BTD postscripts

Well, I hope you folks enjoyed the 25th edition of Border Town Days.

I want to remind everyone that the final wrap-up meeting of the BTD Committee will be at the Farwell Convalescent Center at 8 p.m. cdt Monday. These meetings are always open to the public. If you have any comments about BTD, pro or con, please attend and present them. We're always looking to improve.

It's part of my job as BTD chairman to go around looking for problems and glitches, hopefully so they can be corrected for the following year. I'm very happy to report that this year's list was at a minimum. Thanks to our veteran crew of committee chairpersons, everything went pretty well.

My main concern this year was with our BTD button sales, spearheaded by committee chairman Rick Sullivan. I was hoping to raise enough funds so that we can increase the scholarship money given to Miss Border Town Days. This total for the past few years has been \$200.

First let me say that until we go over the final money figures at Monday's meeting, I won't know whether that amount can be increased. But I'm optimistic it can. Here's why;

We raised \$612 from this year's sale - a record. Our expenses were \$167 to buy the buttons and \$50 for the giveaway, totalling \$217. That means our profit was nearly \$400.

Each year, BTD runs a bit in the red, that's why we seek - and receive - excellent financial help from groups like the Texico and Farwell Chambers of Commerce, Tedson Trailers, the City of Farwell, etc.

If we can afford it, I'm hoping our committee will approve a boost in the scholarship money, effective this year, from \$200 to either \$250 or \$300. I'll let you know next week.

And I would especially like to thank Gwen Hughes for her work in selling buttons that helped make it the success it was.

Looking at other BTD aspects:

- It was really great to see the joy shown by the winner of the pickup giveaway, Gregg Williams.

Gregg, who is moving from Clovis to Albuquerque soon, was needing a vehicle. This is exactly what the doctor ordered, so to speak. Gregg is engaged to be married to Brenda Jones, of Farwell. Brenda is the daughter of Ori and Peggy Jones - Ori was in charge of the antique cars in the BTD parade, and Peggy was on the BTD queen's committee.

- One of the key parts of BTD is for local non-profit groups to earn money during the Day in the Park. All the ones I talked with did fantastic. That's great.

- The CAKE Train was a big hit again with the young'uns. I've always written that Jerry and Marcie Bell live in Pleasant Hill. Not so, I learned Saturday: they live in Ranchvale.

- Another fun event for the younger set was the puppet shows put on by First Baptist Church of Farwell members Pam Monk, April Stout, Julie Mitzelfelt and Ginny Mitzelfelt. Thanks, ladies.

- It was fun to have "Sugartime" Charlie Phillips join in on the entertainment late in the day. Folks got a big kick out of that surprise entry. The benefit concert he

Texico 'grant' survey now under way

Texico residents this weekend will receive a very important knock on their doors.

Residents are being surveyed to find out two basic questions:

1) How many people in their family live in their home.
2) The total income of all members of their household.

The reason it's important to answer these questions is because it will help determine whether the city can receive state and federal grants toward helping pay the cost of its serious KKR Well contamination problem.

When folks are surveyed, they do not give their name or address. But the folks taking the survey must reach a minimum of 60 percent of the city's households for the survey to be accepted.

The survey was the main discussion point at Tuesday's Texico City Council hearing. The hearing was needed because the grants must be sought by the end of August and 2 public hearings (the next being Aug. 6) are mandated.

Nine residents, plus city employees and councilmen, attended the hearing. All favored seeking state help in solving the well dilemma.

Street Supt. Matt Meeks is in charge of the survey. Helping will be other city employees and councilmen, plus Kathy Dionne, Karen Kosier, Ann and Lewis Cooper, Juanita Hadley, Rhonda and Rick Qualls, Gladys Fitz and Onita Dickerson.

The survey must be completed by Monday because it will take time to compile the necessary paperwork to go

along with the state grant request. Also, deputy marshal Fry Urioste has lined up several Spanish-speaking residents to help with the survey.

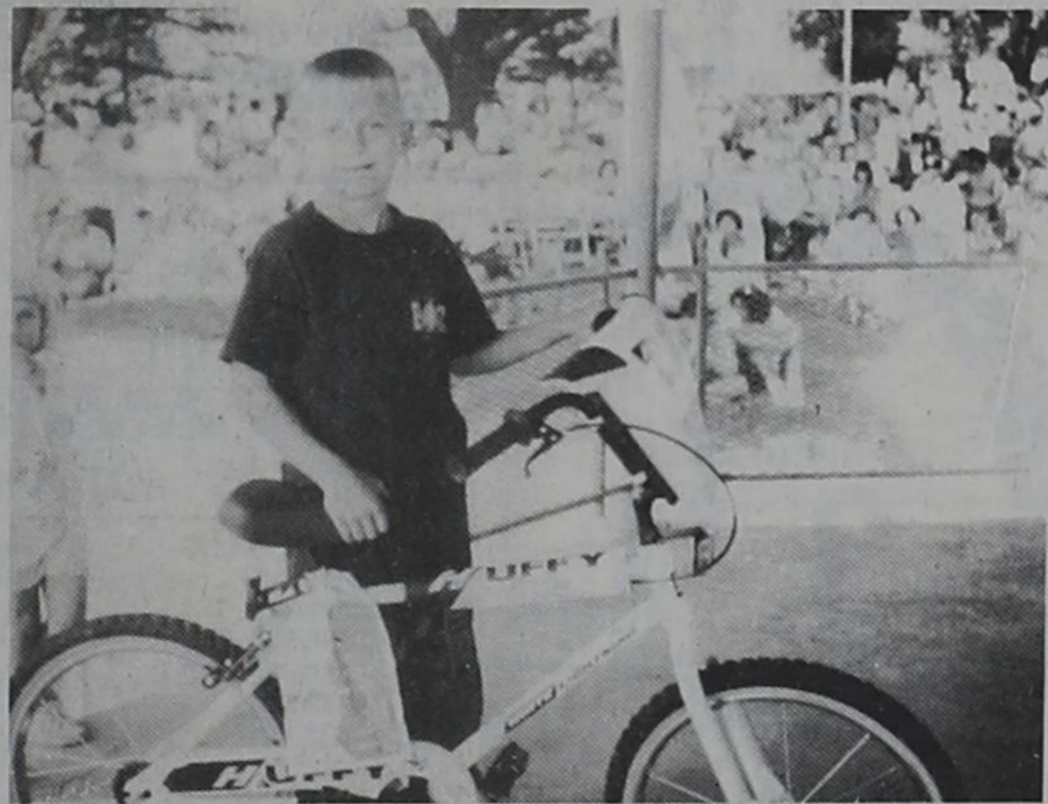
At last week's council meeting, Don Diego Gonzales, of Weston Corp., Albuquerque, the engineering consultant, said it was quite likely that Texico will get state aid.

The city must eliminate the carbon tet contaminant found in the now-closed KKR Park Well, and also plans to connect the KKR and Tower wells, which would dilute the contaminant, plus build a new well. The expense is expected to run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Texico officials hope this weekend's survey will show that at least 50 percent of the city's residents fall into low to moderate income categories. If that proves true, then any funds gotten from the state CDBG fund would not have to be repaid. However, if less than 50 percent fall into those categories, then Texico must repay 5 percent of it. Thus, for example, if Texico gets a grant of \$600,000, it would have to later repay \$30,000.

The 1980 census showed that Texico had 47 percent of its residents fall into the low to moderate income categories. The 1990 census results won't be available until this fall, said city clerk - treasurer Marie Christian.

Water Supt. Billy Hammit again stressed the need for city residents to conserve water until two wells are operating. Currently, only the Tower Well is operational.
