Cowboys are stronger

The football season is upon us - the time when husbands don't talk to their wives for the next several months.

First, pro football:

I've been watching the Cowboys in pre-season and it's hard to get a fix on them because they have played so many players. But they definitely are a Super Bowl contender again.

Obviously, the Cowboys are not as strong as they would be if they had Smith back in the lineup. But this rookie from Alabama, Lassic, has impressed me. With the kind of offensive line that Dallas boasts (barring injuries), this new running back will more than hold his own. I believe he has a good chance to vie for Rookie of the Year honors.

Aikman looks super at QB. The Cowboys are going to score a lot of points on his passes to Harper, Irvin, Novacek and Williams. A real key here is Novacek. If he is injured, the Cowboys will be hurting.

Special teams were a point of pride with the Cowboys last year. This year, they will be better on kickoff and punt returns, thanks to their new speedster, Williams. But I am worried about their punts - they had two blocked in the pre-season.

On defense, the Cowboys will be tough again. They have a plethora of fast defensive backs and solid linebackers. But their defensive line will be awesome, especially in the 4th quarter - when they can bring in fresh, top-notch linemen while their opponents will be tiring. Look for the Cowboys to give up very few points in the final period.

Another key is the kicker, Elliott. He had a bad pre-season, but several of his misses were not off more than a foot. I'm optimistic he'll be back in form. If so, he is a superb weapon. One plus is that he is booting his kickoffs into the end zone - about 5 to 8 yards further than last year.

I think it's neat that the Super Bowl champion Cowboys are better in several respects - better kickoffs, better kickoff returns, better receivers, better defensive backfield, better defensive line. The question mark negative is the loss of Smith - but for how long?

Now a look at the college ranks:

I'm not happy about the trend I've witnessed the past several years for the nation's best teams to put a bunch of rinky-dinks on their schedule. For one thing, it's hard for me

to get good match-ups for the weekly football contest!

The football prognosticators seem to pick Florida State No. 1 each year before the season begins, then watch the 'Noles get nipped by Miami (Fla.). I will also go with Florida State this year, just because of the law of averages.

And the high school teams: First, Lazbuddie. The Longhorns have a solid chance at a state title (I hope I'm not hexing them). They have good depth and experience. Don't be surprised to see them in a state title game in December. Good luck, coach Scisson.

And Farwell and Texico: our teams are young and inexperienced. And they play some tough teams. But the point isn't how many games they win, it's how they grow and mature during the season. You need to compare how they do early on with their last conference games.

Bank to show assortment of artwork

Security State Bank, Farwell, will be displaying 50 to 60 pieces of art on Sept. 8 and 9 during banking hours in their lobby.

The artwork represents many nationally known artists from the gallery of Rice Fine Art of Amarillo.

The exhibition will include western, wildlife, landscape and figurative art. Oil paintings, watercolors, drawings, bronzes, limited edition prints, and books are included in the show. All works of art will be available for purchase. Prices of the art will range from \$100 to approximately \$10,000.

Original works by such artists as Dalhart Windberg, G. Harvey, Frank C. McCarthy, Tom Lovell, Paul Calle and Bob Kuhn will be exhibited.

McCarthy was an illustrator for 21 years for many national magazines. He became an immediate success as a fine art artist. He has been a member of Cowboy Artists of America since 1975. Retrospectives of his work have been held at the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa, the Museum of the Southwest in Midland, Norton Museum in Shreveport, and the Cowboy Artists of America Museum in Kerrville. He and his work are the subjects of three major books.

Lovell has been an illustrator for magazines such as "Life", "True", "McCall's" and "National Geographic." He was commissioned by Abell Hanger Foundation to do a series of 14 historical paintings that now hang in the Permian Basin Petroleum in Midland.

Retrospectives of his work have been held at the Gilcrease Museum and the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. Lovell is the only painter to win the Prix de West award twice at the NAWA exhibitions. A major book on his works was published in 1993.

Calle is best known for his pencil drawings. He wrote the book, "The Pencil." He was the official NASA artist. He designed the "First Man on the Moon" stamp and many others including Robert Frost, Douglas MacArthur, and Fredrick Remington. A major retrospective of his works was held in 1991 at the Gilcrease Museum. A book was published on his works in 1992.

Windberg was born in Texas in 1933. He resides near Austin. He is probably Texas' most popular landscape artist. He was commissioned to do an official painting for the opening of the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library in Austin. And he is the subject of two major books.

