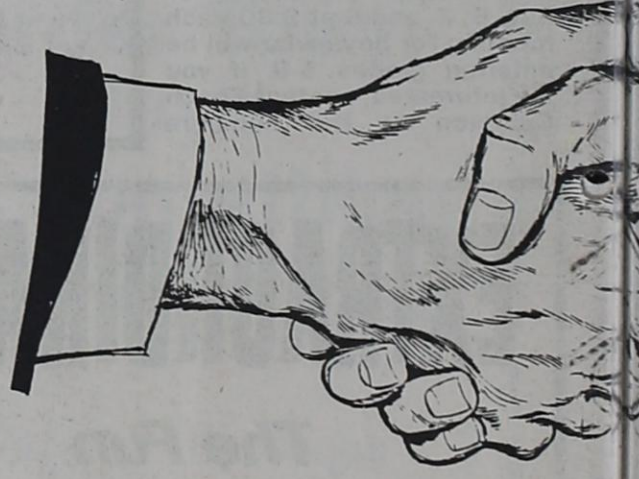

*Recipe of Week*

**Chocolate Tacos**

1/4 c. flour  
 1/4 c. sugar  
 1 Tbs. cocoa  
 2 Tbs. skim milk  
 2 Tbs. oil  
 1 tsp. vanilla extract  
 1 egg white  
 1/8 tsp. salt

Combine all ingredients in a mixer bowl. Beat at medium speed until smooth. Chill, covered, for 2 hours. Pour 3 Tbs. batter into a hot 8 - inch skillet with nonstick coating. Tilt to coat bottom of pan. Bake for 2 minutes or until surface appears dry; turn. Bake for 1 minute longer. Place in a taco rack or wire rack over large deep bowl. Drape tortilla darker side up over 1 - 2 bars of wire rack to form shell. Cool for 15-20 minutes. Fill with strawberries, banana, mango and kiwifruit. Garnish with whipped cream.

**Prize Peanut Butter Pie**

1 pkg. cream cheese (3 oz)  
 1 c. sifted powdered sugar  
 1/3 c. creamy peanut butter  
 1/2 c. milk  
 1 carton whipped topping (9 oz.)  
 1 graham cracker crust  
 1/2 c. finely chopped roasted peanuts

Whip cream cheese until soft and fluffy. Add sugar and peanut butter and blend into cheese. Slowly add milk, blending well. Fold whipped topping into mixture. Pour into baked and cooled pie shell and garnish with peanuts. Freeze until firm before serving.

**Frozen Dessert**

1 c. melted butter  
 2 c. crushed pretzels  
 6 Tbs. sugar  
 1 - 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk  
 1 - 20 oz. can cherry pie filling  
 12 oz. whipped topping  
 1 - 20 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

Combine butter, sugar, and pretzels; mix well. Press into a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 5 minutes. Combine remaining ingredients in a bowl; mix well. Pour onto pretzel crust. Freeze until firm. Cut into squares. Makes 12 servings.

**Pecan Dressing**

1/3 c. mayonnaise  
 1/3 c. chopped pecans  
 1/4 c. light corn syrup  
 1 c. plain yogurt

Stir the first three ingredients together. Fold in yogurt. Chill. Serve over fruit.

"Maybe they don't have the money to repair things in East Germany as much as they do in West Germany," Mrs. Bearss postulated.

She noted that many items were quite expensive in Europe. Ice cream cones in Berlin cost about \$3 each, and simple T-shirts without messages on the front were about \$20. "I mean, it was just a regular old T-shirt, as plain as it could be," she said.

The Bearss kept their souvenir purchases to a minimum.

"I wonder how the people there do it," she mused as she thought about the prices in the

store.

Because consumer items are so expensive, people in Europe are far more conservation-minded than Americans are. They found the people to be much less extravagant than we are.

"In Switzerland, they turn off their engines when they come to stop lights," said Mrs. Bearss. They also recycle bottles, cans and plastic.

Many of the buildings they visited were hundreds of years old. They were built to last, and people in Europe take great care of their property.

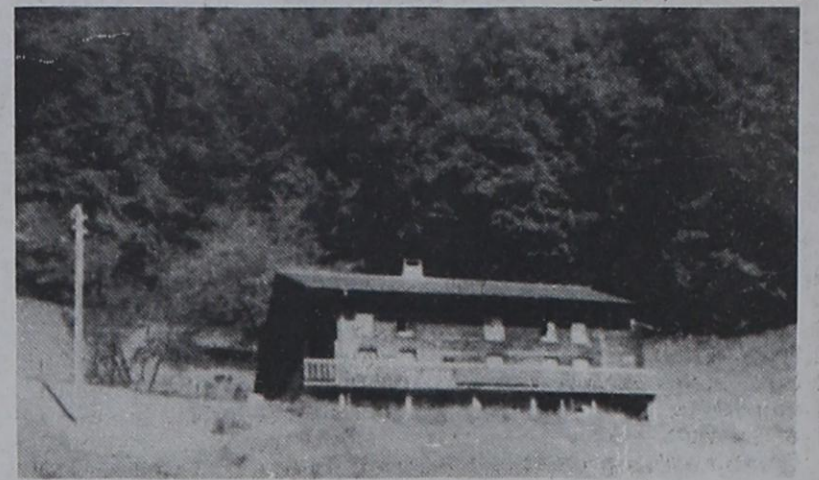
"They sure keep the autobahns in good repair," she noted.

"In Switzerland, you couldn't detect who was rich and who was poor. All the neighborhoods were kept-up," said Mrs. Bearss.

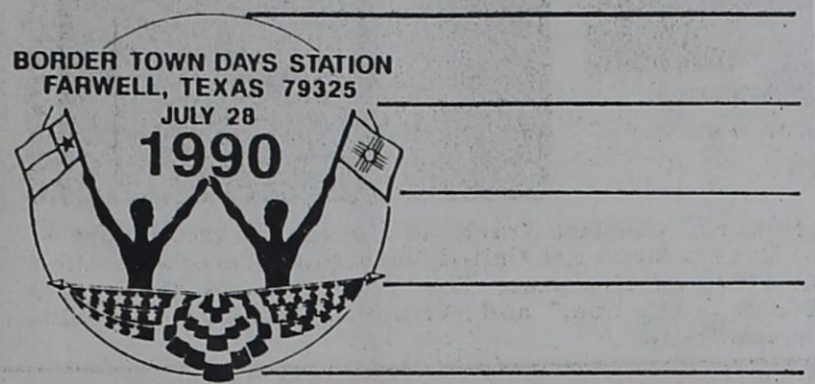
Many Americans would be shut out of the homeownership market in Europe because land often costs hundreds of dollars per square meter. The government of each country also has strict rules about the type and style construction which is allowed in certain areas.

Because they visited Europe in the spring, the Bearss noted the beautiful flowers everywhere they visited. The spring flowers were in bloom in gardens and on the mountain sides. Many of the buildings also had flowerboxes filled with blooms. It all helped to make everything more beautiful.

Other points of interest in Germany included: Frankfurt, Wurzburg, Rotenburg Ob Tauber, Ulm, Heildeberg, and Wolfsburg. On the last day of their trip they returned to Zurich, Switzerland where they departed for the U.S.A.
