Herington's unit honored for valor in Gulf War

Randy Herington, a 1981 Farwell graduate, was with the Second Armored Division's forward unit attached to the First Infantry Division's Big Red One during the war in Iraq. His unit received a valorous unit citation for the work that they did during the action.

According to Herington, his armored unit was in the forefront of the action. From Feb. 15 - 18, they traveled about 150 miles into enemy territory in 72 hours.

"We were in the front when the ground war started," said Herington, "Our task force took more casualties than any other."

Although he was in the forefront of the battle, there was only one time when he felt physically threatened - when the armored personnel carrier he was riding in was hit with shrapnel.

During the time they were in the Middle East, the men in Herington's unit lived in their armored personnel carrier much of the time. When they stopped for the night they dug holes, and slept near their Bradley.

Herington said the men in his unit had one night when they had mechanical difficulties with their equipment, but most of the time it worked quite well. "All of our companies made it. We had small mechanical breakdowns, but since we were moving that far that fast they held up pretty good."

Most problems they faced appeared to be manageable. When they first arrived in the desert, the weather was very cold. Sometimes the men would need showers very badly, but it was so cold at 5 a.m. that none of them really wanted to shower. Often they didn't have to worry about it - there was no water available for showers.

The weather also caused a few problems, but nothing like the terrible sand storms that scrubbed the attempt to rescue the hostages in Iran a few years back. The Middle Eastern battle zone had more rain this year than in the past 10 years combined. The rain seemed to be a nuisance for our troops, but it didn't slow Herington's unit down much.

Food was a nuisance, but not a real problem. The men in Herington's unit ate prepackaged MRE's, which he says, 'taste pretty good, but you get tired of them. They give you

three kinds, and there are always two you don't like. They aren't bad, but they are monotonous."

Herington's mother, Doris, had complained this winter about how difficult it was to get mail or phone calls to him early in the action, but eventually the supportive messages from home arrived. Herington expressed appreciation for all of the support he had received from folks back home.

When he got home he saw a shirt that summed up that support to him. He said, "It said 'Support Our Troops'. It didn't say 'Support the War,' but it said 'Support our Troops.' It was good to know that people cared about us."

Herington noted that the experience taught him a lot about people. Not only did he see the way that his fellow colleagues reacted under the stresses of battle, but he also saw the way people from other cultures reacted.

After going through the thick of battle, Herington was amused by some of the Arabs he met at the King Khaled Military Facility. According to Herington, they complained about their facility. "They had air conditioning, showers, washers, and dryers. They complained because one of their dryers didn't work," he said.

He also remembered the enterprising Arabs who would take a GI's picture with a camel for a package of cigarettes. or sitting on a camel for a carton of them. Few GI's took advantage of the service because, cigarettes were hard to come by.

After the battles, Herington's unit went to Raffa where they were assigned to the relief effort. He had the opportunity to meet some of the people from Iraq in the camp for refugees.

The refugee work helped Herington o understand the importance of the war effort. After talking to some of the refugees, he understood the importance of the presence of the US in the Middle East.

"It wasn't just about oil," said Herington. "One fellow I talked to had a wife and two kids killed by Saddam's secret police." Many others had lost homes and businesses and loved ones. The full picture of what Saddam had done to his own people came home to Herington during that relief effort. It seemed to underline the true value of the American effort in Kuwait.

When asked about Saddam Hussein, Herrington's opinion was, "We should have finished the job, but the Arabs wouldn't let us." In spite of that, it appeared to Herington that most Americans consider the war effort a success.

He does place his experience in perspective when he compared it to the Vietnam War. "Supposedly, we came back heroes," said Herington, "But from talking to guys like Jimmy Curtis and others I've talked to who served in 'Nam, it was a whole lot harder in 'Nam than it was in Saudi."

Herington and his family spent Father's Day with the Herington family. His wife, Margaret, and daughters Sharie and Leah live in Lubbock.

Herington is stationed in Germany.



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

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