Kuhn was born in Buffalo, N.Y. in 1920. He was an illustrator for years, and did covers for such publications as "Field & Stream", "Outdoor Life" and "Sports Afield". He entered the fine art field in 1970. He has been featured in numerous art magazines. He won the prestigious Prix de West award at the 1991 NAWA exhibition at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame. He is the winner of two gold medals and one silver medal at previous NAWA exhibitions.

Limited edition prints will also be exhibited by artists such as Bev Doolittle, Howard Terpning, G. Harvey, Tom Ryan and Robert Abbott.

County rejects Friona proposal

Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton said the Parmer County Commissioners Aug. 23 unanimously rejected a proposed contract from the City of Friona in order for Friona to continue to provide rural fire protection after Oct. 1.

Friona City Manager Paula Wilson said the Friona City Council approved the proposed contract Aug. 16. Basically, Friona wants Parmer County to reimburse the city figuring the Friona's actual expenses, less 20 percent. The ratio of city fires to county fires would be totaled, less accidents and false alarms. The city was asking for quarterly payments, beginning Jan. 1, 1994.

So Friona plans to stop answering fire calls outside the city limits (actually, outside a one-half mile radius of the city) on Oct. 1.

Last year, the county's fire departments got \$85,394 from the county commissioners, which included a special \$20,000 toward a new fire engine for Friona.

Mrs. Wilson noted that Friona passed an ordinance in 1973 saying the fire department would only respond to fire calls within the corporate limits of Friona and within a one-half mile radius of the city.

Presently, the county commissioners have been giving each volunteer fire department a flat total. Since Friona

Football contest is under way

That annual fall pastime - the Area Merchants Football Contest - begins its 35th season today. The entry blank is on the back of this newspaper issue; more entry blanks are available at the Tribune office.

The top prize for the winner of the 12-week contest will again be two tickets to see the Dallas Cowboys play at Texas Stadium. They will host their fierce rivals, the Washington Redskins, Dec. 26.

The grand prize winner also will get \$50 in cash, a night's lodging for two at the famed Radisson Hotel, and more goodies.

And the reason the Tribune is able to offer the contest, and the weekly cash prizes (\$10 for first and \$5 for second) is due to the following sponsors:

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Rules for the 1993 contest will be the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years of age to enter. Entrants must choose 12 teams they think will win the selected contests.

Games will be divided by high school, college and pro ranks. In case of a tie game, unless the tie was predicted by the entrant, that game will not be counted.

Each entrant must remember to pick a tie-breaker score, a very important feature of the contest since many weekly winners (and overall winners) have been determined by the tie-breakers.

The person naming the most games correctly each week will receive a check for \$10; the second place winner gets \$5.

Each week's scoring is tabulated and kept on record at the Tribune office. The standings are posted each Monday and may be seen during regular business hours.

All entry blanks must be turned in to the Tribune office by 5 p.m. cdt Fridays or, if mailed, must bear a Friday postmark.

It's very important that you enter each week's contest to have a strong shot at being the overall winner. Even if you never pick 11 or 12 to take the weekly prize, you may win the overall prize with a consistent 8 or 9 weekly tally.

Parmer County to organize 'Crime Stoppers'

The Parmer County Sheriff's Department is organizing a Crime Stoppers program for the county.

Chief Deputy Don Hatley is in charge.

Offering anonymity and cash rewards, Crime Stoppers seeks information through the media on all felony crimes in the community.

To overcome the citizen's fear of involvement or reprisal, Crime Stoppers assures all callers they remain anonymous. Also, the program pays cash rewards for information leading to the arrest of felony offenders.

The first thing Hatley plans

is to put together a 6-person board. He wants folks from all over Parmer County to be represented on this board. If you are interested, call Hatley at the sheriff's office - 481-3303.

This board will decide on cash awards for persons giving information.

Later, Hatley will put together a larger advisory board.

Crime Stoppers is funded by private donations, plus some court ordered probation fees. Also, some funds collected from the criminals goes into the pot.

Crime Stoppers is a non-profit organization.

School tax notices incorrect

A tax notice published in this week's issue may leave some local taxpayers scratching their heads in confusion.

The notice incorrectly states that the Farwell School tax rate will grow by 311.5 percent. But in publishing the notice, Farwell School officials are only complying with a state law.

"This is one of those situations where the law doesn't make any sense, but we must nevertheless comply with it or risk serious consequences," said Supt. Richard Boothby.

