#### 'Business is war'

A guest column from wife Judy:

Earlier this summer Mike and I enjoyed reading the book Jurrasic Park and seeing the movie based upon the book.

It was fun comparing the two - movie and book.

So we did the same with Michael Crichton's latest book - Rising Sun, a fast-paced murder mystery set against the backdrop of high power business and international relations.

The book and movie of the same name are two very different animals. The book is a T-Rex while the movie is a much tamer beast - still worth watching, but much tamer.

The movie tones down the intense pressures that are placed upon the cops conducting an investigation involving both American and international VIP's. It balances some of the anti-Japanese points of the book with some anti-American ones. It tones down the racism and the rhetoric of the book. It also leaves out a wealth of cultural background.

The main thrust of the book is that the Japanese business philosophies are "Business is war" and "All is fair in war." Crichton contends that the Japanese have systematically targeted and taken over many key American defense industries.

He says, "But we can't ignore the reality of targeted, adversarial trade as practiced by Japan - where business and government make a planned attack on some segment of the American economy."

Before I go any farther with this I must say that I viewed both the book and the movie as an outsider. I'm not involved in big business. I am not an economist; I do not know if Crichton is correct in some of his assessments. I do know that both the movie and the book are fiction. And they are told with such convincing details that it is hard to separate fact from fiction at times.

When Crichton writes about any topic he does such a convincing job that it is easy to accept every single thing he says as Gospel instead of examining it realistically.

Earlier this summer I read another Crichton novel, Congo. It was interesting, too. But, many of the things he proposed way back in 1979 when he wrote Congo turned out to be false. After all, he's only human like the rest of us.

Rising Sun analogy between the Japanese attack on American business now and the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941. The movie leaves this out.

In the book, Crichton points out several ways to turn what he considers to be a horrible business disaster of the magnitude of Pearl Harbor to our advantage just as we did in the 1940's. Examples:

- He quotes Akio Morita, "If you don't want Japan to buy it, don't sell it."

- He says that the Japanese can undersell us because they have designed plants that are (in some cases) 60% more fuel efficient than ours. Maybe we need to design some more efficient new

- He suggests that the U.S. use several legal techniques that are already at our fingertips to change the situation:

(1) Congress already has the power to block the sale of businesses that are involved in the defense industry.

(2) Our legal system recognizes that while a single act may not be considered

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## **Texico writes** to Gov. King

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted to send a letter to Gov. Bruce King explaining why it recently turned down state funds to help with its water contamination problem.

At a special session last month, the council voted 4-0 (Butch Tharp, Carolyn Burrows, Oran Jay Autrey and Ronnie Warmuth) to reject the state's offer of an interest free loan for an air stripper. That vote, against Mayor Doyal LaRue's recommendation for acceptance, helped bring on LaRue's resignation.

The state's offer also included a state grant to pay for an air stripper. The council agreed to accept this grant but the state offer was tied to the loan for the second air stripper.

Air strippers are placed on water wells. They use air to

remove contaminants from the water supply. Texico ran into a major problem over two years ago when tests showed that the KKR Park well was contaminated by carcinogens, which cause cancer. That well was immediately closed and the city has had to rely on its lone functioning well, at Lions Park, for its water supply.

Last month, the city closed a transaction to buy property near the school to build a second well, with a state grant. Bids will be opened on this well next month.

The most recent state tests involving the contamination showed some goods. The dividing line is 5 parts per billion anything above that line shows contaminated water; below it is acceptable water, said water supt. Billy Hammit.

The first test at KKR Park well showed 9.2 parts per billion. The recent test, said Hammit, showed 6.8 parts per billion. Thus, the contamination is receding there although the level is still unacceptable.

Other recent tests taken at various sites also were positive: Lions Park well - .2 parts per billion; and a test well east of KKR Park - .3 parts per billion.

Since it appears the contamination is moving in a southeastern direction and could affect Lions Park well, air strippers are needed for that well and also for KKR Park well, which could be put back into production through the dual use of an air stripper and by mixing that water with water from the other wells. This is why the air strippers are needed.

The costs involved in dealing with this contamination have taken much of Texico's reserve funds. So the city has to be very careful in spending money.

The letter being sent to Gov. King was drafted by Mrs. Burrows. Nothing is asked of Gov. King, except that "prompt, positive action be taken immediately by the appropriate state agency" concerning the identification of the source and control of the contamination in the aquifer.

The letter notes that surveys show that 67 percent of Texico's approximate 1,000 household show low to moderate incomes. "Any appreciable expansion is unlikely because funds are not available for water and sewer line additions and few lots with water and sewer lines available are vacant. A large portion of cour citizenry are retired and living on fixed incomes."