Farwell Schools is required by the state's "truth in taxation" law to publish an official notice reporting last year's tax rate, the proposed tax rate for this year, and the percentage increase.

However, due to a drafting oversight in the new school finance law, the notice significantly understates the tax rate for last year and produces a misleading comparison between last year's and this year's school taxes.

Under the previous school finance law, the county education district (CED) levied part of the taxes used for operating schools and the school district levied the rest. Under the new school finance law, CEDs are eliminated and all school taxes are levied by the school district.

Last year, the CED imposed a tax rate of \$.825 (per \$100 of value) and Farwell Schools imposed a tax rate of \$.39 for a combined school tax rate of \$1.215. This year, Farwell Schools is proposing the same rate - \$1.215.

Because of the mistake in the new school finance law, Farwell Schools is required to report a 1992-93 tax rate of \$.39, a 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.215 and an increase of 311.5 percent, when in reality the rate will stay the same.

In an effort to correct the misinformation, Farwell Schools is publishing alongside the tax notice an advertisement indicating that the official tax notice is wrong. The supplemental ad, also paid for by the school district, provides the correct tax information.

A "hotline" is set up, where folks can call in tips. Each caller is given a code number to ensure anonymity.

Over the past 12 years, Crime Stoppers information has been responsible for clearing over 72,000 crimes and the arrest of over 53,000 suspects.

The Parmer County sheriff's office attempted to begin a Crime Stoppers program around six years ago under then-chief deputy Jerry Atchley. But he took ill about that time and the program never got past the first public meeting in Bovina.

voiced its complaint that it was not being reimbursed fairly since a larger number of its calls are outside the city limits, the commissioners have been discussing changing its formula.

In its budget discussions, the county commissioners are viewing three proposals:

1) The county has set aside \$50,000 for the county's fire departments.

Of this, \$5,000 would go to send firemen to hazardous waste material school. This amount would let two firemen from each of the five departments attend (Farwell, Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie and Rhea-Hollene).

Also, each of the five departments would receive a flat \$5,000 subsidy.

This leaves \$20,000, which would be pro-rated among the three city fire departments (Farwell, Friona and Bovina) according to the percentage of rural calls they make.

2) The county has set aside \$50,000 for the county's fire departments.

Each would get a set amount: Friona, \$20,000; Farwell, \$9,000; Bovina, \$9,000; Lazbuddie, \$6,000, and Rhea-Hollen, \$6,000.

3) Pay each fire department a given amount of money per rural call they make.

Judge Clayton said the commissioners felt that the Friona proposed contact was open-ended, and the county would not have a set idea of the expenses involved. She noted that county doesn't want to raise its tax rates, other than the usual 3 percent it normally approves each year.

Here's a synopsis of the proposed Friona contract:

* Friona agrees to furnish fire fighting equipment and personnel outside the city limits upon the following conditions:

* Parmer County agrees that the acts of any persons while fighting fires outside Friona's city limits shall be considered as the acts of agents of Parmer County in all respects,

although such persons may be regular Friona city employees or firemen.

* Parmer County agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Friona for any damages, or injuries to employees, agents, workmen or firemen of Friona, or to any person's property as a result of performing fire calls outside the city limits. If anyone files suit for damages to his person or property, the county will defend all such claims.

* If Friona's fire insurance rates are raised or jeopardized as a result of answering fire calls outside Friona, then Friona can terminate this contract in 60 days.

* There should be no liability on Friona's part if all its fire fighting equipment is in use under such circumstances as to preclude answering a fire call outside the city limits.

* The county would pay Friona a quarterly fee, to be computed this way: the cost of furnishing fire protection services for rural and non-rural fire calls during the last preceding calendar quarter shall be computed, less 20 percent, and the total number of fire calls inside the city and outside the city shall be computed. The cost of furnishing such rural fire protection shall then be determined by computing the ratio of rural fire calls to the total number of calls for the quarter excluding all accidents, rescues and false alarms.

Supper set

Here's two views of the fire calls that have been made in 1990, 1991 and 1992 (although some departments may be using different "calendar years"):

1) The following statistics show the percentage of calls each fire department made to rural addresses. Obviously, all of Lazbuddie's and Rhea-Hollene's calls are "in the county" since they are not cities:

1990 - Bovina, 66 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 35 percent; Friona, 67 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent.

1991 - Bovina, 64 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 30 percent; Friona, 68 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent.

1992 - Bovina, 73 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 50 percent; Friona, 71 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent; Rhea-Hollene (in its first year of operation), 100 percent.

2) The following statistics show the percentage of calls made into the county by each fire department. Each year's totals should add up to about 100 percent:

1990- Of the 98 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 21 percent of them; Farwell, 15 percent; Friona, 43 percent; Lazbuddie, 20 percent.

1991 - Of the 97 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 30 percent of them; Farwell, 12 percent; Friona, 41 percent; Lazbuddie, 16 percent.

1992 - Of the 139 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 32 percent of them; Farwell, 6 percent; Friona, 37 percent; Lazbuddie, 19 percent; Rhea-Hollene, 5 percent.

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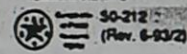

1993 Property Tax Rates in Farwell Hosp. Dist.

This notice concerns 1993 property tax rates for Farwell Hosp. Dist. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Dexter comes on strong to defeat Wolverines

The Texico Wolverines opened their season last Friday with a 36-12 loss to the Dexter Demons in an away game.

The final score, however, did not indicate the closeness of the game. The score was 6-6 going into the final period. And in the first quarter, the Wolverines dominated play.

Texico, a very young team this year, plays at Jal tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. mdt.

After punting the ball on their first possession, the Wolverine defense was stifling. On Dexter's first play, QB Sheldon Jensen was rudely introduced to Clyde Jenkins, who sacked him for an 8-yard loss. On the very next play, the tenacious defense popped the ball loose on an attempted run up the middle. Johnny Salinas recovered the ball.

The Demon defense, however, held strong, also, making Texico go three and out. On the first play from scrimmage after the Wolverines punted, the Texico defense again came up strong. Brett Norvell, a freshman, intercepted a pass by Jensen, who was pressured by the Wolverine line charge.

Texico found itself with a 4th and 15 in Demon territory so they went for it. But Bobby Winegeart was tackled after a short gain.

The Demons went on offense, earning their first down of the game. But on a scramble by the Dexter quarterback, Joel Barba was injured on the tackle. Barba, who is also the first string Texico quarterback, was taken to a Roswell hospital with a neck injury. He was back in school this week.

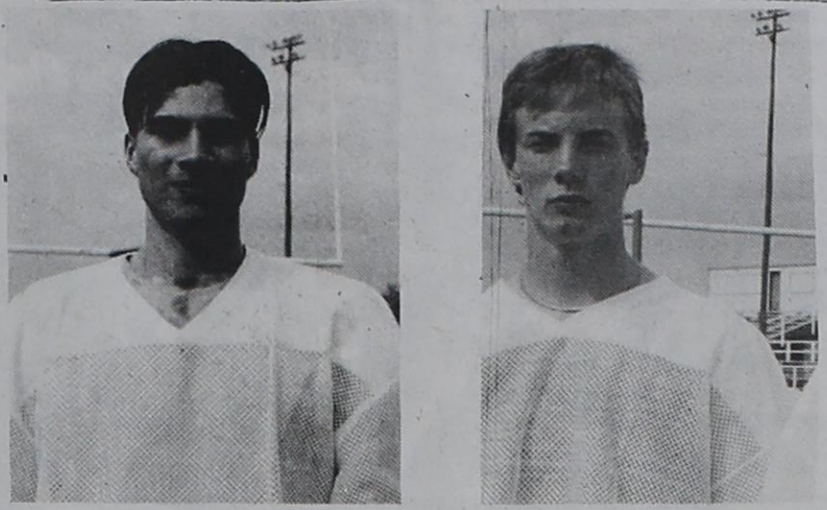
The Wolverine defense again hung tough. On a 4th down punting attempt, Winegeart blocked the punt.

Finally, the Wolverines made the Demons pay for their mistakes, as they took a fumble and produced a 40-yard scoring drive in the second quarter. Hadley Gilbert capped the drive with a 5-yard TD run at 4:23. The extra point kick failed.

Texico kicked off and Dexter's Delipe Sosa took the ball at the 1 yard line and returned it 50 yards to the Texico 49. The Demons drove downfield, tying the score at 6-all on a 1-yard plunge at 1:35.

The third quarter was scoreless, but the flood gates

opened in the final period when Dexter outscored Texico 30-6. With Barba out, things didn't get easier.