The letter points out that water lines under the Clovis highway need repair and funds raised through recent rate hikes are earmarked for that project.

In other business, the council:

- Received two bids for the annual chip and seal coat project. The bid of Appian, Hereford, was accepted.

 Authorized Mrs. Burrows to write a letter of appreciation to former Mayor Doyal LaRue, who resigned two weeks ago. Warmuth suggested it be published in the Tribune, too.

- Heard Bill Autrey ask if the north side of his home would be involved in the state-financed street curbing and gutter program. City Attorney Duane Hamar said it wasn't included this year. He said the state had done an engineering study and picked out streets on a priority basis that carried the

Autrey asked if the city could do the work and he would pay it back. Hamar said New Mexico doesn't allow that type of arrangement.

- Asked City Engineer Bob Lydick to check into the request by Cook Oil Co. to pave its expanded truck stop on the western outskirts of Texico. The problem involves utility lines.

- Heard Warmuth suggest that the mayor's salary be increased, since the amount of work done by the mayor has skyrocketed in recent years. Currently, the mayor receives \$20 per meeting and councilmen receive \$10 per meeting.

Warmuth suggested \$500 a month for the mayor. Mrs. Burrows questioned if the city had funds available for that hike. The topic was formally placed on the next council agenda. If any pay raises are approved, they would not go into effect until the next city election in March 1994.

- Agreed to let City Marshal Gilbert Holguin buy two new bullet-proof vests with state funds.

- Heard Holguin report on hazards at the former Westerner Motel. He said he found 12 juveniles rampaging in the decrepit building, and believes someone is living in a basement there.

The city will send a letter to the owner, now believed living in California, asking that the weeds be cut there.

The problem Texico has is that the city doesn't have the money to demolish the structure if condemnation were approved by the building inspector.

City Clerk Marie Christian noted that the joint powers agreement with Clovis allowing Texico to use the Clovis building inspection department was okayed by the Clovis city

council and went into effect Aug. 1.

## Parmer starts budget discussion

Discussions on next year's budget were begun by the Parmer County Commissioners Monday.

At the top of the list was the recent request of Friona city officials for more financial help for their fire department - since the vast majority of their calls are made to county addresses.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton said several ideas were discussed, with no decisions

 Possibly organizing a county fire district for taxing purposes.

- Instead of disbursing an equal amount of funds to each of the county's volunteer fire departments, use the percentage of county calls made by the departments as the basis for disbursing funds.

- Pay each fire department a flat fee, then use extra funds to be divided pro rata between the fire departments that are located within city limits (Bovina, Farwell and Friona).

The commission is faced with a tighter overall budget. At this point, Judge Clayton said no tax hike is anticipated other than the usual 3 percent allowable by law that the commission has been approving in recently years.

The budget discussions will continue, with the annual hearing set for mid-September.

In other business, the commissioners approved allowing use of the courthouse's first floor Aug. 2 for the county 4-H fair.

unfair or illegal, the pattern of actions can often determine the extent of harassment or aggression. By now, according to Crichton's evidence, there are ample patterns upon which to base legal cases which could block the sale of businesses or products. It may be time to press for "fair trade" rather than totally "free trade."

(3) Japan uses a wealth of red tape in issuing patents and in certain business practices when dealing with the U.S. We can, too.

(4) We could tax the profits of businesses owned by foreign nationals or businesses.

Crichton suggests that we adopt a Japanese management philosophy: "Fix the problem, not the blame." That makes a whole lot of sense.

And Crichton points out in the book that both the British and the Dutch have larger investments in the U.S. than the Japanese do. The difference he contends is that the Japanese have targeted key U.S. industries.

" The British and Dutch don't operate that way... if we want to buy a Dutch or English company, we can. We can't buy a Japanese company," he says.



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


Lake. The couple is at home in Deer Park.







## Recipe of Week

**After Dinner Mints** 

8 oz. cream cheese, softened spearmint, wintergreen, lemon or orange flavoring to taste food coloring

2 16 - oz. packages confectioners' sugar

granulated sugar

Beat cream cheese. Add in confectioners' sugar gradually, mixing well after each addition. Mixture may be divided into 3-4 balls. Add flavoring and food coloring of choice to each batch. For instance, add green food coloring and spearmint to one batch. Add yellow food coloring and lemon flavoring to another batch.

Shape into small balls. Roll each little ball in granulated sugar. Press into a candy mold or flatten with a fork. Store between waxed paper in an airtight container. Makes about