The bright spot for Texico was Johnny Salinas' runback of a kickoff 81 yards for Texico's second TD. But that wasn't

nearly enough to offset 5 Dexter scores, including a safety, a 2 yard TD run, and TD passes of 18, 25 and 33 yards.

Coach Barry Partain commented: "I thought we played pretty well for three quarters, especially after losing Joel Barba in the first period."

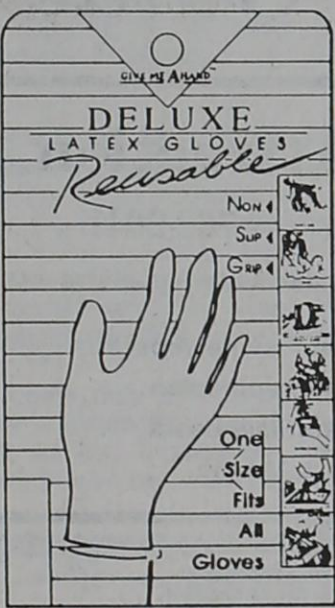
Canning and preserving season is in full swing in our area. Good technique and cleanliness are important in preventing spoilage of the preserved food.

If not destroyed by heat, yeast, mold and bacteria can grow in sealed canning jars! Clostridium botulinum (yields botulism toxin) and salmonella are two types of bacteria that may occur and cause serious illness.

Examine canned foods before using. 1) Do not taste cold food - food should be cooked sufficiently to kill possible bacteria before tasting. 2) Jars should show no signs of leakage, mold, fermentation or gas build-up upon opening.

If you suspect illness caused by canned food - see your doctor immediately. Early treatment may lessen the severity of the symptoms which may include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea. Botulism poisoning may be life threatening, so don't take any chances.

TB tests will be given to new students and new teach-

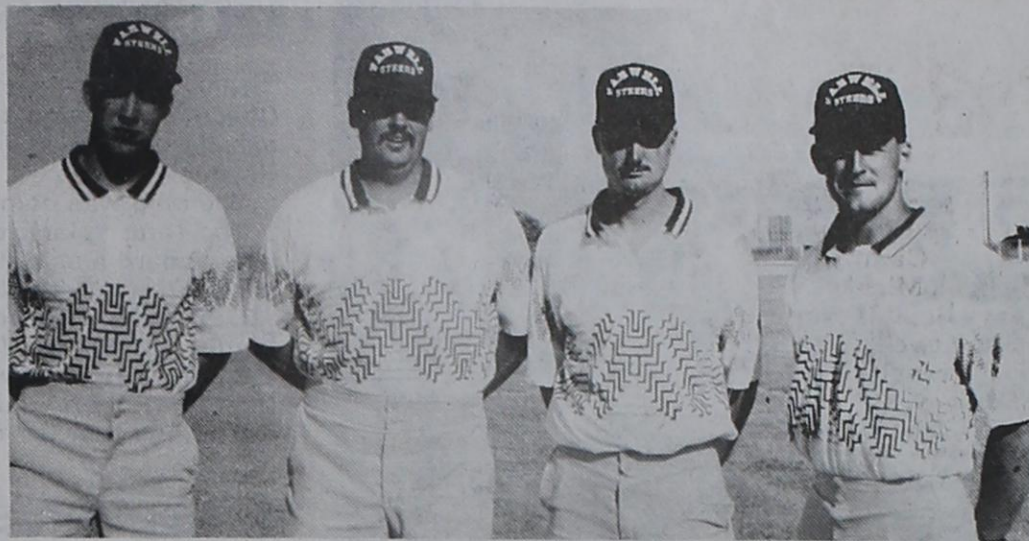
ers at Lazbuddie Schools on Sept. 7. They will also be given to pre-K, Kindergarten, 1st and 4th grade students.

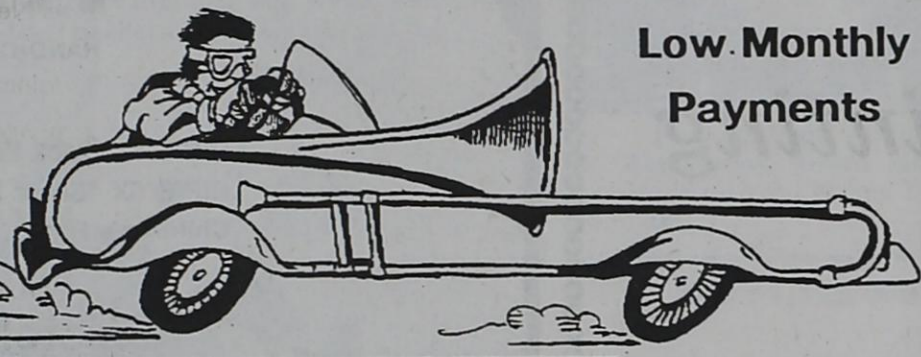

THE ACCOMPANYING TAX NOTICE IS WRONG

The Lazbuddie Independent School District is *required by state law* to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, *even though the notice is deceptive.*

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law, Lazbuddie I.S.D. may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school tax rate and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax rate to this year's tax rate.

The correct comparison of tax rates is as follows:

Last year's (1992-93) total school tax rate (including county education district taxes): **1.1870**

This year's (1993-94) proposed school tax rate: **1.2933**

Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The Lazbuddie Independent School District will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1993 by 357 percent. Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property.

The public hearing will be held on September 14, 1993, at 8:15 p.m.

The statement above shows the percentage increase the proposed rate represents over the 1992-93 tax rate that the unit published on September 3, 1993. The following table compares taxes on an average home in this taxing unit last year to taxes proposed on the average home this year. Again, your individual taxes may be higher or lower, depending on the taxable value of your property.

Under this proposal, taxes on the average home would increase by \$129.59 or 354 percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$93.13 per \$100 taxable value or 357 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

This percentage increase does not reflect 1992 taxes levied by the now-abolished county education district (CED). In 1992, the CED levied a portion of the taxes used for school purposes, and the school district levied the remainder of school taxes. In 1993, school districts will levy all school taxes. For an explanation of the increase, attend the public hearing scheduled above or call your school district.

The Chief's Corner

Q. Are cops in favor of gun control?

A. When I answer this, remember that it is my opinion only. I would have to say, no cops are not in favor of gun control. In my career I have only met three officers that I can think of that were in favor of gun control. We know one thing, regardless of the laws passed, the criminal will always be able to acquire firearms. We also know that the criminal is becoming more violent and that we cannot sit outside your house 24 hours a day.

When the glass breaks at 2 a.m., and you have a strung out drug addict, craving a fix in your living room, how can I then tell you that you don't have a right to own a gun? It is a fact that the cities with the strictest gun control laws also have the highest crime rates. It is a fact that burglars interviewed in prison have stated that they will avoid a house where they believe the owner is armed.

Comment: Before you rush out and buy a gun for "protection," you need to think about a few things. Owning a gun for "protection" implies that you will use it, and by using it you will take a human life. If you are unable to come to grips with that idea, then you don't need a gun, for one of two things will happen, the criminal will take the gun away from you or you will have destroyed your own life by killing another.

Aside from the heavy responsibility of taking a human life there are some other things you need to consider. You had better know the laws concerning the use of deadly force, you will not be able to say, "I didn't know" and expect to get away with it. Police officers know that they may only have a split second to decide to shoot or not, they also know that the lawyers for the plaintiff will have six months to find a different way you could have handled the situation. You are in the same boat when you use a gun on another person.

It simply cannot be stressed enough, owning a firearm for protection implies you will use it to kill another human being. It is your responsibility to safeguard that weapon, know that weapon, receive training with that weapon, and to continue training with that weapon for as long as you own it. One more thing, regardless of what some idiots may tell you, if you ever have to shoot someone, do not "drag the body inside." If you alter the scene of a homicide you will be caught and regardless of the circumstances you will be charged with murder.

'Hard to analyze'

"This year's crop is particularly hard to analyze," says Plains Cotton Growers Vice President Donald Johnson. "Expectations for the crop are changing day to day, mainly

due to a lack of additional moisture to help sustain the area's dryland cotton in the past two weeks."

The PCG issued a prediction of 3.68 million bales from the Texas High Plains on Aug. 11.

Johnson notes that the lack of timely rains on dryland farms adds a new dimension to the situation. Instead of wondering how much these dryland acres will yield, speculation now centers on how much can be saved and carried to harvest. Irrigated fields are still considered to be in good shape with the potential to meet or exceed current yield estimates.

Nationwide over the last ten years the August crop estimate has been over final cotton production five times and under final production five times. The average difference between the August estimate and final production figures is 543,000 bales.

The Farwell Independent School District is **required by state law** to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, **even though the notice is deceptive.**

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law, Farwell I.S.D. may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year.
